BARTLETT TOWN SCHOOL DISTRICT

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The equalized valuation of this district for this year is \$940,104 and the five dollar tax would be \$4,700.52.

The school tax for the current year contains deficiency appropriations for the previous year of \$471 for high school tuition and \$600 for high school transportation.

The payment of high school tuition is not obligatory but optional. It tends to equalize educational opportunity at an age when many pupils leave school for financial reasons.

After a careful survey of the situation in late summer the school board decided to discontinue the school at Goodrich Falls and send the pupils to Glen and to Intervale. Educationally the children have profited by attending a larger school and several hundred dollars have been saved.

The suggestion has been made and finds favor with a number of advocates that the district locate and build a new two-room school house. It is not my purpose to discuss this matter in this report beyond pointing out that educationally there would be an advantage in having two rooms of four grades each instead of two separate eight grade schools. When the teacher's time is divided among eight grades, it is manifest that the pupils are not faring as well as they do in schools with fewer grades to each teacher.

The arrangement with the Conway school board was continued this year whereby the Bartlett district pays half the cost of maintenance of the Kearsarge school. This is in lieu of tuition and avoids the necessity of transportation in that part of the district.

The part-time services of a school nurse could be secured at a moderate expense and would prove a most profitable investment. Much sickness could be avoided if the children could be regularly examined and parents

visited and urged to do the things needful for their children's welfare.

Income

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The equalized valuation of the special school district for next year is \$540,285 and the \$5 tax will be \$2,701.42. The per capita tax for next year will be \$249. State aid received for the current year was \$2,026.48 and the amount for next year based on this year's budget will be known at the time of the district meeting. This fiscal year will close June 30 with no deficit and probably a small balance.

Electric lights were installed in the grammar school last summer and are greatly appreciated. New curtains were also put up in the grammar school and in the high school, and are of the latest type.

With substantial aid from the state equalization fund, this district could well afford to share in the expense of maintaining a district nurse. An opportunity to join such a union is open only at this time of the year when arrangements are made and nurses engaged for next year.

The schools appreciate the generous gifts which they have received from the local Parent-Teacher Association.

The work of the schools is going on very satisfactorily. The extra-curricular activities have been interesting to the pupils, and the public entertainments have been excellent.
