## NOTES FROM THE SELECTMEN

The year 2006 has been both challenging and rewarding for the board. Quarterly budget reviews, fiscal diligence by the town departments, and assistance from the Capital Improvement Plan Committee have greatly assisted the board in achieving a prudent yet responsive balance between the operating budget and the level of service provided to the town. The heating efficiency improvement associated with replacement of the antiquated town hall boiler and heating system is providing immediate cost savings. The CIP is an integral part of the budgeting process. Their estimates provided valuable information and analysis for the planning and select boards and the town's departments. There was considerable deliberation, much of it focused on total compensation rather than wages alone, in arriving at this year's employee cost of living adjustments. The board's commissioning of the Infrastructure Study Group and the Water Supply Study Group has laid a foundation upon which the town will be asked to endorse overdue infrastructure improvements that should serve the town for the next twenty years and beyond. These improvements will be the subject of major public hearings sometime after town meeting.

The volunteers who staff these groups make small town government function. The citizen involvement and interaction between the various boards, groups, and committees, although not always in accord, is what government is all about. Work by town departments, the North Country Council, the planning board, and town residents, has resulted in a Hazard Mitigation Plan. It will help ensure continued eligibility for federal and state reimbursement of costs associated with natural disasters. Similar actions are underway to revise Flood Control Maps and Ordinances to ensure the continued availability for federal flood insurance to town residents. The town's emergency locator system, begun in 2005 with the establishment of regulation road signs, was completed this year with the placement of street numbers. The town's auditor is bringing the town into compliance with a new municipal accounting standard from the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB34). Achieving this standard will ensure that the town remains eligible for Federal Emergence Management Agency and other federal and state funding.

The board continued to increase its knowledge of municipal affairs by attending training opportunities from the Local Government Center, PRIMEX (the town's liability insurer), the North County Council, and state agencies. The town's opposition to the leasing of the Cannon ski area was represented before the Governor's State Parks Study Commission and the Resources, Recreation, and Economic Development subcommittee of the New Hampshire House of Representatives (currently House Bill 52). Our Chairman, with the assistance of the town Health Officer, has taken a leadership role in preparing Bethlehem, Easton, Franconia, and Sugar Hill to meet an influenza pandemic. Ongoing planning suggests that two hundred residents (sixty from Franconia) will be needed to staff the planned inoculation point of distribution (POD).

The year 2007 presents ample opportunities for accomplishment. The ongoing audit will be testing the internal controls knowledge of all personnel who authorize, handle, or expend funds. There will then be an updating and/or establishment of financial policies in the areas of cash receipts, investments, purchasing, credit card use, fund balance, debt, and fraud. The board will conduct an assessment of the efficiency and desirability of

replacing numerous computers with a single server. The reclamation of the Willow cemetery will be reinvigorated. Ordinances will be considered in the areas of Emergency Management, Vector Control (disease spread by insects), winter parking, and good weather road weight limits. The board will be addressing the recommendations of the Capital Improvements Committee. Their recommendation for long-term financing of infrastructure improvements is considered to be of primary importance. Construction at the town hall for personnel security, the establishment of an ADA bathroom, and additional energy conservation measures remain board priorities. A 2006 inventory of signs in town will be analyzed to bring signs into compliance with the zoning regulation. This will help maintain the village-like appearance of the town. The board will continue to support proactive health programs and continue to evolve personnel and compensation policies for employees. The board expects to continue working with the planning board on the refinement of sign, driveway, and building permits. The safety of the sidewalk and curbing along Main Street and the intersection of Main Street with Route 116 and Wallace Hill Road require continued scrutiny.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article and indicated that the overall budget is up 13% from last year. There was some discussion on the dispatch phone lines and the highways & streets line items. Ron Taksar and Sally Small spoke to the questions.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 2 passed unanimously by voice vote.

**At 7:50 PM the Moderator made an announcement that the polls would be closing at 8:00 PM.**

**ARTICLE 3.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred nineteen thousand five hundred-fifty dollars (\$119,550.00) to be added to the following Capital Reserve Funds previously established. The Selectmen and the Capital Improvements Plan recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Highway Trucks, \$36,000; Police Cruisers, \$19,100; Fire Pumper Truck, \$30,000; Fire Equip Truck, \$10,000; Life Squad Van, \$20,250 and Town Buildings Truck, \$4,200.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Carl Belz spoke to the article and gave a breakdown on the specific trucks that will be bought and the anticipated years that they would be purchased.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 3 passed unanimously by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 4.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty five thousand one hundred dollars (\$65,100.00) to be added to the following Expendable Trust Funds previously established. The Selectmen and the Capital Improvements Plan recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Highway Improvement, \$50,000; Sidewalk Improvement, \$5,000; Museum Maintenance, \$6,300 and Library Maintenance, \$3,800.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ramesh Dave spoke to the article giving a breakdown of what each amount would be used for.

There being no further discussion the article was called to a vote. Article 4 passed unanimously by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 5.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of nine thousand dollars (\$9,000.00) to purchase a new mower and trailer for the Town Buildings and Grounds Department. The Selectmen and the Capital Improvements Plan recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ramesh Dave and Jeff Phillips spoke to the Article.

After some discussion the article was called to a vote. Article 5 passed unanimously by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 6.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty-seven thousand six hundred and thirty dollars (\$57,630.00) to replace the boiler and heating system in the Town Hall and to authorize the withdrawal of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) from the Town Building Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund

created for that purpose. The amount of thirty-seven thousand six hundreds and thirty dollars (\$37,630.00) is to come from general taxation. The Selectmen and Capital Improvements Plan recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ramesh Dave spoke to the article stating that the boiler is the original from when the Town Hall was built in 1938.

After a brief discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 6 passed unanimously by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 7.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand four hundred twenty dollars (\$5,420.00) to install a detection and fire alarm system in the Town Hall. The Selectmen and the Capital Improvements Plan recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Carl Belz spoke to the article. There were some questions: where the system would be wired into, if this has gone out to bid and whether the system would detect for carbon monoxide? Ron Taksar and Ron Kirby spoke to the questions.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 7 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 8.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of nine thousand fifty dollars (\$9,050.00) to complete necessary fire code upgrades to the Town Hall. The Selectmen and Capital Improvements Plan recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ramesh Dave spoke to the article explaining the detail of what will be done for the necessary fire code upgrades.

There was some discussion about insurance of the Town Hall Building. Ron Taksar spoke to this comment assuring that Primex had inspected the building and asked to have these things implemented.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 8 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 9.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighty-three thousand two hundred eighty-five dollars (\$83,285.00) to purchase a loader/backhoe for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal of forty-seven thousand dollars (\$47,000.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The sum of twelve thousand two hundred eighty-five dollars (\$12,285.00) is to come from general taxation. Additional funding for this appropriation will come from trading in the 1989 John Deere (\$24,000.00). The selectmen and the Capital Improvements Plan recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

The article was read, moved and seconded. Carl Belz and Scott Knowlton spoke to the article. Carl Belz explained that the Selectmen originally envisioned this to be two separate articles one for a backhoe and one for a loader. At the budget hearing, Scott Knowlton gave a proposal for a multipurpose piece of equipment with significant savings for the Town. The CIP Committee had two members present at the budget hearing and was not able to meet again as a Committee to discuss this new proposal. Therefore, it is not correct to state that the CIP recommended this article. There were some questions about one piece of equipment being needed in two different places and whether the wear



and tear on this vehicle would decrease its lifespan. Jim Hamblin of the CIP Committee also cautioned that we still might need another piece of equipment in the future to take the place of the loader. Scott Knowlton spoke to these questions and concerns.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 9 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 10.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirteen thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven dollars (\$13,877.00) to purchase a stainless steel sander for the Highway Department. The amount of eleven thousand eight hundred seventy-seven dollars (\$11,877.00) is to come from general taxation. Additional funding (\$2,000.00) for this appropriation will come from trading in the 1995 steel sander. The Selectmen and the Capital Improvements Plan recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Carl Belz and Scott Knowlton spoke to the article. A question was raised about what the average life of a spread is? Scott Knowlton answered 15-20 years.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 10 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 11.** To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen as agents to expend the Safety Services Facilities Improvement Expendable Trust to allow for repairs to the building and to be in line with all the other Expendable Trusts. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ramesh Dave spoke to the article. There was discussion about this. Ron Taksar and Sally Small spoke to clarify that the Department of Revenue instructed the Town to do this.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 11 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 12.** To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of thirty-three thousand seven hundred fifty-six dollars (\$33,756.00) for a full Property Valuation Update and to raise the sum of twenty-three thousand seven hundred and fifty-six dollars (\$23,756.00) from taxation, and to authorize the withdrawal of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) from the Reassessment Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

The article was read, moved, and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 12 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 13.** To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of two hundred-sixty thousand two hundred sixty-two dollars (\$260,262.00) for the purpose of solid waste disposal and to raise fifty thousand nine hundred and ninety-seven dollars (\$50,997.00) from taxation, and to expend twenty-four thousand dollars (\$24,000.00) from the Transfer Station/Recycling Center Special Revenue Fund surplus. Additional funding for this appropriation will come from the Town of Sugar Hill (\$32,364.00), the Town of Easton (\$14,711.00), PAYT Fees (\$77,500.00), Special Handling Fees (\$35,690.00), and Recycled Material (\$25,000.00). The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

The article was read, moved, and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article. There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 13 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 14.** To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) for the purpose of a feasibility study to be expended by the Infrastructure Committee as they find necessary. The sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) will come from fund balance (surplus) and no amount will be raised from taxation. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved, and seconded. Carl Belz & Kathy Mead spoke to the article. There was discussion about what is being studied; Jim Hamblin of the CIP asked when the study would be completed. Ken Ford commented that the Infrastructure Committee should be ongoing.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 14 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 15.** To see if the town will vote to transfer two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) from the Recreation Committee's line item budget to the Rink Surface Maintenance Fund previously established. The Selectmen recommend this transfer of funds.

The article was read, moved, and seconded. Ramesh Dave spoke to the article.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 15 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 16.** To see if the town will vote to transfer one thousand-five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) from the Recreation Committee's line item budget to the Dow Field Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen recommend this transfer of funds.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ramesh Dave spoke to the article.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 16 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 17.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-six thousand five hundred sixty-five dollars (\$66,565.00) for the purpose of operating the Abbie Greenleaf Library and to transfer this amount to the Library Trustees for their use as they see fit. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Carl Belz spoke to the article.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 17 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 18.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,500.00) to purchase street numbers and posts for the Town of Franconia. The Selectmen and the Capital Improvements Plan recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 18 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 19.** To see if the Town will vote to dissolve the Health Insurance Deductible Expendable Trust created in 2003. With said funds plus interest to date to be placed in the town's general fund. The Selectmen recommend this article.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article. There was a question about the amount of money. Sally Small answered that the amount was in article 20.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 19 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 20.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand eighty-five dollars (\$5,085.00) plus interest to date, to be placed in the Emergency Management Expendable Trust Fund, which was previously created. (The sum of \$5,085.00 plus interest is the amount from the dissolution of the Health Insurance Deductible Expendable Trust Fund in warrant article #20). The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ron Taksar spoke to the article and made a motion to amend the article to read: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand eighty-five dollars (\$5,085.00) plus interest to date, to be placed in the Emergency Management Expendable Trust Fund, which was previously created. (The sum of \$5,085.00 plus interest is the amount from the dissolution of the Health Insurance Deductible Expendable Trust Fund in warrant article #19). The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. The amendment was moved and seconded.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 20 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 21.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for the Franconia Children's Center to be used for general operating expenses. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Carl Belz & David Weed spoke to the article. David Weed, board member, spoke to the article. The money would help to defray operating costs.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 21 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 22.** To see if the town will place a question on the state election ballot to change the polling hours so that the polls shall open at 11:00AM and close at 7:00PM for all regular state elections beginning with the first state election to be held in the year 2006 as provided in RSA 659:4-a.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Sally Small & Kathy Mead spoke to the article. Sally Small explained that this would be put on the ballot for State Primary and State General Elections for people to vote whether they want to change the hours. Kathy Mead added that it is difficult to get people to cover for the whole day. That is the reason for the proposed change.



Bill Mead made a motion to amend article 22 to read: To see if the town will place a question on the state election ballot to change the polling hours so that the polls shall open at 11:00AM and close at 7:00PM for all regular state elections beginning with the first state election as provided in RSA 659:4-a. The amendment was moved and seconded.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 22 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 23.** To see if the town will vote to modify the veteran's credit from \$1,400.00 to \$2,000 for service connected total and permanent disability as provided in RSA 72:27-a.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Sally Small spoke to the article. There was a question about what the maximum amount is for permanent disability. Sally Small responded that it was \$2,000.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 23 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 24.** To hear the reports of agents, auditors, and committees, or other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relative thereto.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Ken Ford spoke commending the group on a great meeting.

There being no reports or further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 24 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

**ARTICLE 25.** To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The article was read, moved and seconded. Bill Mead asked the people if they were opposed to waiving the reading of the articles? He explained that the article would be read before it is voted on but could be a time saver.

There being no further discussion, the article was called to a vote. Article 25 passed unanimously by a voice vote.

Bill Mead also asked if there was any objection to changing next years meeting start time to 7:00 PM instead of 7:30 PM. This was voted on by a show of hands in favor. There was a majority of hands in favor so next years meeting time will be changed to 7:00 PM.

Ron Taksar, Chairman of the Select board presented Ramesh Dave with a plaque of appreciation for his 6-years of dedicated service to the Town as a Selectmen.

There being no further business to transact, there was a motion and a second to adjourn the meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 9:35 p.m.

**ARTICLE 4.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred seventeen thousand four hundred fifty dollars (\$117,450.00) to be added to the following Capital Reserve Funds previously established. The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Highway Trucks, \$17,500; Police Cruisers, \$14,250; Fire Pumper Truck, \$40,000; Fire Equip Truck, \$26,000; Life Squad Van, \$7,500; Reassessment, 8,000 and Town Buildings Truck, \$4,200.

**ARTICLE 5.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy two thousand six hundred dollars (\$72,600.00) to be added to the following Expendable Trust Funds previously established. The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Cemetery, \$6,200; Highway Improvement, \$50,000; Sidewalk Improvement, \$5,000; Museum Maintenance, \$3,400 and Library Maintenance, \$8,000.

**ARTICLE 6.** To see if the town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Town Buildings and Grounds Equipment and to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for this purpose. The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required.)

**ARTICLE 7.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventeen thousand dollars (\$17,000.00) to install a detection and fire alarm system in the Town Hall and the Library. The amount of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) is to come from taxation. The balance of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) is to come from fund balance (surplus). The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

**ARTICLE 8.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-two thousand eight hundred thirty-eight dollars (\$72,838.00) to purchase a truck with equipment for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal of forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The sum of thirteen thousand eight hundred thirty-eight dollars (\$13,838.00) is to come from general taxation. Additional funding for this appropriation will come from trading in the 2001 Ford F-550 with plow (\$14,000.00). The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).



**ARTICLE 9.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-three thousand dollars (\$23,000.00) to purchase a wood chipper for the Highway Department for the purpose of wind storm clean up and the much needed brush cutting to be done along the sides of the roads. The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

**ARTICLE 10.** To see if the town will vote to change the purpose of and existing Highway Loader Capital Reserve Fund to the Highway Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund and to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) to be added to the newly named fund. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation. (2/3 vote required).

**ARTICLE 11.** To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of two hundred forty four thousand nine hundred sixty dollars (\$244,960.00) for the purpose of solid waste disposal with eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00) from the Transfer Station/Recycling Center Special Revenue Fund surplus, Town of Sugar Hill (\$33,812.00), the Town of Easton (\$15,369.00), PAYT Fees (\$74,500.00), Special Handling Fees (\$35,000.00), and Recycled Material (\$25,000.00) and to raise fifty-three thousand two hundred and seventy-nine dollars (\$53,279.00) from taxation. The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

**ARTICLE 12.** To see if the town will vote to appropriate two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) from the Recreation Committee's line item budget to be added to the Rink Surface Maintenance Fund previously established. The selectmen recommend the transfer of this appropriation.

**ARTICLE 13.** To see if the town will vote to appropriate one thousand-five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) from the Recreation Committee's line item budget to be added to the Dow Field Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The selectmen recommend the transfer of this appropriation.

**ARTICLE 14.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-nine thousand eight hundred forty-two dollars (\$69,842.00) for the purpose of operating the Abbie Greenleaf Library and to transfer this amount to the Library Trustees for their use as they see fit. The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

**ARTICLE 15.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for the purpose of adding more security in the offices of the Town Hall. Five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) is to come from taxation. The balance of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) is to come from fund balance (surplus). The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

**ARTICLE 16.** To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for the Franconia Children's Center to be used for general operating expenses. The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

**ARTICLE 17.** To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) for the study and implementation of the infrastructure improvements and to make the selectmen agents to expend. The sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) will come from the fund balance (surplus) and no amount will be raised from taxation. The selectmen recommend this appropriation.

**ARTICLE 18.** To see if the town will vote to adopt the Optional Veteran's Tax Credit as described by the state general court, TitleV, Chapter 72, Property taxes, Section 72:28. The Veteran's optional tax credit would be the amount of \$500.00. In recognition for those veterans who made sacrifices and served in the armed forces of our country and were honorably separated from service for the country, as described in Section 72:28 IV (a thru c) and V (a thru g). (By petition.) The selectmen do not recommend this article.

**ARTICLE 19.** To see if the town will vote to adopt under RSA 72:27-a an exemption from the assessed value, for property tax purposes, for persons owning real property which is equipped with a wood heating energy system as defined in RSA 72:69.

**ARTICLE 20.** To see if the town will vote to adopt under RSA 72:27-a an exemption from the assessed value, for property tax purposes, for persons owning real property with a solar energy system as defined in RSA 72:61.

**ARTICLE 21.** To see if the town will go on record in support of effective actions by the President and the Congress to address the issue of climate change which is increasingly harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the future well being of the people of Franconia.

These actions to include:

1. Establishment of a national program requiring reduction of greenhouse gas emissions while protecting the U. S. economy.
2. Creation of a major national research initiative to foster rapid development of sustainable energy technologies thereby stimulating new jobs and investment.

In addition, the town of Franconia encourages New Hampshire citizens to work for emission reductions within their communities, and we ask our Selectmen to consider the appointment of a voluntary energy committee to recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire congressional Delegation, to the President of the United States, and to declared candidates for those offices. (By petition.)

**ARTICLE 22.** To hear the reports of agents, auditors, and committees, or other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relative thereto.

**ARTICLE 23.** To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## 2007-2013 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PLAN

The 2007 – 2013 Capital Improvements Plan, adopted by the Franconia Planning Board and accepted by the Franconia Board of Selectmen, was completed by a diverse group of seven citizens, appointed by the Planning Board and the CIP Chairperson. The Committee worked from April through December 2006 on this year's effort.

The Committee interviewed all Town Operational Department Heads, the Fire and Life Squad Chiefs, Recreation, Library and Heritage Society representatives and the Town's Select Board and administration to collect their anticipated capital needs, and the priority of the needs, for the time frame 2007-2013. These individual requests were then laid out in an annualized schedule and prioritized in relation to each other and the Town's historical yearly capital expenditures and the ability to raise monies to fund the projects in the future. The Committee's review and budgeting of projects was done in light of the substantial infrastructure projects being considered by the standing Infrastructure Committee (IFC) as well as the pending Profile School appropriation and Bond votes.

Next, a draft of the CIP was published to use a higher short-range target of approximately \$300,000 for 2006 and 2007 in anticipation of budgetary pressures caused by Profile School funding and the possible need to fund sizable Town infrastructure projects in the coming years. This would represent an approximately 11% increase for the next two years over the Town's six year historical average for dollars per \$1000 of property value. Next, a draft of the CIP was published and made available for the citizen's review. A public hearing was then held to elicit comment on the draft and the feedback reflected in the committee's final draft to be presented for adoption to the Planning Board. The CIP was presented to the Planning Board on January 10<sup>th</sup> 2006 and officially adopted. The Committee presented the Plan to the Select Board on January 17<sup>th</sup> 2006 for use in their planning of the Town of Franconia 2006 annual budget.

The CIP Committee would like to highlight a few specific findings and concerns that it recommends receive further consideration by the CIP Committee, Planning and Select Boards, newly formed Infrastructure Committee and the community at large:

1) The CIP Committee recommends to the Select Board that a Capital Acceptance Plan (CAP) or similar process be established for the large infrastructure projects that have been recognized and action recommended by the Infrastructure Committee (IFC). A CAP type process would assist the Town Administrators and the standing Committees (CIP, IFC, PB), working with the citizenry, to establish the best strategy for the execution of a given project(s) and secure its acceptance for funding. This effort would take into consideration the current Master Plan, CIP, IFC recommendations and present tax burden in crafting an acceptable and effective strategy to address the Town's substantial infrastructure needs.

2) The CIP Committee recommends that the Town consider long term financing, either in the form of bonding or bank financing, for some of the larger proposed capital projects. In lieu of having reserved for these needs in years past, the identified timing of these projects, and the relative present cost of borrowing, this method of raising monies seems prudent and effective in managing the tax impact of these capital expenditures.



3) The CIP Committee plans to establish a more structured and rigorous RFP process for the proposal and acceptance of capital needs requested by the Operating Departments and Town organizations. By improving this process, the Committee, working with the requestors, hopes to improve the efficiency, accuracy and cost effectiveness of the individual requests. It is also anticipated that this effort will improve the appropriate timing and level of Reserve Fund appropriations.

4) The CIP Committee recommends that the Select Board prepare a comprehensive long range plan for the upgrades necessary at the Town Hall (windows, insulation, ADA bathroom, security construction, etc...) This seems especially necessary in light of the IFC's proposed reconfiguring and improvements to the building.

5) The CIP Committee recommends that the Road Agent, working with the Select Board, Planning Board and Infrastructure Committee, establish a long range Strategic Plan for the Town's roads. This plan would provide recommendations and schedules for maintenance and improvements to existing roads and identify required new construction. This plan would be used to establish appropriate and realistic annual funding to be included in the CIP. (This recommendation is in lieu of the yet to be completed and accepted Plan being prepared by NCC)

Finally, the CIP Committee would like to thank all Town employees, administrators, board members and citizens for their generous contributions of time and consideration in establishing and delivering Franconia's 2007-2013 CIP. We are hopeful that the plan and process will be an important aid to the Select Board in their annual budgeting and result in improved capital planning and investment for the Town of Franconia.

## THE COLONEL OLIVER NELSON PLANNING AWARD

The volunteer local committees and boards of the Town of Franconia have emphasized the importance of comprehensive planning. In 2004, North Country Council was contacted by the town to assist them in the development of a Capital Improvements Plan. Shortly after this planning process began the town's planning board began working with NCC on the development of the town's Master Plan. Over the past few years the town has completed the Capital Improvements Plan, formed an Infrastructure Committee to review community facility needs in town, spent two years on the rewrite of the entire Master Plan, completed an All Hazards Mitigation Plan, Worked with Watershed to Wildlife on a Natural Resource Inventory and have now begun developing steps towards the creation of a Town Trail and Recreation Plan. The Town of Franconia is an example to all towns on how to embrace all facets of planning and work on a comprehensive vision for the future. Ron Taksar from the Board of Selectmen will be accepting the award on the town's behalf.

In addition to the Oliver Nelson Award, we would like to present the town with a useful resource book on Trail Planning and Maintenance developed by the Rails to Trails Conservancy in hopes that it will provide some assistance in the development of their Trail and Recreation Plan.

## FRANCONIA LIFE SQUAD 2006 ANNUAL REPORT

2006 was our first full year as a transporting ambulance and the transition from a non-transporting first response unit to a full transporting ambulance service has been smooth. The Life Squad has received praise for its member's professionalism and high level of skills from the Littleton Regional Hospital and from patients.

Members are from the towns of Franconia, Sugar Hill and Easton and are dedicated to providing the highest quality emergency medical service to the communities it serves. Our members are all Nationally Registered Emergency Medical Technicians and are constantly training and improving their skills. Each member must have a minimum of 24 hours of continuing education each year plus every two years must take a refresher course and an extensive practical exam. Our members are very well trained with most members far exceeding the required minimum training.

Currently, four of our members are certified to provide Advanced Life Support and two members are in the process of being certified at the advanced life support level. These members can administer certain medications and start intravenous lines. Many of our members have other specialized training including ice rescue, swift water rescue, and motor vehicle extrication certifications. All of the members are certified in advance CPR and in the use of the heart monitor and defibrillator. Most importantly, all of our members are dedicated to providing compassionate emergency medical care.

Chris Fowler retired from the Franconia Life Squad after many years in order to spend more time with the Franconia Police Department. The Franconia Life Squad works closely with the area Police and Fire Departments as a seamless team that allows for a quick and professional mitigation of an emergency situation. In 2006 the operating expenses were \$45,572 and income obtained from patient billing and Sugar Hill and Easton subsidies totaled \$36,777 with the net cost for the operation of the Franconia Life Squad to the Town of Franconia being \$8,795 or roughly half the 2004 cost, which was prior to transporting when the Ross Ambulance subsidy is included.

### Additional Report of Forest Fire & State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. A fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or [www.des.state.nh.us](http://www.des.state.nh.us) for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. Fire activity was very high during the first several weeks of the 2006 fire season, with red-flag conditions issued by the National Weather Service and extreme fire danger in many sections of the state. The largest forest fire during this period occurred in late April and burned 98 acres. The extremely dry conditions in Spring resulted in over twice the amount of acreage burned than in all of 2005. Our statewide system of fire lookouts towers is credited with keeping the fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Fires in the wild land urban interface damaged 6 structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wild land fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. ## FRANCONIA & MITTERSILL WATER DEPARTMENTS

The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services performed a sanitary survey on the Franconia Village Water system at the end of 2005. We received the results of their survey on March 17, 2006, which identified several areas, which needed attention. They mentioned that these same areas had been identified in previous surveys, but had not been dealt with. We are working to improve these deficiencies. We went to the Town Selectmen and told them our situation and asked for their support. They suggested that we set up an ad hoc committee of residents of Franconia, both water users and residents who have their own wells, and we also have help from DES and from Recap Solutions. The committee is called the Water Source Study Group, (WSSG). We have been meeting since late summer and have just received an Evaluation Proposal from the engineering firm of Stantec Consulting of Manchester, NH, which will help us make these needed improvements and to get the needed funding. We are planning to have open meetings in the coming months to update the public with our progress.

While we work on this important project, we are also dealing with the day-to-day leaks and pressure problems, which happen in a system that needs to be updated. We surveyed our property at McGowan Hill this past year and cut down many trees in order to maximize our water supply. Although we had many one-time expenses this year, the cost of operations will require a small increase in water rates.

Since 2002 we have moved through the State regulations and are close to getting our newly refracted well hooked up to the system at Mittersill. This will add up to 10 gallons per minute to our supply. These costs have forced us to slightly increase these rates, also, in order to meet emergencies, which may arise.

## FRANCONIA HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The Highway Department's report this year will consist of what we have done and the direction in which we are heading with aspect to the Town roads.

1. Brush Cutting – Brush cutting was done on the following roads: Wells Road, Lafayette Road, Bickford Hill Road, Iron Foundry, Wallace Hill, Slalom Lane and Slalom Circle.
2. Ditching – We ditched the Wells Road, Tucker Brook, Delage Farm Road, Beechwood, Evergreen, Old County, Balancing Rock, Forest, Rockwood, parts of Iron Foundry, Toad Hill, Oaks Road, Franconia Mountains Road and Magowen Hill. Over 3000 yards of material was removed from the ditching project.
3. Reclamation – We reclaimed the second half of the Wells Road to get it ready for pavement.
4. Paving – Paving was done on the following roads: River Street, Garfield Close, Academy Street and the entrance to the Lafayette School.
5. Grading – The gravel roads were graded and yolk raked 3 times this year. A lot of the so-called double ditch lines have been eliminated.
6. We hauled winter sand, cleaned bridges, swept all the paved roads and moved all the useable rock from behind the cemetery. Clean up of the highway garage backyard is finally finished and we are currently working on the upgrade to the front. We can now work inside the building, but more room is needed. A lot of the deficiencies from the past are now up to specs. There is still work to be done. The 2-foot culvert on Delage Farm Road was replaced with a 4-foot pipe arch and a 12-inch overflow pipe. This is working well but the real test will come in the spring. There was a survey done of the Town's roads for the Strategic 10-year plan, a request of the CIP Committee. Currently, the Infrastructure Study Group, CIP and Selectmen are still reviewing the report with recommendations to come.
7. The town experienced two windstorms this year. One storm was major with a lot of damage that affected the whole Town. Just as an example, we had one road in town with over 100 trees down in it. Without the combined efforts of the Franconia Fire, Police, Highway, Maintenance Departments, and the volunteers the town would have been in a whole world of hurt. I would like to thank everybody that was involved with making the clean up not only happen, but happen quickly. This is what living here is all about.
8. Our plans for the upcoming year with your help will include: paving Wells Road, brush cutting, shoulder work, ditching, replacing some culverts and continued work on the highway garage. Reclamation of roads will depend on the funding. In saying that, the highway department is very aware of the Profile School funding issue that is facing the community. We are greatly appreciative of your support it means a lot. If you have any comments, questions or concerns please contact us.

Besides the decisions cited above, the Planning Board has been working steadily toward updating the Town's Master Plan, Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations. Many individuals and committees of the Town outside the realm of the Board have contributed their time and expertise to these tasks. The results have been very positive.

One of these results has been to have a working draft of the whole Master Plan, except for the Implementation Chapter, ready for this year's Town Meeting. That last chapter should be completed by April. Stacey Doll of North Country Council has greatly facilitated our endeavors. Also, the Planning Board, along with the Conservation Commission, contracted with Watershed to Wildlife, Inc. to complete a Natural Resource Inventory for the Town. This will give the Town a valuable technological tool to plan for future development, besides incorporating the results into the Natural Resource and Future Land Use Chapters of the Master Plan. After holding a public hearing, the Board envisions spending the next year revising the Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations to make them consistent with the vision of the Master Plan.

As far as anticipated changes to the Zoning Ordinance this year, pending the Town Meeting ballot vote, there were a series of amendments to the floodplain management regulations to bring them into compliance with National Flood Insurance Program regulations.

Subdivision Regulations have been greatly improved by the adoption of new Road Standards, which we hope, will save the Town in future maintenance costs and provide safer roads.

Finally, the Capital Improvement Plan Committee has continued their fine work of refining and streamlining the process for reviewing capital expenditure requests. The Board is grateful for their efforts and appreciates the valuable planning tool they create.

## ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Zoning Board of Adjustment, upon application, reviews and decides on alleged errors in administrative finding, and grants variances to the Town's Zoning Ordinance to provide relief from hardship. The Board also has the authority to grant an exception for use in keeping with certain provisions of the Ordinance.

In March 2006, the ZBA granted a Special Exception to Article III, Section 2f:2 of the Zoning Ordinance for David and Tina Weed to construct a small apartment in conjunction with and attached to a single family dwelling on Balancing Rock Road.

In June 2006, the ZBA denied a Special Exception to Article III, Section 2f:2 of the Zoning Ordinance for Howard Galligan to construct a small apartment in conjunction with and attached to a single family dwelling on Mountain Road.

In December 2006, the ZBA granted a Variance in relation to Article III, Section 2 of the Zoning Ordinance to Nelson and Leatrice Progin for a lot line adjustment between two substandard lots on Profile Road.

Several ZBA Members attended the Planning and Zoning Conference held in Waterville Valley in October 2006.

## TRI-TOWN TRANSFER STATION

2006 was yet another busy year at the transfer station. Garbage tonnage rose to 540 tons, 5 tons more than last year but still 12 tons less than 2004. Although the recycling tonnage that we marketed dropped, we actually processed 10 tons more than 2005, the difference being not quite enough for full loads before 2007. Even so our recycling rate was 40%.

We recycled:

- 191 tons of paper products
- 11 tons of plastic
- 3 tons of aluminum cans
- 40 tons of scrap metal
- 111 tons of glass

Last April we participated in the first “Color it Green” community clean up which, thanks to numerous volunteers, was an excellent start. We hope to continue and expand the clean up in 2007.

A special thanks to Margo Connors, Leigh Starer, Ben Woo and the students of Lafayette School for the gardening and artwork. We can’t wait to see the bulbs they planted in full bloom.

Once again Greg, Chris and I thank you for your cooperation throughout the year.

## THE FROST PLACE

Now in its thirtieth year, the unique partnership between the Town of Franconia and the Frost Place continues to be a resilient and creative approach to historic preservation and education.

As a museum and poetry center based in the home where poet Robert Frost lived full-time from 1915 to 1920 then spent many summer through 1938, The Frost Place attracts thousands of visitors each summer between Memorial Day and Columbus Day. In contrast to today's fashion, when tourist sites are frequently multi-media spectacles this little museum is extraordinarily simple, several rooms in an ordinary 19<sup>th</sup>-century farmhouse, not much changed in a hundred years. Yet this was a place where some of the most inexhaustible writers lived and worked, and where some of the most inexhaustible poems in the English language were written, poems that people have loved from childhood through old age. This was a place where a great artist could concentrate, where his children were happy, and where he was amazingly productive.

The quietness and simplicity we still experience here – and the stunning view of Mount Lafayette – are clearly very moving to our visitors, who this year came from across the globe, from almost every state of the union and Canada, India, England, Indonesia, Australia, Japan, New Zealand, Russia, Poland, Sweden, Ireland, China, and Mexico. The 2006 museum docents were Sara Brickman, an intern from Smith College, and Travis Helms, recent graduate of Dartmouth College and first recipient of a new annual award offered by Dartmouth to an especially promising young writer, the William W. Cook – Frost Place Fellowship.

While the house and grounds are owned by the Town, the museum and conference programs are overseen by a Board of Trustees, now numbering twelve dedicated volunteers. This past year, Trustees Parker Towle, Carlene Gadapee, and Jeffrey Wheeler's rotated off the Board, and their hard work on behalf of the The Frost Place is gratefully acknowledged. During 2006, major changes were made in the day-to-day administration of the Frost Place, as long-time Executive Director Donald Sheehan and Assistant Director Keisha Luce were replaced by Jim Schley, a writer and teacher from South Strafford, Vermont. Don Sheehan continues to serve as Director Emeritus.

Since 1977, a residency has been awarded each summer at The Frost Place to a poet who is given a financial stipend and the opportunity to live and work in non-public quarters in the house. In making this award, the Trustees seek to select a poet who is at the kind of artistic and personal crossroads faced by Robert Frost when he came to Franconia in 1915, not yet having published a book in the U.S., and not yet well known to the public. The 2006 Resident Poet was an especially gracious and convivial guest, Robert Farnsworth of Lewiston, Maine. The 2007 residency has been awarded to Jody Gladding of East Calais, Vermont.

The Frost Place's programs have expanded in recent years to encompass four annual conferences, which have earned national acclaim: The Young Poets Conference (April 27-29, 2007), the Conference on Poetry and Teaching (June 25-29, 2007), the Frost Place Seminar (August 5-10, 2007). During each conference, evening readings are open to the



public with no admission fee, and local poetry enthusiasts are welcome to attend. The Frost Place also hosts an open house in early July, in celebration of New Hampshire's Official "Frost Day," to give neighbors and townsfolk a chance to meet the director and staff and the Resident Poet.

In addition to museum operations and conferences, Director Jim Schley's major priorities for the coming year include gradual expansion of school programs and teacher training in the North Country and developing dynamic partnerships with local and regional businesses as well as arts organizations and museums, including cooperation in publicity with historic Robert Frost sites in Derry, NH, Shaftsbury, Vermont, and Ripton, Vermont. An urgent need is debris removal and clean-up necessitated by wind damage from a late-October storm that toppled hundreds of small and large trees along Ridge Road and was particularly destructive along the half-mile "Poetry Trail" at The Frost Place, where visitors can view Frost poems on wooden panels and markers indicating the wildflowers and forest plants often cited by Frost, who loved to 'botanize' on his own walks.

Like many small nonprofit ventures, The Frost Place is facing serious financial challenges, but by taking a deliberately 'traditional' path – guaranteeing the upkeep and well-being of the house, barn, and gardens; offering a museum experience that is unglamorous but authentic; and providing superb poetry workshops and readings – The Frost Place appears well positioned to address the future while maintaining a powerful connection with the past.

## FRANCONIA HERITAGE MUSEUM

The past year has been one of transition for the Heritage Council from establishing the museum to administering and maintaining it. We will complete our 10-year commitment to manage the Franconia Heritage Museum for the town in May 2007. In anticipation of the growing need for a paid staff person, we built up our capital to \$100,000 in the expectation that our invested capital would eventually produce enough income to pay someone a living wage to manage the museum. Our volunteer curator announced her reluctant retirement when she reached age 80 after more than 10 years' work setting up and managing the museum. She advised the Board that the increased administrative responsibilities of the growing museum now were more than she could handle. The collection had expanded to 10,000 items from the original 1,500 and membership had risen from 20 to more than 200.

The Council did double its number of events this year, with an eye to increasing support. In the past decade, we have focused exhibits and events on the guest houses in town, the social and cultural organizations, family histories, village houses, the iron industry, the skiing industry, the Old Man of the Mountain, vintage clothing, and tourism, as well as the history of the town as it developed from a frontier farming community of 72 residents in the first census in 1790, to a major tourist destination with about 950 residents in the year 2002.

It was Sarah Nelson Welch who began the move toward a museum by saving all the documents and diaries of the Brooks family, beginning with those of her great grandfather, Luke Brooks, who arrived here with his bride on horseback in 1795. The Brooks family recognized the importance of history and provided their artifacts. In addition, Sarah left her estate to the town in a trust designated for a museum. She had dreamed of establishing a museum and her dream was fulfilled in 1998, shortly after she died. Several members of the community shared her interest. The entire community can be credited with support of the museum. Several residents added to the collection from their own artifacts and memorabilia, while others, present and former residents contributed their time and gave generously to the financial support of the museum.

After retiring here from a journalism career in Connecticut, Jewell Friedman found preservation of local history a challenging cause. She felt as strongly about it as did Sarah, and she supported Sarah's cause as though it were her foster child. She was appointed curator. Last year, in response to the volunteer curator's retirement notice, the Council advertised a part-time position at the Museum and hired Sharon Penney as administrator. A northern NH native, Sharon is a Trustee of the Abbie Greenleaf Library, former alternate to the local Planning Board, has a decade of experience on the North Country Council Regional Planning Commission and until recently was Executive Director of the Northern White Mountain Chamber of Commerce. She is committed to the promotion of cultural and heritage endeavors and looks forward to working with the board of directors and other area historic and cultural entities. Earlier last year, the Museum served as a resource for Plymouth State University by supervising an intern in the Heritage Studies Graduate Program.

The Board sought ways this year to make the position of administrator one of full time with an appropriate wage. The outgoing curator is so pleased with her potential successor that she has taken steps to establish a Charitable Heritage Fund with a \$20,000 gift annuity to benefit the museum operation.

The Franconia Heritage Fund is being set up in partnership with the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation. The gift annuity will benefit the donor with 8% annual interest for the remainder of her years, with the ultimate beneficiary being the Franconia Heritage Museum.
