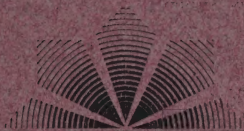


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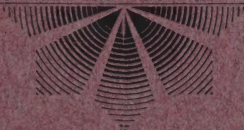

Report of the Selectmen,

For the Year Ending Feb. 15, 1901.

TO THE CITIZENS OF HILLSBOROUGH :

In presenting a report of the receipts and expenditures and the financial condition of the town, the first subject that presents itself is the town indebtedness, which has assumed such proportions that it cannot readily be concealed. The outstanding notes against the town, as the report shows, amount to \$37,824.04. The yearly interest on this amount, at 3 per cent., is \$1,134.72. If the town desires to take the debt in hand and commence some policy of systematic reduction, a sum of \$2,000 must be raised and set aside to be applied to the payment of notes and interest. At the rate indicated it will require at least 30 years to liquidate the debt.

A comparatively large amount of taxes has been abated, as follows: To J. H. T. Newell, for 1896, \$20.40; to G. W. Lincoln, for years 1897, \$50.94; 1898, \$44.91; 1899, \$31.61; 1900, \$90.65, amounting to \$258.51. The reason for these abatements is that, as they must some time be abated, it might as well be done now and not reckon them year after year as assets of the town when there is not a cent in them.

The present Board of Selectmen found the town engaged in three law-suits, known as follows: The Copp

case, the Beard road case, and the Electric Light case. They have all been settled on the best terms attainable, at an expense to the town of \$845.30. We are happy to state that the town is unincumbered with any judicial contests at the present time.

The town has accepted bequests from various estates to the amount of \$6,254.70. The incomes of these legacies are to be used for various purposes as enumerated in the wills of the testators. The income of one only, that of the late Abney Symonds, is to be used wholly for the benefit of the town. In view of the rather complicated nature of the management of these donations, would it not be well to choose a trustee or agent to have charge of them?

Depot street has been in very bad condition for several years at certain seasons. The cause was accumulation of water threatening to undermine the foundations of the buildings and the bank wall on the lower side of the street. To remedy this increasing danger, it was thought best by the board to lay a sewer of sufficient capacity to carry off the surface water along the lower side of the street with man-holes at intervals, from the Public Square under the rail road crossing, thence in Water street to the outlet on land formerly owned by Samuel Clement, opposite the Hatch Burnham place. The work was done under the supervision of the road agent. The cost was \$743.83, a sum larger than the estimate before the work was commenced. It is believed that the outlay was judiciously made and that the street is permanently improved thereby, and a saving of damages effected for the future.

The sidewalks in Bridge Village were found to be in bad condition, both the concrete and the wooden walks. Under the supervision of the road agent, the old walks were repaired and in some places new ones laid. The sum of \$1,000 appropriated at the last annual meeting for the above purpose, was exhausted before the Selectmen were

advised of the fact, and a small draft was necessarily made on the fund appropriated for current expenses. But there will be no more need in the immediate future to raise any money for the repair and construction of sidewalks. The highway tax required by law, if judiciously and economically expended, will be amply sufficient to keep the highways and sidewalks both, in repair.

The town farm has demanded and received the attention of the board. The agent for the four years previous, left the farm on April 1. The stock was found in a sickly condition, the house destitute of provisions, and every thing about the premises suggested bad management. This state of things, through the exertions of the agent, has been partially corrected. The diseased animals have been cured by proper treatment, or exchanged for healthy ones without expense to the town. The broken and worn tools have been repaired and made serviceable, and a few new ones purchased. The scanty house furnishings have been replenished to some extent without perceptible cost to the town. The farm and its belongings are now in such condition that with thrifty and economical management the balance against it in years to come should be very small, if any. But unless better results can be assured than have been secured for a few years previous to this year, it would undoubtedly be wise on the part of this town to dispose of the property.

This Board of Selectmen found the matter of lighting the streets in an unsettled condition. At the last annual meeting the town instructed the Selectmen "to contract with some responsible person, firm or corporation, to light the streets of Hillsborough by electricity, at a price not to exceed the sum of \$13.00 per light per year, for the period of one year only." As no "person, firm or corporation" could be found with which to make such a contract, the Selectmen could not make it, and they, perhaps unwisely decided to continue the service at the rate of \$15.00 per light per annum, till May 1st, next. But the Selectmen think they have assurance that if the town should see fit to vote a five year contract at \$13.00 per light per annum on the basis of the present number of lights, a responsible party can be found with which to place it.

Town Warrant.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Childs' Opera House, in said town, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock, in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose three Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Highway Agent, for the ensuing year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for the two years ensuing, and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer, and Tax Collector to the Town Auditors, the reports of the Auditors, Agents, Committees, or other town officers, heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the town and apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt, or pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for building and repairing highways, bridges and culverts.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise any money for school purposes, other than that required by law, or pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, not to exceed seventy-five dollars, for Senator Grimes Post, G. A. R. to be used Memorial Day.

7. To see if the town will vote that no Liquor Agent, or Agents shall be appointed for the ensuing year.

8. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to contract with any reliable person or company to light its streets with electricity for the term of five years from May 1 next, at the rate of thirteen dollars per light per annum, or pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To see if the town will vote to sell the town farm, stock, tools and house furnishings, choose an agent to convey the same, or pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to put in proper condition, the Hillsborough Bridge Cemetery, so-called, or pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase a stone crusher and road roller, raise money for the same, or pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Fuller Public Library.

13. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of the late Harvey Jones, to give the Cornelius Cooledge Farm for an Old Ladies' Home, or pass any vote relating to the same.

14. To see what action the town will take in regard to lighting its streets, or pass any vote thereunto relating

15. To see if the town will vote to sell the Whipple land, about six acres, and taxed to John L. Otis, sold for taxes and bought by the town, and choose an agent to make the conveyance, or pass any vote relating to the same.

16. To see if the town will vote to sell the Center land, taxed to Chauncey L. Brown, sold for taxes and bought by the town, and choose an agent to convey the same, or pass any vote thereunto relating.

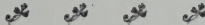
17. To see if the town will vote to sell the Hannah Brown or Hannah Batchelder land, sold for taxes and bought by the town and choose an agent to convey the same, or pass any vote thereunto relating.

18. To see if the town will vote to continue the present by-laws in force, prohibiting cattle and horses from running at large in the highways.

19. To transact all other business which may legally come before said meeting.

TRUST FUNDS.

The town holds in trust the following funds, the income of which is to be used for the purposes specified below:

The Mark W. Fuller bequest of \$2000.00, drawing interest at 6 per cent. The income to be used, first, in keeping in suitable condition the Fuller plat in the cemetery between the Upper and Lower Villages; the balance to be used for the benefit of the inhabitants of the town. The town voted to use the balance for the Fuller Public Library.

The Sarah C. Fuller bequest of \$1000.00 to the Fuller Public Library, subject to the same conditions as the Mark W. Fuller bequest, excepting that the First Selectman of the town shall visit the Fuller plat four times each year, forever.

The Abby C. Murdo bequest of \$100.00, drawing interest at 4 1-2 per cent., the income to be paid to the Methodist church at Hillsboro Center, annually.

The Caroline M. Burnham bequest of \$200.00, the income to be used to forever keep in suitable condition the Dr. A. C. Burnham plat in the Deering cemetery.

The Sarah Taggard bequest of \$100.00 to forever care for her plat in the cemetery between the Upper and Lower Villages and keep the same in suitable condition.

The estate of Maria Travis, \$100.00, the interest to be appropriated to keeping in repair for all time the burial lot of her late father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. James Baldwin.

By the will of the late Abney Symonds the town has received \$2604.70, the income of which *shall be used annually towards paying the yearly expenses of the town and for no other purpose.*

The Mary E. M. Smith bequest of \$50.00, the town to expend the income of the same in maintenance and care of her burial lot and that of her deceased husband, Jerry Smith.

The Catherine W. Bascome bequest, \$100.00, to forever keep in suitable condition her burial plat in the Lower Village cemetery, so-called.

We publish these, so that each incoming Board of Selectmen may know what their duties are concerning the funds that have been bequeathed to the town, enabling them to comply with their requirements,

Report of the Board of Education

—: FOR :—

Special School District.

The regular daily work of the schools was resumed at the commencement of the fall term under the supervision of Prof. Tracy whose record the year before proved him to be the right man for the place, Miss Tewksbury, Miss McKellips and Miss Powell—three popular teachers—accepted their re-election. The School Board was sorry to receive the resignations of Miss Manahan and Miss Carter—successful teachers in the Intermediate and Primary grades.

Their places were supplied by Misses Blanchard and Pierce, and Mrs. Shoults was elected to the vacancy made by transferring Miss McKellips to the Grammar School.

The Seventh and Eighth Grades were so much larger than usual, that an additional teacher was required for part of each day. Miss Perry, a well known town teacher, was elected for this purpose.

Drawing was continued until the winter term under the instruction of Miss Butler, when, owing to illness in her family, the lessons were omitted, but will be resumed as soon as possible.

Miss Putnam, teacher of music, received and accepted a call to Claremont early in January, and Prof. Newman was elected in her place.

New seats were purchased for the First Primary room during the summer vacation, a new floor was laid in the

north basement, and the fire box under the boiler was relined with fire brick. Special appropriations were made for this purpose at the last school meeting.

The steps of the front porch are becoming unsound, and will soon be dangerous if not repaired. A new grate is needed for the furnace and the addition of storm windows on the north side of the building, would make those rooms more comfortable in cold weather, and save fuel as well. The efforts of Prof. Tracy to raise the standard of scholarship in the grades below the High, have been met by earnest co-operation and hard labor on the part of the teachers, and the pupils as a whole, have done excellent work.

Another year has been added to the High School course, making for the present a three or four years course, optional. The fourth year is intended to complete the preparation for college, and place its graduates on a plane with the graduates of any High School.

Prof. Tracy is working hard to accomplish this result. He has been ably assisted by Miss Tewksbury, and already there is a larger membership and an increased interest. The Seventh and Eighth grades are so much larger than heretofore, that we may look for larger classes hereafter in the High School. Parents are realizing more and more the necessity of a good education. If they will extend their sincere sympathy and support, the success and prosperity of our schools will well repay them.

You are hereby notified to meet at the School House at Lower Village (so-called) in said district, on the fourteenth day of March, 1901, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following subjects:—

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
5. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subjects embraced in this warrant.
6. To see if the district will vote to raise any money in addition to that required by Law for school purposes and repairs of school houses and if so, how much.
7. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to unite with one or more town districts or special districts to form a supervisory district for the purpose of employing a superintendent of the Public Schools therein, under the provisions of Chapter 77 of the Session Laws of New Hampshire, 1899; and to raise money to carry such vote into effect.

School Board.

Report of Board of Education, TOWN DISTRICT,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 15, 1901.

No American problem is more urgent in its demand for solution than that of the future of the public schools. In the talk on "How shall we improve our ungraded schools," at the Teachers' Institute held Jan. 11th, this year, it was urged upon us to lengthen our school year. This has been our aim for the past few years, and this year we succeeded in obtaining 31 weeks, besides painting the school-houses, and putting the buildings in repair in the Upper Section.

Two new stoves have been bought which is added to the bill on incidentals.

We are depending on the generosity of the people to allow us enough to make the necessary repairs in the Lower Section, with enough to run our schools 30 weeks or more the coming year.

There must be good school privileges for the country children, or America is doomed to meet worse conditions than have ever threatened her. There is no problem for the statesman more serious than that of the future of the country-school. The boy is not to be educated for himself, nor for his father, but for society and the state. And because this is so, we ought to be generous and furnish the general appliances and means for an education.

The only change in text-books in the past year has been in the readers. Cyr's Readers being introduced have been duly appreciated by both teachers and pupils. We have introduced from time to time some excellent supplementary readers.

The importance of supplementary reading is recognized by every person familiar with the progress made in schools in the last few years. It has for its purpose to open the whole spiritual universe to the child. It brings him into contact not only with distant lands, but with the great minds of the present and the past, and with all matter temporal and eternal, making him the heir of all ages. Through supplementary reading the child's horizon is widened at a very early age.

It has been said, "As the teacher, so the school,"—a truth universal and unchangeable. In no other occupation are there so many ways and opportunities for wasting time and energy, and making mistakes, as in teaching. It is far more difficult to mold mind than matter, far more difficult to know what to do, how to do, and when to do, than in any of the industrial trades. Is it not befitting then that those who take charge of our rural schools, shall be fitted to render a service to the children who are placed under their care, which will prepare them to do the work the world needs to have done.

Then let us urge upon our teachers the necessity of taking a live interest in their work, attend teachers' meetings and the institutes—especially when they come to your own town—and attend the summer training schools, if possible.

We believe the large majority of our teachers in the past year have been faithful to their charge and with good results.

The teachers' wages have been \$20.00 per month, with three exceptions, Nos. 6, 4 and 13. These schools are ex-

ceptions. It will be our judgment to pay no teacher over \$20.00 per month, unless they are normal students.

It is evident to all friends of the public schools that there should be a more complete, better organized co-operation of the home with the school. The school is an institute created and supported for the benefit of the children. Then let us plead for the hearty co-operation of the parents, with both teachers and School Board.

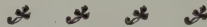
