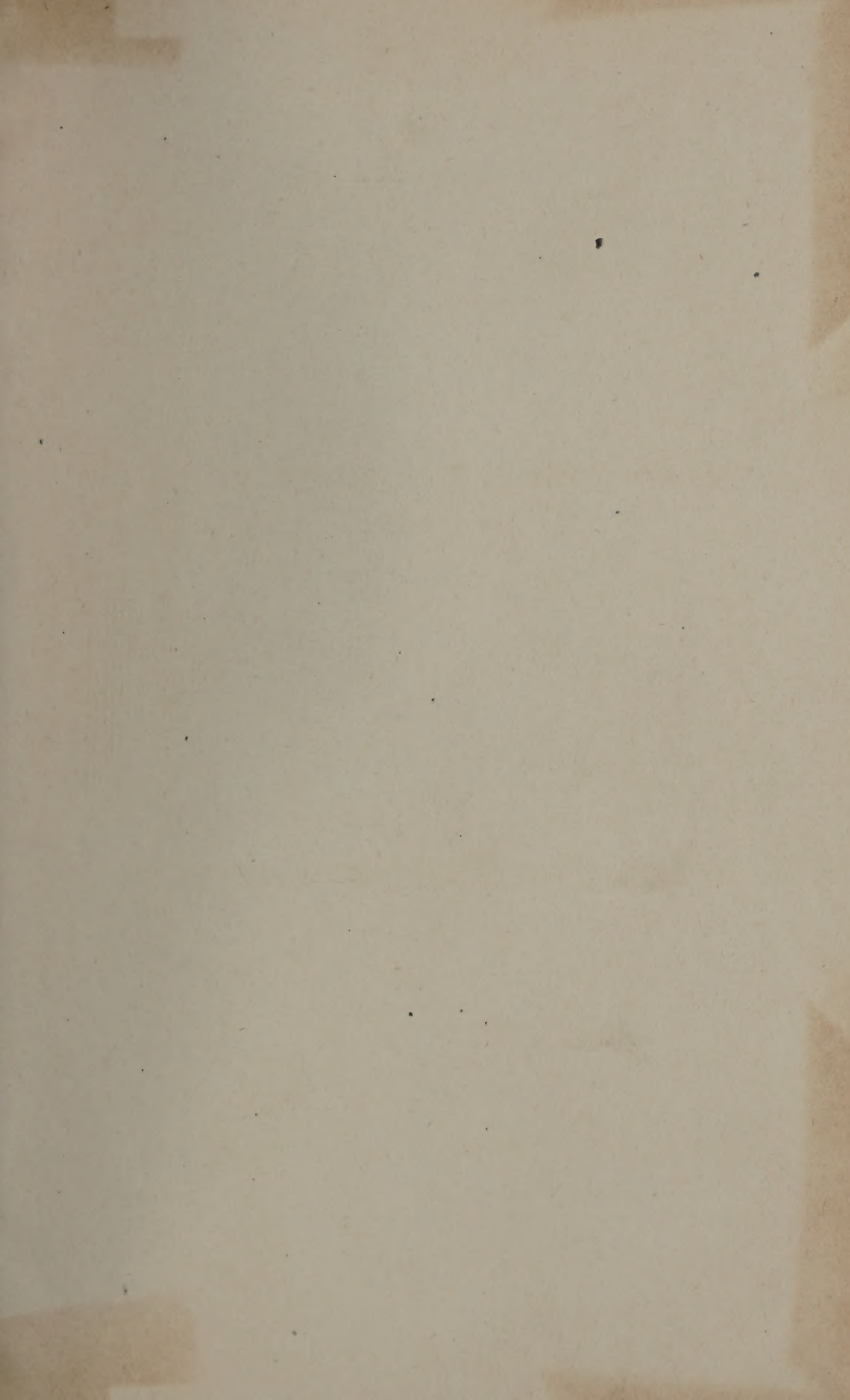

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton qualified to vote in Town affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in the Town Building in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

Article I. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article II. To choose three Selectmen for the ensuing year.

Article III. To choose three Trustees for the Littleton Public Library to serve for three years each in place of A. S. Batchellor, Geo. H. Tilton and Julia A. Eaton, terms expired.

Article IV. To choose an Auditor for the ensuing year.

Article V. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, for the laying out, constructing and repairing highways and bridges and for the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, and for all other necessary town charges.

Article VI. To see what sums of money the town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day and also to see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote for the celebration of the coming Fourth of July.

Article VII. To see what action the town will take in regard to increasing the number of street lights.

Article VIII. To see what action the town will take in regard to appointing a Liquor Agent.

Article IX. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers, heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article X. To choose any other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article XI. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before the meeting.

CURRENT COMMENTS.

The business of the court, on the criminal side, has considerably increased in the aggregate over the amount shown by the reports for either of the two previous years. Forty-four cases were heard and disposed of the past year. This, however, is three less than is shown by the record for the political year, 1895-6, which was the first of service of the present justice. It is a fact of some significance and very creditable to this town that of the forty-four cases now reported, only in eighteen were the respondents residents of this place, the other twenty-six being either from other towns or transient persons apprehended here. Of the forty-four offences, twenty-eight were committed in this town and sixteen elsewhere. Statistical statements which follow will indicate more in detail the classification of the cases reported.

The population of the town by the census of 1890 was 3,365. It is now estimated to be at least 4,000.

Paul R. Clay resigned the office of clerk, January 20, 1899, and Burns P. Hodgman was appointed February first. Lewis B. Heald, having accepted an appointment to a federal office, resigned the office of Special Justice on the thirteenth of February, 1899, and Marshal D. Cobleigh was subsequently appointed, February 21, to the place by the Governor and Council.

The recommendation is made to officers, in whose hands warrants are placed for service, that care be taken before expense is made to ascertain that the complainant is responsible for the liability incurred under chapter 256, section 9, Public Statutes, or that the prosecution of the complainant has the approval of the selectmen of the town in which the offence occurred or of the Solicitor or the County Commissioners.

Under the provisions of chapter 256, section 14, it appears that towns are liable for prison charges as well as other costs in cases of enforcement of the laws relating to offences against the police of towns, unless the procedures shall have been approved by the Solicitor or Commissioners.

Attorneys, magistrates, sheriffs and police officers would do well to ascertain whether a prosecution on any given evidence for offences against the police of towns has the approval of the selectmen. In other, and more important cases, like approval of prosecutions should be obtained at the earliest practicable point of time from the County Solicitor or Commissioners.

Under chapter 112, Public Statutes, which relates to the illegal sale of intoxicating liquors, the provisions respecting punishment for drunkenness are not included as was formerly the case. That is now treated as an offence solely against the police of towns, Public Statutes, chapter 264, Sec. 14, Strafford County vs. Dover, 61 N. H., 617. Hence, it would seem to follow that that class of cases is not included among those which the solicitor is compellable to prosecute under the requirements of section 34 of the same chapter.

He is, however, compellable, (section 34), upon proper evidence being formally called to his attention by a reputable citizen, by a statement under oath, to prosecute for violations of offences now specified in the chapter above named. Section 23 of the same chapter prescribes the duties of selectmen in this behalf.

If these suggestions are observed as far as practicable, a great saving of expense to the public and of unnecessary effort on the part of officials in seeking somebody who will be responsible for expense previously or inconsiderately incurred, will be avoided.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

The usefulness of the public library has been maintained at a high standard during the past year as will be apparent by the appended special reports.

SUNDAY PRIVILEGES IN THE READING ROOM.

By the generous thoughtfulness of Gen. George T. Cruft, of Bethlehem, provision has been made for having the reading room open every Sunday in the year (except in the months of July, August and September) from 2.30 to 6 p. m. Miss Jennie E. Smith has had supervision of the reading room on Sundays. This plan has been in operation during the winter and will be continued till July 1 next, and permanently, if the patronage of the public justifies the effort and outlay. This feature of the library service is under experiment and ample opportunity is afforded for the ordinary use of the rooms at a time when many have their only season of relief from the exactions of business and labor. Notice of this privilege has been given in the newspapers. It is believed that those who do not have the opportunity afforded by a well appointed private library for Sunday reading may with profit to themselves and without detriment to the public improve the right now accorded to consult newspapers, magazines, and books of reference in that part of the day in which the reading or reference room is open for the use of the public, whose property it is and whose trustees we are.

IMPROVED APPLIANCES FOR LIBRARY ADMINISTRATION.

The library had outgrown the card catalogue case that was first in use and the necessity for better facilities in this particular has been met by the purchase of a new and ample receptacle. The one formerly in use has been advantageously disposed of. A rolling truck for the redistribution of books has also been added to the library furniture. An elegant clock of antique pattern has been donated by the Littleton Dramatic Club and placed in position in the reading room. Formal acknowledgment of this most welcome gift has been tendered the club by the trustees.

PRESERVATION OF LOCAL LITERATURE.

In the endeavor to keep in touch with general library progress, the trustees have taken measures to accomplish a collection of material which belongs in the special department of local literature. The details of the plan adopted are explained in the vote of the trustees which is given in this connection:

“Voted: that the Librarian be directed to procure all books which are by authors native of this town as far as practicable.

“Voted: that the Librarian procure all books or pamphlets which contain the writings of residents of this town provided that procurement by purchase shall generally be limited to the works written or published while the authors may have been residents of the town.

“Voted: that the Librarian be directed to procure scrap books and arrange in them articles of biography of persons connected with the town by nativity, residence, or otherwise; addresses, sermons, and other articles delivered or published here or elsewhere of permanent

value as a part of the history of literature of the town; and that separate volumes be devoted (1) to biography, (2) to addresses, essays, controversial papers, and sermons, (3) to other articles.

“Voted: that pamphlets containing published writings of natives of the town, persons residing in town, the writing or publication having been done while the author is a resident of the town, material relating specially to the town, or sermons and addresses delivered in town, be bound in substantial form for permanent preservation and appropriately arranged in the library.

“Voted: that so far as practicable the Librarian procure and preserve in scrap or stub books such printed programs and other temporary or fugitive literature relating to the town as may be of interest in the present or future.”

This enterprise invites the co-operation of all who are interested in the library at home or abroad. Books, pamphlets, newspapers, scraps and cuttings, which touch upon the lines above indicated, may be handed or sent to the librarian. Books have been provided for the newspaper cuttings. It is especially desirable that biographies of present or former residents, whether in the form of memoirs or prepared for other purposes, should be sent in by those who may find them in papers, periodicals or manuscripts. It is impossible to estimate how much useful material may be collected by general popular co-operation for the purpose indicated.

BIBLIOGRAPHY OF LITTLETON.

It is manifestly an important feature of library work to prepare and preserve a suitable catalogue of local bibliography. On good authority (Report of State Librarian, 1897, p. 34) it is asserted that such an undertaking should include “books and pamphlets on the town’s

history, topography, literature, art, science, industries, etc., biographies of natives or residents, works of local authors, reports of town officers and local societies, school catalogues, programmes and examination papers, church lists and other publications, sermons, catalogues and circulars of industrial and commercial concerns, programmes of concerts and other public or private entertainments, handbills, posters, books, pamphlets and periodicals published or printed in the town, maps, etc.

“Nothing is too insignificant to be of possible use to some enquirer. Classified scrap books of newspaper clippings, arranged under such heads as biography, fires, churches, government, improvements, names of important events, etc., are of the greatest value. It should be remembered, however, that indiscriminate and unclassified scrapping is nearly useless. Neither should one preserve in this way material already found in books. A local collection should also include portraits, views, photographs of buildings, etc.

“In addition to printed matter the library should contain manuscript material of all kinds relating to the town. Books and pamphlets representing much well-directed work, the results of which should not be lost, for various reasons remain unprinted. In this class belong papers read before the society, also notes made by members but never used in any published work. The manuscript material also includes diaries, business and family papers, account books, logs of sea voyages, record books of societies, etc.”

The attention of the trustees has been directed to this necessity and a suitable book of record provided for entries of items or paragraphs descriptive of special articles, addresses, sermons, controversial papers, pamphlets and books by resident or native authors. The list is really large and should include a great number of titles.

On one question that naturally arises in this connection, we quote again the authority above cited:

“What is a local author? Certainly every one, whether native or foreign, who has done most of his literary work within the town, must be classed under this heading. In Salem, this includes Hawthorne and Bowditch (natives), Edward S. Morse (born in Maine), and Dr. Bently (in Boston). When we go beyond this it is difficult to draw the line. Is every native and every resident to be included in this category? There are natives who left the town so early in life as to owe to it nothing but the mere accident of birth (such as Prescott and W. W. Story in Salem). Others may be called “birds of passage.” Clergymen frequently belong to this class. Salem examples are Roger Williams, G. B. Cheever, and Rufus Choate. No uniform rule can be laid down. In a general way it may be said the smaller the town the more inclusive should be the rule. The small town must make the most of its notables. At the Cambridge Public Library, Harvard students coming from outside the city are not considered Cambridge authors unless they actually produce literary work while residents. Whatever limits are fixed, within these limits everything should be carefully collected.

“To collect this material some one must make it his special business and be ever on the alert. The field may be subdivided, one person looking out for public documents, others attending to churches, schools, musical matters, etc., while one follows up the publishers and printers.”

For the preparation of this catalogue, the teachers of the schools, ministers, editors, members of literary clubs, authors themselves and all others who may learn of data which is appropriate, the trustees invite to co-operate and results from any effort, whether organized, continuous, or desultory, will be welcome and will find place in the catalogue which is proposed.

CO-OPERATION OF THE LIBRARY WITH THOSE ENGAGED IN SPECIAL LINES OF STUDY.

Particular attention has been devoted to the necessities of the schools, the reading clubs, the grange, and of others engaged in special departments of study by library co-operation. So far as practicable, useful and standard works of reference, related to the courses named and subjects under consideration, from time to time, have been procured and placed at the disposal of those engaged in special studies as organizations or individuals.

It should perhaps be more generally understood that the library will accommodate patrons who desire to borrow books from the State Library. Whenever a request is left with the Librarian for the loan of a book from the state, the request will be immediately forwarded and if the borrower is willing to pay the charges of transportation, going and coming, the books will be issued through this library for use for a time reasonably limited.

RENEWAL OF THE QUINQUENNIAL APPROPRIATION.

The appropriation last provided for the term of five years by vote of the town and by supplemental action subsequently will expire with the coming year by limitation. It will be necessary to provide at the next annual meeting, March, 1900, for another five years' term.

It will be the endeavor of the trustees to conduct the affairs of this important institution so that its continued support will appear more than ever before in the light of pleasure combined with duty.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BOOKS.

Without question our public library is at the very front in its educational influence in this community. It works in the greatest sympathy with School and Church, and with every other toning influence. One of the advantages of home life in communities like ours far from great city centres is the hour of leisure, the uninterrupted evenings. Our library has made those seasons periods of entertainment and instruction. It brings the reader in touch with the latest thought, the greatest minds, and the grandest lives. Authors become friends, characters acquaintances, and ideals inspiration, and the great precepts capital in trade.

A liberal education can be obtained in these leisure moments by a thoughtful reading of our best books. It is exceedingly gratifying to note the class of literature mostly read. This last year has seen a great falling off in fiction and a marked advance in history and biography. There has been a constant inquiry for works of science and art.

The committee feel much hampered by the smallness of the appropriation. We are obliged to pass recent publications of high merit, which are constantly called for. There are magazine sets needed for constant use, books of reference.

So we ask for a larger appropriation for the next year. We have received several generous gifts from Mrs. M. A. Kenney, Mrs. H. F. Green, Mr. B. W. Kilburn, Colonel C. A. Sinclair, A. S. Batchellor, General George T. Cruft—in all, thirty-seven volumes. These are a welcome addition to our library. Those of General Cruft are particularly adapted to the quiet Sunday afternoon, every one an authority on its subject. They are the last and best things said on the topics of which they treat. We are still hoping that some of our citizens will place in

the hands of the trustees certain sums, the interest of which may be expended for some peculiar line of literature. It would be a good and lasting monument to some of the families whose names have been identified for many years with the growth of our town.

We need not say anything of the reading room—the large patronage speaks for itself. We have most of the popular magazines and many weeklies and dailies. They are all read.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

To the President of the Board of Trustees:

The Committee on Finance submit the following report:

A careful study of the Treasurer's report will show that a sum of over \$200 has been expended for books, which for some years has been the usual amount after providing for running expenses.

Your committee earnestly wish this might be increased that a sum of not less than \$300 could be clearly devoted to this most important item.

The apparent balance of \$195.71, reported in the hands of the Treasurer, will be immediately reduced to a real balance of \$7.77, by reason of payment in salary of librarian of \$87.50, \$59.04 for the last order of books, \$30 for care of rooms during Sundays, \$10.00 for pedestal ordered.

This is the last year the trustees will have the benefit of the appropriation of \$700.00 yearly made 3 years

ago, and provision will have to be made at the March meeting in 1900 for another appropriation to cover all the annual charges of the library.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN.

To the Board of Trustees of the Public Library:

The tenth annual report of the Librarian is herewith submitted:

The circulation of books the past year has not equaled that of 1897, but I feel that the falling off is easily

accounted for in that our daily papers have been of such absorbing interest to all loyal Americans that many have had no time for the reading of books.

Fiction claiming only 62 per cent of the 13,260 volumes issued shows a marked increase in the reading of History, Travels, Biography, etc. Three hundred and thirty-seven volumes have been added, 171 by purchase; 125 books and pamphlets from State and Government; 35 from friends of the library. (See report of Book Committee).

There is now a total of 6,742 volumes. One hundred and eighty-two cards have been issued, the last bearing the number, 2508.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TOWN HISTORY.

As was stated in the report of last year, it may be repeated at this time, that the principal part of volume two of the work has been printed; that is, the entire body of the genealogical section which includes all the histories of families and the printed sketches are open to inspection at the Municipal Court room. Volume one is passing through the press at the establishment of the Riverside Press at Cambridge as rapidly as the copy can be taken care of by the printers and the sheets properly proof-read. Some delay has been occasioned this winter by the interposition of a large amount of Christmas and New Year holiday work to which the publishers gave preference over our work for some weeks.

So far as preparation of material is concerned, the work of the committee is done and it only remains for the printers, the writers of the narrative, the indexers, and those who will attend to the distribution of the volumes to effect a final and speedy conclusion of the undertaking. The committee recommend that they be authorized to make, at their discretion, a charge of fifty cents per volume to cover the expenses of shipments, packing, express, postage and distribution of volumes.

The report of the treasurer of the committee accompanies this general statement.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

LOCATION OF FIRE ALARM BOXES.

- No. 42, corner Cottage and Mt. Eustis streets.
- No. 43, corner Cottage and South streets.
- No. 44, near West end of Union block.
- No. 45, corner High and School streets.
- No. 46, corner Main and Saranac streets.
- No. 47, corner Main and Meadow streets.
- No. 48, front of Saranac Glove shop.
- No. 49, South St., near J. R. Jackson's residence.
- No. 52, corner Union St. and Lafayette Ave.
- No. 53, corner Pleasant St. and Chiswick Ave.
- No. 54, Union St., near G. A. Edson's residence.
- No. 55, Front of E. H. Well's store, Aphthorp.

DIRECTIONS.

The glass covered box on side of alarm boxes contains the key; get the key by breaking the glass, and open alarm box; pull down the hook, letting go at once. For second alarm, pull down the hook after first alarm has rung.

The alarm will indicate the station from which the signal was given. Thus, a signal at Station No. 42 will be sounded by four strokes of the bell, followed by two strokes. This will be repeated, so that notice will be clearly given that fire has broken out in the vicinity of Station 42, if that be the case, because the alarm sounds a four, by four strokes of the bell, and a two by two strokes of the bell. In this way Station 42 is indicated. The other stations will be indicated in a similar manner, the second number struck by the alarm bell corresponding to the number in unit's place, either 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, or 7, as the case may be.
