# Warrant.

## State of New Hampshire.

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Milan in the County of Coos in the said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:*

You are notified to meet at Androscoggin Hall in said town, on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects, viz :

1st. To choose necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2nd. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor and other other necessary charges arising within the town.

3rd. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for laying out and building and maintaining highways and bridges.

4th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for breaking roads during the winter of 1917 and 1918.

5th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for building State Highways.

6th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for maintaining State Highways.

7th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for support of Schools.

8th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the purchase of books and paying other expenses of the Public Library.

9th. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the proper observance of Memorial Day, and appropriate the same to the use of the Grand Army.

10th. To choose a Library Trustee to serve three years.

# Report of School Board.

---

*Report of the Chairman of the Board of Education to the voters in the School District of Milan.*

Much is read at the present time in many of the periodicals regarding "getting back" to a more thorough teaching of the fundamentals, commonly known as the "three R's." Unquestionably the public has a right to demand that a boy or girl, upon leaving the elementary schools, should be able to express his thoughts clearly and intelligently, both by spoken and written word, to spell correctly, write legibly and perform quickly and accurately the simple processes of arithmetic that are in common use. That we have not allowed ourselves to get away from the teaching of the fundamentals is evident when an examination of the finished product is made. See 9th grade graduates.

We began the year with practically a new corps of teachers throughout the town, only one of the former teachers being retained. We feel that we were especially fortunate in our selection of teachers as the work in every instance except two has been carried on in a most satisfactory and efficient manner.

The average attendance has been somewhat interfered with by various epidemics, cold weather and bad travelling. This is to be regretted as the District receives yearly a considerable sum from the State for average attendance. If parents and children cooperated more fully the sum might be materially increased. The transportation of children is getting to be a serious proposition. If the parents were a little more considerate and meet the town part way the trouble would be reduced to a minimum. It would be an encouragement to the teachers, and a satisfaction to the people if they visited the schools more frequently and see what is being done. The school buildings are in a fair state of repair. The school house on Hodgdon Hill has been painted, new sash put in, a hardwood floor laid; and various repairs made on practically all the others during the year. The out buildings are not as sanitary as might be desired. The School District of Milan is required by law to raise for schools \$1200.00 the coming year. In order to obtain additional State aid to that received for average attendance qualified teachers and from the literary fund the school district must raise by taxation a total of \$2736.54. The follow-
