#### TOWN MEETING WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Monroe in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Monroe on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will raise for Memorial purposes.
- 4. To see how much money the town will raise for the care of cemeteries.
- 5. To see now much money the town will raise for electric lights in town.
- 6. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising money for the purpose of keeping a physician in town.
- 7. To see how much money the town will raise for building and maintaining highways and bridges.
- 8. To see how much money the town will raise for libraries more than the law requires.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid for highway construction.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid maintenance.

- 11. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid on bridges.
- 12. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.
- 13. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to give deeds for cemetery lots sold by town.
- 14. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to raise money on town notes if necessary.
- 15. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they appraise the property to be taxed.
- 16. To see how much money the town will raise to support a band in town.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from H. E. Locke's to the Victor Ward place, so-called.
- 18. To hear reports of town officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

#### LIBRARY HOURS

Tuesday: 12.15—8.15 P. M. Saturday: 2—6 P. M.

The first of July the library was moved into the lower room of the old school building. Book shelves were built around three sides of the room and they hold the books without too much crowding. Two new tables and six chairs have been purchased and with the old ones in the building make the room quite comfortable. A new clock was purchased and several good pictures, rescued from the old school houses, make the walls attractive. The lawn was graded and seeded and the grass was kept mowed. Our flowers were not a great success but they bore a few gay blossoms. We hope to have better success next year.

Miss Dorothy Annable, secretary of the State Library Commission classified the books, and with the help of Mrs. Mary Smith and several young ladies, made a card catalog. This catalog enables us to tell readily what books by any author the library has, or to find the author if only the title of the book is known, and also to find what books the library has on a given subject.

The library was opened to the public July 16 and since then has been open two afternoons and one evening each week. The number of books loaned has tripled since the library was moved. The number of books loaned during the first six months of the year was 760 and for the last six months 2131 making the total circulation for the year 2891.

The academy students use the library for reference work and they get many books for their outside reading list. Most of the non-fiction purchased this last year was selected primarily for the academy students. The new Compton's Encyclopedia is a wonderful help and the new unabridged dictionary fills a special need.

Through the cooperation of the teachers, the sixth, seventh and eighth grades came to the library and were instructed in the classification of the books and use of the card catalog. As a result, several pupils have become regular users of the library. We hope that under the direction of the teachers much valuable reference material will be made useful. The library is open at 12.15 on Tuesdays so that pupils who ride in the school bus may have an opportunity to visit the library and select books. The number of those who have availed themselves of this privilege is quite gratifying.

The library subscribes for National Geographic Magazine, American Boy, Child Life, Our Dumb Animals, Our New Hampshire and Literary Digest. Several other magazines are given by citizens after they are through reading them. All these magazines may be taken out in the same way as books.

The North Monroe Branch still operates and serves many who would find it difficult to get books from the main library. The number of books loaned from North Monroe branch for the past year was 632.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Monroe:

I herewith present my third annual report as superintendent of schools.

The following figures are self-explanatory and need no special comment. For the year 1931-1932 the total enrollment was 77; the per cent of attendance, 95.65; cases of tardiness, 9; number of school visits by members of the board, 4; by the superintendent, 93; by citizens, 153. There were nine pupils on the roll of honor for perfect attendance: Doris Bedell, Pauline Emery, Lyle Lang, Doris Moore, Gladys Page, Dale Gibson, Elwyn Gibson, Prince Hadley, Bernice Moore.

Five pupils were promoted in June from the eighth grade to the high school: Larkin Burril, Rita Champany, Elizabeth Champany, Helena Johnson, Frances Little.

This year the enrollment has been 81. The teachers are as follows: Mrs. Gertrude W. Hoar, principal of the building, grades VI-VIII; Miss Margaret R. Cyr, grades III-V; Miss Harriet F. Wilton, grades I-II; Miss Irene C. Jewett, domestic arts; Miss Alice M. Brown, music; Miss Underhill, nurse. Miss Mabel I. Connelly came at the beginning of the winter term to take the place of Mrs. Hoar who resigned. In addition to the pupils in the consolidated school there are twenty attending high schools outside of the district.

It is a pleasure to note that the standard tests given in June indicate that the work done in the school was of an excellent quality, a majority of the scores being well above the average. One pupil in the third and one in the eighth grade made the highest scores for their grades in this supervisory union.

The domestic arts work for the girls of the fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth grades was started at the beginning of this year. It is hoped that the manual training for the boys may also be started in the near future. The school does not expect to make expert cooks, dressmakers, and carpenters. It does aim to discover latent tastes and talents, and to teach the children some of the rudiments of these arts.

I wish to express the thanks of the district to Mr. Russel Bartlett of Woodsville who gave the money for the prize essay contest held in the grammar room last spring. The first prize of \$5 was won by Helena Johnson, the second of \$5 by Adelbert Champany.
