TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newton, qualified to vote
in Town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Auditors, Road Commissioners, Trustees of Public Library, Constables, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Measurers of Wood and Bark and Surveyors of Lumber, Health Officers, Fence Viewers, and all other necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for paying the town debts and defraying the interest thereon, for the support and maintenance of the Public Library, and for other necessary charges arising in said town.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25 for Memorial Day purposes.

4. To hear the reports of the Town Treasurer and Board of Selectmen to the Town Auditors, the reports of the Auditors, Agents, Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To choose three trustees to care for trust funds.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise money for the extermination of brown tail and gypsy moths.

8. To see if the town will elect three cemetery trustees.

9. To see if the town will accept state aid and raise \$822 for roads.

10. To raise extra highway money for state aid maintenance.

11. To see if the town will vote to place an electric light at Israel Ingalls' corner and make appropriation for the same.

12. To see if the town will vote to exempt Newton Box Co., at Newton Junction from taxes for a term of five years.

13. To see if the town will vote to extend the street lights from Sargent's corner to Flemings' corner.

14. To see if the town will vote to ditch Mrs. E. B. Hoyt's meadow.

15. To see if the town will vote to build a suitable place for the protection of the town records.

16. To see if the town will vote to buy proper heating apparatus for the Town Hall.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

According to the terms of the will of the late John A. Gale, formerly of Newton, N. H., formerly of Haverhill, Mass., formerly of Brookline, Mass., we wish to quote you a copy of the second paragraph of his will:

SECOND: "To pay over to the Trustees of the library located at Newton in the State of New Hampshire, the sum of five hundred (\$500) dollars, to be used by said trustees in any manner they may see fit for the benefit of said library. This legacy, however I give strictly upon the condition that the trustees of said library shall name it, "The Gale Library" in memory of my father Jacob H. Gale and my mother, Harriet H. Gale."

Codical to my last will and testament: "I give to the trustees of the library located in Newton, New Hampshire, the sum of fifteen hundred (\$1,500.00) dollars in addition to the sum of five hundred (\$500) dollars already given by me in this my will. This amount is given upon the same terms and conditions as expressed in paragraph numbered two in this my will."

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Newton:

In a backward look over the school year just closed the school board has a feeling that its chief concern has been to make both ends meet, and that in its endeavor to do this it has pursued the only sensible course in handling school funds. The results are, briefly, that the board has succeeded in giving an average of 34 1-2 weeks for all schools, has retained or secured competent teachers, has met a large expense for transportation that was entirely unexpected, and has paid for an iron fire escape on the grammar school, the cost of which had to be met in great part out of funds appropriated originally for other repairs. In order to meet the extra transportation burden and at the same time give as near 36 weeks of school as possible, so that the schools might be kept up to the standard necessary if their graduates were to continue entrance to Haverhill High School, or other high schools or academies, without examination, the school board voted to defer the second payment for Haverhill High school tuition until the appropriations for 1917—were available. This was done after arrangements had been made with the Haverhill school authorities.

Reviewing the work of the year in detail, the school board submits the following:

TEACHERS:

In the spring term the board placed the salaries of the three in the three lower schools on a common level of \$12 a week and was glad to do so, in view of the very

satisfactory services they were giving and the common knowledge that teachers as a class are lamentable underpaid for the time and effort that they put into their work. The entire staff of four teachers remained with us in the spring term. Because of illness in her family, Miss Harriet C. Gardner, teacher of the grammar school, was obliged to leave us temporarily, near the close of the term, and Miss Eva B. Case of Haverhill was secured as a substitute. The latter accepted the difficult task of carrying to its conclusion the preparatory work of the ninth grade for entrance to high school or academy and training the entire school for the graduation exercises; this in addition to instruction of the seventh and eighth grades. The board considered itself fortunate in securing her so late in the season.

Miss Gardner returned at the beginning of the fall term.

In the summer Miss Marion E. Davis resigned after several year's service here and the board, believing in the employment of competent home talent when possible, engaged Miss Isabell Rowell to take her place. Reports from parents have indicated that the choice was a very acceptable one. The board was pleased to be able to retain Miss Gardner, and Miss Margaret Ingalls at the Rowe's Corner school and Miss Angelia E. Kelly at the Junction school.

Teaching of music in three of the schools was continued throughout the year, Mrs. H. J. Bartlett serving as teacher during the entire period.

TRANSPORTATION:

The school district at its 1916 meeting voted to abolish transportation of pupils from the Junction to grammar school and it cut off from the general appropriation the amount that it was estimated this service would cost. It was learned afterward that this vote was illegal—that

the power of granting or refusing transportation was vested entirely in the school board. Before this was learned, the board, in accordance with the district vote, had discontinued the service. On being informed of the illegality of the district's action, the board met and, disregarding the district vote in so far as it applied to the winter months, voted to restore transportation from the Junction for the period from Dec. 1 to April 1, but not to restore transportation from that section during the milder months. It believed this policy was reasonable, especially as children in other sections were walking as far or farther to school. Several parents, however, refused to send their children to school unless transportation was restored for the entire school year. The board, believing its course was reasonable, was obliged, because of this belief, still to refuse transportation the year around and eventually was compelled, as the law required, to prosecute these parents for restraining their children from attending school. The court took the parents' view of the matter, found the parents not guilty, and because of the court's decision that it was unreasonable for the children to walk the distance (two miles) promptly restored transportation.

The court's decision will probably stand as a precedent for the town of Newton, at any rate, as long as the present laws applying to the transportation of pupils are unchanged. Under the decision, any pupil walking two miles or more is entitled to be carried at the expense of the school district.

Under the law as it now stands, the carrying of pupils depends on the personal belief as to its reasonableness or unreasonableness of the school board. If the parents whose children are not given transportation entertain a different belief, whether real or assumed, from that of the school board, and the case goes to court, the matter

then depends on the personal belief of the court—the belief of one person against that of two or more persons on the school board (should the court's belief be contrary to that of the board.)

The board is of the opinion that this matter should not be left to the personal belief of any one person or any small group of persons but that the law should be amended to fix a definite distance over which children shall be carried or to give the entire school district power to decide what transportation shall be given. The school district has the power, by resolution and appointment of a committee to act, to seek such an amendment if it sees fit.

TEXT-BOOKS AND SUPPLIES:

In the purchase of supplies the board continued its policy of buying in March the greater part of what would be needed for the year, replenishing as needed particular stocks that it was found were being used more than others.

The rapid rise in the cost of paper led to request to teachers to be careful of the supply. Early in December, when it was found prices were still rising (in some cases to 100 per cent. over March prices) the board secured credit until March 15, 1917, of its supply house and purchased a full supply of paper and other materials for the year 1917-1918. The bill, dated March 15, was sent at the time of purchase. It amounts to \$135.82 and the amount is included in the fund estimated to be needed for books and supplies

REPAIRS:

The school district expressed the desire that the board build a fire escape on the grammar school building and added \$75 to the repair fund it had previously voted, to cover the cost of the escape. A wooden escape probably

could have been build for \$75, but the board, believing a wooden escape entirely unsuited to the purpose for which a fire escape is designed, secured figures from some eight firms on an iron escape and awarded the contract to the firm offering the lowest estimate, C. S. Parris & Co., of Boston. The entire cost of the escape installed, with carpenter work and locks, was \$228.72.

Because of the heavy expense, the board abandoned its repair program announced at the district meeting and voted to make only the very necessary general repairs. These included an extension of the coal bin in the grammar school, and at the Junction school interior painting, repairs to the outside platform, steps, flagpole, stove and and shed.

TUITION:

The full amount of tuition permissible to be paid by law was furnished for one pupil at the Merrimac High School. For 15 pupils attending Haverhill High School the board paid for one term of tuition at \$20 each, leaving the remaining \$20 each, as already explained, to be paid out of the coming appropriations. This does not mean any extra expense to the district this year, unless it chooses to resume full payment of \$40 in advance. As a matter of fact, the board was not in arrears in the payment of tuition at the close of the fiscal year because the bill for the second term's tuition had not been presented.

FUEL:

The enlargement of the coal bin at the grammar school building will now enable the board to buy a full supply of coal at the time when it reaches its lowest price of the year.

MEDICAL INSPECTION:

The board again recommends that a fund for medical inspection be appropriated, in the interests of the children's and teachers' health. There were occasions in the past year when action by a medical inspector acting on orders from the board would have been of value in all four of the schools. Parents who on these occasions were anxious about the health and safety of their children will probably recall these times vividly enough.

ENUMERATION:

The board adopted the card index system of enumeration. By this method an accurate record may be kept of all pupils by schools and grades and facts regarding each pupil are instantly available.

GENERAL:

Unclassified expenditures were greater than usual because of expenses incurred in the transportation controversy and in the purchase of a new stove for the Rowe's Corner school, the old stove having broken in two.

Elmer E. Butler, elected chairman in March, resigned from the Board Dec. 27, near the close of his three-year term, owing to the necessity of removing to Boston because of illness in his family. The other members of the board declined to accept the resignation and retained him as a long-distance member for the remainder of his term.

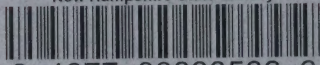
