### REPORT

OF THE

### SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE

FOR THE

# TOWN OF STODDARD,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1883.

### DISTRICT No. 1

The spring term commenced May 1 and continued nine weeks under the instruction of Miss Clara E. Upton. Average attendance, 33. All attended to reading, spelling and penmanship; 28 to arithmetic; 23 to geography; 4 to grammar, and 1 to history; 17 to composition.

It was a most successful school. The teacher having those combined qualities that cannot fail to succeed, viz., an excellent education, good judgment and a love for teaching, and the scholars seemed to strive to excel each other in making it a most profitable term as well as one that should be a credit to them. They all succeeded admirably and deserved our praise.

The fall term of eleven weeks was taught by Miss Nellie S. Dicker. Average attendance, 29. All were taught in reading, spelling and penmanship; 25 in arithmetic; 19 in geography; 5 in grammar; 23 in composition, and 1 in history.

The improvement made by the scholars was very satisfactory and the order was excellent.

### DISTRICT No. 2.

The spring and autumn terms were taught by Miss Mary E. Davis, 19 weeks in all. Average number of pupils, 18.2. All

attending to reading and spelling; 14 to penmanship; 16 to arithmetic; 7 to grammar, and 7 to composition

Miss Davis is successful as a teacher and the school is a credit to teacher and scholars alike.

#### DISTRICT No. 3.

The spring term was taught by Miss Lizzie A. Brown; 8 weeks; average attendance, 9.74. All recited in reading and spelling; 7 were taught penmanship; 7 arithmetic; 4 grammar, and 1 physiology.

The fall term of four weeks was taught by Miss Florence S. Knight; average attendance, 10.7. All were taught reading, spelling and penmanship; 9 arithmetic; 8 geography; 11 drawing and 2 physiology. For so short terms of school the progress made was creditable.

### DISTRICT No. 5.

The spring term was taught by Miss S. Grace Curtice with an attendance of 19. All were taught in reading; 12 in spelling; 10 in penmanship; 13 in arithmetic, and 7 in geography. There was not the interest in the school room that I should have liked to have seen manifested, and the teacher's register shows too many absent and tardy marks for a profitable school.

The fall term was taught by Miss Helen R. Swain; 10 weeks. Number of scholars, 26; average, 21. 24 attended to reading; 17 to spelling; 15 to penmanship; 19 to arithmetic; 8 to geography, and 3 to grammar. I think the teacher tried to have a good school but the school house was in so poor condition it was next to impossible to have a successful term.

#### DISTRICT No. 6.

There were three terms of school in this district, taught by Miss Nettle M. Gibner, 29 weeks in all. All were taught reading and spelling; 10 penmanship; 10 arithmetic; 9 geograraphy; 2 grammar; and 1 history. The scholars have made rapid progress in their studies. The teacher has ever been ready to assist and instruct them, making the time spent in the school room profitable to all.

### DISTRICT No. 8.

The spring term was taught by Miss Jennie S. Whittemore. 8 weeks; average attendance. 11.74. All attending to reading ing and spelling; 10 to penmanship; 9 to arithmetic; 5 to geography; 3 to grammar; 3 to composition. The order in school was good, and the school a success.

The second term was taught by Miss Addie M. Taylor; 11 weeks; average attendance, 13.64. All were taught reading, spelling, penmanship and arithmetic; 8 geography; 3 history; and 3 composition. I was away at close of the school, not getting word soon enough to be present, but think the school was successful.

### DISTRICT No. 9.

Number of scholars, 3. All attended to reading, spelling; 2 to penmanship; 2 to arithmetic, and 2 to geography. 7 weeks of school. The school was successful.

Your schools the past year have proved successful as a whole. More pains have been taken by the Prudential Committee to secure teachers well qualified to teach, than has usually been the case, and you have the thanks of your Superintending Committee for the success attending those efforts. I must say one word regarding your school houses in Number 5 and 8. They are a disgrace to the town. How can you, parents, send your children to such places, when a few dollars, well spent, will give them a comfortable school room? Remember this at your school meeting, and don't think more of your wallet and what it contains than you do of your children. Remember there is no place where children are more liable to get severe colds than in school rooms where the wind can whistle through the cracks and keeps the room cold. Build a new house if necessary and take my word for it you never will spend your money more creditably.
