## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To appropriate the sum of \$500.00 from the net earnings of the town truck to meet the note due on said truck.

4. To see what sums of money, including that required by law, the Town will raise and appropriate for building and maintaining highways and bridges for the year ensuing.

5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$302.67 for Town Road Aid, the State's share to be \$2,017.80.

6. To see what sums of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Winter Maintenance of highways.

7. To see if the Town will raise or borrow and appropriate any money for the purchase or hire of equipment for use on the highways or take any action relating thereto.

8. To see what sum of money, including that required by law, the Town will raise and appropriate for the support of the Public Library.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate any money for Memorial Day, or take any action thereon.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate any money for Old Home Day, or take any action thereon.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$48.00 for the Monadnock Region Association.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for the fire company or take any action thereon.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for other fire protection, or take any action thereon.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$274.80 for Red network telephone service.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay the Fire Truck Equipment note.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$205.00 for the aid of the Elliot Community Hospital of Keene, New Hampshire, or take any action thereon.

17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$158.00 for Street Lights, or take any action thereon.

19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate any money for the further improvement of the Sullivan Cemetery.

20. To see if the Town will take any action relating to a building code.

21. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors or Committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before the said meeting.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Sullivan qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said district on the 28th day of March 1957 at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years, and a member for one year.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to accept any sums of money available from Federal funds and to authorize the use of any such funds for the school construction program.

10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to sell the East School and Center school at public auction; or to tear down and remove the Center school, and to take necessary action to this purpose, and to authorize the use of funds received for the building program.

11. To see if the district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the district the benefits of title 2 of the Federal Social Security Act as authorized by Chapter 101 revised statutes annotated amended by chapter 301 and 332, laws of 1955, and to exclude from the plan positions filled by election or on a fee basis and to authorize the school board to execute necessary agreements with the State of N.H. to carry the plan into effect.

12. To take up any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

12. It was voted to have the school board and school study committee concentrate its report on (A) an addition to the Sullivan center school.

13. It was moved to adopt Section A of Article 13. It was not an unanimous verbal vote. Balloting proceeded.

It was voted to transport all children living more than one half mile from school, when road conditions make this possible, and to raise and appropriate eight hundred dollars for this purpose.

14. It was voted to have a well drilled at the upper center Sullivan school with the necessary plumbing and heating and to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars for said purposes under terms as stated in the warrant.

Whole number of votes cast was 39. Necessary for choice 26. No 13; Yes 26. The vote was affirmed and so declared.

15. It was voted to pass over this article.

(11) It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for expense and architect services connected with the school study project.

It was voted to dissolve the meeting.

## SULLIVAN SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

Continued discussion of school improvement in Sullivan was the topic of ten meetings of the study committee this past year. The plans for an addition to the Center School shown last year at the School Meeting proved to be more costly than the town's borrowing power permitted. Mr. Norman Randlett, the architect, revised these plans. It was decided to hold an open meeting to determine the attitude and feeling of the people toward these new plans. At said meeting on January 3, 1957 a test vote was taken on the following: a) to drop the school improvement plan; b) to wait until the district meeting in March; c) to hold a special school meeting as soon as possible to vote on school plans.

The result of the vote was: 6 in favor of a; 4 in favor of b; 19 in favor of c.

The Court granted the petition for special meeting on January 24, 1957 in Town Hall. Prior to this meeting the committee consulted Mr. Alston D. Jenkins regarding proposed addition to Center School. He advised against spending a lot of money on an old building, and felt that a new cinder block school could be built for approximately the same amount as would be needed to remodel and add to present building.

At the special meeting on January 24th the pros and cons of new cinder block school were voiced. There were 69 votes cast. Number necessary to carry the vote—46. 22 were opposed and 47 in favor of a new building. It was voted, also, to employ Mr. Norman Randlett as architect, to transfer the capital reserve funds and interest into the school building account, to authorize the school board to acquire additional land or purchase plot at a new location, the cost not to exceed \$1000. Lucile W. Cordingley, Theodore Parker, Virginia W. Turner and

George L. Whitham were elected as the Building Committee to work with the School Board.

Several possible new sites have been offered, but no decision had been reached at press time. Mr. Randlett has submitted preliminary plans which the committee and school board discussed and revised.

Revised statutes annotated, Chapter 33 and any amendments thereto; and to delegate to the school board authority to fix the time and place of payment of principal and interest of said bonds or notes, the interest thereon, and the principal amount of each bond or note and to take other action as may be necessary and advisable.

3. To see if the district will authorize the transfer of capital reserve funds and interest into the school building account and authorize the use of said funds for construction purposes on the new school or addition and for the acquisition of land for this purpose.

4. To see if the district will authorize the school board

to acquire necessary additional land adjoining the present center school, needed for construction purposes or playground space, or to purchase a new plot at a new location; and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for such purpose.

5. To see if the school district will appoint the present study committee as a building committee to assist and advise the school board on the proposed school construction.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

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At the annual school district meeting in March 1956, funds were voted and approval given for the school board and study committee to work with an architect to bring in proposals for new school construction.

The school problem in Sullivan is not one of overcrowded facilities, but rather one of modernizing and consolidating the school plant so that Sullivan pupils may obtain their education in comfortable, healthful and safe surroundings. The modernization of the school plant will also enable us to retain our teachers over longer periods of time.

After many meetings and much discussion, the board and study committee decided to ask for court permission for a special school district meeting in order to present their findings to the citizens of the community. This decision was reached after a public meeting held at the Center school on Jan. 3, 1957. At the special meeting held on January 24, 1957, it was voted to authorize the board and study committee to hire an architect and proceed with the construction of a new school on a site to be elected by the joint committee.

It is hoped that the new building will be ready for use early in the fall and all look forward to the successful conclusion of the communities efforts to improve the school facilities for our pupils.
