

The results of a study of the preceding table of statistics is quite gratifying in some respects. The average of the per cents of attendance for all the schools is 83.78 for the winter term, 91.46 per cent for the spring term, and 91.62 per cent for the fall term. There is a steady improvement in attendance during the year, and if we compare these per cents with the corresponding ones of last year, which were 82.34 per cent, 88.49 per cent, and 88.86 per cent, we find an improvement in each of the three terms of this fiscal year over the corresponding terms of last year. The attendance last term was the nearest perfect of any term since I have been connected with your schools.

It is also noticeable that there has been but one change in the teaching force during the year, the smallest number of changes during any one year for at least seven years. Farther back than that number of years I have not the data for comparison.

It is worthy of note in this consideration also that the truant officer has not been called on to investigate a single case of non-attendance.

It seems to me that it is pertinent to ask whether there is any significance in the coincidence of this improvement in attendance and the permanence in the teaching force. It seems to me altogether probable that the improvement was due largely as a natural result to the continuance in office of tried teachers.

A teaching force acquainted with the children and the needs of the schools together with the improved attendance, have, I believe, rendered the general work of the schools more efficient this year than for some time past. Any avoidable change would be inadvisable and liable to result in one of those school tragedies so common in rural schools.

Through you, I wish to call the attention of the people of Westmoreland to the fact that their school district is paving the school district of Keene for the tuition of eight pupils attending the Keene high school from this town, and is also paying Tilton academy for one. rate of tuition in each instance is \$40 per year, making a vearly expenditure for the town of \$360. Two hundred dollars was assessed for this purpose last year. It is evident that the school board cannot pav liabilities of \$360 with an appropriation \$200, and they cannot legally pay tuitions from any funds except appropriated and assessed for that purpose. Had the treasurer of the school district of Keene been unwilling to wait until the next fiscal year for the tuition of the Westmoreland pupils attending the Keene high school the past term, the parents of those pupils would have been obliged to settle the bills and wait for reimbursement until an assessment had been made for

that purpose. This has happened in spite of our repeated admonitions. Parents contemplating sending their children to high schools or academies where the liability for their tuition may be upon the district, are required by law to notify the school board of their intentions.

The payment of this unusually large amount for tuition to other school districts for pupils, some of whom are not graduates from our schools, has raised again the advisability of putting our high school on the list of approved secondary schools. Permit me to make the following observation on this subject. The Department of Public Instruction will approve our school whenever we meet with its requirements for courses of four, three, two, or one In event of such approval, the school district of Westmoreland will be exempt from the liability for tuition of Westmoreland pupils attending other approved secondary schools for as many of the four years as the course of the Westmoreland school is approved. So long as the school is unapproved, the parents have the option of sending their children to the local school or to some other approved school, and the district will be liable for the tuition to the extent of \$40 per year per pupil.

I believe that nearly every town which can afford to maintain an approved secondary school should do so. The advantages which the community would derive from such a school would, in my opinion, greatly outweigh the disadvantages, and the only question is the question of expense. Although such a school located at the South Village might not be within walking distance for all the pupils within the limits of the town, the avoidance of the objectionable trips on the railway trains, the long waits in Keene, together with the opportunities furnished for getting an education better fitted to the needs of Westmoreland pupils, makes such a project quite desirable. No community can long sustain a desirable individuality

after its commercial, social, and educational activities have become a mere adjunct to some neighboring city.

There are now nine days which the law states shall be observed as holidays. Eight of these occur when the schools are liable to be in session. Of these days, January first, February twenty-second, Fast day, May thirtieth, and October twelfth could be more appropriately observed by devoting a portion of such days to appropriate exercises in the schools rather than by closing the schools. This would be in compliance with the law and probably more in fulfillment of the original spirit of the statutes.

With a sincere expression of appreciation of the many courtesies extended to me during the year by the board, by the teachers, and by the community in general, this report is respectfully submitted.
