vote to raise for the support of the fire department the ensuing year, or act thereon.

ART. 8.—To see if the town will vote to pay the firemen anything in excess of that allowed by law, or act anything thereon.

ART. 9.—To see how much money the town will vote for the support and care of the public library the ensuing year, or act thereon.
