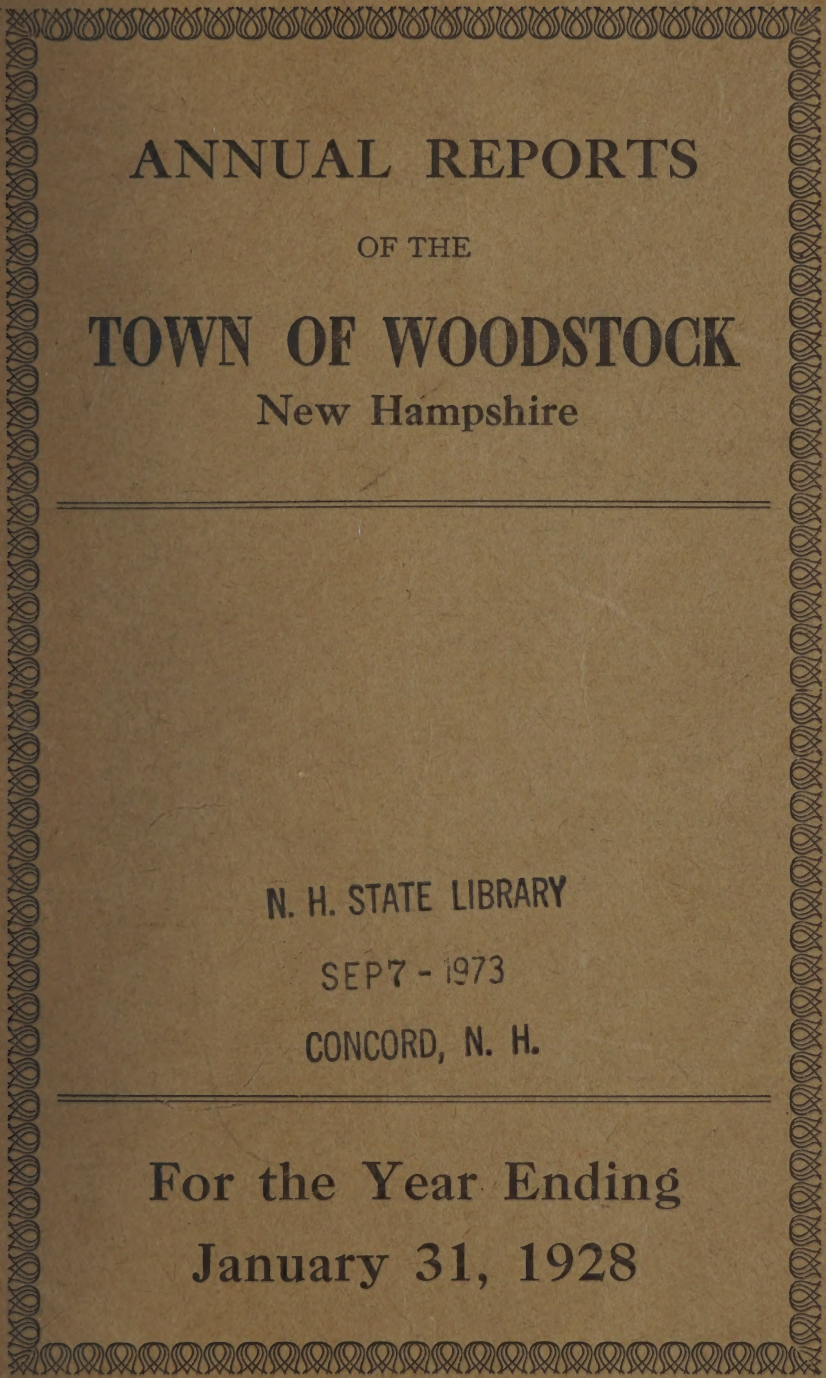

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Woodstock in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Woodstock on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay town charges.

4. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for highways.

5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Trunk Line maintenance, State Aid maintenance and State Aid construction.

6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for libraries.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of cleaning snow from sidewalks in main part of village of North Woodstock and also to sand the sidewalks when dangerous from ice.

9. To see if the town will vote to lease electric light dam property on east side of Daniel Webster Highway to some suitable manufacturing plant if such

an industry can be induced to locate in town, also to see if town will vote to raise the sum of fifty dollars for the purpose of erecting a board to advertise the above property on.

10. To see if the town will vote to have all gasoline oil pumps removed from the street side of the sidewalks in the village of North Woodstock so that the streets of said village will not be taken up with this obstruction as it is now, as it is very dangerous to the welfare of the public.

11. To see if the town will vote to hire a policeman and make appropriation for same.

12. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for cemeteries.

13. To see if the town will vote to repair or replace Glover Bridge on Daniel Webster Highway and raise money for same.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any article embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
9. To see if the district will vote to adopt medical inspection for the schools and to raise and appropriate money therefor.

10. To see if the district will vote to remodel a part of the school building at North Woodstock so as to furnish another room for the high school and to raise and appropriate money therefor.

11. To see whether or not the district will vote to give the boys and girls who graduate from our eighth grade the following books which each has used in the grammar school: viz., geography, grammar, arithmetic and American history.

12. To see what action the district wishes to take in regard to the school condition at Woodstock and to raise and appropriate money therefor.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Mrs. Chairman and Members of the School Board:

I hereby submit my ninth annual report of the Woodstock schools.

In September, the schools opened with two new teachers, viz., E. Viola Harrington at Woodstock to take Miss Baston's position, of last year, as she was transferred to North Woodstock to fill the place made vacant by Miss Rowden's resignation; the other teacher is Carolyn E. Dodge, high school assistant, to take Miss Gilmore's position who resigned to become a special teacher of French in Massachusetts.

The teachers for the present year are: high school—George H. Summerville, Carolyn Dodge and Hazel Balch; elementary schools—Elizabeth Thompson, Pauline Whitney, Blanche Baston and E. Viola Harrington; and Music—Mrs. S. Louise Benoit.

The following data was gleaned from the teachers' registers returned last June: Number of visits by School Board members 17, by citizens and others 162, and 238 by the superintendent of schools; schools were actually in session 170 days; 106 tardy marks; total membership 163 with a per cent of attendance of 95.62; and the following 25 pupils with a perfect record—Floyd Avery, Harriet Aldrich, Amelia Allaire, Dorothy Baston, Thelma Baston, Helen Bradley, Charles Burbank, Dorothy Burbank, Francis Chandler, Martha Couture, Adelbert Deachman, Harold Emerson, Phyllis Emerson, Harry Kendall, Frances Keniston, Kathleen Lane, Marcia Lynde, Martha Nichols, Donald O'Brien, James Parker, Delmore Rogers, Lloyd Roy, Helen Sawyer, Glen Stevens, and Henry Weston.

The report of the September school census shows 69 boys and 51 girls, or a total of 120 pupils in town between the ages of 5 and 16. This is 17 less than were found the previous year.

The health inspection was made by Mrs. Marie Violette, R. N., of Lincoln. About the same percentage

of defects were reported as in the previous year. I trust that the parents will make an effort to have, when possible, the reported defects corrected.

The basement ceiling was covered during the summer vacation and a floor laid over the cement in the commercial room.

The school building at North Woodstock should be remodeled by raising the roof on the south part of the building to make an assembly room for the high school and remove the commercial department to one of the rooms on the upper floor. It is not an uncommon occurrence to have the basement flooded. This is not good for the typewriters.

The frequent flooding of the basement has injured the heating plant so that some repairs are imperative. When the river is high, water stands in the boiler pit for weeks at a time and sometimes it is but a few inches from the fire. At such times, the janitor is forced to wear rubber boots while stoking the fire.

The high school work is going very well. The pupil loss has been small and a good spirit has been manifested. The athletics have been a great help to the school and the games played and won go to show that a good team may be had in a small high school which has good leadership.

The prize speaking contest that was inaugurated last year is to be continued and is financed by Profile Grange. The Grange has also helped the school athletic associations by gifts of money.

The report of the headmaster is appended and made a part of this report.

Co-operation is a big asset in school work as well as in many other activities of life. May our co-operation in the schools continue to be whole-hearted that the greatest good may accrue to all for whom they were designed.

REPORT OF WOODSTOCK HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Alonzo J. Knowlton,

Superintendent, Supervisory Union No. 33,
North Woodstock, New Hampshire.

I submit with pleasure this my second annual report of Woodstock High School. The work of the year has been made pleasant and possible by the support and assistance of the town's people, superintendent and loyal teachers.

The school opened September 13, with thirty-seven pupils enrolled as follows: seven seniors, ten juniors, twelve sophomores and eight freshmen. Seven are enrolled in the Academic Course and thirty in the Commercial Course. Of this number, one has left school.

Flood conditions have interfered somewhat with our school schedule, but the installed bus system gives us more time than the railroad service might have done. We are well equipped with books and with supplies for chemistry.

Opportunity will have been given to all pupils, before the close of school in June, to participate in extra-curricula activities. The high school play will be given in the spring. A prize speaking contest and the school paper are projects now in the process of production. In the athletic activities many boys and girls have found recreation and practical business application. In the fall a tennis tournament was held; and through these winter months basketball has been sponsored and supported entirely by the efforts of the pupils. It is hoped that a baseball schedule can be carried through in the spring. A half-hour assembly has been held of late on Friday afternoon. The responsibility of these programs lies entirely with the pupils.

The Senior Class of 1927 with the aid of the athletic association and school board presented a set of

encyclopedias to the school last June. Of these graduates all have entered a higher institution of learning except one, who has taken up duties in a banking concern in Boston.
