TOWN WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deerfield, in the County of Rockingham, in Said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:—

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Deerfield, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money necessary to secure state aid on highway construction.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$375 for state aid on highway maintenance, as required by law.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to pay a portion of the principal of the trust funds.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to purchase a road machine.

7. To see if the town will vote to transfer the grange clock appropriation to the account of repairs of highways.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens of Deerfield:

I herewith submit for your consideration my third annual report as superintendent of your public schools.

During the first term of the school year covered by this report ten schools were maintained in town, with an enrollment varying from four to twenty-one. During the second term nine different schools were maintained for a portion of the time, the pupils from the Mount Delight district being conveyed for the entire term to the school at the Old Centre. In connection with the matter of closing schools and transporting pupils to other schools, it might be well to state that it is the general opinion among those in touch with educational affairs that a school which cannot maintain an enrollment of at least six or seven pupils is rarely conducted with profit.

The superintendent has regularly visited these schools, as was done last year. At each visit all classes were examined in at least a portion of their studies, any failures or deficiencies noted, and an attempt made to improve the same. At the opening of every term the program of studies by grades has been explained to the teachers, and the essential things to be covered in that term have been outlined.

In a town where the school year is as short as in Deerfield the work outlined for each grade cannot be properly completed unless there is a full and regular attendance for every day that the school is in session. Pupils who are more or less absent from school not only are inclined to lose interest in their work, but such absence tends to hinder the advancement of the class as a whole, and is thus a detriment to the proper advancement of the school.

In certain schools—perhaps most notably the Pond school—the attendance is far from being satisfactory.

Such irregular attendance is unsatisfactory in results both to teacher and pupil, and eventually the parents will discover the fact. The schools of Deerfield are really in session but a short time as compared with many other places, and during this time parents should see to it that the chief business of their children is to be regular and prompt at their school work. If the citizens and parents of Deerfield wish to obtain the best results from the money expended for schools, here is a large opportunity for them to do a vital thing. Let us hope that the coming year will bring an improvement in this matter of attendance.

Considerable supplementary reading matter has been introduced during the past year. This has helped materially in making the reading lessons more interesting to the children, and has thus tended to improve the quality of the reading. Some new histories have also been placed in the schools, and a few more will be needed during the coming year. New blackboards have been installed in some of the school buildings. All the schools have been supplied with drinking fountains and individual drinking cups for the pupils, thus much improving the sanitary conditions and lessening the chance of transmission of disease from one pupil to another.

The school physician, as a result of his examination, reports that on the whole he finds the pupils to be in very good condition. The largest number of defects was found in the teeth. He reports fifty-two cases of defective teeth, but states that these are mostly limited to one or two small cavities. Notices with regard to this will be sent by him to the parents.

As was stated in my report of last year, many of the buildings in town are not in first-class condition as regards lighting, heating, ventilation, etc. It is the recommendation of the state educational department that a district should adopt a program of annually appropriating money to thoroughly renovate at least one school building. There is opportunity for such a policy in Deerfield,

and it would seem that the Parade school might be a good one on which to make a start in this direction, this being one of the larger schools of the town, and so located as to be likely to continue to have a fair enrollment.

Thanking all who have been of assistance in furthering the welfare of the Deerfield schools, I submit for your consideration the above report for the year.

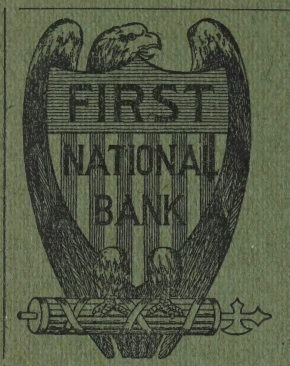
