SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Freedom School Board:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The schoolhouse at Freedom Village is still a place of live and worthwhile activities. It is a pleasure to visit the schools and see the eager faces of the primary children and the earnest, thoughtful application of the older pupils.

Mr. Phil A. Bennett has 20 pupils in the Grammar School and Miss Ruth A. Pearson has 28 pupils in the Primary School.Each school has a warm noon lunch during the winter, thanks to the help of the Mothers' Club. Playground activities are always full of interest, teachers and pupils enjoying life together.

The Bulletin Board in the hall is supplied with a large, framed picture, besides work done by the pupils. A settee has been placed in the hall and citizens are invited to come in as they pass, rest a minute, and see the work displayed. Citizens should become familiar with the good work which the schools are doing.

The health of the children is being guarded by the school nurse, Miss Harriet M. Curren. Following up the Toxin Anti-Toxin treatment of last year, the Shick test was given, showing that practically every child was immunized. Last spring a dental clinic was held at the schoolhouse at which a large number of children were given treatment. Money is well spent when it is used to improve the physical condition of the boys and girls.

A summary of Miss Curren's inspection for this year follows:

Parents are urged to seek special advice when children are found defective. It often happens that defective vision or diseased tonsils cause the child to fail in school work.

Plans are under way for another dental clinic this spring and for a pre-school Toxin Anti-Toxin clinic a little later. Parents should make every effort to take advantage of these opportunities as the nurse arranges for them.

Repairs

During the summer the building was cleaned, floors were painted, furniture varnished and minor repairs accomplished. The rooms were greatly improved by the installation of adjustable curtains. Kindergarten chairs were purchased and a table was made by grammar school boys.

For next year I recommend the installation of at least one ventilating heater. As soon as possible hard wood floors should replace those now used and which need to be painted every year. The building should be provided with screens.

Some plan should be found for establishing the building more securely on its foundations. It rocks badly in a heavy wind.

Statistics

The record of the year ending June 30, 1929 shows an average attendance of 41, an average membership of 47.5 and a percent of 87. The school last year was badly broken by sickness. Everything possible should be done to prevent absence from school. Pupils lose work which cannot be made up and our record suffers.

It is interesting to note that September 1, 1929 was the tenth anniversary of the going into effect of the new state school law. At a largely attended meeting of school boards in Concord in December, it was shown that school conditions had improved much during the last ten years. The average school year in rural towns has been lengthened to 36 weeks. More children complete the eighth grade and go on to high school. More high school graduates enter post-secondary schools. Fourteen high schools have been established in rural sections. Every town in the state has supervision. The health of the children is looked after by a nurse or a physician. The normal schools have grown from 240 students to 924. Soon there will be a college or normal school graduate teacher for every school in New Hampshire.

The future will demand better educated citizens. The children of today are the citizens of tomorrow. Let us do everything we can for the welfare of the pupils now in our schools.

As superintendent of schools, I wish to express appreciation of cordial support in the school work in Freedom.
