TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Greenland, in the County of Rockingham, in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on Tuesday, the 10th. day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000. to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200. for the maintenance of State Aid Highways.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600. for Trunk Line Maintenance.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400. for the suppression of the Elm Beetle.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700. for the repairs of Highways and Bridges.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500. for the support of the Weeks Public Library.

8. To see if the Town will vote to build a dam on the property of Charles E. Ireland, for the storage of water for fire fighting purposes, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for the same.

9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to pay a reward of \$250. for the arrest and conviction of Poultry thieves.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150. for the observance of Memorial Day, and other Community Projects.

11. To see if the Town will vote to pay Alfred W. Clough, the balance of \$800. now in the Town Treasury, received from the sale of the Moses Walker Estate, for taxes due the Town, said sum being the amount left over after all taxes and expenses of sale having been deducted therefrom.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50. for the care of cemeteries.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to purchase signs to be placed at the boundary line of the town at the entrance of each highway, designating the name of the Town items of historical interest, and raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$100. for same.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

The following is the thirty-third annual report of the Weeks Public Library.

This year has been the most successful in the history of the Library, as the circulation was nearly ten per cent larger than that of last year. A large part of this increase is in the Juvenile Department, for the school children are using the Library more than ever before. The circulation of books for the year was 6324 of which 5791 were in the class of fiction and 533 in general literature. 1870 were children's books

Forty-five new cards have been issued to borrowers during the year.

133 new books have been added since our last report, bringing the accession number up to 8303. However, the volumes on the shelves are about a thousand fewer, as that number have been lost, worn out, or removed because they had become useless to a modern library. Every year a larger number of volumes must be discarded as the library has been in use so many years that those which began life with it have reached the time of honorable discharge. By careful mending the life of our books has been prolonged much beyond the average in other libraries.

Hearty thanks are due Mr. Miller, who last year very generously set out sixteen shrubs on the Library lawn which will materially add to the attractiveness of the lot. This year he gave some Boston ivies, which it is hoped will in time spread over the side walls of the building.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Greenland:

I take pleasure in submitting to you my second annual report as superintendent of the Greenland schools.

Following the survey tests given in September, 1929, and the achievement tests given in February, 1930, both of which were mentioned in my report of last year, general achievement tests were given in June, 1930, at the end of the school year, for purpose of noting progress from February to June. All pupils took part in this test, the papers were checked and a graphic table of progress made for each individual. The evidence presented in these results was used by teachers in noting efficiency of teaching and of learning. We have kept the results in mind as the present year has progressed. Expressed in general terms it can be safely said that good progress was made in the schools, and that we have considered constantly the individual peculiarities and attainments of the pupils. The results of these tests are on file at all times for your inspection and for use in consulting with individual parents. We are about to give the half year tests for the current year.

A system of permanent school records was installed at the close of last year by which, as each pupil enters grade I, he will be assigned a card in the system, on which will be recorded all marks given to him, until he finishes grade VIII. These marks, together with other information as to health, date of birth and the like, will be more and more useful as time goes on. Previous to last year there was no permanent record of any pupil except name, age and family data as required by the register. No registers earlier than

those of 1924 are to be found anywhere so far as I know. It is probable, I suppose, that they were burned when fire gutted our school building. It can be seen that these records are valuable. For that reason I recommend that a small fire-proof safe be provided to hold them.

There are many phases of elementary education not taught in books but learned in indefinite ways. I refer to such matters as politeness in school, on the street, and at home, good habits of cleanliness and health, respect for elders, in fact all those arts of living which make family and community life pleasant and happy. Our teachers realize that here we have a large responsibility, in school and out, and I know they are exerting every effort to bring the school to a satisfactory condition in every way. I have only praise for their work in the school room and for their interest in their work. They have invariably cooperated in every suggestion which seemed for the good of the schools, for improvement of their own methods of work, or for the good of the community.

I have included in my report some tables which offer in a readable, concrete form much information about the schools. I suggested in last year's report that we ought to increase our percentage of attendance. Table I shows that a gain was made there. We had, however, a few more cases of tardiness than in the previous year. I hope we shall make a better showing at the end of the present year. Nearly half the tardiness marks, according to Table II, were in grades I and II where we should expect them. Comparative statistics and costs are shown in Tables V and VII. The latter table shows that Greenland's cost was the lowest in six years.

I commend to your notice the report of Miss Patten, the school nurse. She is well trained, and vigorous in despatching her work. She has visited the school this year oftener

than once a week on the average. She has been very active in connection with her examinations during these last few weeks of danger of contagion by small pox. Daily examinations have been made and the reason known for every absence from school.

I earnestly hope that before another school year starts a dependable water system can be established. Children need at all times an abundance of water to drink. In the interest of good order, of course, most children must drink at recess times. It is very difficult to satisfy the thirst of more than one hundred children when the water supply is not constant for at least a half hour. We try to teach the children to have clean hands and faces, and to practice only clean habits in the toilets. This, however, is difficult to do when the supply of water is so intermittent as to make the flushing of toilets impossible for considerable periods.

We have a beautiful building and one of great use to the community. Of course, it is subjected to hard useage. It could not be and ought not to be otherwise. On account of use, it is in great need of paint and varnish both inside and outside.

Your cooperation and that of parents and other citizens in our work of trying to maintain a good school is very greatly appreciated by Mr. Shuff and his teachers, and by me. For them, and for myself, I make public acknowledgement of our obligation.

Since September 8, 1930 I have made twenty-four nursing visits to the Greenland school. One hundred eight physical examinations have been made and notifications of defects sent to parents. The physical condition of the children of Greenland compares very favorably with that of the children of other towns. This shows cooperation on the part of parents.

On account of the presence in town of a severe communicable disease, in recent weeks, a daily examination has been given the pupils and each absence from school has been followed up.
