REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

FOR THE YEAR ENDING AUGUST 1, 1897.

Most of the facts which the law requires the school board to report to the district are found in the accompanying table. The truant officers report, as a result of their canvass of the town in April, that they found residing in Hopkinton, 115 boys and 99 girls between the ages of 5 and 16. Of the above number, they report 19 who had not attended school during the first part of the school year. Most of these are children less than 6 years old, and nearly all of them have attended school during the term just closed.

The truant officers further report that the attendance of 162 of the school children has been practically constant, and that they find no children of sound mind between the ages of 10 and 16 unable to read English, and only one unable to write English. The school board, after careful comparison of the different school registers, has determined the number of different pupils between the ages of 5 and 16 who have, during the year, attended the public schools to be 227; and that there have been 9 pupils less than 5 years old, and 9 who were over 16. The above figures neither imply negligence on the part of the truant officer, nor neglect of school privileges by the children.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 15, 1898

In submitting our report for the year, it is our pleasure to state that there are many indications that our schools have been generally satisfactory. Parents and other citizens have given the teachers and the school board their active and cordial support, and have shown their interest in the school work by making a large number of visits at school. The almost entire absence of complaint, the many favorable comments, and our own observation of the substantial progress of most of our scholars, are among other encouraging indications.

That the standard of attainment in our schools is at least equal to that of adjoining towns of similar means is indicated by the facts that pupils who come to our schools from families recently moved into town, have not shown any marked superiority of scholarship over pupils always attending school in this town; and that pupils who have completed their common school studies in our schools, and are attending high schools in adjoining towns are almost invariably taking high rank in their classes.

We have endeavored to improve our schools, not only by securing the best teachers to be obtained with the revenues at our disposal, but also to improve the other means of instruction. A beginning has been made of supplying the schools with new charts to take the place of the old ones, which are getting out of date and, in many cases, falling to pieces. Following the example of a great majority of neighboring towns and cities, we have introduced the vertical system of penmanship. This has been done with the hope that the children might more easily learn to write, and become more legible writers. The exchange of copy-books was effected without any expense to the town. Also an exchange has been made of all of the worn specimens of Appleton's Readers (the better copies being retained for supplementary reading) for new and improved books. The exchange of readers and the purchase of charts and of a supply of chalk for several years, has caused some increase in the usual expenditure for books, supplies, etc., but we believe that it will be repaid by the increased interest and improvement of the pupils.

The written examinations, now held annually according to law, have been of great assistance to the members of the school board in determining the qualifications of teachers. The oral examination, besides being embarrassing to the candidate, is often misleading; but the written examination, when properly conducted, seldom fails to reveal the excellences, as well as the defects, of scholarship. This

form of examination has been an incentive to improvement on the part of teachers and those preparing to teach, and if adhered to, cannot fail to be of advantage to our schools.

The statistics of the legal school year closing August 1, 1897, are reported in another place. Two terms of school—one in the fall and one in the winter—have been held since the above date. For the information of the public a brief statement of these two terms is now made, as follows:

The average length of each term was nine and two fifths weeks. The fall term of school at North Contoocook was closed during the ninth week on account of the sudden death of the teacher, who was one of our most valued and faithful workers. No school has been maintained at Sugar Hill during the year, the few scholars resident there being furnished conveyance to Stumpfield.

During the past year the interior of the school-house at Blackwater has been repaired, and the school-room supplied with a new set of school furniture. The school-house at South Contoocook has been supplied with a new coat of

shingles, and minor repairs made on several other school-houses. We have no school-house, now in use, that needs extensive remodeling, but we have several that need some repairs during the coming year. The school-houses at North Contoocook, at Tyler's, and at Blackwater, all need a new coat of shingles; the inside of the South Contoocook school-house needs painting. The plastering on the school-room at Hopkinton village has become loose and is continually falling off, and it seems to be necessary that both the lathing and the plastering should be renewed. We trust that these matters will be taken into consideration and something be raised for special repairs in the ensuing year.
