To the inhabitants of the Town of Webster in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.
4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of fighting Pine Blister Rust.
5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum necessary for State and Highway Construction.
6. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum necessary for State Aid Maintenance.
7. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for Town Library.
8. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.
9. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

10. To see if the town will vote to give a discount of 2% on all 1929 taxes paid before August 1, 1929.
11. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate to pay on town debts.
12. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen power to borrow money for town expenses.
13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board:

Herewith I submit my third annual report.

The teachers employed for the year 1927-8 were as follows:

On account of the small number of pupils the Bashan school was not opened this year. The pupils were transported to the Putney Hill School.

In every item except number of pupils registered there has been an improvement over last year:

1. The number of half-days lost for these two schools is 10. Last year it was 34. In 1925-26 it was 53. Thus without additional expenditure of money each school has

received more than two weeks more schooling this year than in 1925-26.

2. The percent of attendance is slightly better this year. Tardiness per pupil has considerably decreased. The number of visits by the school board has doubled.

The total number of pupils residing in the district and attending public schools was 40, the same as last year. Of these 31 were registered in the Webster schools, and 9 in the High Schools of neighboring districts as follows:—Concord High, 2; Hopkinton High, 2; Penacook High, 4; Tilton Seminary, 1.

The honor roll of perfect attendance is as follows:

For one year—Eleanor Frost, Viola Palmer.

For three quarters—Robert Roby, Ernest Frost.

For two quarters—None.

For one quarter—Alton Kimball, Vito Kaspar, Albert Mignault, Emily Mignault, Roger Sanborn, Olive Smith.

This is a much better record than last year when there was no pupil who had perfect attendance for the year.

The annual medical inspection was made by Dr. L. H. Cogswell. The report follows:

As in the previous year the number of pupils having defective teeth is very high in proportion to the whole. Parents should endeavor to have this corrected. A dental clinic might be held to correct this.

In June two pupils, Emma Mathewson, and Dorothy Mathewson, completed the work of the eighth grade at the Corser Hill School.

The equipment at Putney Hill was improved by the addition of sixteen feet of Sterling blackboard,—imitation slate. The inside of the building at Corser Hill was painted.

In both schools the desks now in use are of the old fashioned double non-adjustable type. Several are broken. At the Putney Hill school foot-rests were made for the smaller pupils whose feet did not touch the floor when seated. As soon as possible adjustable chairs and desks should be installed in both schools. This will greatly assist in improving posture, and preventing possible curvature of the spine, besides adding much to the comfort of the pupils.

Cooperation on the part of parents, pupils, and teachers has resulted in another year of good progress for the schools. It has been a pleasure to work with the board in its endeavors to advance the educational work of the district.
