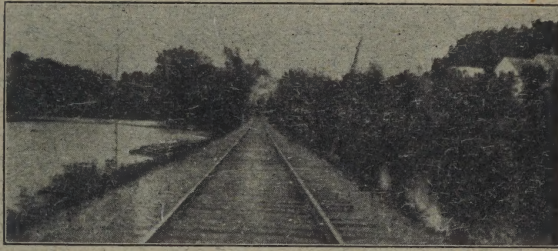

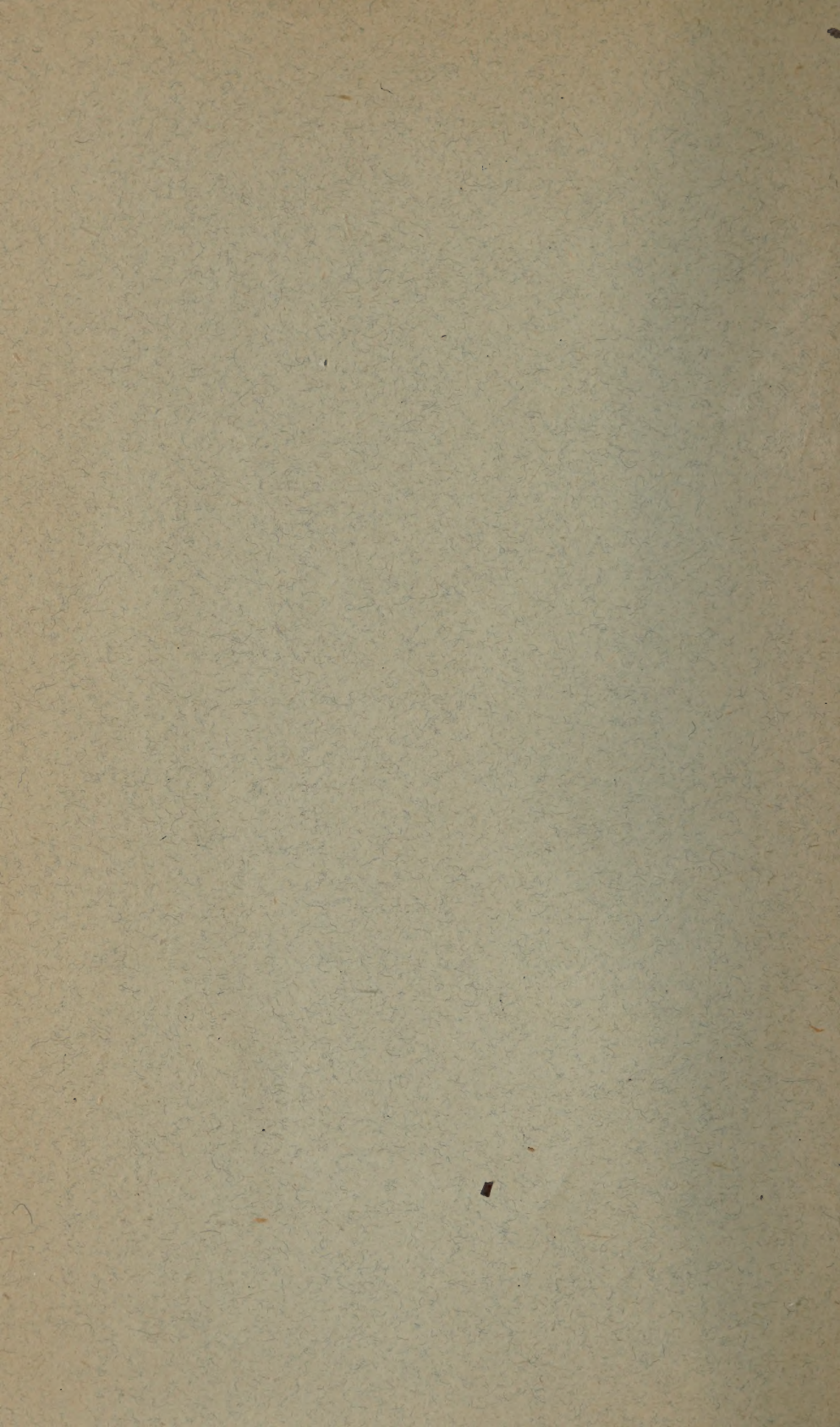

Warrant For Town Meeting of 1906.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. S.]

To the inhabitants of the town of Wolfeboro qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet in Brewster Memorial Hall, in said town on the second Tuesday of MARCH next at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, two Auditors, Treasurer and Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year, and one Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.

ART. 2. To choose all other necessary town officers.

ART. 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways, under the law passed at the January session, 1905.

ART. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways, bridges, and sidewalks, in addition to that required by law.

ART. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray town expenses.

ART. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay on its indebtedness.

ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay each Fireman legally returned for the year 1906, in addition to that required by law.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay to the G. A. R. Post of this town to defray the expenses of Memorial Day 1906.

ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Wolfeborough Town Library in addition to that required by law.

ART. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for concrete sidewalks on No. Main Street

or elsewhere and fix the terms and conditions under which such money will be expended.

ART. 11. To see if the town will vote to build a Steel Bridge, floored with wood or concrete, with proper stone abutments, over Smith's river on Main Street in the village of said Wolfeboro, and raise and appropriate money to pay for the same either by assessment or by hiring money on the credit of the town or both, and to elect an agent or agents to make all necessary contracts and to carry into effect any vote or votes taken under this article, agreeable to the request of the committee appointed by the Wolfeboro Board of Trade.

ART. 12. To see what action the town will take in reference to authorizing the Selectmen to invest all surplus monies derived from the rental of its system of Water Works pending the redeeming of its bonds.

ART. 13. To see what action the town will take in reference to improving, building and maintaining boat landings for the public use and raise and appropriate money for the same.

ART. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to limit and exterminate the ravages of the Brown-tail Moth and pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to reduce the number of its highway districts and fix the number of them.

ART. 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Selectmen's Report.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF WOLFEBORO:

Your Selectmen in submitting their reports for the fiscal year, 1905, have aimed to make them as plain as possible, and if there is any part of them which you do not understand we shall be pleased to meet and explain it to you if within our knowledge to do so.

Like our predecessors we found the finances of the town, at the beginning of the fiscal year, 1905, as to working capital, in an unsatisfactory condition,

There were orders outstanding amounting to \$3,164 91 and to meet this amount there was only \$1,215 88 in the hands of the Treasurer. Beside these orders there were other bills due sundry persons, and no available cash to meet them. We consulted with the Town Treasurer, and concluded it best to borrow on credit of the town in anticipation of taxes. Accordingly we borrowed \$2,000 00 until such time as it could be met by receipt of taxes.

The case, Town vs. Whitton and Clow, by advice of counsel has been settled. Of this claim, upwards of four thousand dollars was doubtful. Considering this, rather than spend money contesting in court, your Selectmen by advice of counsel and some of the largest tax payers, thought best to accept the final offer of their (Whitten and Clow) counsel. The sum agreed upon was five thousand dollars, which we have received and paid over to the town treasurer.

The Water Works department is in a very satisfactory condition. The receipts the past year have exceeded the ex-

penditures upwards of two thousand dollars, and if this department is well cared for in the future it will be a source of income of at least fifteen hundred dollars annually, available for a reserve fund.

The bonded debt has been reduced the past year, nearly five thousand dollars. In a few years according to the terms of the bonds the balance will have to be met either by direct taxation, notes, re-bond, or some other way. Would it not be well to consider this fact and begin to prepare for it?

The following statements will show in detail our financial work for the year which we trust will meet your approbation. You will note that none of the appropriations have been exceeded.

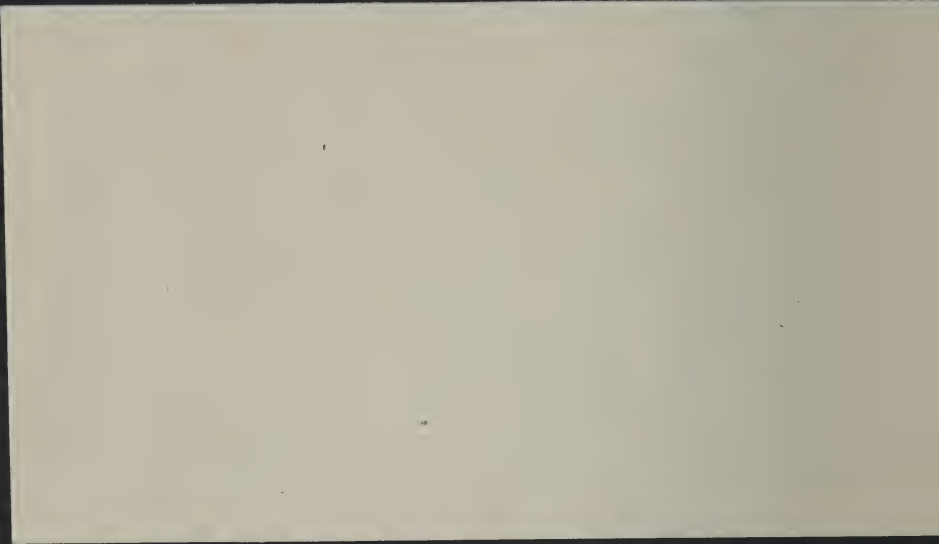

BOARD OF HEALTH REPORT.

TO WILBUR H. GILMAN, ROSCOE M. FLANDERS, AND JOHN E. FOX, SELECTMEN OF WOLFEBORO.

GENTLEMEN:—I have the honor to submit the following report. At present there are no cases of sickness in town that can be considered as contagious, no exciting nuisance that requires remedial action and this town so far as we have knowledge, is free from any existing menace to health. There are no cases of tuberculosis reported and conditions warrant the promise of an unusually healthy season. During the year past we experienced an epidemic of Small Pox, Measles and Mumps. Total 259 cases, all requiring full and partial quarantine, also three cases scarlet fever, two cases typhoid fever: one case spotted fever and seven cases tuberculosis. There has been five fatalities from tuberculosis, one from scarlet fever, one from spotted fever and one from measles. Two cases of tuberculosis returning to Massachusetts, from which state they were visitors.

Every home where these diseases have been located has been properly fumigated by Formaldehyde-gas as the law requires.

Seventy-one complaints have been investigated, 38 legal notices served, 1 house closed as unsanitary; drainage into the public highway prohibited, many cess-pools caused to be constructed and several nuisances abated. Whatever of magnitude has been ordered and accomplished has been done through the effort of the full board and by the directing advice of the State Board.

The work which the above amount covers is as follows: Relaying 30 services about 650 feet. Connecting 7 new services, 115 feet. Laying 120 feet new 4 inch tile for drain at Rendall's Corner fountain. Extending Sewell Street main 350 feet of 2 inch pipe. Repairing Reservoir, which required 14 barrels cement. Laying about 700 feet of pipe deeper, on account of freezing. There have been about 20 leaks, none of which were very large or very expensive to repair. The "Wild Line" has given but little trouble, there have been no leaks; have endeavored to keep it blowed off, keeping as free from air as possible, thus giving as free a flow of water as possible. At no time during the year, except in May, when it was being repaired, has there been less than eight feet of water in the reservoir, and most of the time it has been full and overflowing. The Stand pipe has given but little trouble, the services supplied from that source having been without water but a few hours. Up to the present time there has been no trouble with frozen pipes, and as conditions are now, there seems little likelihood of there being any.

In conclusion will say that unless some unforeseen accident occurs, can see no reason why the present system will not be adequate, by exercising due precaution and care with regard to waste of water, for a number of years.
