SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Bartlett:

Last year for the first time the budget was published in the town report. Because of the emergency then existing the meeting was held early and the report could not be distributed in advance of the meeting. This year there will be ample opportunity for those interested to study the budget and report in detail.

The budget for next year shows a reduction in the operating cost of the high school of \$298.00 and a reduction of \$1,473.00 in the elementary schools. This is effected largely by a reduction of salaries. The revised schedule is without doubt within the limits approved in the allotment of state aid and any further reduction would not benefit the district financially and might prove a detriment educationally.

There is an increase of \$2,259.00 in the total of statutory obligations, the only decrease being in the salary of the superintendent. The increase is due to interest charges and the payment of notes which fall due during the next fiscal year. It may be possible that some of the notes could be renewed and if that is true, it is within the discretion of the district to alter the amount to be raised for the payment of principal.

The total costs of operation and of statutory requirements is \$17,039.75 and this can be reduced by expected income of \$2,500 leaving \$14,539.75 to be assessed to balance the budget.

At the end of the budget are the items not required by law which must be dealt with under special articles of the warrant.

For many years the schools of Bartlett Village have enjoyed the services of a music teacher, and since the union of the two districts music has been taught in all the schools of the town. The salary of the music teacher plus cost of travel is about \$300.00.

It was voted last year that pupils from Upper Kearsarge who were already in attendance at Kennett High school should have their tuition paid until graduation. There will probably be five of these next year.

The school bus operated by Linus Howard combines three transportation routes:—elementary pupils from Kearsarge to Intervale; elementary pupils between Glen and Bartlett to Bartlett; and high school pupils from Kearsarge, Intervale, Goodrich Falls and Glen to Bartlett high school. For purposes of bookkeeping and of accounting to the state, \$720.00 of this cost is charged to elementary expense, and is allowed in the allotment of state aid. If the bus were discontinued the district would still be obligated to provide for the elementery transporation now taken care of by the bus. The law does not require high school transportation but it is the only way to equalize high school opportunity for those in the lower part of the town. It should be understood that the school board has absolutely no right to pay high school transportation or high school tuition in another town without a specific appropriation by the district.

A number of citizens have recommended to the school board the employment of an additional teacher in the high school. Your superintendent believes that this is desirable but is not convinced that the district can afford it under existing conditions. We have a two-teacher high school serving nearly sixty pupils each of whom is enrolled in a four-year course. It is obvious that there is no other way than to have (as we do) a single course of study which all must follow, whether or not they like it, and whether or not it is suited to individual differences. A third teacher would remedy this situation. Besides another salary it would involve some expense to fit up a room. If commercial subjects were added it would necessitate the puchase of typewriters and other equipment. Commercial courses are costly both in equipment and materials consumed while the supply of stenogaphers is today far in

excess of business demands. These points are mentioned not because your superintendent is antagonistic to the employment of another teacher but simply because he believes that the district should not rush into this matter without knowing the situation and counting the cost accurately. It would seem that when it is possible to enlarge the high school opportunities by a larger teaching force, the advantages should be distributed as widely as possible and not benefit a small group who might desire some special training.

The act which unites the two districts provides that there shall be six members of the school board and that all elected members shall serve out their terms. There can be no change in the number until the district, by vote, determines a new rule. An article in the warrant will provide an opportunity to legislate on this matter. In some other towns where a smiliar situation has arisen because of consolidation, a resolution or rule has been passed by which as the terms of two members expired, only one has been elected, and thus automatically the number has been reduced to three, one of whom is elected each vear for a three year term as the general law provides. In any case if any change is to be made, the motion should be drawn up carefully so that there will be no loop holes and no possibility of legal misunderstanding. A change can be made if the voters desire under article three.

Your superintendent acknowledges with gratitude the friendly cooperation of teachers, school board members and citizens throughout the town. It is a time when we need cooperation, forbearance and all the courage we possess to maintain school morale with diminshed revenues. It can and will be done and where special sacrifices are needed, I am certain that they will be shared equitably by parents, teachers and citizens for the sake of the children.
