Inaugural Address.

Delivered by the Mayor, Hon. Geo. F. Rich.

To the Honorable City Council :

In accordance with the provisions of our City Charter we have met here this morning for the purpose of taking the oath of office and assuming our official duties for another year. To the new members I extend a cordial greeting and welcome you to our official family, and to all I pledge myself at this time to work with you for the best interests of our city.

For the purpose of calling your attention to the business affairs of the city a brief review of the past year may be profitable and I will take this occasion to call your attention to some of the more important matters that have been considered and in some instances are now under consideration.

Finances.

An examination of the report of our auditor, which appears in our annual report recently published, shows that our net debt was decreased during the year 1916 by \$6,633.88, which I consider a most excellent showing.

During the year serial bonds were issued to the amount of \$40,000.00 to provide funds for the building of the new Bartlett Schoolhouse.

All uncollected taxes for the years 1908 and 1909 amounting to \$7,882.65 have been abated and I recommed that during the coming year all uncollected taxes for the years 1910 and 1911 be abated.

While there have been small overdrafts in some of the departments, there have been, on the other hand, savings made in other departments so that there was no net overdraft during 1916 as has been the case for several years past.

Public Schools.

In this department we have been both fortunate and unfortunate, fortunate in the addition of the new Bartlett School, but unfortunate in the loss of the Burgess School by fire. Plans are already under way

for the rebuilding of the Burgess School on a larger and more modern scale, and when that is completed we shall be well equipped for school buildings.

The management of our schools is the same as for some years past and is in every way satisfactory.

It will be necessary to increase the appropriation for this department over that of last year, and I am strongly in favor of providing sufficient funds to maintain the present high standard of efficiency.

Department of Public Works.

Labor conditions together with the increased cost of all materials used in this department, made the past year an expensive one but notwithstanding these conditions this department kept within its appropriation, which has not been the case heretofore for several years.

In addition to the completion of the State Highway job between Postoffice Square and the Gorham line there is urgent need for new streets, sidewalks and sewers in almost all parts of the city and I recommend a liberal appropriation for this department.

Fire Department.

This department has had another fortunate and successful year. The service rendered has been universally satisfactory and a substantial saving has been made from the appropriation. The cost of maintaining this department the coming year will necessarily be more on account of higher wages being paid to the men and the increase in the cost of materials so that the appropriation should be increased somewhat over that of last year.

Police Department.

The management and control of this department being vested in a Board of Police Commissioners our sole duty to provide sufficient funds for its maintenance and in making our appropriation for this department I believe that we should be guided largely by the recommendations of the Board of Police Commissioners, who have managed the affairs of this department in an able and fearless manner, as a result of which I believe we have one of the best, if not the best policed city in the State of New Hampshire.

Public Library.

The increase in patronage of our library from year to year is conclusive evidence that it is doing a good work. The necessary increase in salaries and the cost of the books will require a small increase in the appropriation over that of last year.

Health Department.

Although not an expensive department, this is one of the most important and is now well organized and doing a good work. In order to keep up with the times and provide for an increase in expense caused by our growth in population it will be necessary to increase the appropriation to some extent.

City Poor.

The results of the high cost of living appear more prominently in this department than in any other, and the calls for help have increased and will continue to increase to such an extent that more money must be provided.

This department is well and economically managed and the expenditures are no more than humanity require.

Incinerating Plant.

While last year it seemed advisable to build an incinerating plant for the proper disposal of our garbage, it now seems imperative that this matter should receive your immediate consideration. The cost of such a plant will be about \$5,000.00 and the expense of maintaining it will be comparatively small.

Public Parks and Playgrounds.

By virtue of an act passed at the present session of our legislature we are authorized and empowered to borrow money for the purpose of the development, improvement and maintenance of parks, playgrounds and parkways, and upon recommendation of the Board of Park Commissioners, I favor the issuing of bonds to a reasonable amount for the purpose of making a substantial beginning on this long delayed movement.

Conclusion.

Ever mindful of the trust and confidence reposed in us by our fellow citizens in choosing us as their public servants, let us assume the duties of our office with zeal and enthusiasm, not with the idea of meriting further favors at the hands of our constituents but with a broader purpose of satisfying our own consciences that we have acted honestly and wisely in all matters and things that shall be brought to our attention, and with this thought as our guiding star let us now proceed with the business at hand.

SECTION 2. The use of the above named articles within the limits of the City of Berlin, is hereby prohibited.

SECTION 3. Any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars (\$10.00) for each offense.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

Said bonds shall be dated September 1st, 1917, to be in coupon form, payable to bearer, maturing one thousand dollars on September 1st of each of the years 1918 to 1937 inclusive.

Each annual payment to consist of one bond of one thousand (\$1,000.) dollars; principal and interest to be payable at the Manchester Safety Deposit and Trust Company in Manchester, N. H., and none of said bonds to be obligatory without the authenticating certificate of the said Manchester Safety Deposit and Trust Company endorsed thereon.

The said bonds shall bear the seal of said City to be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the City Treasurer and shall bear interest at the rate of four and one-half (4½) per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually. The coupon attached to said bonds shall bear the fac-simile signature of the City Treasurer.

Further particulars as to form, issuance and sale of said bonds to be determined within legal requirements by the City Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Finance Committee.

The proceeds of said bonds in the amounts specified shall be applied solely for the purpose designated.

That for the purpose of providing payment of the principal and interest of said bonds there shall be raised by taxation each year sums sufficient to pay said principal and interest due each year until all of said bonds are paid in full.

Department Reports.

Report of City Engineer.

BERLIN, N. H., Oct. 30, 1917.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

I have the honor to submit the annual report of the Engineering Department of this City. I will take each branch of the work separately.

I have given lines and grades for concrete curbs on the following streets: Church street, Seventh street, Norwegian street and Second avenue, about one thousand feet in all. Some of this work was let by contract and was done quickly at a very low cost. I have given grades and lines for back walls on the following streets: Seventh, Denmark and Church. These walls were for the purpose of keeping surface water off private property. Private parties wishing to build permanent walls or fences on the street line in front of their property required the street line. I have given the street line in about thirty places in different parts of the city. I have given about sixty foundation grades to parties building houses in different parts of the city. These houses were built mostly in Forbush Park, Berlin Mills and on Western avenue. Two hundred feet of six inch sewer was laid on Grafton street. This required lines and grades, also location, for the sewer book. I also made a survey for the location of a sewer to take care of sewerage and surface water west of Wight street and Fifth avenue. This sewer was to run down Fifth avenue to Wight street then north of J. Howard Wight's property across the Grand Trunk right of way to Dead river, but owing to shortage of labor it was impossible to put this sewer in. The sewer book is up to date at this time. I have re-indexed this book and corrected such mistakes as have come to my notice.

The change of location of the street line on Glen avenue required quite a lot of work. It was necessary for me to run out the new lines on both sides of the street, also to run a line of levels from the Glen Crossing to the Tucker house on Glen avenue. To make maps and description for the deed of the land obtained from the International Paper Co. by the City of Berlin, and of the land given the paper company by the City of Berlin. I also run in a railroad curve for the Berlin Street Railway. The City's part of this work is now complete.

The City has installed a new incineration plant on their lot near the Mason field. This work required laying out and inspection of the building during the process of its construction. This work was done by contract and I think the City has a first-class plant. I also made survey and maps of property the City bought from John B. Gilbert and A. B. Forbush on Main street for sidewalk purposes. I have also obtained a few recorded maps for the City, and they are on file at the City Engineer's office.

I have given quite a number of permits to parties wishing to build permanent walls and fences on the street line, also permits for light and telephone poles.

The citizens of Berlin do not seem to realize that it is against the City ordinance to build a permanent wall or fence on the street line without a permit from the City Engineer.

In closing I wish to apologize to the Mayor and City Council for not remaining full term of my appointment, but our country being at war, and the engineering work for the City nearly at an end I feel that it is my duty to go.

In addition to the above permits, a permit was issued for the construction of a stone building on the east side of the river on Burgess street to Antonio Bosa, at a cost of \$2,000.

I have also issued a permit to build a wooden building to be used for a church to Rev. Fr. Leclerc on the east side of the river on Sullivan street. This building is 63x92 feet. One story and basement will cost when finished about \$19,000.

The new incinerator plant for the purpose of disposing of garbage, built on the John Moore lot, on the Jericho road, so called, at a cost of \$6,300.

The Burgess school building which was destroyed by fire, was rebuilt by Snodgrass & Houston under the supervision of H. C. Bates, architect, at a cost of \$35,377.

Grand total, cost of all new buildings and additions and repairs in the City of Berlin of \$292,677.

This does not include the corporations, that is, the Brown Co. and the International Paper Co.

I wish to thank the Mayor and Council and the members of the City Government for the aid and courtesies extended to me during the year of my official duties.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council:

Gentlemen:—In presenting my report as City Overseer of Poor for the past year, I call to your attention the fact that the overdraft amounts to but \$137.88. Everyone is more or less familiar with existing conditions and one might wonder that a city the size of Berlin should get through a year such as has passed without showing a larger expenditure for the care of its poor.

So far as my knowledge goes, there is no suffering here among the poor of our city. The winter is exceedingly severe and fuel difficult to obtain and in ordinary times the prices charged would be prohibitive, but fortunately wages are good and there is employment for all. The past year has brought many families in from nearby towns, attracted, no doubt, by the opportunity for work. The continued advance in price of necessities will be reflected in our bills for the coming year, but with careful attention to detail, and an understanding of each case and the situation as a whole, I see no reason for alarm. We should be able to go through the coming year with approximately the same amount appropriated.

I wish to extend my thanks and appreciation to all persons and especially the city officials for the courtesy and assistance rendered.

Report of the City Solicitor.

BERLIN, N. H., January 29, 1918.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

I herewith submit my report as City Solicitor for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1918.

The case of Joseph O. A. Devost vs. the City of Berlin, Berlin Water Company and Twin State Gas & Electric Company, was tried in the United States District Court at Concord, N. H., on January 30, 1917. At the trial I was assisted by Herbert I. Goss, Esq. The jury returned a verdict against the City for \$6500. The case was transferred to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, on assignments of error, and was argued before that court on January 3, 1918, by your solicitor and Mr. Goss. The decision of that court should be rendered within a few weeks.

The case of County of Coos vs. City of Berlin, involving a question of the City's liability for the support of certain paupers is now pending before the New Hampshire Supreme Court. Briefs have been filed and the case will be argued by me on February 5, 1918.

Two petitions for abatement of taxes brought by the International Paper Company against the City of Berlin have been discontinued by the petitioners.

The following cases are now pending against the City in the Superior Court:

1. City Bowling Alleys vs. City of Berlin.

This is an action for damages alleged to have been received from the water of Dead river in the year 1915.

2. City Bowling Alleys vs. City of Berlin.
3. Anthony J. Oeschger vs. City of Berlin.
4. S. Zolofsky vs. City of Berlin.
5. Salvatore Morando vs. City of Berlin.

The last four cases are actions brought against the City for damages caused by the water of Dead river in the year 1917.

During the past year I have investigated and reported on various claims filed with the City Council, and have performed such other duties as were brought to my attention.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

BERLIN, N. H., January 31, 1918.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Health has been greatly handicapped in its work since the health officer, Mr. Geer, was granted leave of absence to work in the army cantonments. We have so far been unable to secure a substitute for his place as the Government is taking every man available for public health service.

The work is being done by Dr. Marks, the medical member of the board.

On account of the greatly increased amount of laboratory work made necessary by almost daily analysis of water as recommended by the State Board of Health, it has been necessary to secure an assistant to do the clerical work in the office. Since Mr. Geer went away this assistant has taken a course in the laboratory on milk analysis, and received a certificate from the State Agricultural College, Durham, N. H., and is now doing the work in a very satisfactory manner. We have received a great many complaints this year regarding the milk situation. We realize that there has been a slight lowering of the standard. This is partially due to the personnel of the milk distributors, partially to the unusual condition that exists, both as to production and to labor as a result of the war. The Board has been rather more lenient than formerly on account of these conditions. It has, however, given the milk situation a great deal of thought and can assure you that steps are now under way whereby we expect to bring the milk supply of this city up to a higher standard than ever before attained.

We have for a long time felt that the collection and disposal of garbage should be under the direct supervision of this department, and recommend that it be turned over to us next year.

We have kept well within our appropriation this year largely on account of the marked decrease in the number and the difference in

the character of contagious diseases, and we would respectfully recommend for the coming year the same appropriation we received in 1917,—namely, contagious diseases \$600.00, sanitary \$2,400.00.

Vaccination.

This year 424 children were vaccinated at the expense of the City. Of this number 25 were re-vaccinated.

This coming year a charge of 50 cents will be made for all vaccina-

tions made other than at the time prescribed by the Board of Health.

For about a month before school starts in the fall, the Board of Health physician is in the laboratory of the Board of Health three afternoons a week, where he does the vaccinating.

During the year we have received a great many complaints of a comparatively petty nature. This office cannot act as a clearing house for disagreements between tenants and landlords and neighborhood quarrels, and it must be distinctly understood that to receive our attention complaints must be in writing and duly signed.

Complaints of Public Nuisances.

This year there have been 56 complaints received at the Board of Health office which have been investigated and upon which action has been taken. They are classified as follows:—

Food Stores.

Inspection of stores has been continued as has been the custom for the past two or three years and conditions have been greatly bettered.

Water Analysis.

The water supplies of the city have been tested regularly during the year. The total number of tests made was 283. These tests have shown that our supplies are satisfactory for drinking purposes.

Clean Up and Paint Up Week.

An attempt was made this year to have the greatest clean up and paint up week in the history of the city, and while splendid work was done, the results were not quite what we had hoped. This was largely due to the complicated methods employed, and to the fact that the season was very cold and backward. A great many school children went into the campaign on a competitive basis, and prizes were awarded for the best efforts.

This year we hope to be more favored by the weather and by more simple methods to obtain better results.

Garbage.

During the last year the city has constructed an incinerator plant which takes care of the disposal of garbage in place of the old garbage "dump." A full description of this new plant and its work appears in the report of the Department of Public Works.

School Boards of Health.

This year with the cooperation of the School Board we organized a Health Department in every school. Each grade elected a member

and these members elected a Health Officer for one term. The duties of these Boards are as follows:—

To meet once a week with the principal of the building for the discussion of matters of general health conditions of rooms, buildings and grounds.

To keep daily records of the temperature and lighting of the rooms and condition of the basements.

To report to the City Health Officer cases of infectious or contagious diseases.

To plan and carry out a series of health topics to be discussed in every room each week of the year.

To submit a written report to the City Health Officer through the School Health Officer on what has been accomplished during the term.

A first and second prize is offered by the City Board of Health for the best reports each term.

Each term the School Health Officers have visited the Board of Health office in City Hall and have conferred with and received instructions from the Health Officer or Board. The results from this movement have been really wonderful. The sanitary condition of the school grounds and buildings have improved, the children are neater and cleaner. Pediculosis and Impetigo have almost disappeared.

The Board wishes me at this time to express its great appreciation of the work both to the Health Officers, also to the School Board, and to the teachers who have so heartily co-operated to make this work a success.

Medical Inspections.

The medical inspection of the school children has been carried on in the same manner as in the past three years. A complete report will be found in the report of the Superintendent of Schools, or Board of Education. A glance at that report will disclose the fact that nearly 50 per cent of all the children in school who have been reported for conditions needing attention, have been attended to. This compares favorably with any city in the country where medical inspection is carried out.

Report of Library Trustees.

BERLIN, N. H., Feb. 1, 1917.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Trustees of the Berlin Free Public Library take pleasure in submitting their twenty-fifth annual report, which includes the Treasurer's statement and the report of the Librarian.

Since the last report our country has been drawn into the great war, and as every human institution has been affected by this world catastrophe so of course has the Berlin Free Public Library. The Trustees have felt deeply the responsibility of making the Library a center of patriotic education and a force with which to combat German propaganda. This thought has been our ruling idea and we have been most ably seconded by the Librarian.

Miss Adria Hutchinson resumed this position on October 1st and is giving the Library the same devoted and enlightened service as in her former term of office. During her absence she has had the benefit of added study and experience and her work is even more valuable than before. Miss Kailey and Miss Jewell are most excellent assistants and the Library is steadily growing as a beneficial influence in our community.

During the year there have been two patriotic movements in which the Library has taken the lead. The first was the drive for "A Million Dollars for a Million Books for a Million Soldiers." Under the leadership of Mr. Osgood and seconded by an energetic committee Berlin's quota of seven hundred dollars was raised.

The Library also launched the movement for sending books to the soldiers and the placards "Let your idle books help our soldiers," which have been displayed all over the City have brought a generous response. One large box of excellent books and magazines has been forwarded and another is almost ready.

It will be noticed that the Treasurer's report shows a larger balance than usual. Owing to the increase in salaries and other expenses during the past year, this balance will about cover the bills which will accrue up to the time of our next appropriation.

There are many ways in which the usefulness of the Library could be increased. The following improvements are all urgently needed:—

A telephone would undoubtedly widen the field of the Library's influence.

The installation of the Modified Newark Charging System would prove its value in a short time by increasing the circulation.

Depot stations at the Brown school and the Bartlett school are very much needed. These branch libraries would serve that part of the population which needs and wants books but which cannot reach the central library. The establishment of these stations of course means the hiring of another assistant.

We need more reference books especially the latest edition of one of the standard encyclopedias.

We need more magazines. There are many calls for the "Nation" and the "New York Times Current History."

We need a newspaper rack.

We need books in French.

In the children's room the heating is inadequate. We also need many more books for this department. The importance of this work cannot be too strongly emphasized.

While the Trustees urge the necessity of the foregoing improvements they realize that such changes would mean the expenditure of more money. They, therefore, do not wish to ask for an additional appropriation at this time when there are so many calls for money for the necessary prosecution of the war. When peace comes again we hope to have an increase in our working fund and thus be able more nearly to approach the highest standard of usefulness.

Librarian's Report.

BERLIN, N. H., December 31, 1917.

To the Board of Trustees of the Free Public Library:

The twenty-fifth annual report with statistics, covering the work of the library for the year 1917, is herewith submitted.

It is always difficult to judge the work of a library only by statistics as so many other factors enter into and take an important place in the real work. This year more than any other must we consider what the library has done along patriotic lines and what books it has added which have helped to make the citizens of Berlin better able to answer the many calls from their country. Our State Library Commission has expressed the situation aptly in the December "N. H. Public Libraries" by saying, "As the soldier must fight, the munition workers toil, the housewife save, so the librarian must find her portion of service in spreading the information which the people should have." Since taking up the duties of the library in October, your librarian has worked with this idea ever before her and has attempted with the available means to place the library upon a patriotic basis by co-operating with the U. S. Food Administration, the "Let your idle books help our soldiers" campaign and especially in working out the selection of books for the library.

By analyzing the 338 books purchased, seventy dealt directly with the war and Red Cross work; twenty new books have been added on household management and food economy, also about thirty pamphlets have been mounted on manilla paper and made ready for circulation. These books have been placed conspicuously in the delivery room and they have been advertised thoroughly, both by personal effort and by printed lists. Only sixty-three novels were bought during the year and while this small number undoubtedly affected many borrowers, this was the only fair proportion of the book fund which could be spent conscientiously. The remainder of the purchases were for the reference department, the children's department and for that non-fiction which a library necessarily must have to supply the everyday needs.

The total number of books taken out in circulation was 34,676; 12,358 of these were from the children's room. That the number of

books circulated is smaller than that in other libraries of about the same number of volumes is due to a great extent to our charging system. With this system the number of books which a borrower may take is limited to one book of fiction and one of non-fiction. Almost every other library in the state has increased this privilege and this library is far behind in this respect. Aside from these limitations, the system is proving an inadequate and inaccurate record, the latter fact proven by the number of books lost in circulation for the year. The modified Newark charging system could be installed at a slight cost, thus permitting the library to increase the borrowing privileges and at the same time to have a permanent and accurate record of its charges.

The reference department has continued to be one of the busiest sections, especially in its work with the High School students. The extra assistant appointed in October for three nights a week has given the librarian an opportunity to do more personal work with the pupils than heretofore. Many bibliographies have been compiled and the material reserved conveniently for the students' use. A file of pamphlets has been started, such as those issued by the U. S. government on the Liberty Loan, the Savings Stamps, etc., which already has proven most useful.

During the past year no attempt has been made to carry out any special work with the grades, but with the beginning of the new year arrangements have been made to give five talks on "The Use of Books and the Library" to the four seventh grades of the public schools and to the eighth grade of the parochial school. A talk on the "Use of Magazines and Indexes for High School Work" is to be given to some of the classes in the High school.

One of the most important departments of the library is that devoted to children's work. This has progressed along its usual lines, but a lack of books has hampered the children's librarian in many ways. To do really effectual work, more books are needed, particularly the old favorites and those in line with the school studies. In December, Miss Kailey, with the assistance of Miss Marguerite McGivney, began a series of story hours. The attendance has been very good, ranging from fifteen to one hundred and sixty-three. The following stories made up the program for December:

Dec. 1 and 8, Miss Kailey—How Christmas came to the Mulyanays.

Dec. 15, Miss McGivney—The Christmas angel and Mrs. Santa Claus.

Dec. 22, Miss Kailey—How the fir tree became a Christmas tree.

Dec. 29, Miss McGivney—Jack Frost and the Princess with a long nose.

An exhibition of books suggestive for a child's own library was

held during the two weeks before Christmas and attracted much favorable comment. In the selection of these books, a special point had been made of illustrators and good editions of the standards.

For a detailed summary of the year's work, your attention is called to the statistics appended to this report.

Report of Board of Education.

BERLIN, N. H., January 31, 1918.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

We submit the 33rd annual report of the Board of Education for the year 1917-1918.

During the past year the Board has been able to do many things which have been mentioned in preceding reports.

The Burgess school, destroyed by fire in March, 1917, has been enlarged from a four to an eight room building and was opened at the beginning of the winter term in January. This gives the additional rooms needed so that the crowding in the grade rooms has been eliminated. The average number of pupils per grade room is now 38, a number well suited for good results in teaching. There are three empty rooms available.

The total growth of the school system has been regular but it is an unhealthy growth. There has been a decrease in the number of pupils registered in the High school. This is due to the great demand for labor. The demand for educated young people is bound to be great after the war and we deplore the short-sighted policy of putting the child to work as soon as the grade school system is finished.

This school system will come under the provisions of the Smith-Hughes Act and should get Federal aid for the Mechanic Arts department.

The Board has lost one member by resignation during the past year, Mr. H. D. Green. We were very sorry to lose him.

The coal situation has been acute in the Berlin schools as it has been over the entire country. We hope, and expect, to be able to keep the schools open.

In view of the unusual demands which come from all sides the Board feels that the schools should be run as economically as possible during the coming year, and no new work should be undertaken. We hope to be able to maintain our present standard, and in order to do so, we recommend that the appropriation for schools for 1918-1919 be kept at the same figure as for 1917-1918; viz: \$50,000.00. Below you will find the financial statement for the year.

Report of the Superintendent.

To the Board of Education:

I beg to submit to you my fifth annual report as Superintendent of your public schools, the fourteenth report to be issued from this office.

In General.

In common with all schools of the country we have been confronted this year with new and serious problems. The fuel shortage, the growing scarcity of teachers, the difficulty teachers have had in securing boarding places, the higher cost of living without proportionate income, and the increased number of children permitted to leave school to work, have all had their effect upon our schools. Then there is the war time mental depression that permeates even into the class room.

Our fuel shortage has been met, thanks to the generous interest of the Brown Company. The teacher shortage is becoming serious. College and normal school attendance have decreased materially and the draft has called many men from the class room. Men and women alike are leaving the profession for higher salaries in other occupations. Four resignations and one discharge have occurred in our high school to date. The only remedy is a substantial increase in salaries, not the usual \$25 or \$50 increase but one worthy of the part the teachers are serving in preparing this country for the future.

It has become a country wide conviction, supported by the experience of England and France, that the schools must be kept open and in full operation at almost any cost and that the strongest pressure should be made to keep children in school. It must be remembered that the children of today are to be the men and women who are to assume the burdens of reconstruction after the war days are over.

Certain activities have been strongly encouraged in the schools. One is that of saving money, food and fuel. This gives the children a part in the social adjustment due to the war. Another is that of using the children for the distribution of government literature and information in the homes. We have discouraged all calls made upon the pupils for money collections. The sale of Bonds and Thrift and War Saving Stamps has been conducted purely in the interests of

Financial

The financial demands of the year have been greater than ever before, owing to the larger school membership and the higher cost of salaries and material. The City Government has met this increase with a very generous response. A study of the expenditures for the year reveals the following facts:—

The expense of general control of the department increased six per cent over the preceding year. This increase is divided about equally between salaries and additional clerk hire.

The expenses of instruction increased 32 per cent. The number of grades increased from 21 to 28, or 33 per cent; the number of teachers from 39 to 49, or 26 per cent. It is evident, therefore, that the increased cost of instruction is due in the aggregate entirely to the growth of the school system.

The expenses of operation increased 30 per cent, due to more fuel being required for the additional building and to the high fuel prices. The amount spent for fuel increased 56 per cent. The number of janitors increased from 3 to 4, or 33 per cent.

The expenses of maintenance decreased 42 per cent. Repairs cost 23 per cent less than the year preceding. Furniture, school grounds and insurance cost less by 52 per cent.

Auxiliary expenses increased 31 per cent, due to Medical Inspection and \$200 paid for Community Gardens. The total increase for the year amounted to 23 per cent.

The Burgess Building

The old Burgess building was destroyed by fire early Sunday morning, March 4, 1917. It was occupied by two fifth grades and two sixth grades, with an enrollment of 170 pupils. These pupils were all assigned to other buildings, and returned to work the following Tuesday morning. Grade one at the Cole school was transferred to the Marston building. This room was then used for two of the Burgess grades, one entering at 8.30 and remaining until 12.00, the other entering at 1.00 and remaining until 4.30. The other two grades were conducted in like manner in room five at the Brown school. This "shift" plan caused more or less confusion at home and tended to lower the daily attendance in the rooms affected, yet as a temporary arrangement it proved quite successful.

The new Burgess building was opened January 15, 1918. Seven of the eight rooms in the building are now in use, occupied by four fifth grades and three sixth grades. The crowded condition in many of the rooms in the city has been very much relieved. The average registration per room during the fall term was 46 pupils. It is now 38.

The use of this building entirely as an intermediate school naturally results in a few children travelling some distance, but it is plain to see that this inequality cannot be avoided under the present location of buildings. I wish to commend the attitude of parents and pupils affected by the many transfers made necessary by the new assignment.

The School Savings Bank.

The interest in the school savings bank has increased very materially during the past year. The average weekly deposits have increased from \$37.73 to \$136.69. Besides the usual work incident to the regular deposits the bank has taken part in selling to pupils and teachers bonds of the second Liberty Loan on instalments. 27 bonds were sold to the amount of \$1,450. The bank has been appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury as authorized agent for the sale of government thrift stamps and war savings certificates. At the close of business Friday, February 1, 2795 stamps had been sold to the value of \$698.25. This represents the sale of 147 stamps per day. An effort is being made in all the schools to encourage pupils to place their savings in this way. Grade V, room one, at the Burgess school, formerly Grade V at the Marston building, has the honor of being the first grade in the city to attain 100 per cent. This means that every child in the room has purchased one or more stamps.

Junior High School.

Our Junior High school organization is now complete. Grade VII remains in the Marston building and since the opening of the winter term has been divided into four divisions with four teachers in charge. It registers 144 pupils or an average of 36 pupils to a class. Grade VIII is in the High school building taking the place previously occupied by the freshman or first year class. Its registration numbers 123 pupils. By being separated in this way these grades miss much that might be obtained from being in a building together with interchange of teachers and the privileges of an assembly hall, but the separation cannot be avoided until a new building is erected or a substantial extension added to the High school building. I would call attention again to the fact that the present High school building cannot accommodate more than its own classes after September, 1921. On and after that date the full 12 years' work will be in force.

The program of work for these two years will not be submitted to the State Department for approval until the close of the present year in June. When this program is accepted our elementary schools will end with the sixth grade, and grades VII-VIII will be rated as high school grades.

High School.

The management and control of the High school cannot be too highly commended. The work of the school has been considerably disturbed this year by numerous changes in teachers. It is also less effective than it might be if teachers and rooms were adequate for closely supervised study. In the program of study found in the Appendix it will be noted that certain courses only lead to higher institutions. It cannot be too highly emphasized that pupils entering high school should decide early the line of work or study they contemplate on graduation and should select their high school studies accordingly. The figures relating to high school membership throughout the report refer in all cases to pupils registered in the high school building. There is no first class this year. The entering class is known as grade VIII of the junior high school. For further data I refer you to the report of the head master.

Medical Inspection

The same physicians have been in service as last year. The inspection in the public schools took place between October 22 and November 14. The first grade pupils were examined together with others who had not previously been examined and those who had been reported by their teachers. Pupils found by the examiner to need the attention of a physician were reported immediately to their parents. The results thus far have been better than in any previous year.

The School Boards of Health organized in each building a little over a year ago continue to be active factors in the school. A new board is elected each term and a health officer appointed from the board. The duties of the board are as follows:—

To meet once a week with the principal of the building for the discussion of matters of general health conditions of rooms, buildings and grounds.

To keep daily records of the temperature and lighting of the rooms, and condition of the basements.

To plan and carry out a series of health topics to be discussed in every room each week of the year.

To report to the City Health Officer cases of infectious or contagious diseases among members of the school.

The health officer of each building reports in writing to the City Board of Health at the end of each term. These reports outline with considerable care the work the children have done. Prizes of \$1.00 and 50 cents are offered for the best reports.

Some health topic is taken up each week as a basis for the informal study of physiology and hygiene. The following is the list of topics outlined by the Boards of Health themselves for the present school year:

Clean hands, faces, ears.

Fingernails, clean and well cut.

Clean teeth; how to brush them.

Taking baths; hot and cold, when.

Washing hair; lice, nits.

Keeping clothes brushed, clean, mended.

Keeping clothes buttoned up, hair combed.

Sleeping; early to bed, windows open.

Clean noses; handkerchief, or piece of cloth.

Refuse; sticks, paper, skins; where to put it.

Use of drinking fountains, public cups.

Coughing and sneezing; use of handkerchief, not in another's face.

Spitting; not on floors or streets; where to spit.

Safety First; keep away from ball ground when not playing, play ball only on ball grounds; crossing streets, etc.

Flies; personal cleanliness, no dirt or decayed matter; *SWAT THEM.*

- Use of toilets; do not waste paper, always flush.
- Regular hours.
- Posture, standing, sitting.
- Digestion.
- Breathing; through the nose not the mouth, deep breathing.
- Exercise.
- Dust; disease carrier, how to avoid.

- The cellar.

- Impetigo; nature of disease, how spread, cure.
- Airing clothes.
- Orderliness; hanging up clothes, keeping clothes in place.
- Nosebleed; how to treat.
- Fires; bonfires, fires in woods, mice and matches, playing with matches; what to do in case of fire.
- Mice and rats; cover food, set traps, disease carriers.
- Necessity of immediate assistance from nearest "grown up" in case of drowning, fire, sickness, fainting.
- Reason for not wearing in school; sweaters, mufflers, rubbers.
- Humane treatment of children, animals.
- Dangers of snowballing; children, horses, houses.
- Freezing and frostbites; what to do.
- Public safety:—
- (a) Do not throw glass in street to puncture tires or cut feed
- Refuse breeds flies.
- (b) Keep off streets to avoid being run over by trains, teams, autos and electric cars.
- (c) Keep away from river; avoid colds, drowning.
- Ways to prevent spread of diseases:—
- (a) Sunshine and light.
- (b) Soap and water on floors, woodwork, etc.

(c) Ventilation.

Eyes; well washed, how strained, need of glasses, sore eyes, necessity of quick removal of foreign substances.

Ethics; honesty, truthfulness, copying, stealing, bribery, bravery, cowardice, right and wrong, cheerfulness.

Table manners:—

- (a) Wash before and after.
- (b) Use napkin.
- (c) Knife for cutting.
- (d) Use of fork and spoon.
- (e) Keep spoon out of cup
- (f) Eat slowly and quietly.
- (g) Passing food.
- (h) Finding fault with food.

Health Don'ts:—

- (a) Don't put pencil in mouth.
- (b) Don't bite pencil in mouth.
- (c) Don't eat apples, etc., found on ground.
- (d) Don't eat garbage.
- (e) Don't smoke cigarette butts.
- (f) Don't swap gum.
- (g) Don't lap another's candy.

I know of no better means of health instruction, nor practice in the regulations of health conditions. The hearty cooperation of the City Board of Health has made this work exceedingly interesting and effective.

Mechanic Arts

The work in Sloyd and Mechanic Arts has been unusually successful this year. The furniture for the Bartlett and Burgess schools has been in large part the product of the school shops. Among the major projects have been the following:—

Domestic Arts

I believe we have taken at least one backward step during the year. I refer to the dropping of Domestic Arts from the High school

program. If there ever was a time when every woman and girl needed an expert knowledge of the art of home making, it is today. The country is facing a shortage of food, fuel and clothing. The Government, through its Food Administration, is straining every nerve to bring to the homes lessons of diet, conservation and economy, the elements of which ought to have been learned in the schools. I trust another year this important subject may be reinstated, and my recommendation of a year ago be adopted, that it become part of the work of every girl in the school. I would recommend a program to include the following:—

Household Appliances
Household Design and Decoration
Household Economics
Sanitation and Hygiene
Physiology and Nursing
Dietetics

Under the present program, cooking and sewing are offered to all the girls of the Junior High school, the equivalent of two periods per week. Our noon lunch, carried on the past two years for the benefit of pupils bringing their dinner, had to be suspended.

The first three months of the Fall were devoted almost entirely to canning and preserving. The results were unusually successful. 412 glasses, the equivalent of $274\frac{1}{2}$ quarts, were put up by the pupils for 41 different persons.

The work included:—

Canned pears, peaches, plums, grapes, cranberries, beets, beans, tomatoes, etc.

Grape and plum conserve, apple butter, orange and grape fruit marmalade.

Apple, currant, peach, plum, grape and crabapple jelly.

Pickled pears, onions, beets, spiced crabapple, grapes and rhubarb, picalilli and chow chow.

Principals of four room buildings will receive \$25 additional, six room buildings \$37.50, and eight room buildings \$50.

An "A" teacher is satisfactory. No reelection is required after the third year of service as long as an "A" rating is maintained. A "B" teacher is less satisfactory. She must come up for reelection at the end of the year. A "C" teacher is unsatisfactory and is not eligible for reelection.

Four courses of study are outlined by the superintendent. Three of these may be selected by inexperienced teachers, two the first year of service and one the second year. These courses are intended to encourage young teachers to continue their professional reading and study while assuming the duties of the class room. An increase of \$25.00 per year is granted for each course satisfactorily completed. As heretofore, no one is employed as a regular teacher who is not a graduate of an approved normal school.

Evening School

The George F. Burgess Memorial Evening School opened Monday Evening, October 1. The fall session closed Thursday, December 20. During this time there were enrolled 306 men and women, with an average attendance of 118 per night. This is the largest attendance in the history of the school. Classes in Chemistry and Bookkeeping were added to those of last year. The generous contribution of Mrs. Burgess has been supplemented by an equal appropriation from the City, and the managing board enlarged to include the Board of Education. The school now stands at the parting of the ways. It can return to the form of a strictly private institution, confining itself chiefly to the elementary studies for foreigners, or it can take advantage of the City appropriation, together with the federal aid under the Smith-Hughes Act, and become a people's continuation school in fact as well as in name. It could operate more nights a week, provide a wider range of studies, and be organized on a thoroughly business basis. The latter plan has been my hope for the school since my connection with it four years ago. However, if for any reason this plan cannot be adopted, I would recommend that the money hereafter appropriated by the City for evening school purposes be used in the operation of the continuation school under the provisions of the Smith-Hughes Bill.

Superintendent's Office

On January first the superintendent's office was transferred from the High school building to the City Hall. The work of the School Department is now conducted in the room assigned to the Board of Education. This change was made for two reasons: first, to provide room in the High school for a private office for the head master; second, in order that the increasing demands upon the superintendent's time might be met undisturbed by the confusion of a school building. Under the old arrangement neither the head master nor the superintendent has had a private office. Everyone familiar with common office practice can readily understand the necessity of such a room. Under the new arrangement the head master is provided with excellent office accommodations; the superintendent still has no opportunity for privacy for carrying on his office work. The School Department needs and ought to have a room with an adjoining private office, furnished with an equipment equal to that of other active departments of the city. I submit the matter for your consideration.

In Conclusion

Education is as much of the heart as of the head and the hand. School training should give knowledge and power, and our best schools are giving these to a remarkable degree. But knowledge and power are dangerous things unless controlled by a balance wheel of high motive, wide vision and human sympathy. Individual responsibility must be developed, not merely for the sake of the individual, but for the community and the race. This is my constant charge to the teachers, and the supreme aim of the Berlin schools.

In concluding let me say that this human element is also a large factor in the control and operation of schools. Teachers and pupils are human, and the whole system is a sensitive living organism. When encouraged it responds with enthusiasm and the results are marked; when depressed it recoils, acting without interest and with little progress.

Berlin is a materialistic city. Its people are prosperous and busy. The schools reflect the mental and nervous activity of the place. This is good, but in the same proportion they fail to receive the stimulus of active support they need in order to render the highest service to the city. This they deserve and should have. I cannot bespeak more for the future management of the Berlin schools.

Head Master's Report.

BERLIN, N. H., January 31, 1918.

To Supt. Harry L. Moore:

I herewith submit to you my fifth annual report as head master of the Berlin High school.

The total registration for the school year ending June, 1917, was 402 pupils, 190 boys and 212 girls. The total enrollment to date for this school year is 390, 180 boys and 210 girls. Five pupils who left school last year due to sickness have returned.

There is no freshman class this year due to the organization of the Junior High school. The total number entering in the fall of 1917 was as follows:—From the public schools, 78, repeating the year 11, from the St. Patrick school 32, from the St. Regis academy two, and from outside schools 17, a total of 140 pupils, 67 boys and 73 girls.

In the class graduating in June, 1917, there were 74 pupils registered at the beginning of the school year 1916-17. Five of these left school on account of unsatisfactory work and the remaining 69 pupils graduated, or approximately 43 per cent of the entering class. Following is the table in detail:—

For the United States as a whole the first year high school class is 40.9 per cent of the total enrollment, while the fourth year class is only 13.5 per cent. For the Berlin High school for the past four years as follows:—

A study of the tables and the above data indicate that the loss in the upper grades is decreasing and that there is a larger per cent of the total number of pupils graduating each year. This decrease of per cent of the IX year compared with the increase per cent of the XII year indicates that as a whole the pupils enter with the aim of completing the work of the school, while the others seek employment rather than to enter high school and later drop out after a few months. This has been very noticeable in my connection with the system for the past few years even without the proof of statistics. This year while there has never been such a demand nor so many opportunities for young men to work, the loss thus far is not much greater than that of previous years. I recall several cases this year of pupils in the upper classes who have left school, later to return with a decidedly improved attitude, as they had found through outside experience on their own part and without the home influence, that it would be an advantage to them to complete their high school course.

Table four gives a full report of the activities of the members of the Class of 1917 since graduation. It will be noticed that there is a decrease in the number of pupils attending higher institutions of learning the past year, something to be expected under the present conditions.

Table three gives a full report of the loss of the different classes for the school year 1916-17 furnishing interesting data when compared with similar tables of previous reports.

The programs of the social organizations of the school for the past year will be found in the appendix of this report. These have been very successful. The money obtained from the concert given by the Mandolin Club last year, amounting to \$47.00, was used in purchasing a set of drums and traps for the school. The club is now composed of 50 girls, some of whom have learned to play since the opening of the school year 1917-18. An opportunity has been given this year for the girls to practice under the direction of an instructor during school hours, thus affording an opportunity for those girls whose help was needed at home and who could not remain after regular school hours for practice. Mr. John Graff the official photographer of the Brown Corporation, who so successfully gave a series of lectures last year, is now giving a regular course in practical photography to the members of the Nature Club during regular school hours. In the athletic contests of last year the class of 1917 had the winning team for both boys and girls. The Athletic Association has the strong support of the students and shows a financial balance of \$161.52 to date.

The students under the direction of Mr. Matthews have published a school paper, "*The Reflector*," the same to be published twice each school year. This gives an excellent opportunity for the students in connection with their English work to collect and preserve data that will be of value. This paper will go into the homes of the majority of the pupils in high school and will accomplish much more than any report that could be sent out from the school. "*The Reflector*" will carry to the homes information about the school that will stimulate a greater interest on the part of not only the parents but the citizens of Berlin as well.

Due to the lack of accommodations in our assembly hall now used for a general study room, it has become necessary to limit the number of classes attending the school socials to one class. Under this new scheme the parents for the first time, since the school has outgrown the assembly hall, have the privilege of attending the school socials. This year the parents have fairly well responded and I am in hopes that this will be a means by which the parents will come in close contact not only with the social development of their children but with the teachers and the school.

There has been a tendency for the past few years among colleges and high schools to simplify the program for graduation. This is a saving in money to both school and parents. I have known of cases

where pupils have left school simply because parents could not furnish the necessary funds for the different expenses of graduation. Last year on account of the abnormal condition practically all the schools in the state simplified their graduation exercises. When this was suggested to the Class of 1917 they immediately responded. As a result the graduation exercises that were held formerly at the Albert Theatre were eliminated and were combined with the class day exercises into one program held on the High school grounds. The evening of the same day the annual banquet and ball was held at the Mt. Madison House at Gorham, thus completing the program in one day. By this method the class had a balance of \$69.00 after all expenses were paid. This balance was then turned over to the Red Cross, providing a year's membership for each member of the class. This action of the class is highly commendable.

The attempt to raise the scholastic standing of the school by having the teachers send weekly reports of all the students doing unsatisfactory work is still being continued. In extreme cases the parents have been notified by letter which has resulted in establishing a closer relation between the parents and the school officials. In the majority of cases where the parents have been so informed there has been an improvement in the attitude of the pupils concerned towards the right kind of home study which has resulted in a higher type of school work. However there is much to be accomplished along these lines as the conditions yet are far from being perfect. To encourage scholarship there is placed in the appendix of this report the names of all the students who have obtained an average of at least 90 per cent in three or more subjects for the first semester's work.

Public Works Department.

BERLIN, N. H., January 31, 1918.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

In presenting the annual report of the work done by the Public Works Department for the year 1917, I will say that there has never been a time when it has been so difficult to accomplish the necessary work as in the past year.

For the first and only time, since I have been in charge of this department, we are in excellent shape to do almost any kind of work that is required under this department, due to our excellent equipment, but this year the department has been severely handicapped by the prevailing labor conditions and the high cost of materials. Sufficient suitable labor could not be obtained at any price that would seem advisable to pay. Not only has the labor question been a source of trouble but to obtain materials at such times as we were actually in need was out of the question, due to the manufacturers' delay and the railroad difficulties in shipping the same. This was not only annoying but expensive and the cost to the department, by actual figures, has been in excess of 30 per cent over last year. I have found by corresponding with officials of other cities in this state, that their difficulties have been much the same as our own, and the State Highway Department has figured that the work this year has cost about 30 per cent more than last year.

Notwithstanding the conditions we have labored under, we have done considerable good permanent work, some of which I would like to call to your attention at this time.

One of the best improvements that we have accomplished this year is the work that we have done on the Glen Hill, just below the crossing of the Glen tracks. We put in a heavy retaining wall and a large fill, and if the Berlin Street Railway had moved their tracks over, which they intend doing the first of the coming year, it would have been a great improvement to this part of the city, as it straightens out and widens the street, making a much more presentable and safer street for the heavy traffic to which it is subject.

We have this year completed the good permanent work that we started on Pleasant street last year and have laid bituminous concrete

from the Grand Trunk crossing on Pleasant street to Mason street and from Mechanic street to Green street and Post Office square. This street is now one that the city may feel justly proud of and I hope the first step in the direction of putting in more streets of the same kind. A piece of the same kind of work was laid on Mechanic street, by Mr. Bell's stable to the foot of the hill. As this piece of street was subject to a lot of heavy travel and was always in a muddy and unsanitary condition, and required a lot of repairs, the work was a big improvement at this point.

The usual amount of dirt and cinder sidewalks were covered this season with tar concrete at a considerable cost, which will in the future save the cost of replacing the cinders and dirt, which constantly had to be replaced after every storm. All the macadam streets in general have received more than the usual attention given them in former years. They have been re-surfaced with crushed rock, where needed, and the smaller holes filled with patching compound, before receiving the usual application of tarvia and sand. More road oil has been used this year than before on our dirt streets and has proved very popular and beneficial to our streets.

One of the most notable improvements, which is only partially completed has been the removal of the old tar covering on Main street, and the putting in of a small amount of covering, an experiment, which proved very satisfactory and economical. This new process was put on late in the season as we were held up considerably waiting for the material to arrive, but what was applied proved so satisfactory that we shall continue this work as soon as the weather will permit in the early spring, as we have the material on hand. This will put our street in a good passable condition until such time as the tracks can be raised and new rails substituted for the present ones, and a permanent street laid.

A large amount of our appropriation was spent in buying new machinery, repairs on our buildings, buying horses and equipment for the same, and the buying of materials which were bought and not used, consisting of cement, sewer pipe, and tar products, etc., which appear in our inventory.

I think the city has taken a step in the right direction in buying horses for the street department and would recommend that they purchase another good team as soon as they can find them, as I think the city would profit by owning their own teams.

I would recommend that a certain part of the appropriation of this department be set aside as a general maintenance appropriation for our streets, sewers, sidewalks, etc., and also a garbage appropriation

be agreed upon and set aside for that purpose and the balance, whatever it may be, be used in construction of new work.

However I would not recommend laying out too extensive work in the line of permanent improvements and new work, as it is very expensive doing work at the present time and we shall doubtless have as much difficulty in obtaining materials and suitable labor as last year.

In closing I would say that the general public comes in closer touch with the work of the street commissioner than that of any other department, and not always understanding the disadvantages he labors under, is very liable to criticize the work of his department.

Following is a list of the work done last year, under job numbers, and the cost of the same.

Job No. 50, Street Maintenance.

This is the largest account that this department has. It includes all street repairs, caring for surface water, culverts, drain pipes, cleaning out and upkeep of catch basins, putting in new ones, sweeping and cleaning all streets, removal of snow and ice, sanding sidewalks, painting and repairing fences, guard rails and bridges, and the removal of ashes in the spring. This account is unusually large this year owing to the heavy rains during the summer season. Many of our macadam streets are beginning to show the effects of the heavy traffic to which they are now being subject by the fast increasing number of automobile trucks, and also the length of service they have given, with but few repairs until this season, when considerable attention has been given them by several different patching compounds and applications of tarvia, mixed with crushed rock and dust, at a heavy cost, but I think that the money has been spent wisely and the results obtained have been very gratifying. The cost of this work was \$17,002.33.

Job No. 51, Sewer Maintenance.

As I remarked in my report for 1917, the city has outgrown its sewer system, and the small size of the sewers laid in past years, and the rapid increase in the number of buildings to be connected to some of these calls for frequent large outlay in replacing inadequate sewers with larger pipe, and at the same time improving grades, taking out crooks, etc., to avoid constant stoppages in the flow. Last summer was also a very wet season, and as our sewers combine street drainage with sanitary service, I have been put to frequent heavy expense in clearing blockades of sand. The present winter has also been so extremely cold that we have had much additional expense, due to the freezing of the smaller sewers. The principal replacement jobs were as follows:—About 205 ft. on Hillside avenue, from A. B. Forbush's

residence to about top of the hill; about 50 ft. on Fourth avenue near H. D. Shea's residence, and 50 ft. on the sewer that comes down from Factory to Green street, behind the shoe factory. All these sewers have been giving trouble for some time. The total cost of this job was \$1,581.38.

Job No. 52, Tools and Equipment.

This job includes repairs and maintenance of boilers, buildings and general equipment of the Public Works Department, the purchase and repair of all small tools and the purchase of quite a number of larger machines, as follows:—One oak gutter plow, one new road grader, new jack-hammer, drill and steels for the same, steel for the Sullivan air compressor, street flusher and fixtures, contractors dump cart and harness. There was also included some heavy freight charges. The cost of this job was \$2,303.58.

Job No. 53, Office.

This account includes all office supplies and equipment purchased, superintendent's salary and clerk hire. Total cost was \$2,719.06.

Job No. 54, Garbage.

This account shows the cost of collecting all garbage and waste from all parts of the city. Owing to the change made during the earlier part of the summer, from collecting by teams to motor trucks, the amount shown for the cost will not be a true report, as part of this amount was for insurance, body for new truck, sled for collecting garbage, which was afterward used for street work and not for garbage, and other charges which were first charged to garbage and afterward used for other work not pertaining to garbage. As the garbage when wholly collected by teams took the entire time of the teams, the entire amount could be charged to garbage, but in the case of the truck only a part of the time is utilized for garbage collection, and the other time the truck is used for other work. This year a system has been arranged for keeping the actual cost of the truck when used for garbage purposes, and which will give the actual cost of the garbage collection. The cost of the work this year is \$1,823.97.

Job No. 55, Storage Storehouse.

This account is carried for the purpose of charging all material which is bought in quantities and to be used on different jobs during the working season. These materials, such as cement, sewer pipe, etc. are first charged to the storehouse, and as used charged to the work where used, and the same credited back to the storehouse. This account this year shows considerable as our years supply is still prac-

tically intact, as many of the jobs that the Public Works Committee intended doing had to be abandoned owing to the prevailing labor conditions. Practically all of the amount shown in the cost is taken care of in the inventory by the cement, sewer pipe, etc. that is still in the storehouse, and the remainder was spent for repairing and changing over the storehouse to enable us to house our two new trucks and additional machinery. Cost \$1,398.07.

Job No. 56, Blacksmith Shop.

The blacksmith shop was entirely rebuilt this year and stocked with material used for city purposes, and at the present time is one of the best shops in the city. The city is now able to do all its own horseshoeing, both for the Public Works horses and the Central Fire Station teams. It was necessary to enlarge the shop, lay new floors, put in windows, and buy equipment, which at first makes the cost seem high, but which in the future will prove a great saving to the city. The inventory takes care of the greater part of the deficit shown, and the remainder of the deficit was spent in the repairs. The shop, had not these improvements been made, would have shown a good profit. Cost of the work was \$609.49.

Job No. 57, Road Maintenance

This account includes all the repairs on all of our roads outside of the closely built part of the city. We were fortunate in not having so many washouts as last year, but there are several old bridges and culverts that require some lumber and labor each year. The total cost of the work was \$2,705.88.

Job No. 58, 1916 Account.

This includes bills of last year which did not come in time to be included in the report of last year, and which was necessary to carry and to be paid this year. The account had several credits likewise, which were owing last year but which we were unable to collect until this year. The total cost of the work is \$589.02.

Job No. 59, Miscellaneous

The account contains much the same odd items as last year, but there are charges considerably over \$400.00 to S. D. Tilton, which will be collected when we make final settlement with him. Cost of the account is \$773.63.

Job No. 60, Engineering.

Owing to the difficulty in obtaining help, very little new work was undertaken this year, and consequently less engineering was required. Cost of the work was \$458.25.

Job No. 61, Crusher.

The total cost of running the crusher was \$2,501.40, for which we crushed 1516 cubic yards, or a cost of \$1.65 per cubic yard. This rock was charged out to our own jobs at actual cost, and that charged to S. D. Tilton and Board of Education at a small profit, showing a credit balance of \$61.85.

Job No. 62, Sprinkling.

On account of our using more oil each year, and flushing and sweeping the main street at night, the cost of this item has been greatly reduced. Cost \$860.31.

Job No. 63, New Bridge, Second Ave.

This is a temporary wooden structure, built across the ravine south of Green Street to enable us to dump ashes and other refuse more conveniently, forming the basis of a permanent fill. Total cost \$347.79.

Job No. 64, Pleasant Street.

This includes a pipe railing set on the top of a wall near Sampson's and our share of a back wall built by him, these two items amounting to \$83.29. The city did the work of preparing and re-grading the street with crushed rock for Tilton to cover with tar concrete. This cost \$418.70. Mr. Tilton's work on this street included 2,856.5 yd. at \$1.50 yd. or \$4,284.75. This work was done from the Railroad Crossing to Mason Street, and from Mechanic Street to Green Street. Total cost \$4,786.74.

Job No. 65, Glen Hill.

This job is one that was surveyed last year and approved of, but owing to the lateness of the season when we closed up our contract with the Berlin Street Railway, we were unable to start work until this spring. It consists of a heavy fill of about 5000 yards, quite a heavy rock cut at the top of the hill, a heavy retaining wall to hold the toe of the slope, and a large concrete culvert. The city's part of this work is practically completed, but the Street Railway failed to move their tracks. If they had done so this great improvement could easily have been finished this year. We have a credit of \$700.00 against this job from the Street Railway people whenever it can be finished. Total cost \$3,808.07.

Job No. 66, State Road Maintenance.

This account was under the supervision of the State Highway Dept. this year, and looked after under their patrol system. The work consists of all repairs, re-surfacing, and dragging of the road between

the old Sam Paine Bridge to the Milan Line. There was \$2,000 appropriated for this work, \$1,000 by the State and \$1,000 by the City of Berlin. The cost of the job was divided equally by the City of Berlin and the State. The total cost of the work was \$1,298.55.

Job No. 67, S. D. Tilton

This year's job included the bituminous surfacing of three streets and a large amount of sidewalk work, and also gutter job on School Street. The street jobs have been credited back to the three streets on which they were done, namely: Pleasant Street, job No. 64, Mechanic Street, job No. 95, and Green Street, job No. 93 (B), and will be found itemized under these heads. The sidewalk and crossing work amounted to \$3,386.10, distributed over the following streets: First and Second Avenues, Green, Pleasant, School, Willard, Church, Main, Norwegian, Seventh, driveway between the City Hall and Parent's Store and Mechanic Street. In addition a heavy gutter was laid down the steep hill on School Street at a cost of \$176 40, to repair past and prevent future damage by the heavy flow of water on this street. An itemized account of Mr. Tilton's work has been prepared by Mr. Macy and Mr. Brannen, who have had charge of these costs this year, and the same can be inspected at all times in the Public works Office in City Hall.

Job No. 68, Norwegian Sidewalk.

This job was the continuance of the work begun last year on Norwegian, Seventh and Sweden Streets. The work this year consisted of a heavy rock cut on Norwegian Street to lower the grade for a suitable sidewalk, the building of a concrete curb around the Norwegian Parsonage, 520 feet of new concrete curb on Seventh and Norwegian Streets, and a small rock cut on Sweden Street with additional concrete curb, and the filling in of all of the above work with cinders and crusher dust. Part of this work was done under contract by Gus. Anderson. Cost \$843.56.

Job No. 68 (B), Denmark Street.

This is a concrete wall built at the corner of Eighth and Demark Streets, a distance of about 100 feet. This was to prevent the street surface water from running on to the adjoining property. The wall was built under contract by Gus. Anderson, and the filling in of the same was done by the city. The cost of the work was \$153.55.

Job No. 69, Grafton Street Sewer

This consists of 500 feet of sewer pipe laid at the upper end of Grafton Street, and on Sullivan Street about 100 feet south of Grafton Street. This was a hard and expensive job, as a large portion was through solid ledge. The cost of the work was \$811.88.

Job No. 70, Sam Decoteau Wall.

This was a concrete back wall about 80 ft. in length built to hold the new sidewalk put in at this point on Mechanic street last year. Cost of this work was \$129.16.

Job No. 71, Main Street Job.

This was a most trying job to the Public Works Department this year, both in expense and undertaking. The work consisted in taking off the remains of the old covering put on some four or five years ago by F. L. Farnsworth of Ayer, Mass., and which proved a failure and an eye sore to the City of Berlin. This covering was removed from Berlin Mills to Post Office square, and in some places so difficult to remove that it was necessary to heat it by building fires on top to loosen the tar that it might be picked off. The Supt. of Public Works, upon the recommendation of the officials of the street department of Portland, Me., and other cities, tried out a new process over a part of this street and although not of a permanent nature, makes a very desirable street and one that is not expensive. This application proved so satisfactory that this coming year it will again be applied, which will put our Main street in a very good condition until such time as the street car tracks are raised and a permanent pavement put in. The cost of the work was \$1,547.32.

Job No. 73, Fourth Avenue.

This was the completion of taking out the ledge on Fourth avenue, which work was begun last year, and a macadam street commenced where the ledge was taken out. Owing to its near vicinity to the crusher the rock was sold to the crusher, making the job show a much less cost than it would have, had all the work been charged to Fourth avenue. Cost \$802.67.

Job No. 74, New Storehouse.

This was a new building erected on the Moore lot on Jericho road, and is used for storage purposes only. This building was necessary by reason of lack of room at the storehouse buildings on Mason street and which left part of the public works equipment exposed to the weather during the seasons when the same was not in use. Cost \$706.97.

Job No. 75, Public Works Single Team.

This team was purchased early in the summer and has been used as a patrol team on the east side of the river. Part of the equipment of this team has been charged to the tools and equipment account and the maintenance of the team is included in this cost. Cost of job \$427.92.

Job No. 76, Old Crusher.

The old crusher was moved to the Moore lot to be used for crushing the gravel bank which the city owns at this place. Quite extensive repairs were made, putting the same in a first-class working condition for this work. Owing to the lateness of the season in getting a permit from the Grand Trunk Railway giving us permission to run an electric wire over their tracks for power purposes, the crusher was not started this season. Cost of this job was \$405.86.

Job No. 77, Sidewalk Maintenance

This includes the maintenance and upkeep of all sidewalks not covered with concrete. In addition to this a number of curbs have had to be raised and rebuilt, which is included in this cost, \$819.85.

Job No. 78, Mack Truck.

This is the account carried for the new Mack Truck bought the early part of the summer for the Public Works Department. The amount shown in the cost of this job includes all repairs, replacements, gasoline charges, oil, grease, etc. used during the season. The cost of operating the truck, including all repairs, replacements, labor on truck when same was not in use, gasoline, etc. was about 19c per mile, and the cost of the truck without the labor, replacements and repairs was about 12c per mile. Cost of the job was \$556.98.

Job No. 79, State Road Construction.

This is a continuance of the work that was begun last year on the Gorham Road, beginning at the Gorham Town Line and completed to a point opposite the Cross Power of the Brown Company. The work this year was not carried on to any extent, and stopped early at the request of the State Highway officials, owing to the scarcity and high cost of labor. The work was begun at the first crossing this side of the Gorham Town Line, and consisted of draining the swamp at this point, ditching and putting in culverts, and filling in the road bed with the sub-grade. This cost of this work was \$743.59. This cost was divided equally by the State and the city of Berlin. Cost to the city \$371.79.

Job No. 80, Rockingham Street.

This job was the building of about 200 feet of Rockingham Street south of Graften Street. It was a heavy cut and fill. Cost \$178.39.

Job No. 81, Fifth Avenue Sewer.

This small account is for the hauling of sewer pipe to Fifth Avenue, 1,100 feet of 15 inch pipe. The pipe was not laid this year owing to the labor proposition. Cost \$26.68.

Job No. 82, Church Street Sidewalk.

This work consisted of the putting in of a concrete curb of about 400 feet, filled with cinders and covered with crusher dust. It also included the putting in of four driveways with 10 inch pipe. This work required quite a little rock being moved, and also the putting in of very deep curbing for nearly its entire length. The cost of this work was \$375.44.

Job No. 82 (B) F. Collabelli Wall.

This was the putting in of a heavy retaining wall built in front of the residence of F. Collabelli on Church Street to keep the surface water from running into his basement. By agreement with Mr. Collabelli the city furnished the material and part of the labor. Cost of the job was \$122.90.

Job No. 83, Tarvia.

A little more tarvia was applied this year than in former years, and was used on all the macadam streets that has been treated in the past, together with the new macadam work that has been done this year. Cost was \$2,011.59.

Job No. 84, State Aid Maintenance.

This account covers repairs on a little stretch of state aid road on the east side of the river, from the new bridge to Lavertu residence. The cost of the work was divided between the state and city, the cost to the city being \$57.38.

Job. No. 85, Public Works Dept. Automobile.

This automobile was used for the transportation of men, light materials, and use of the superintendent on the different department jobs under construction this season. Cost of same was \$360.30.

Job No. 86, Gasoline.

This is an account kept for the gasoline used by the Public Works Department motor trucks. The gasoline is first charged to the gasoline account, and as used by the trucks charged to their account and credited to the gasoline account. This account shows a small balance which, however, is practically covered by gasoline now in storage, and by a small amount now due from other city departments for gasoline sold them, the balance of the deficit being the cost of a tank, pump, installation of same, and the erecting of a small gasoline house. The cost of this account is \$183.23.

Job No. 88, Oiling.

The city used considerably more oil this year than in the past—more than 12,000 gallons being applied. The cost was slightly higher

due to the increase in the cost of the oil and the higher cost of labor applying same. Cost of this account is \$1,063.56.

Job No. 89, School Street.

This was a piece of water bound macadam street laid on School Street, between High and Willard Streets, a distance of about 500 feet. This street was in a very bad condition, and owing to the heavy traffic which it receives the improvement will be greatly felt. The street had to be filled to over a depth of two feet in some places to bring it up to grade, and in such cases this was done with large stones, and only the surface treatment was covered with crushed rock, making the cost much less than it would have, had crushed rock been used throughout. This was one job in which the Mack truck showed its efficiency, as will be noted in the low cost of this work. Cost \$1,005.34.

Job No. 90, Croteau Hill.

An amount of \$91.56 was spent on the road leading to Croteau Hill on the east side of the river. This amount consisted of general maintenance work on this road.

Job No. 91, Forbush Park.

The City of Berlin during the last year accepted several of the streets in that part of the city known as Forbush Park, and in putting the same in a good, safe and passable condition an amount of \$405.93 was expended, which is the cost of this job.

Job No. 92, Incinerating Plant.

The cost of this job includes the salary of the care keeper and the cost of tools and equipment in getting the same in working order after its completion by the contractors. Cost \$324.77.

Job No. 93, Cambridge Street.

This work was another step toward the completion of Cambridge street. The work consisted of grading on the upper end and the installation of five catch basins and the laying of a considerable amount of sewer pipe to take care of the surface water, which has been the chief source of trouble on this street. The cost of the work was \$382.58.

Job No. 93 (B), Green Street.

The city prepared this street for S. D. Tilton's covering at a cost of \$156.92 and Mr. Tilton's work included 665.4 yds. at \$1.50 or \$998.10. This work was done from Pleasant street to Post Office square. Total cost \$1,155.02.

Job No. 93 (C), Champlain Street Sewer.

This was the laying of about 200 ft. of six inch sewer pipe on Champlain street to connect with the main sewer on Merrimack street. Considerable ledge work was necessary, therefore the cost of the work was a little expensive. Cost \$231.28.

Job No. 94, Madigan Street Sidewalk.

This work consisted of the building of a concrete curb and fill from Jewell street to Madigan street and on the south side of Madigan street to Fourth avenue, a distance of about 516 ft. Cost was \$297.04.

Job No. 94 (B), Sullivan Street and Sewer.

Under this heading two jobs were carried on, one for Sullivan street sewer and the other for Sullivan street, cost of both jobs being kept separately. The Sullivan street sewer was built to accommodate the new French Catholic church, now under construction and also to take care of the residences close by the church on Sullivan street. This was a six inch sewer and was laid for a distance of about 250 ft. and cost \$185.87. The Sullivan street part of this account was work done on Sullivan street, between Coos and Grafton streets, near the new church, and consisted of the blasting out of several large boulders, some ledge work and a heavy fill of cinders. The cost of the street work was \$539.98. Cost of both jobs on Sullivan street was \$725.85.

Job No. 95 (A), Mechanic Street.

The preparation of this street by the city for Tilton cost \$229.41 and his work included 1048.5 yds. of covering at \$1.50 or \$1,572.75. This work extended from Pleasant street to the foot of the hill leading to Goebel's mill. This job was much needed, as in front of Bell's stable this street has been very muddy. Total cost \$1,802.16.

Job No. 95 (B), Mechanic Street Sidewalk.

This walk was built on the westerly side of Mechanic street from the old city building to the foot of the hill leading to Goebel's mill. This work was a big improvement as this was a very muddy place during wet weather. The cost of the work was \$101.89.

Job No. 95 (C), Prospect Street.

This was a sewer on Prospect street to accommodate the new residence of Mr. Bennett just north of Hillside avenue. The cost of this work was borne jointly by Mr. Bennett and the city. The city furnished the pipe and Mr. Bennett paid for the cost of the digging. The cost to the city was \$21.01.

Job No. 95 (D), Willard Street Sewer.

This was the extension of the main sewer on Willard street at the northern end. The sewer was laid through a deep hollow and a heavy fill was necessary. The cost of the fill and the sewer was \$118.96.

Job No. 96, Insurance.

This account includes the accident and liability insurance of the men in the employ of the Public Works Department and other insurance on Public Works equipment not directly charged to any one department. Cost \$772.23.

Assessor's Report.

BERLIN, N. H., January 31, 1918.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and the City Council of the City of Berlin :

Gentlemen:—We beg to submit our report for the year ending January 31, 1918, for the Twenty-first Annual Report of the City of Berlin.

The inventory of the taxable property in the City of Berlin shows an increase of \$503,744.00 over last year. When you consider the fact that we had a falling off in stock in trade of \$261,112.00 by reason of a smaller stock of pulpwood than in years past you cannot fail to see that we show a large increase on real estate the past year. We are aware of the fact that real estate has and is increasing in value, due in part, if not wholly by reason of the cost of reproduction, but we feel that real estate in Berlin was assessed at its full value last year, and about all the increase that we can get for the coming year will be on new buildings.

The city has purchased a card system and cabinets to be used by the Assessors and we are now waiting for an appropriation to install the same.

We had the same difficulties last year that we have had in years past in getting the citizens to return their inventories according to law and we feel that the same is due wholly by the people not appreciating the assistance that it would be to the Assessors to have the inventories returned promptly, property specifically mentioned and located and where they are entitled to swear off the property according to law have it properly done, then we would not have to abate taxes later on that should have been sworn off. We have had to do more or less of this in the past year, but unless we can be shown some reasonable excuse for not having returned an inventory we shall feel it our duty not to allow parties to swear off their property after we have established the rate.

We found 4073 polls in town which was an increase of 328 over last year.

We desire to express our thanks to the citizens for the information and help given us in discharging our duty.

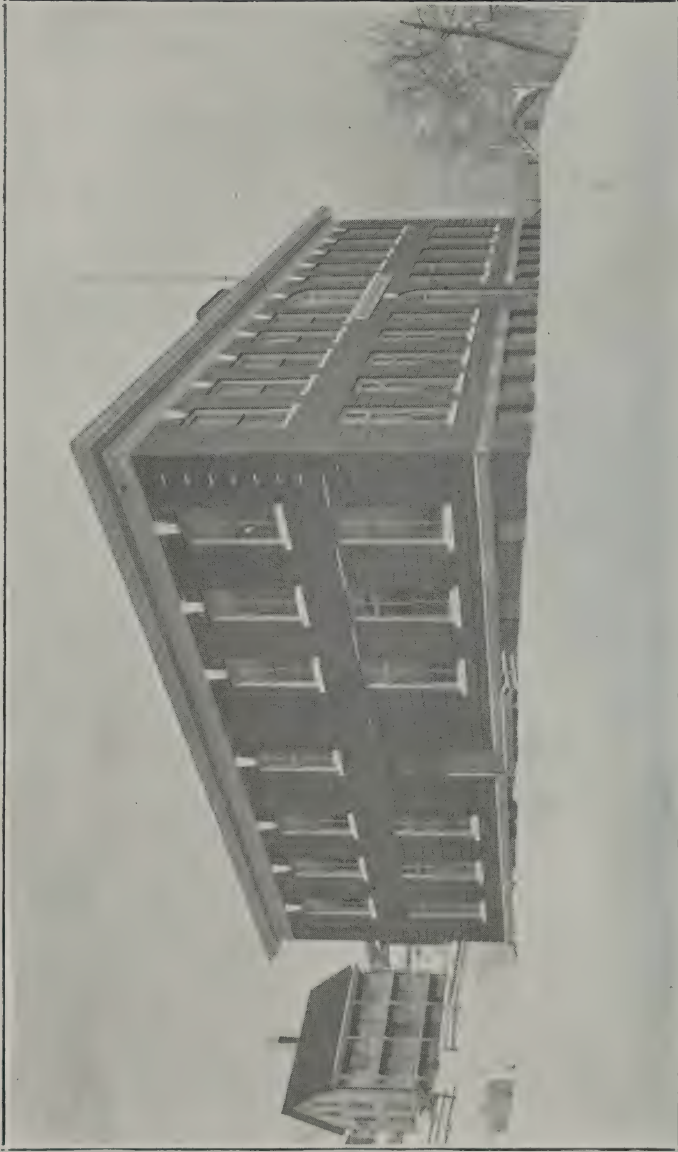
