THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deerfield, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Deerfield on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To vote for delegates to go to the National Conventions.
4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a cement bridge.
5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to gravel road at the center.
6. To see what action the town will take in regard to prices paid labor on highways.

Given under our hands and seal, this 14th day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and twenty.

## DEERFIELD SCHOOL REPORT.

---

### *To the Citizens of Deerfield:*

We herewith submit for your consideration our annual report:

We maintained eight schools in town last spring, with enrollments varying from eleven at the Center and No. 6 to thirty-one at the Parade.

We transported the pupils from the Goffstown Dist. to the school at the Parade, and the children at Mt. Delight to the Old Center.

At the beginning of the fall term we decided to do away with the school at the Old Center, transporting the children to the Center district, thereby maintaining seven schools in town.

As most everyone is aware there was enacted at the last session of the New Hampshire Legislature a New School Law, a law which will give the children of Deerfield and other small towns just as good a chance to get an education as the city children, which is as it should be. There are many features in this new law that space will not permit to explain in this report, but we believe that New Hampshire now has the best and most progressive educational law that has so far been incorporated in the statutes of any state in the Union.

After conferring with the State Superintendent at Concord, and acting upon his recommendation, we started work on making a few improvements of the sanitary conditions of some of our school buildings, most notable, the Parade schoolhouse, where we installed a new set of Heywood-Wakefield adjustable single chairs and desks of the most modern style. Of the old desks that were removed we fitted up a fairly good set which we put in at the West Deerfield schoolhouse, where they were using old-fashioned desks, with nothing but a plank for a seat.

We put in more windows at the Parade, and closed up the front window, thereby causing most of the light to come over the pupil's left shoulder, another improvement for the physical welfare of the children.

New wall-board was put up at the West Deerfield school-house, and the interior painted.

At the Pond we found most of the ceiling off, this we replaced with new.

There are a great many things that need to be done to make our schoolhouses sanitary, and which will be required to be done by the state within a few years, under the new school law. We feel that we have made a beginning this year, and hope that it will be continued the coming year.

Consolidation of schools: This is another important question, which we shall have to give much attention to in the near future. The wisdom of consolidating all, or some, of the schools in Deerfield is something that will need to be studied very carefully. We do not believe that a school with less than ten pupils should be maintained, if it is possible to transport the children to another school, without causing them too much hardship. A child in a school with six or seven pupils does not take the interest in his work that he would in a school where there could be seven or eight in a class. We believe that the time is not far distant when there will be but two or three schools in Deerfield, and we believe that, when the time comes, Deerfield will send its boys and girls out into the world much better prepared to fight the battle of life, than it is possible to do at the present time.

We have been fortunate in securing a good force of teachers this fall. At the present time, all are Deerfield girls.

In many towns, it has been impossible to get teachers at any price, and, at the present time, there are about eighty schools in New Hampshire closed, because the school boards could not find a teacher.

The teachers of our schools have been very much underpaid in the years gone by. Under the new school law we have been able to pay more this year, but they are now earning much

less than is received by unskilled workmen, in many instances.

These men and women are doing more in the way of character forming than are many of the parents of the children themselves. They have opportunity for moral influence which challenges that of the church. In a word, upon their shoulders rests a tremendous responsibility. We do not, as a people, recognize sufficiently this responsibility, and we fail, very generally, to give those who are carrying this burden, proper compensation.

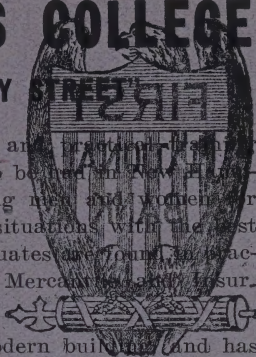

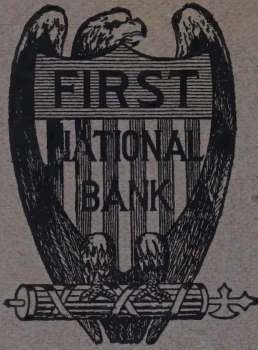
