REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

The following is the thirty-fourth annual report of the Weeks Public Library.

The Library has been open every Library day except Memorial Day and the Fourth of July. The circulation has been larger than the average and 23½ percent of the books taken out were juveniles and a little over 8 percent were non-fiction. One hundred and nine volumes were added during the year, bringing the accession list up to 8412. About the same amount of money was spent for books, but the number was much smaller than last year as prices have continually risen so that new novels by the best writers are now \$2.50 each and non-fiction is much more expensive than fiction. We have been able to make our money go farther by buying as many reprints as possible.

Twenty-four books were discarded because they were worn out and fourteen more were never returned among them some of our more expensive and useful volumes. Twenty-seven new borrowers' cards were issued, sixteen of them to children.

During the year some painting was done to protect the roof and the outside wood work was much improved by two coats of paint. In the basement a good sized space has been inclosed to provide dustless storage for books for which there is not room on the shelves.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board
of Greenland, N. H.:

It gives me pleasure to submit my third annual report as superintendent of the Greenland schools.

In the interests of economy in printing, the report is brief and several statistical tables which were inserted last year have been omitted. It seems wise, however, to include Tables I, II and III in order that parents and other citizens of the town may have the information contained in them. These bare figures often tell much about the conduct and morale of the school and of the interest of teachers, parents and school officials. For instance, Table I shows very clearly in the column headed "Percentage of Attendance" that some person or persons have interested the pupils in faithful attendance, for in the year which ended last June, the figure rose over two percent, while the tardiness dropped. The persons most concerned in this matter are the parents, the teachers and the nurse; they have succeeded in making the school seem attractive to the pupils. Table II tells us how each room in the building stands in the same matters mentioned in Table I. This information is obtained, of course, from the registers where it is recorded from day to day as the year goes on. Table III again tells the story of constant attendance, and furnishes an opportunity for a small reward of merit to those fortunate enough to be very regular in attendance. The teachers last year, as well as those of the present year, are earnest and constant in their efforts to make their schools the best possible. We study together our plans and aims, we discuss procedures, we

strengthen weak spots. We believe the school is improving and we hope to make it better still.

The vote of the district last March to improve the water system has been of untold good to the school and at great economy. We have now all the good water we want and at all times. The pupils not only feel much better because of the supply, but they are actually in better health and they do better work. Our building also can be kept in better sanitary condition because of the new water supply.

The painting of the toilet room floors has made the sanitary care of these rooms much easier. We teachers feel that a clean, tidy and sanitary building is not the least powerful factor in the education of children. Most children like to help maintain a clean building in a good state of cleanliness; in the same way an untidy building invites more untidiness on their part and their careless habits begin to spread from the building to their own persons.

We have taken special pains to make the results of our teaching and discipline so good that they will be reflected when the pupils are on the street, in the home or in social company. It is our constant aim to bring this procedure to such a state of perfection that the pupils will actually reflect the school's effort to educate and train. Mr. Shuff and I are in constant touch with the plans and progress of the High School to which our pupils go. In so far as possible our seventh and eighth grades are taught as those grades are taught in the system to which they will go. We hear good reports from those who are in these high school grades.

I call attention to the report of the School Nurse. I include Mrs. Dolbec with the teachers when I say that I commend the school staff for sincere effort and good accomplishment.

If schools are good in any district, many persons in that district must cooperate in the process. The hearty cooperation of these people in Greenland is hereby gratefully acknowledged.
