

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF PUBLIC LIBRARY.

Your board find the library this spring in a somewhat better condition than that of last year. Lack of funds to work with left the board without resources, and the books had, many of them, become much the worse for wear. One hundred and fifty or sixty were rebound, and nine recovered, before being put on the shelves, and money that we hoped to expend for new books had to be used for that purpose. The books were all called in at the close of the library year, and found to be in good condition, with the exception of the covers. Many of them must be renewed before they are let out again.

Your board would call the attention of the reading public to the use and abuse of the books, and counsel greater care in the handling of them, or else in the course of three or four years the library will have become a thing of the past.

We would repeat the recommendation of other boards in relation to the manner of electing your trustees, believing that to be the only right way for the best interest of the library.

In accordance with the laws of the state of New Hampshire, the Board of Education respectfully submit the following as their report of the town schools for the past year:

Several things have happened during this last school year that have had a tendency to lessen the standard of the schools in several of the districts.

In the first place, under the new law a complete line of new text-books was taken; and, later, the Board of Health found it best to close two of the schools for two weeks, thus breaking in on the routine of study and detracting from the interest of the schools.

But with all this, your board have found an active interest in the studies by teachers and pupils, and a very marked advancement in discipline and knowledge.

It has been the aim of the board, so far as it was practicable, to provide teachers who were thoroughly competent, and who could carry out the new methods of teaching that have taken the place of the old routine of study and recitation. These changes have in many cases been so radical that all may not have understood them, but the rapid advancement of the little ones has been the best proof of their efficiency.

In regard to new books, your board have chosen, after a careful examination, what they think to be the best in general use, and think they are giving good satisfaction.

The school buildings in the several districts have been generally looked after, and new appliances after the best and most approved models have been introduced. Your board think that the town has reason to congratulate itself on the flourishing condition of its several schools.

We would, however, call the attention of the town to the fact that in No. 5 (so called) there is no play-ground except the public highway, and there are no out-buildings of any kind—a want that it is to be hoped will soon be remedied.

In closing, we would say that the parents have shown a very active interest in the schools this past year by their presence in the school-rooms. They have the thanks of the teachers and the board. We believe that interest manifested in this way has a beneficial effect on teachers and scholars.

Several minor cases have been reported to them and acted upon, the only case worthy of notice being that of diphtheria, in District No. 1, a full report of which will be made elsewhere.

Owing to the fear of contagion, and acting by the advice and under the solicitation of residents in the several districts, the board advised the closing of the schools in No. 1 and No. 4 (so called), and they were closed for two weeks respectively.

Fortunately, no new cases were developed, and all danger is apparently over.
