Town Meeting Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Monroe in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Monroe on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will raise for Memorial purposes and other celebrations.
- 4. To see how much money the town will raise for care of cemeteries.
- 5. To see how much money the town will raise for electric lights in town.
- 6. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising money for the purpose of keeping a physician in town.
- 7. To see how much money the town will raise for building and maintaining highways and bridges.
- 8. To see how much money the town will raise for Libraries more than the law requires.
- 9. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the class 11 road known as Monroe main road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$3,397.50 or will accept state aid for construction of class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$152.58.

- 10. To see how much money the town will raise to support a band in town.
- 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a certain sum for the purchase of and setting of a soldier's monument.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to provide a room in an approved hospital for the free use of our townspeople in need of hospital care.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.
- 14. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to raise money on town notes if necessary.
- 15. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at the time they appraise the property to be taxed.
- 16. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to adopt the secret ballot for the election of town officers.
- 18. To hear reports of town officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Monroe:

I herewith present my fifth annual report as superintendent of schools.

The total inrollment for the year 1933-1934 was 85; the per cent of attendance, 95.51; pupils not absent or tardy, 6; cases of tardiness, 38; number of school visits made by board members, 11; by the superintendent, 115; by citizens, 85. Twenty-one high school pupils attended McIndoes academy, two attended Littleton High School, and one attended Kimball Union Academy.

The six pupils on the roll of honor for perfect attendance were Dale Gibson, Doris Moore, Richard Carter, Elwyn Gibson, Philana Slack and David Lang.

A class of eleven was promoted in June from the eighth grade to the high school; Doris Bedell, Robert Carlisle, Doris Champany, Pauline Emery, Chester Gould, David Johnson, Teresa Knights, Lyle Lang, Doris Moore, Philip Ward, Geneva Worster.

For the current year, 1934-1935, the enrollment has been 89. The teachers at present are Mildred L. Holcomb, grades VII-VIII; Lillian D. Stone, domestic arts and grades V-VI; Margaret R. Cyr, grades III-IV; Harriet F. Wilton, grades I-II; Alice M. Brown, vocal music; C. George McLure, band instrumental music; Lottie M. B. Underhill, school nurse. Miss Connolly had planned to return in the fall but illness forced her to take the year off. Miss Jewett taught part of the

year then resigned in November to become assistant county agent for the Four H Club work. We wish to express to both Miss Connolly and Miss Jewett our appreciation for the fine work they did while in the school. In addition to those in the local school thirty high school pupils are in attendance at McIndoes Academy and one in Littleton High School.

Monroe is more fortunate than almost any town in the state in being able to secure any needed equipment and carry on the activities in music, domestic arts, manual training, athletics, hot lunches and clinics. Sixty-five children had dental work done, 3 had tonsils removed, and 6 had glasses fitted for vision defects. In these days of changing conditions it is a decided advantage for a child to learn how to make good use of his leisure time.
