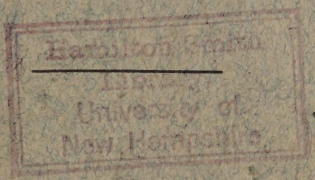


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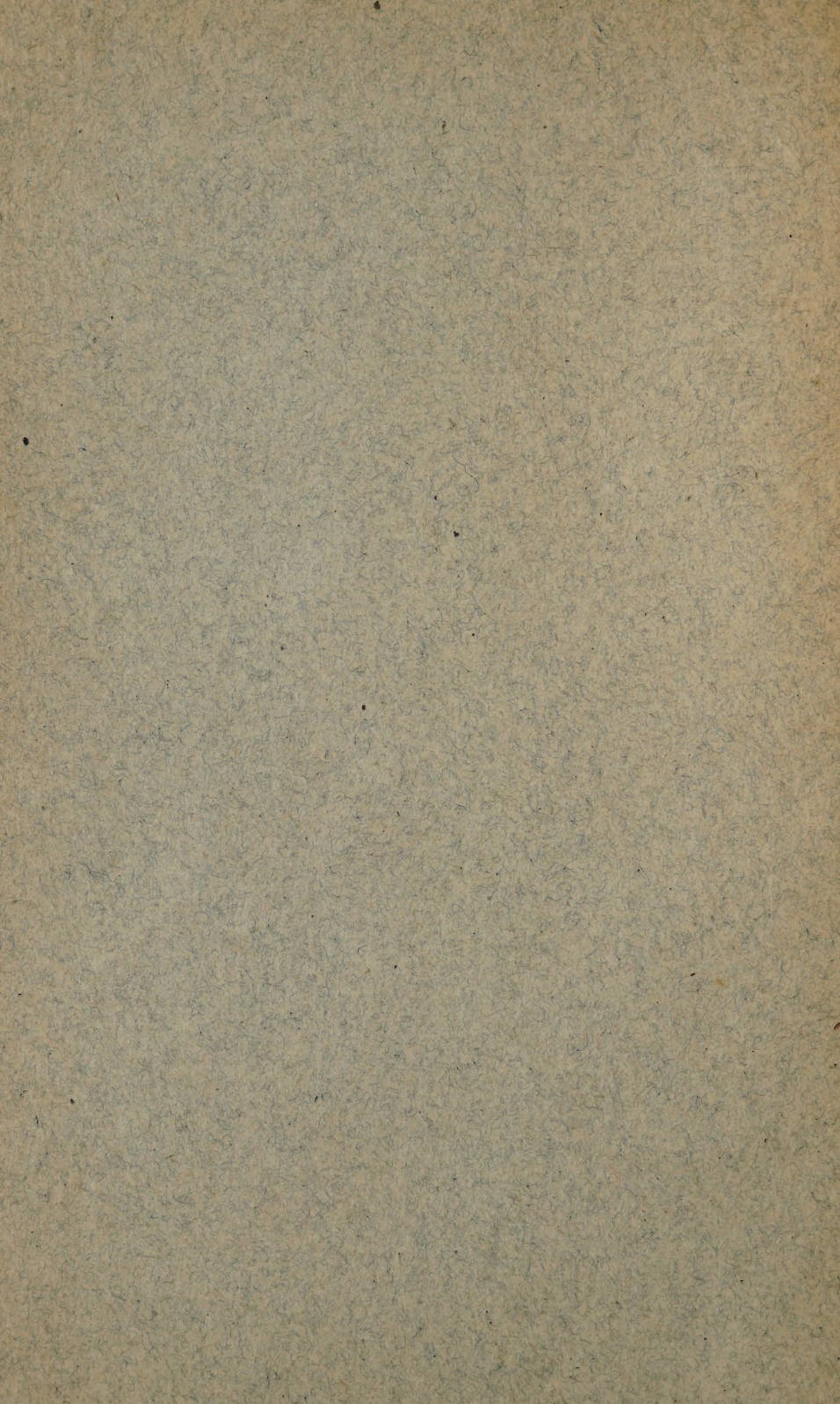

SCHOOL REPORT.

Another school year has drawn to a close. In the majority of instances everything has been moving along with little friction, and we think that the standard of scholarship will compare favorably with former years. We can safely say that in some schools the standard has been materially raised.

The teachers, with few exceptions, have been bright, wide-awake young ladies, ready and willing to work and keep up with the spirit of the times. Teaching is a profession for which intelligence and training are necessary. This work of education should no longer be left to novices destitute of any training. It is the same with teaching as with any other business or profession. The teacher who can mould the scholar and fit him for higher education, or to take his place in the business world as an educated man, will command the best pay. We have reached that point to-day. If the town will allow the school board to pay the wages received by the best graduates of normal or training-schools, then will the people be satisfied with the work in our public schools, and not until then.

The teachers whom we would like to hire can get better prices in other places; now and then we can secure a teacher whom we would like to keep, but in the majority of cases they are only waiting for a more favorable opening. How much better for the town, if we could hire the best teachers and keep them with us many years.

Then could the work be graded and systematized so as to compare favorably with city schools. You may ask, Why not shorten the school year, and thus hire better teachers? There are two objections. We could not compete, as other places offer longer periods for school work. Again: It is also questionable whether the efficiency obtained at the expense of shorter sessions is not more than offset by enforced long vacations and the lost opportuni-

ties of continuing school work even under less favorable circumstances.

Several unpleasant questions have arisen, which no one regrets more than your servants on the school board, the most disagreeable being the burning of the school-house in the Robinson district. We condemn anarchy in foreign governments, and no one wishes to feel that we have it in our midst. What the object was, no one save he who applied the torch can tell. In these enlightened days, when everybody is given a hearing and the people rule, it seems needless to injure a town by fire. The building was found to be in such condition that moving it to advantage was impossible, and therefore the money appropriated at the last school meeting for that purpose was left in the hands of the treasurer. There were scholars enough in the district to warrant our opening the school where it was located. The building was repaired at slight expense, and a teacher hired, but her services were not needed.

The money raised for repairs has nearly all been expended in the out districts, the village school building having been repaired last year at considerable expense.

The appropriation for books and supplies has all been used, but there is a good clean stock on hand. The music, under Mr. Knox's supervision, has been progressing, and we hope the town will continue that appropriation.

After some delay, your school board succeeded in making the necessary arrangements with the trustees of Pembroke Academy for the admission of the town scholars free. Many have entered the school, and have thus been kept at home under the restraints of home life, and others have been encouraged to continue their studies who would have been thus early thrown upon the world. We trust you will all see the advantage of this arrangement, and give it a fair trial, again appropriating the same amount. Many scholars have had this object in view, and have worked hard to raise their per cent. in order to be admitted another year. Do not dash their hopes to the ground by refusing this money towards the support of the old academy.
