You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town of Pittsburg on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid.
4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget.
5. To see if the Town will vote to buy a truck for the fire department and appropriate money for same.
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by a tax deed.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$150.00 for Old Home Day.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept payment of property taxes and allow the following discounts on all amounts paid prior to December 1st,—
- On or before May 1st— $3\frac{1}{2}\%$ .
  - On or before June 1st— $3\%$
  - On or before July 1st— $2\frac{1}{2}\%$
  - On or before August 1st— $2\%$
  - On or before September 1st— $1\frac{1}{2}\%$
  - On or before October 1st— $1\%$
  - On or before November 1st— $\frac{1}{2}$  of  $1\%$
9. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

David M. Ellinwood of Littleton, a recent graduate of Amherst College and of Boston University, is now headmaster of the Junior-Senior high school; Virginia A. Park of Pittsfield, N. H., a graduate of Keene Normal, Class of 1932, four-year course, has the upper room at Danforth. These new teachers have proven themselves in many ways a valuable addition to the teaching staff.

The other teachers are all somewhat experienced and well known in the Pittsburg schools and have performed their duties in their usual conscientious and able manner as heretofore.

### Attendance

Up to the period of the January illness our per cent of attendance was unusually high but serious colds and other ills and accidents have served to weaken our former very excellent record. A speedy return to school and a make-up of work in all classes serves to mitigate such distractions.

Plays and games on the school grounds and basketball at the town hall have served the purpose of keeping up a lively spirit of enthusiasm and of co-operation for good health and determined effort.

### Repairs and Equipment

The Indian Stream building underwent a thorough overhauling, was painted inside, repairs made to ceiling and roof which makes of it an attractive rural school building.

Repairs to other buildings have been reduced to keeping seats varnished and repaired to save buying new. All the buildings are now in good repairs. As little as possible has been paid for new equipment and supplies and text books, consistent with keeping up to date with school work and having books suitable for class use.

Text books, being the most constant basis of instruction, must be selected with care and must be oc-

asionally replaced with new. Purchasing new books for primary classes in reading have been necessary.

Improved ideas and methods in geography, history, English and Science have made it advisable to change somewhat our texts in these subjects. A course in Biology has been made to take the place of the third year of French.

Our aim in manual arts is to acquire the use of carpenters' tools, to be able to make ordinary repairs for the home, aims toward better home membership and more valuable citizenship.

### Results of Tests

During each school year the State Board of Education gives several tests to the senior class. The teachers and superintendent also give tests to all the pupils, not only those based directly on lessons and texts, but more general and standardized tests, given to the same grades all over the United States.

These are known as achievement tests and show by the results how far a pupil has progressed towards a liberal education.

Many pupils have consistently attained 100% in their regular weekly spelling tests of 40 words and equally good marks in health habits and arithmetic.

Great interest in what is read and a quickened ability to learn to read and write well is evident in the cases of nearly all pupils in the elementary grades.

A constant attempt to evaluate methods and results of all teaching in all subjects is kept in view by pupils, teachers and superintendent.

### Transportation

Consolidated schools in Pittsburg makes transportation legal and necessary. Such transportation has been arranged by the School Board into a number of routes and such routes assigned to the lowest bidders.

High school transportation is not legally required but has in the past been deemed a worthy project both by voters and by the School Board on the basic idea that it assists older boys and girls to continue with their education. How much fifteen hundred dollars added to the whole amount of taxes raised in Pittsburg adds to each individual tax payer may soon be determined by each one so taxed.

Pittsburg is now paying somewhat less than other towns south of us in Coos County for high school and elementary teachers. The schools need just as good teacher as other towns.

The cost of schools in Pittsburg as compared with other towns in the state stands in 16th place from that of least cost. There are 226 towns in New Hampshire that pay more for schools per \$1,000 of equalized valuation than Pittsburg. The cost ranges from \$3.04 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation in the town of Monroe to \$23.48 in Mason. Pittsburg now stands at \$5.36, one of the lowest in the state.

We thank parents for cooperation; we thank all tax payers for their support of the public schools; we exhort pupils and teachers to their most honest effort, and we pledge ourselves to do our best to make every dollar count for what is essential and of most value in education.

During the fifth year of the Pittsburg Public Health Nursing Association many patients have availed themselves of the nursing service. There have been 1,645 inspections of school children and 1,369 home calls made. The nurse has assisted with 11 births, 12 surgical operations, 14 accidents and been of help at 6 death beds. There have been cases of serious illness where it was necessary to stand by until private nurses could be called and then to work with them.

The school work has been done each month with exception of one school. The State Board of Public Health, the State Board of Public Welfare and the State Board of Education have all had a part in the administration of our work in the past year. This year the school attendance has been somewhat broken on account of the prevailing epidemic of sickness. Many physical defects have been corrected, but funds for clinical work have been very limited and there is much work to be done. Many of our clinics are made possible through the sale of Christmas Health Seals and Red Cross subscriptions.

Under the direction of Dr. Blodgett and Miss Gladys Blasland, our county Infant and Maternity Welfare Nurse, two Diphtheria Immunization Clinics were held at the town hall. 50 children between the ages of 6 months and 12 years received Toxoid. This treatment is given by the State Board of Health without expense to the children. Diphtheria is a dangerous and contagious disease of the nose and throat and can be prevented by the use of Toxoid or Toxin-antitoxin. We are more than fortunate in having this service and I am sure that more parents will realize the importance of this protection to their children in the coming years.

During the month of October the Child Welfare Clinic was held at the town hall with a very good attendance. In June Dr. Bowen of Exeter, N. H., held a Dental Clinic; 19 children were cared for. There is urgent need of a thorough dental examination every six months in order that the teeth may be kept in good condition.



Like the infant and preschool welfare work, the prenatal work is all free. Expectant mothers may have regular urinalysis and blood pressure service as well as advice and helpful literature as early in pregnancy as they wish. Serious complications may be avoided by knowledge gained early. Throughout the state the past year prenatal clinics have been established giving the best medical and educational advice to those mothers needing it. We are hoping as time goes on that we may have a prenatal clinic at the County Hospital.

The results of underfeeding in children are stunted growth, rickets, tuberculosis, dulled minds, warped dispositions, fear, lack of courage and insecurity as well as many other mental and physical defects. Proper foods such as milk, fresh vegetables and fruits in abundance are necessary for the growing child.

The physical and mental stress of the present unemployment situation is of grave importance. A reduced income in the majority of families means lower standards of living as to proper foods, medical attention and other necessities of life. These existing conditions eventually bring about lower resistance and a susceptibility to disease and sickness. During the present crisis we must all share with our fellow men, not only worldly goods, but confidence, courage, hope, and bend our energies to keep up the standard of health we have attained.

The usefulness of the Pittsburg Health work has been demonstrated in the past five years. If it is of sufficient value to the townspeople it will probably continue with changes to meet future needs.

I extend thanks and appreciation for the loyal cooperation received from the Nursing Committee, Superintendent of Schools, Teachers and Parents.
