

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Woodstock in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:



SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Mr. Chairman and Members of the School Board:

I hereby submit my fourteenth annual report of the Woodstock schools for your consideration.

The schools opened in September with the following teachers: Stephen T. Crowther, headmaster and Grace Page and Frances M. Blackburn as assistants; Thelma K. Bond, grammar school; Margaret Muchmore, intermediate room; Persis L. Doe, primary room at North Woodstock; Dorothy M. Douglass, grammar room; and Beth Bolton, primary room at Woodstock.

The September school census showed 88 boys and 72 girls or a total of 160 pupils in town between the ages of five and sixteen. This is three more than were reported one year ago. The total registration on September 30th was 177 which is an increase of one over one year ago. Twenty-one of these were over sixteen years of age.

From the teachers' registers for 1931-1932, the following data was copied: Visits by school board members 51, by citizens and others 203, by the superintendent of schools 381; there were recorded 131 tardy marks which was 51 less than during the previous year; the percent of attendance was 96.34 which is .83 per

cent greater than last year.

The health inspection was done by Addie Bilodeau, R. N. She has done some excellent follow up work for

us. Her detailed report is appended.

The report of inspection of the high school by the State High School Agent for the present year was very satisfactory as a whole. In the report he mentioned the fact that the halls had not been refinished. The headmaster's report is appended and made a part of this report.

Last June, eight pupils completed the work of the grammar school and all entered high school in September. There were six who graduated from the high

school.

The following thirty-six names of pupils were recorded as having a perfect school record of attendance for the year 1931-1932: High School—Sherwood Avery, Harriette Benton, Virginia D. Bradley, Zelda M.

Foster, Louis L. Frank, Winston Govoni, Harry A. Kendall, Edward J. Kimball, Lloyd E. Roy, Lester A. Sabourn and George W. Report of Headmaster

Mr. Alonzo J. Knowlton, Superintendent of Schools, North Woodstock, N. H.

I hereby submit my third annual report of Woodstock High School.

The registration in the high school on September 7, 1932, was forty pupils. Since that date four more pupils have enrolled. Two pupils have moved away, and one pupil (a senior last year), who had some requirements to finish because of illness, has been grad-

uated, which makes our present membership forty-one.

There are six seniors, nine juniors, fourteen sophomores, ten freshmen, one graduate student, and one special student. Twenty-three pupils take the Academic Course, while eighteen are taking the Commercial Course.

I feel this year that there is a more earnest attempt to do better work among the pupils. This may be largely due to our present economic era, but I also trust and believe that it is partly due to closer cooperation between the parents and the school. We both realize more than ever before that it is our cooperative duty to give the pupils as much practical training, and as many opportunities for advancement as we possibly can.

This year we have had several new sports introduced in an attempt to develop our pupils physically. In the fall we combined touch football and track. This winter, thanks to the cooperation of the North Woodstock Chamber of Commerce, we were able to combine a carnival with ice hockey. This spring we hope to do more in baseball than we have done in the past.

The seniors now have their play ready for produc-

tion.

Our school day is divided into eight periods, which

allows more time for supervised study in school.

In closing, I wish to thank the townspeople, School Board, Superintendent of Schools, and the teachers, for their interest and cooperation in Woodstock High School.
