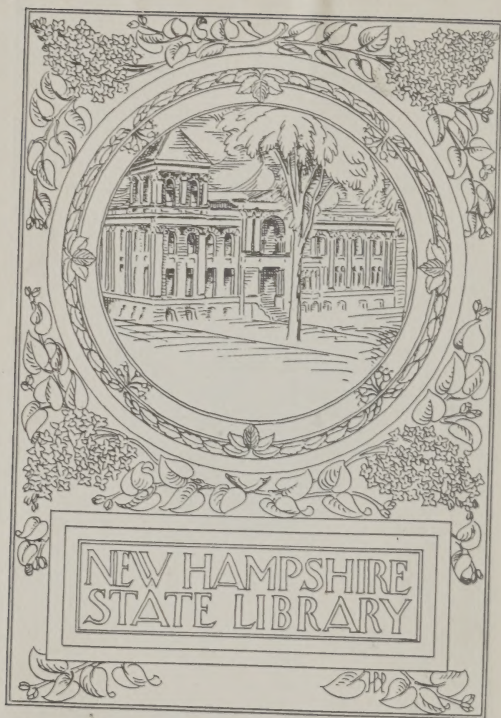

Said bonds shall be dated July 1, 1919, and be in coupon form, payable to bearer, maturing five thousand (\$5,000) dollars on July 1st of each of the years 1920 to 1924, inclusive. Each annual payment to be divided into five (5) bonds of one thousand (\$1,000) dollars each, principal and interest to be payable at the Manchester Safety Deposit and Trust Company, in Manchester, New Hampshire, and none of said bonds to be obligatory without the authenticating certificate of said Manchester Safety Deposit and Trust Company endorsed thereon.

The said bonds shall bear the seal of said City of Berlin, and shall be signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the City Treasurer. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of four and one-half (4½) per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually in January and July of each year. The coupons attached to said bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the City Treasurer of said Berlin.

Further particulars as to form, issuance and sale of said bonds to be determined within legal requirements by the City Treasurer, subject to the approval of the Finance Committee of said city.

The proceeds from the sale of said bonds in the amounts specified shall be applied solely for the purposes designated in this resolution.

That for the purpose of providing payment of the principal and interest of said bonds there shall be raised by taxation each year sums sufficient to pay said principal and interest due each year until all of said bonds and interest are paid in full.

Gentlemen :—I have the honor to submit for your consideration the yearly report of the Police Department. Commencing January 1 and ending December 31, 1919.

In submitting our annual report of the Police Department, it is the desire of the Board of Police Commissioners to explain the reason for the overdraft to the amount of \$1741.31.

In the year of 1918, our appropriation was \$18,000.00, notwithstanding the fact that we had the returns from the Municipal Court, which were much larger than they are now, owing to the license law.

In the year of 1919, our appropriation was reduced from \$18,000.00 to \$16,000.00. During the year it was necessary for the Board of Police Commissioners to increase the salaries of the police officers at two different times. At the present time the pay of the regular patrolman is \$28.00 per week of seven days, at ten (10) hours per day, or a yearly pay roll of \$18044.00, which makes the department overdrawn to the amount of \$2044.00, on the pay roll alone, not figuring any other expense such as special police, which we have to have occasionally; the Judge of the Municipal Court; the Clerk of Court; the pension of ex-City Marshal George B. Day; the telephone service; office stationery; cost of operating patrol wagon; sheriff fees to take care of prisoners and fare, whenever they have to be taken to the house of correction. Also many other expenses not included herewith, all of which are charged to the Police Department, which makes it impossible to run the Department on an appropriation of \$16,000.00 without reducing the number of patrolmen which we do not consider advisable, in a city of this size; if anything they should be increased.

Report of the City Solicitor.

BERLIN, N. H., January 31, 1920.

To His Honor, The Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

I herewith submit my report as City Solicitor for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1920.

The case of City Bowling Alleys against the City of Berlin was tried in the Superior Court at Berlin, N. H., on April 8-15 inclusive, and resulted in a verdict for the city. The case was transferred by the plaintiff to the Supreme Court and is now there pending.

The case of Joseph O. A. Devost against the City of Berlin, the Berlin Water Company and the Twin State Gas and Electric Company was tried at Lancaster, N. H., on April 28-30 inclusive and resulted in a verdict against the city for \$5325.00. The city transferred the case to the Supreme Court. Briefs have been filed and the case will be argued at Concord, N. H., at the February term of said Court.

Much credit is due to Edmund Sullivan and Herbert I. Goss, both of Berlin, who took the active part in the trial of the foregoing cases.

The following cases in addition to those already mentioned are now pending against the City of Berlin, in the Superior Court of Coos County.

1. City Bowling Alleys vs. City of Berlin.
2. Anthony J. Osechger vs. City of Berlin.
3. Z. Zolofsky vs. City of Berlin.
4. Salvatore Morando vs. City of Berlin.

Since I assumed the office of Solicitor on April 1, I have made all warrants for the Police Department and conducted in behalf of the city all prosecutions of the Municipal Court.

Upwards of fifty matters have been referred to me by the City Council for investigation and report, many of which have required a considerable amount of time.

I have also drawn such resolutions and ordinances as have been brought to my notice, and have made such leases, deeds, contracts and other documents as have been necessary in the carrying on of the usual business of the city, and have consulted and advised with the different city departments and officials respecting such legal questions as have arisen in the course of their official duties, etc.

During the months of October and November, I spent many days

upon the city records of tax sales from the year 1906 to 1919 inclusive and at the close of said examination made and filed with the City Clerk an extended report showing the result of my investigation and also drew and had executed, ready for record. 232 Collector's Deeds from the different collectors to said city, covering the various parcels of land which during said years had been sold to the city for the non-payment of taxes. As a result of this work there has already been paid in to the city several hundred dollars for back taxes, and considerable more will be collected.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

BERLIN, N. H., Jan. 31, 1920.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and the City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen—The accompanying 7th annual report of the Health Officer we submit for your careful consideration.

We believe that this report shows a very substantial progress in the work of the Health Department, in that during the past two years our city has been without an health officer.

His suggestion regarding the matter of infant welfare and public milk station certainly deserve considerable attention, as it is our belief that our city would be materially benefitted by the organization of such a plan. Also we should like to have you consider his discussion concerning the need and the use of a public health nurse. There is no doubt in our mind but that our department will develop greatly in its scope during the coming year.

We wish to thank you for the appropriation with which the work of this department was carried on during the past year. However, even though we did not overdraw our appropriation to any considerable extent, it must be remembered that for the first half of the year we had no health officer and that during that period our work did not cover such a broad field.

During the coming year it is our intention to broaden the work of this department covering much of the educational and publicity side of our work. As you no doubt are aware two new clinics are being organized in this city: one to take care of venereal diseases and the other for tuberculosis. Everyone should carefully consider what a movement of this sort means to our community and this project should receive the utmost co-operation of the city government and citizens.

It is our present intention during the coming year to institute some widespread move to improve housing conditions in the city. You can readily see that such a movement is one which requires a very broad system, and a large amount of co-operation in order to be successful. Our specific plans and time for this activity have not yet

been decided upon, but we are of the opinion that we will be able to undertake it during the late spring or early summer.

To cover this broadened field of activities for our department for the coming year an appropriation of \$6000.00 should be set aside. The appropriation for 1919 was \$3100.00 which is equivalent to 18 cents per capita; the appropriation for 1918 was \$6000.00, 36 cents per capita. An examination of the reports of various boards of health in cities similar in size to ours will show that appropriations for public health work average considerably more than that for which we are asking. In closing we earnestly request that you will appropriate this amount for use in our department for the coming year.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER.

BERLIN, N. H., January 31, 1919.

To the Board of Health of the City of Berlin :

Gentlemen:—Herewith is respectfully submitted a report of this department's activities for the year of 1919.

It must be remembered that the Health Officer has been in the city only since July 1st and that before that date there was only such work as routine milk and water analysis done.

I have attempted to make this report as broad as possible and believe that the whole field of this department activities has been covered exhaustively. I have also tried to make my report easily understandable to laymen, in that the matter with which it deals is of vital importance to everyone.

This department has received, investigated and abated fifty-six complaints of public nuisances. Nineteen cases were investigated which had no foundation. They are classified as follows :

One of the most time consuming branches of work that the Health Officer has to deal with is investigating public nuisances which have no foundation. Time and again complaints come to this office which have no relation to public health; such as ash heaps and rock piles and unsightly collections of kindling wood. Again complaints come in about broken city sewers. A broken public sewer should not be complained of to the Public Health Department, but should be made to the Public Works Department. If complaints like these were carried to the right authorities the Health Officer would have more time for public health work.

Clean Up Week.

Clean up week this year was carried out as usual. Although not so much publicity was connected with it as heretofore, it was as successful as might be expected under the circumstances.

This spring we plan to revive the old system of organization in this campaign. This is one of the campaigns that costs you little or nothing; one that will reap a harvest for you in the form of a cleaner community and a more healthful year. Get behind it when the time comes.

Vaccinations.

This year this department has vaccinated, confirmed, and issued certificates to 186 school children. At present practically all children in school have been vaccinated and those each year are merely the ones that are just entering school.

The coming year this department plans to do more work along this line. There is no doubt that every community large or small needs work of this sort and too much emphasis cannot be placed upon it. The Health Officer has been appointed a special inspector for the State Board of Health and in that capacity will carry this work forward.

Food Store Ratings.

This department has changed its sanitary system of rating food stores to conform to that employed by the State Board of Health and submits for your examination the following list of all dealers handling food in any form. This system, while perhaps not indicating any difference between ratings in the same class, tends to discourage any false accuracy. These ratings were made by J. X. Duval, inspector

for the State Board of Health, and the local Health Officer, January 28, 1920, and show considerable improvement over the above list. It will be noted that most of the restaurants having bad conditions have gone out of business.

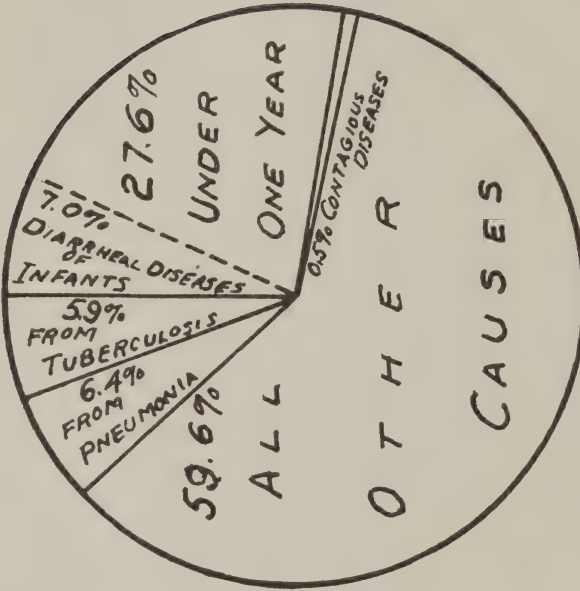

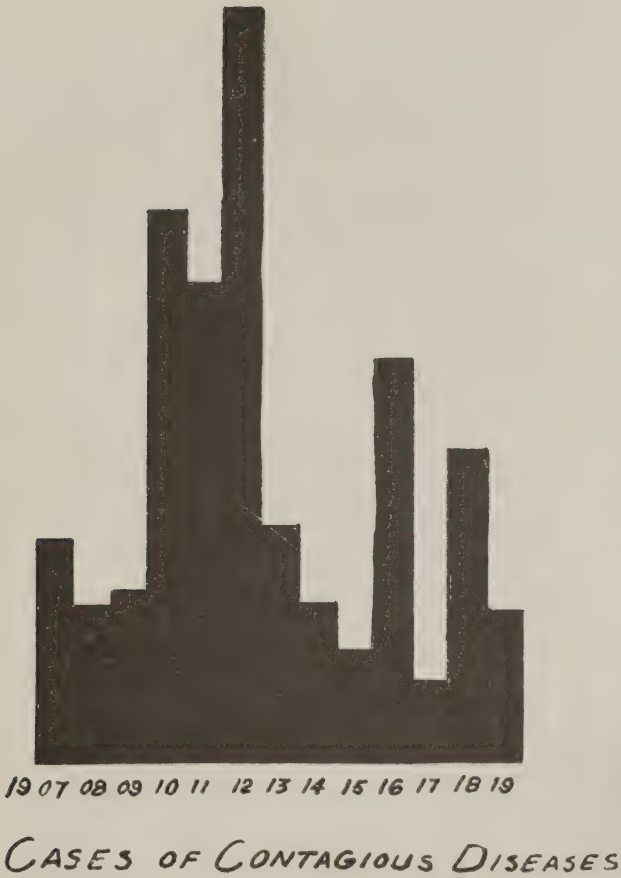

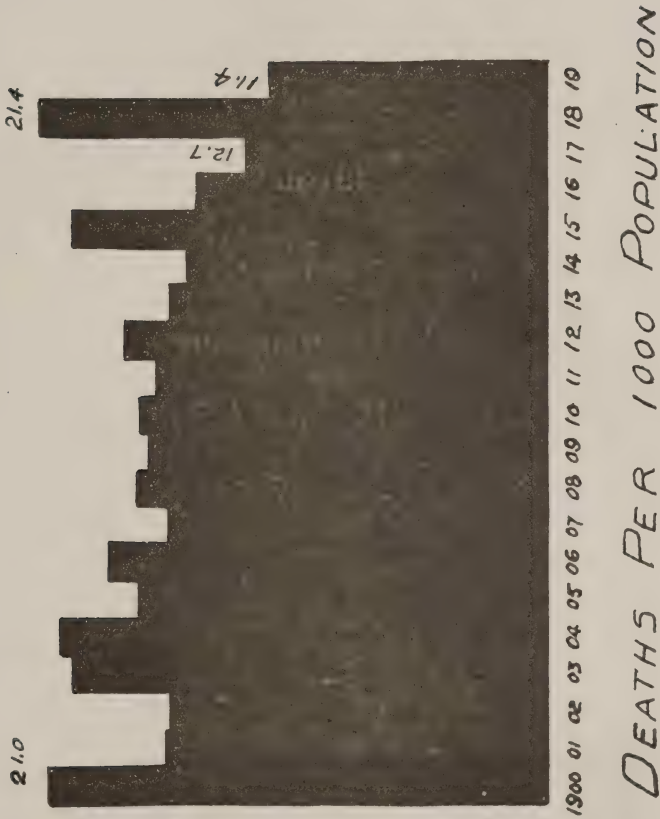

In closing my report for the year 1919 I feel that the work of this department has been carried out as economically as possible. Of course this is not the main point of a health department; the work of such a board should not be figured in that light, but upon the basis of constructive work done. I do not mean by that statement that any extravagance should manifest itself; but the value of the work done cannot always be easily seen from the dollars and cents standpoint.

At this point I believe that a few recommendations for the coming year would not be out of place, and with that end in view I shall attempt to give some which I consider of vital importance to the health of this community.

I. Berlin needs some program for infant welfare.

In attempting to bring this matter before the general public I feel that it can be safely said that its contents deeply concern every family in this city. Berlin is a busy, prosperous city of about sixteen thousand inhabitants and is in a peculiar position, opening it to all the inherent evils of a manufacturing city. It is so situated as to render the introduction of disease in all forms comparatively simple and a mere matter of course. The fact that many cases of overcrowding in tenements are common also increases the difficulty with which disease may be combated and heightens the necessity of prompt action.

The crude birth rate means the number of births annually in each one thousand of inhabitants regardless of sex or age. In this community it is, and has been high; ranging from 47 in 1906 to 29 in 1919. A very significant fact is, that since 1907 to the present time out of every 100 births recorded 15 have died before reaching the age of one year. Of this number who die under one year old, four have died from diarrheal diseases of infants. These figures are unnecessarily high; they cannot be reduced to zero but they can be halved or quartered according to the protective measures taken. On sending out questionnaires to 35 New England cities similar in size and condition of Berlin it has been ascertained that in nearly every community some work is being done along these lines. One city of 18,000 population maintains three baby clinics and has a summer health camp for undernourished children.

The condition in Berlin has reached the stage where the citizens of the community can no longer ignore existing conditions. Some immediate steps must be taken in the matter of infant welfare work or this city will continue to have a high infant death rate. There are a number of ways this work may be started, but it involves the utmost co-operation among the public spirited citizens of the city. It means also that the charitable and voluntary organizations should be willing to help, if not individually undertake the work.

The immediate steps that should be taken are as follows:

1. The establishment of an infant welfare clinic open two or three times a week with a physician and nurse in charge, who would also do follow up work if necessary.
2. The establishment of a pure milk station under the direct supervision of the Public Health Department and the milk inspector.
3. A system of home education for mothers, which might be done largely through the clinic.

One of the obvious reasons why this work cannot be undertaken by the Health Department is the lack of sufficient funds.

It is earnestly requested that every reader of this article take the matter home to himself or herself, and ask if the time has not come when our community shall take modern steps for the protection of the children, with the ultimate view of a happier, healthier Berlin.

II. I should recommend that the health department adopt a new and up-to-date sanitary code. The adoption of such a code, if it were complete in every detail, would serve the following purposes:

(a). Educate the board of health in modern methods of health work.

(b) Act as a catalogue for the various activities of the health officer and serve as a standard by which his work might be judged.

I have prepared such a code which I think would be advisable to use in our city and shall attempt to have it considered by the city government.

III. I am confident that the city would find it very profitable to employ a public health nurse for work in this department. There are at present very few cities of this size in New England that do not in some form or another, employ at least one nurse.

The following quotation is taken from one of the latest works on public health and shows admirably the need and use of a public health nurse:

“NEED FOR A PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE.”

“About one-quarter of the people are without regular medical advisers. They call a physician only when they are sick abed, and drop him as soon as they can sit up. They neglect conditions which are painless, and believe they will outgrow ordinary chronic complaints. They overlook physical defects which lead to permanent disability or incompetence. They live amid unsanitary surroundings, and practice unhygienic habits which render them easy victims to contagious diseases. They are often without ambition, and accept their condition and station in life as inevitable. Many are contented with their state and desire nothing better. The preventable physical defects and many of those conditions which may be remedied by social

agencies come under the jurisdiction of the health officer. A public health nurse is needed to look after the victims while their defects are in a remediable stage. Her work is to educate, advise, encourage and inspire the sufferers and those who are responsible for their welfare. She arranges for their medical attention, and teaches them the proper methods of home care. She persuades them to submit to the diagnostic procedures of the health department, to accept prophylactic vaccines and serums, and to adopt active preventive measures against infections. She takes the sufferers to clinics and hospitals, and acts as their friendly guide and counselor.

"Physicians are usually willing to donate their medical and surgical services to those in need, provided they do not have the bother of persuading them to undergo examinations and to follow advise intelligently and willingly. The nurse is the field agent of the physicians and the health officer. She makes preliminary arrangements for examinations and operations, attends to the follow-up inspections, and sees that instructions are carried out. She makes it possible for physicians to give their services with a fair prospect that those who receive them will be permanently helped. She is almost indispensable in the practice of preventive medicine.

"Many communities employ visiting nurses to care for the sick poor to whom they are called by physicians. A visiting nurse does the actual work of nursing, has only a few cases at a time, and spends a considerable time with each case. She is an assistant to private physicians, and does little else than bedside work. In contrast with her duties, the public health nurse does preventive work. She does not nurse private cases for physicians except in emergencies, and then only until other care can be provided. She deals with those who require a physician's services only rarely, but who do require oversight, instruction and encouragement over considerable periods of time. She has a large number of persons under observation and instruction at one time, and refers each one to the health officer or physician at infrequent intervals. She deals principally with children in whom defects may be permanently remedied, provided the proper home treatment is given or hygienic measures are followed. Although she depends on physicians for diagnoses and for suggested treatments, most of her work is done independently of them. Her work is entirely different from that of the visiting nurse, and their activities overlap only occasionally. There is need for both a visiting nurse and a public health nurse in every city and large village.

METHODS OF WORK.

"A public health nurse works in homes, in schools and in clinics. She visits from house to house, talks to the people and decides who

are in need. She seeks cases to whom she may offer her services and those of physicians and the health officer. She observes home conditions and explains points in hygiene and sanitation which are obvious to the educated and refined, but which are practically unknown to a large proportion of the people. The personal work which she does in homes upon her own initiative requires the greater part of her time.

"The public health nurse also works in schools. She observes the children and discusses their condition with the teachers. She gives some treatments and advice directly to the children, but the most effective school work which she does is that of visiting the parents in the homes of the needy children. The school is a convenient place in which she discovers defective children, but she does most of the work of treating and correcting their defects in their homes.

"A central clinic is a necessity in doing public health nursing. It may be only an office, or it may be a fully equipped operating room with wards and beds. The nurse requires some place to which she may bring cases for treatments and for examinations by physicians.

"The method of work which a nurse follows will depend on herself and the needs of the town. A competent nurse is expected to be a leader and to adapt her methods to the community in which she works. If the work has been previously developed, or if she is one of many nurses in a large city, her work will be systemized and laid out for her; but in a small community she will plan the work in her own field, just as the health officer is the leader in his own line of work.

ACTIVITIES.

"Public health nursing is rapidly becoming a distinct profession, and the work has developed along five standard lines: 1, communicable diseases; 2, tuberculosis; 3, infant welfare; 4, child hygiene; 5, school work. Public health nurses are also employed by the departments of health of state and large cities, and by lay societies to conduct special investigations, supervise midwives, conduct exhibits, and do other general work.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES.

"When an outbreak of communicable diseases occurs, many mild cases will be missed and will remain unknown unless search is made for them. A health officer cannot find these cases without a house to house canvass. The public health nurse is the proper person to do this work. She is not supposed to come in close contact with severe forms of diseases, such as scarlet fever or diphtheria, for if she did, many persons would object to her presence in their homes. Her duty is to find the cases and report them to the health officer, who will make

proper disposition of them. This work will occasionally have to be done on a large scale during an epidemic; but the public health nurse will maintain a constant lookout for mild cases, particularly of minor diseases, such as chickenpox, mumps and whooping-cough.

TUBERCULOSIS.

"Effective anti-tuberculosis work cannot be done without the services of a public health nurse. There is a wide spread belief that consumption is always a fatal disease. Incipient cases delude themselves with the belief that they do not have the disease. They stay away from a physician until they are beyond cure. Advanced cases go from one physician to another seeking relief with pills and powders. A public health nurse is needed, first, to discover cases, and second, to advise and encourage them to persevere in hygienic measures. She visits suspected cases in their homes, secures their examination, supervises their treatment, and arranges for their admission to clinics and hospitals. She is their friend and confidant. She comforts the advanced cases, and encourages the incipients with the assurance of relief. She educates the people of a community in the meaning of a cough and loss of weight and strength, and demonstrates to them that tuberculosis is curable and preventable. All this work requires constant visitation and supervision. There are at least 10 or 20 cases of tuberculosis among each 1000 inhabitants, and experience shows that they will not place themselves in the care of physicians unless they are constantly urged by a public health nurse or a similiar worker. The efficiency of a public health nurse may be judged by the quality and quantity of tuberculosis work which she does. A public health nurse in every community will be the principal means by which tuberculosis will be eradicated.

INFANT WELFARE.

"The great reduction of death rates in civilized lands in recent years has been principally among infants and young children. One of the greatest factors in life saving among babies has been the education of mothers, especially in cities and in congested sections of villages. The work has been carried on principally by public health nurses. They visit homes and demonstrate methods of bathing and feeding, the pasteurization and preservation of milk, the clothing of the children, and the ventilation of the rooms. They establish and conduct milk stations and infant welfare centers in which care is given to the babies and instruction to their mothers. They give advice and attention to expectant mothers and secure the co-operation of midwives and practical nurses in the proper care of the infants in their charge. This work has reduced the infant mortality in New York

City in a generation from nearly 300 per 1000 to less than 100. There is a field for this work in every community."

In order to carry out the work of this department covering a large field for the year of 1920 an appropriation equivalent to thirty-six cents per capita should be set aside. The appropriation for 1919 was eighteen cents. That for 1918 was thirty-six cents.

Assessors' Report.

BERLIN, N. H., January 31, 1920.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and the City Council of the City of Berlin :

GENTLEMEN—We beg to submit our report for the year ending January 31, 1920, for the Twenty-third Annual Report of the City of Berlin.

The inventory of the taxable property in the City of Berlin shows an increase of \$1,227,063 over last year, which appears to be an increase on all classes of property. We are aware of the fact that real estate has and is increasing in value, but it is a question whether the price that property is selling for today is the true value.

We had the same difficulties last year that we have had in years past to get the citizens to return their inventories according to law, and we feel that the same is due wholly by the people not appreciating the assistance that it would be, not only to the Assessors but to themselves to have the inventories returned promptly, property specifically mentioned and located, and by so doing there would be less double taxation and mix up in property the same as has been recently found in adjusting old taxes, which had been sold to the city. We feel it a duty, not only to ourselves, but to the tax payers of Berlin to insist upon having the inventories of taxable property returned according to law. The law provides where they are not so returned the Assessors *shall* set down to such persons or corporations, by way of doamage four times as much as such property would be taxable if truly returned and inventoried. It also provides that if the Assessors shall wilfully omit or fail to perform any of the provisions above referred to *they shall* be liable to forfeit for each offense two hundred (\$200) dollars, therefore if you neglect your duty do not blame us for doing ours.

We desire to express our thanks to the citizens for the information and help given us in discharging our duty, but we want them to go a little further this year and *return their inventory blanks*.

Report of City Engineer.

BERLIN, N. H., January 31, 1920.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor of submitting the annual report of this department, for the years 1919-1920. In making this report I will make a short summary of the different jobs in the order of their occurrence.

Survey and plans were made for foundations for two 10,000 gallon road oil tanks. These tanks were placed in such a manner, that they could be filled from the cars, and emptied into the sprinkler wagons by gravity, and are situated on the city lot on Green street.

A survey and map was made of the new city cemetery. A number of lots were staked out, and the surface leveled to some extent.

A steel and concrete bridge was put in over the Grand Trunk Railroad at the Cascade village, to replace the old wooden structure which became unsafe. This office made plans and estimates, laid out the work, and superintended the construction of the new bridge.

The street line on Glen avenue was changed. This required surveys and plans. This new location will give a greater width between the west street line, and the car track, near the Cross Machine Shop. The road will be strengthened to some extent, and will result in considerable improvement of the approach to our city.

The Gorham road required some work from this office; estimates of earth and ledge excavation, laying out the old and proposed street line, that the City of Berlin and the Berlin Street Railway might make an agreement as to the new location.

A survey and map was made of the underpass on Green street showing a proposed scheme for improvements, such as widening the roadway and removing the center pier.

A new street, Moreau street, was laid out on Berlin Heights, connecting Elm and Spruce streets.

A survey was made and plans are under way for a steel and concrete bridge to replace the old wooden structure over Jericho brook on the West Milan road. In view of the fact that the State road will be extended beyond this point, the bridge will be so located as to eliminate two sharp turns.

The city has been in need of an up-to-date map for the past five or six years. Such a map has just been completed by this department. This map shows the new streets, changes in names of streets, also Forbush Park and Liberty Park. Persons desiring a copy of this map may obtain same for a small sum, by applying at this office.

It is proposed to change the location of the Public Works Department yard from Mason street to the city lot on Mason field. This requires plans, estimates and specifications for a stable, garage, blacksmith shop and sheds to house the city property. This work is being done by this department, and plans will be completed in the near future.

A survey and location plan was made for the proposed park on the East Side near the Boston & Maine station. This work was done under the direction of the Park Commission.

Lines and grades were given for sewers on the following streets:
Fifth avenue: 250 feet of 15 inch pipe; 218 feet of 6 inch pipe.

Jolbert street: 125 feet of 8 inch pipe.

Shepard street: 54 feet of 15 inch pipe.

Second avenue: 175 feet of 6 inch pipe.

Portland street: 125 feet of 6 inch pipe.

Park street: 118 feet of 15 inch pipe.

Hemlock street: 284 feet of 6 inch pipe.

Prospect street: 308 feet of 6 inch pipe.

Spring street: 395 feet of 6 inch pipe.

Summer street: 90 feet of 4 inch pipe.

Norwegian street: 50 feet of 15 inch pipe; 210 feet of 12 inch pipe.

Horne street: 160 feet of 15 inch pipe.

Napert village: 775 feet of 6 inch pipe.

Grafton street: 250 feet of 6 inch pipe.

Coos street: 700 feet of 10 inch pipe; 135 feet of 8 inch pipe.

Rockingham street: 300 feet of 6 inch pipe.

Ninety foundation grades were given during the year. This shows an increase in building of almost 100 per cent over the two previous years.

Pole and hydrant locations are one of the duties of this office. Thirty pole locations have been given the Twin State Gas & Electric Co. Twenty-one pole locations have been given the Coos Telephone Co. Two pole locations have been given the Brown Co. Four hydrant locations have been given the Berlin Water Co.

Twelve permits have been issued this year to parties wishing to build a permanent wall or fence on the street line in front of their property.

Four descriptions and sketches have been made of property that has been purchased by the city during the past year.

Report of Board of Education.

BERLIN, N. H., January 31, 1920.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

We herewith submit to you the thirty-fifth annual report of the Department of Education for the year 1919-1920.

In April, 1919, Mr. Peter Desautels was appointed as a member of the Board of Education. On December 16th he resigned and January 13th Mr. William G. Dupont was appointed to take his place.

The property of the city coming under direct control of the Department of Education comprises the schools and school grounds. The school buildings are in good condition with the exception of a few minor repairs and alterations which the Board plans to execute during the summer vacation. The school grounds need a generous outlay of time and money to make them useful and attractive. For the past three years the Board has made plans for improvement of school grounds but, owing to the scarcity of labor, it has been impossible to carry out the plans; the wall and walks on Bartlett school grounds being the only work accomplished last year. The money set aside for improvement of the Burgess school grounds, \$500.00 will build a driveway and walks. The Board plans to have this work begun in the spring. If the Council would authorize the Public Works Department to grade Maple street, and build a wall back of the Burgess school, putting in a sewer to take care of surface water in that vicinity, the Board would be materially helped in carrying out plans for a school playground worthy of the name. We feel that the building of the wall in this locality should not come out of the school appropriation.

Four or five years ago the Board urged the Council to secure for the city the vacant lots adjoining the Marston school on State street, to be used for school purposes. The Board earnestly requests that you take immediate action on this matter, also a reconsideration of the vote against the closing of Pine street.

The time has come when the Department of Education must plan for a new high school, the present building being needed to accommodate the junior high. The property mentioned is the best location in the city for the new high school. It will centralize the schools and make possible many economical measures; one heating plant, one

gymnasium and assembly hall, also suitable grounds for the various school activities. A senior high school should be built with thought for the future as well as the present. It should allow for a normal growth just as the city grows; it should have an assembly hall large enough to hold the friends and relatives of graduating classes at the time of graduation. Such a hall is needed for school lectures and meetings of various sorts. Every high school needs a gymnasium large enough for school activities, socials and physical instruction; the mechanic arts, commercial and scientific courses of the school should be well equipped and carried on in modern work shops, offices and laboratories. A music department should be added to the school program, and a school orchestra and glee clubs be conducted under trained instruction, also a trained librarian to take charge of study periods. The Board and Council certainly want our city, the fourth in the state, to have its schools on a par with other cities of the same standing. The buying of land and building a high school will, of course, need a special issue of bonds. We ask that this recommendation be acted upon at once in order that the high school may be ready for occupancy by September, 1921, at the very latest.

One of the Board's greatest problems last year has been the securing and holding of the best teachers available. The rapid advancement in living expenses has made it necessary to increase salaries materially and this the Board has been glad to be able to do. The past year has been our first year under direction of State Board of Education. In several matters the Board has had to meet extra expenses, especially in the carrying on of the Evening School.

A school nurse is required as part of the school staff. Since November the District Nursing Association has been most generous in having their nurses do the school work under the direction of the school physician and teachers. This work is greatly appreciated and shows the importance and need of daily investigation and treatment of the 1300 children in our public schools. From November to January 30th there have been 42 visits to schools.

The Board thanks you for your support and generous appropriation of past years and requests an early hearing before the Finance Committee that an adequate appropriation may be recommended for the use of the Department of Education for the coming year.

Report of the Superintendent.

To the Board of Education :

The past year has been an important one in the educational affairs of this country. Important changes have been made in the state organization, resulting in wider aims and new requirements. Out of our national post-war adjustments have arisen serious problems of school administration affecting every teacher and school in the land. It is to these matters in particular that I would call special attention in this my seventh annual report.

New State Law.

On March 28, 1919, the Legislature passed a bill completely reorganizing our public school system. Among other things this bill provides for a State Board of Education of five members, none of whom shall be "technical educators," this Board to have charge of the general educational policies and administration of the state. State wide supervision of schools by local or district superintendents is made compulsory, these superintendents being nominated by the local boards and elected and paid by the State Board. "Standard" schools maintained for at least 36 weeks per year are required of every school district. These schools must be taught by approved teachers. Evening or special day schools must be provided when required and minors 16 to 21 years of age unable to read and speak the English language understandingly must attend regularly. The English language must be used by all schools, public or private, as the language of administration and instruction. These in brief are the chief provisions of the Act which has placed New Hampshire in the front rank among the states in educational legislation. Results in future years should be marked, determined largely by the co-operation with which the several units of the organization work together and the degree of support the people of the state give to those who have the work in charge.

Teachers.

There are vital issues before the American people today. Our personal and our national ideals are both being tested. Individual liberty and popular government are being assailed. There is unrest everywhere. Nothing but the power of straight thinking and lofty

sentiment can maintain these ideals and transmit them on to the future. The life of the nation depends as never before upon the universal education of its people and the schools must bear the burden of this responsibility. This country has no more important problem today, and there are hopeful signs that the people at last are beginning to realize this fact and are ready to extend to the schools a greater measure of confidence and material support.

Yet from the school's point of view the times are still hard and discouraging. Salaries, always low, have increased the past years, but in no degree to compare with those in other callings. Smaller and smaller are the numbers entering college and normal school to prepare for teaching. The classes to graduate this year from our New Hampshire normal schools are typical of those throughout the country. Plymouth and Keene together will send out in June approximately 80 teachers instead of 160 as heretofore, and there will be nearly 400 positions in the state to fill. Young men and women are preparing for other work and scorn the suggestion of teaching with its meager income and lack of social standing. Moreover teachers are constantly leaving the work for other occupations.

The situation is alarming and demands the most serious attention. This country in self-defense must maintain its schools. There is but one way to do it: Namely, to offer sufficient inducements to attract potential teachers to the profession. The importance of the right school training during these critical years demands the best manhood and womanhood in this country. Salaries must be greatly increased, and teaching must receive from the public a much greater degree of confidence and respect. At the same time teachers on their part must rise to the situation and prove themselves worthy of the high position to which the times have called them. They must maintain a true professional spirit displaying by word and action the sterling qualities the public has a right to expect.

With few exceptions our own teachers rank high and are doing a grade of work that is attracting favorable attention to our schools. Unrest has affected us, and more changes have occurred than we have sustained in several years, yet fortunately not to the extent experienced in many places for the same period. This can be attributed in part to the determination of the Board to keep pace at least by salary or bonus with the salaries paid in other cities. Three teachers left the High school during the year, a loss of 20 per cent; ten or 32 per cent left the grades; a total loss of 13, or 28 per cent. Of this number seven left to be married, four for better teaching positions, and two to enter other occupations. Two others were married but returned to their schools in September. The following table shows the length of

High School.

In my last report I estimated an average registration of 475 pupils in the junior and and senior high schools this year. As a matter of fact we have 498 present registration. At this rate an average membership of at least 525 may be reasonably expected next year, and in September, 1921, at least 650; 300 in grades VII and VIII of the junior high school and 350 in the senior high school. As I have pointed out before the full six years' work goes into effect in the fall of 1921, when room for an additional class must be provided for. The normal capacity of the high school together with the second floor of the Marston building is 444. We shall have, therefore, a registration of at least 200 more pupils than the capacity of the rooms now in use for high school purposes. The solution I believe is a new high school building, the assignment of the junior high school grades VII and VIII to the old high school, and the use of the second floor of the Marston building again for upper grade purposes. I submit the matter for your careful consideration.

Membership.

Our total registration increased from 1316 on February 1, 1919, to 1387 on February 1, 1920, a gain of 5.3 per cent. The following table gives the registration in detail :

Since February, 1919, pupils in grades I to VI living at the Cascades have had the privilege of attending the Gorham school. The city pays their tuition to the Gorham School District at the rate of \$25.00 per pupil. There are 34 pupils in attendance to date.

Medical Inspection.

The usual examination of children in the first grades, together with all others apparently needing attention, took place during the fall term with Dr. H. H. Marks as school physician. The following defects were found among the 156 children reported to their parents:

A second examination has just been completed, covering all children previously reported, also those whom the teachers, by their own examination, had found to be defective in sight or hearing. The results obtained by this second inspection are most gratifying. The following table displays the highest percentage of improvement yet obtained in any year in Berlin :

The district nurses assigned to the several buildings have assisted in following up and treating some of the more chronic cases. Their services have been much appreciated. Special credit also is due Dr. Marks for his continued interest during the past five years in the whole movement of better health among the children. Our Junior Red Cross fund furnishes a limited amount to meet the expense of treatment in worthy cases.

Under the new law every school district in the state must now employ a regular school nurse who shall act with the school physician in inspection, direction and follow-up work. Since the State Board requires all children to be examined before the close of the present school year, I would recommend that a nurse be secured at once to enter upon her duties at the earliest possible date.

Evening School.

The evening school opened Monday evening, October 6, with sessions as usual Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 7.30 to 9.00 o'clock.

The nation wide movement in the interests of "Americanization," the elimination of illiteracy and the universal use of English as the common language have stimulated evening school attendance wherever there are foreign speaking people. The state law referred to above has also tended to increase the attendance. Since our registration was so large it was decided to conduct English classes only for the present, thereby eliminating the high school subjects of former years. The whole attention of the school, therefore, has been directed to instruction in the English language and matters pertaining to

American citizenship. Mrs. Margaret Mahaney was employed for full time as Director of the school with very apparent results in unity of work and organization.

The teachers this year are especially competent, nine of the fourteen having had previous experience in evening school work. Only two of the number are teachers in the day schools. The salary schedule offers \$2.00 per night to teachers new to the work, \$2.50 to those with experience, and \$3.00 to those of long exceptional experience. Following is the present staff:

Ninety-five minors have presented themselves to date for their literacy tests. Of these twenty have passed the requirements; the remaining seventy-five have received certificates of registration in the evening classes.

The school is now a part of our public school system under the direction of the Board of Education, yet out of gratitude to Mrs. Burgess-Waring, who for so many years was its sole support, it still retains the name of the George E. Burgess Memorial Evening School.

School Gardens.

Following our plan of last year instruction in gardening and direction of home gardens assumed an important place during the spring and summer. Miss Margaret Simpson was again appointed Director and Mrs. Shirley Teare assistant. A successful exhibit of vegetables was held at the High school in September.

Added to the above should be the minor items of increase plus the so-called "Head Tax" of \$3,738.00 paid to the state under the new state law. This tax is one of two dollars for every pupil enrolled in the public and evening schools for the preceding year. This is the city's contribution towards statewide supervision. Our enrolment was 1869

pupils.

Our cost per pupil on a basis of present membership, 1387 pupils, after deducting the expenses of evening school, is \$55.97, i. e. each day school pupil costs the city \$55.97 for the year's instruction. The following comparison with preceding years indicates a gradual increase in per capita cost amounting to 67 per cent in five years, a very conservative rate as compared with increases in general for the same period:

A further increase of \$20 to \$25 per pupil would not amount to an exorbitant cost either in comparison with school expenditures in other cities or with educational values returned to pupil or community.

In Conclusion.

In attending to the numerous duties incident to the new requirements and in attempting to keep the working staff of our schools complete, the superintendent has had little time for close supervision of class room work. The duties of a superintendent are coming more and more to be those of a general manager and less of a supervisor. To the cooperation and professional worth of our teaching staff is largely due the success of our schools in the year that has closed.

Finally, let me express to the Board my hearty appreciation for what measure of support and confidence they have extended to me.

Report of the Head Master.

BERLIN, N. H., February 1, 1920.

To Supt. Harry L. Moore :

I herewith submit to you my seventh annual report as head master of the Berlin High School.

The total registration for the school year ending June 1919 was 385 pupils, 172 boys and 213 girls. Table I. gives the registration in full. The total enrolment to date for the school year 1919-1920 is 391, 176 boys and 215 girls, indicated in full in Table II. Five pupils who left school last year due to sickness and other causes have returned.

The registration of the class of 1924 for the school year 1919-1920 is as follows :

From the Public Schools 93, repeating the year 5 and from outside schools 9, a total of 107 pupils, 57 boys and 50 girls. Twenty-four pupils entered the Class of 1923 from the St. Patrick's School. Ninety-one percent. of the pupils promoted from the seventh year entered the Class of 1924.

In the class graduating in June 1919, there were 54 pupils registered at the beginning of the school year 1918-1919. Two left school to go to work, 1 left to get married, 1 left due to sickness and 3 failed to graduate. The remaining 47 pupils graduated, or approximately 32 percent. of the pupils registered in the Class of 1919.

Out of 34 pupils that were promoted from the eighth year of the St. Patrick School, 22 entered the Class of 1919 of the Berlin High School in the fall of 1915, 11 left school, 2 lost class standing and 9 pupils or 41 percent. graduated as compared with 68 percent. of the previous year. Out of the 119 pupils that entered the Class of 1919 from the Public Schools 34 pupils or 29 percent. graduated as compared with 33 percent. of the year before. Table 3 gives a full report of the loss of the different classes for the school year 1918-1919.

Table 4 gives a full report of the activities of the members of the Class of 1919 since graduation. It is of interest to note by comparing this table with the similar one of last year that 36 percent. of the members entered Colleges and Training Schools as compared with 21 percent. of the previous class. Again six of the pupils of the Class of 1919 entered our State Normal School and Bay Path Institute, both training schools for teachers, as compared with two of the Class of 1918, a fact that is commendable especially at this time when the country is in need of highly trained teachers.

The social activities of the school have been carried on through the different organizations under the leadership of teachers especially appointed for this work. The program of these organizations will be found in the appendix of this report. The success of such organizations depends in a large measure upon the ability, initiative and enthusiasm of the teacher in charge. The work in most cases is as successful as can be expected under the present conditions. The Thirteenth Annual Junior Recital was carried on with marked success. The time and work of the Athletic Association has been spent in developing not one school team but in developing sixteen class teams thereby giving an opportunity for every boy and girl in the school to take an active part in the athletics. The following report received from the student manager and coach of the Athletic Association showing that thirty-seven students played long enough to obtain their class numerals speaks for itself.

Our school bank shows that the Athletic Association has a balance of \$151.04.

In accordance with Article XII. of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Berlin High School Athletic Association of Berlin, New Hampshire, the following students, and members of the said organization, have been awarded their class numerals respectively, for playing, at least, one half of all the games, or the equivalent, during the basket ball season of nineteen nineteen.

Tardiness, a matter not given the proper consideration by some parents, is, however, a very important factor both in the administration of any school and the life of the adolescent boy or girl of the high school age. During this period, the most critical in the life of the individual, it is highly important that the child arrives at school on time and thus forms the habit of punctuality. Our school records show that the chronic cases of tardiness are confined to special groups of pupils with the following characteristics, low scholastic standing, failure to do the required work, the tendency to leave school and cases of either suspension or expulsion. Pupils living a great distance from the school, even under the most extreme weather conditions, have fewer cases of tardiness on an average than those pupils living in the city close to the school building.

Table 5 shows a complete record of three classes that have graduated under the present regime covering a period of four years. The data includes all individual cases that have been tardy five or more times during each school year. It also shows the total number of tardinesses for each individual and the class total for a four year period. I have also included the characteristic type of each individual case.

Explanation of the above Table:

A pupil in the class of 1917 during his Senior Year, school year 1916-17, number of tardiness 12; Junior Year, school year 1915-16, number of tardiness 8; Sophomore Year, school year 1914-15, number of tardiness 4; Freshman Year, school year 1913-14, number of tardiness 11; a total of 35 cases of tardiness for the four years. The letter "A" in the first column refers to this same pupil as graduating with average scholarship.

It will be seen from table 5 that the maximum number of tardinesses for one individual for one year is 20 and for four years is 39. Eighteen pupils of the Class of 1919 were tardy 308 times during a period of four years, practically the equivalent of the total number of tardinesses for the entire school for one school year.

This matter is constantly being brought before the pupils and parents by means of charts and tables similar to that of table 5 with the expectation that conditions will improve.

The College Entrance Examination Board gave its examinations for the first time in Berlin last June. Out of the six pupils who took the examinations only one failed. The examinations of the board will be given this year during the week beginning June 21.

For the past two years a great deal of time and effort has been spent in an investigation of how pupils spend their time outside of school hours. This investigation has brought about a better understanding between the parents and teachers and as a result there has been a marked improvement in the scholastic standing of the school.

Public Works Department.

BERLIN, N. H., January 31, 1920.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin :

Gentlemen:—In submitting to you the annual report of the Public Works Department for the year ending January 31, 1920, I wish to say a few words in regard to the work done by this department this past year.

We have spent a large amount of money but when it has been proven by actual statistics from the New Hampshire State Road Department that it costs twice as much to do work at the present time as it did three or four years ago, it means that \$100,000.00 spent now is about the same as \$50,000.00 spent three years ago. In considering these facts we have not spent as much money as the citizens of Berlin would naturally suppose. The demand for public improvement in this city is loud and insistent, the growth of our city is increasing so fast that this department will be called upon in the next few years to build many streets, sidewalks and sewers, and necessarily must have a large appropriation in order to comply with the wants of the people.

This department has done a large amount of work this past year. There was about \$30,000.00 worth of work ordered done last year which was not completed on account of the scarcity of labor. This work was finished before we started in on the work which was to be done this season.

A small portion of the work which was ordered to be done this year was not completed owing to the ground freezing up earlier than usual.

Much work of a permanent nature has been done this year. Cambridge street which has been for the last ten years a source of big expense to the city has been taken care of at a cost which will be shown in this report. This street has been built with what is known as the asphalt penetration system and should be good for at least ten or fifteen years without any maintenance cost.

Another much needed job this year has been taken care of and which has made a great improvement to that part of the city, namely, the Mt. Forist and First avenue job. These streets have been widened out and laid down with water bound macadam covered with tarvia "B," new sidewalks have been put in and the location is much im-

proved.

One other great improvement which all citizens must agree with me, is the commencing, in the residential part of the city, of laying cement sidewalks. We have built this year 5,485 square yards of these sidewalks, the abutting owners, in most cases, have paid one-half of the expense of putting on the cement covering. This work was done by Mr. J. E. Byron under contract at \$2.00 per square yard. In reckoning up the whole cost of these walks we find that the abutters have actually paid only one-third of the cost as the city had to bring these walks to grade and prepare the foundation for the cement covering.

Will further say in regard to sidewalks, that we have covered 9,659 yards of our old walks with what is known as tar concrete. This work was done by Mr. S. D. Tilton under contract at \$1.00 per yard and \$1.50 per yard for crossings.

If the cement sidewalks withstand the severe cold weather of our winter, I would recommend that more cement walks be built in the future and less tar walks be constructed. Besides the concrete and tar covered walks just mentioned, the city has built this year 5,480 feet concrete curb with cinder fill sidewalks, this being a little over a mile in length.

I would like to say just a few words in regard to the permanent work done on our streets. Pleasant street from Church street to the railroad crossing has been laid down with bituminous concrete, also Green street from Pleasant street to first avenue. This work was done by Mr. S. D. Tilton under contract the same as Pleasant street two or three years ago, with increase in cost. The cost of this work appears in our report.

Owing to the fast increase in our automobile travel and the heavy trucks which are steadily coming to the front, our streets must be built of a permanent nature with a hard covering, in doing this the first expense will be heavy but the maintenance expense will be very small.

The sewers constructed during the past year by this department measure 5,416 feet, at an expense of \$5,950.38. Many of these sewers were laid through ledges and necessarily must be expensive.

Our State road leading towards Gorham was not completed this year owing to the delay caused by trying to make some agreeable arrangements with the Berlin Street Railway to change the location of this road west of their tracks eliminating two crossings. After a number of meetings with Mr. Gross and the directors an agreement was drawn up and submitted to the city officials, after carefully studying this agreement they one and all declined to sign it. The matter was then taken up with Mr. Everetts, the Commissioner of the State

Highway Department of Concord, N. H., and it was finally agreed to use the old location by widening out the streets, putting in proper drainage and grading the same to suitable grade. Owing to this delay we were very late in getting started on this work, the ledge has been taken out to the required width and proper culverts installed, sub-grade put on, but only a small portion of the finished grade was used. This work had to be abandoned on account of the cold weather and should be one of the first jobs started in the spring as soon as the weather permits.

The long talked of Glen avenue job was not completed as it should have been owing to the failure of the Berlin Street Railway to procure railway ties to move over their tracks. Think Mr. Gross understands that the track will have to be moved early in the spring and no doubt he is making arrangements to get his ties this winter. The ledge at the lower part of Glen avenue was removed this season and this job can be completed as soon as the railway is set over.

Our State road leading to Milan and Gorham should be built of something more permanent than gravel, it should have a hard covering of some kind, it is almost impossible to keep it in good repair with the amount of automobile travel and heavy trucks that we have at the present time. This is entirely up to the state and I do not know as the state would see fit to change the type and construction at present, but it should be done. Our road on the East Side leading to our cemeteries should be graded and thoroughly built this season and a sidewalk should be constructed on one side of the road. We can get the state aid on this work which would be 20 per cent paid by the state and the balance by the city. This work should not be overlooked next year.

In making out our report we have tried to condense it as much as possible and everyone wishing more details in regard to the cost of the different jobs will be gladly shown the books kept in this department.

Following is a list of the work done during the past year with the cost of same:

Street Maintenance.

This is the largest account in this department. It includes the repairs and maintenance of all our city streets, sweeping and cleaning of same, removing snow and sanding sidewalks, cleaning out catch basins, taking care of the surface water, cleaning up ashes in the spring, painting and repairing fences, guard rails, bridges, etc. Many of our streets are badly worn out and the expense has been somewhat heavy this season in keeping them in repair. A large amount of patching compound mixed with crushed rock and sand has been used on

our old macadam streets to make them passable this season. The cost of this work for the year is \$16,883.99. For East Side street maintenance \$2,570.76. Making a total of \$19,454.75.

Sewer Maintenance.

The care of sewers and the cost of same is increasing every year, due to the fact that the small sewers laid years ago being unable to take care of the great amount of sewerage at the present time and the addition of the large number of new sewers which are being put in each year. During the past year the city has laid approximately one mile of new sewers, the location of which will be shown later in this report. The work includes the general upkeep of the entire sewer system, also the putting in of a large quantity of new sewer pipe and the labor of laying same, and the cost of land rent for sewers which are on private property. The cost of this work is \$1,897.12.

Road Maintenance.

This includes all the repairs and maintenance of our roads outside the closely built part of the city. Owing to the scarcity of help last year the country roads were in very poor condition and a large amount of money has been expended this year on these roads. On our Cates Hill road alone there was expended \$854.96. Cascades and Western Avenue \$620.90. Croteau Hill \$107.94. The balance of the amount named for road maintenance was expended on West Milan road, East Side Milan road, Success road and other country roads. The cost of the road maintenance account for the year is \$5,597.12.

Sidewalk Maintenance.

This includes the maintenance and upkeep of all sidewalks not covered with concrete. In addition to this a number of curbs have had to be raised and rebuilt, which is included in this account. Cost of this work \$1,480.93.

Garbage and Incinerator Plant.

This account includes the gathering of garbage and waste from all parts of the city with automobile trucks in the summer and teams in the winter, also the running of our Incinerator Plant, which disposes of this garbage and waste. Owing to the fast growth of our city we are collecting much more garbage this year than in previous years. The cost of this work is larger than last year and will continue to be larger as our city increases in population. Cost of work \$4,542.94.

Tools and Equipment.

This includes the repairs and maintenance of the tools, wagons, steam rollers, steam boiler, snow plows and all machinery used in this

department, also the purchase of all new tools and equipment bought this year. Total cost \$2,156.99.

Office and Engineering.

This includes the salaries of the Superintendent of Public Works, Timekeeper and Bookkeeper, all materials and office supplies used in this office, cost \$3,800.33. Engineering includes all engineering work done for this department, cost \$686.61. Total cost \$4,486.94.

Insurance, Miscellaneous and Buildings.

Insurance includes the insurance on buildings, steam boilers, liability insurance on the Mack and International trucks, a bill of \$465.75 which was not paid last year on liability insurance for the men, one-half pay for the men who have been disabled in this department and taken care of at that rate when not working, repairs on buildings belonging to the Public Works and some accounts which have not been charged to any other account in this department. Total cost \$1,044.27.

Blacksmith Shop and Materials.

These accounts are kept for the purpose of keeping account of the materials used in this department, all materials being credited up as they are bought and then charged to the different jobs. The material account this year shows a debit of \$80.83. This shows a debit but has been a saving to the city. The blacksmith shop has been operated practically the same way, all materials and labor being charged to the shop and credited to same when charged out to the different jobs. The shop shows a credit of \$548.15.

Sprinkling and Clean Up.

The cost of sprinkling this year is \$989.91. The clean-up account is for gathering ashes which have been accumulated during the winter season. Cost \$1,637.49.

1918 Accounts.

Report of Library Trustees.

BERLIN, N. H., February 1, 1920.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and City Council of the City of Berlin:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Trustees of the Berlin Free Public Library take pleasure in submitting their twenty-seventh annual report, together with the Treasurer's statement and the report of the Librarian.

The urgent need of our Free Public Library at this time is more books. The Board has been criticised for the reason that the purchase of new literature is not keeping up with the increasing demands of the library's patrons. It is true that more books are needed, not only to replace the old ones that are surely wearing out but to keep pace with the new demands that are yearly increasing. The Board is limited to an expenditure of about \$700 per year for books and periodicals. The cost of books, like every other article of use, has steadily advanced, until today it takes \$1.60 to purchase a former \$1.00 book. A minimum amount of \$1000 should be expended each year for new books and as our only source of income, other than a small amount received in fines, is the yearly appropriation received from the city, we respectfully request that this amount be increased. While we hesitate to urge an increase in the sum appropriated, we believe that something should be done this year.

That the Free Public Library has a real place to fill in this city, is shown by the librarian's report which is attached. Miss Kailey states that the circulation reached the total of 35,989 books the past year, which is an increase of nearly 6,000 over the preceding year, and that only the lack of books prevented a still larger increase.

The library has been very efficiently and successfully managed this year by Miss Lottie C. Kailey who was engaged to succeed Miss Hutchinson. Miss Kailey is proving very satisfactory, as also is her assistant, Miss Julia Laffin. The trustees feel that both Miss Kailey and Miss Laffin are entitled to a substantial increase in salary but unless some provision is made by Your Honor and Council this cannot be done as our present appropriation is insufficient.

It has been suggested that perhaps the library should be kept open longer hours but we fail to see the need of such a move at this time. Money which would have to be used to pay a large additional

expense, which such a change would incur, could more appropriately be expended for books.

One improvement that is seriously urged is the need of more radiation in the children's department. During the colder winter days this basement room is practically uninhabitable. Another annoyance has been the frequent freezing of water pipes leading from the street into the building. The only remedy is to relocate them at a considerable expense. The physical condition of the library building and equipment is excellent, and except for the above improvements and a few minor repairs each year no large outlay is necessary.

The trustees urge upon the institution's friends the establishment of a permanent endowment fund, the income from which could be used for purchasing books. No more worthy cause can be found and once started such a fund would undoubtedly be increased from time to time.

We have sufficient funds on hand to carry on the work of the library until the new appropriation is made. The treasurer's report shows a substantial balance on hand but payment for books which have been ordered will reduce this to an amount just sufficient to pay current expenses.

In closing, we respectfully ask your consideration of our needs, and pray that an added appropriation of at least \$1000.00 be given us this year in order that we may keep our Free Public Library up to a satisfactory standard.

Librarian's Report.

BERLIN, N. H., February 1, 1920.

To the Board of Trustees of the Free Public Library:

The 27th annual report of the library for the year ending December 31, 1919, is herewith submitted.

Your attention is called to the urgent need of more books, if the library is to continue to be of assistance to the people of Berlin. Many complaints have been made concerning the small number of books found on the shelves, and patrons are forced to go elsewhere for their reading material, because of the insufficient supply of books. While the circulation this year shows an increase of somewhat over five thousand books, still there is no doubt but what that amount could be doubled if the library had the necessary books. This year two boxes of books have been sent to the bindery for repairs, one from the Adult Department and the other from the Juvenile Department.

The reference room is crowded every afternoon and evening with pupils from all schools, public and parochial, who come here seeking aid in their research work. A new set of encyclopedias is absolutely necessary in this room, as at present time it is almost impossible to answer up to date questions with old encyclopedias. The extra assistant appointed for three hours a week has given the librarian more time for individual work with the pupils.

The Children's Department still continues to do very good work, but here also there is a lack of books, especially the old favorites. The large increase in circulation shows how much this department is appreciated, as this year nearly four thousand more books were taken out for outside reading, than last year. In one day, November 12, one hundred and eighty books circulated from this department, the largest number, in one day, ever known in the history of the library. Beside the children who take books, many little ones come here to look at magazines and scrap books, which are prepared for their enjoyment.

Many thanks are given to the friends and patrons who have shown, by their gifts, an interest in the library.
