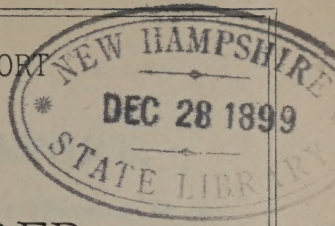

REPORT

OF THE

SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE,

For the Year ending March 1, 1881.

I have the honor to herewith submit the annual report of the condition of the Public Schools for the year now closed.

AT the last town election it was voted that this report be printed.

In conformity with that vote your school report is now for the first time in the history of this town presented in printed form.

I note with pleasure this fact as indicative of a deeper and more general interest in our town schools.

Every year shows marked advancement in the standard of education.

Our Universities, Colleges and Academies subject their courses of study to frequent and careful revisions, and at comparatively short intervals make additions to their requirements of admission to their courses of study.

In order to fit for higher institutions those who intend to pursue a more extended course of study, and in order to prepare for the responsible duties of citizenship such as have not the opportunity or disposition for a more extensive

course, our common schools are from time to time required to render more effective service. The most approved methods of instruction are necessary for the attainment of these results.

Uniformity in text books is also a very important condition of success in our schools. This can be more easily secured in view of the fact, that an occasional change of text-books is unavoidable by reason of improvement in the arrangement of school-books to adapt them to the methods of instruction in general use, also by reason of the accumulation of knowledge on the various subjects of study. No class of workers for schools devote more energy, skill and painstaking labor to their work, than authors. And certainly millions of dollars are annually employed, in preparing in the most convenient and attractive form the results of Scientific investigation. Those entrusted with the care of the young ought to examine all means which give promise of awakening a lively interest in Study and gladly avail themselves of those found suitable to their purpose.

With the increasing facilities for gaining an education we can only maintain our relative position in this progressive movement by using such means as bring general success. And if our children are to enter life's conflict under as favorable circumstances as we, their educational advantages must be as much greater than ours were, as the average educational opportunities of to-day are greater than those which we enjoyed.

District matters of general interest are given in connection with statements on the several districts.

DISTRICT No. 1.

Winter Term. Length, 13 2-5 weeks ; whole number of scholars, 16 ; average attendance, 11 ; instances of tardiness, 70 ; of dismissal 25. Teacher, Mrs. A. S. Roberts ; Wages per month, including board \$20,90.

During the first part of the term the School was well at-

tended and good advancement made, the last part of the term the traveling was so bad that many of the scholars were unable to attend. In consequence of sickness prevailing among most of the scholars, the school money was not all kept out.

DISTRICT No. 2.

Fall Term.—Length, 6 weeks ; whole number of scholars, 22 ; average attendance, 20 ; instances of tardiness, 0 : of dismission, 0. Teacher, Miss Hortense Dealand ; Wages per month, including board, \$17.

This school notwithstanding the length of the term made good progress under the care and instruction of one of the most proficient of teachers, her presence in the school-room can but inspire the scholars with energy and diligence. She is a graduate from the New Hampton Seminary. This School has been under her instruction for several successive years. The school contains pupils, that have made unusually good attainments, for their advantages.

The whole number of scholars that belong in this district are 8 the others come from an adjoining district.

DISTRICT No. 3.

Summer Term.—Length, 8 weeks ; whole number of scholars, 20 ; average attendance, 16 ; instances of tardiness, 17 ; of dismission, 0. Teacher, Miss Laura F. Armitage. Wages per month including board, \$19. The scholars made progress. Miss. Armitage was a graduate from one of the Normal schools in Mass. We think with more experience she may make one of the best of teachers. In Book-keeping 1.

Fall Term.—Length, 8 weeks ; whole number of scholars 23 ; average attendance, 17 ; instances of tardiness, 23 ; of dismission, 17. Teacher, Miss. Marynette W. Hill ; wages per month including board, \$20.

Winter Term.—Length, 14 3/5 weeks ; whole number of scholars, 21 ; average attendance, 14 ; instances of tardi-

ness 42 ; of dismissal, 28. Teacher, Miss. Maryette W. Hill ; wages per month including board, \$20.

Miss. Hill with good qualifications has acquired skill, as a teacher. giving thorough instruction to all entrusted to her care. The advancement during both terms was very good. The school was not visited after within about four weeks of its close, for reason of bad roads and inclemency of the weather. In Book-keeping 1.

DISTRICT No. 4.

Summer Term.—Length, 7 weeks ; whole number of scholars, 21 ; average attendance, 18 ; instances of tardiness, 11 ; of dismissal. 9. Teacher, Miss Annah M. Cotton ; Wages per month, including board, \$19.

Fall Term. Length, 7 1-2 weeks ; whole number of scholars, 25 ; average attendance, 23 ; instances of tardiness, 37 ; of dismissal, 17. Teacher, Miss Annah M. Cotton ; wages per month, including board, \$20.

During both terms, Miss Cotton performed her duty faithfully and with good success. She is judicious in her methods of teaching and governing. There was evidence of good progress in the School. In Book-keeping 2

DISTRICT No. 7.

Fall Term.—Length, 9 weeks , whole number of scholars, 13 ; average attendance, 11 ; instances of tardiness, 80 ; of dismissal, 12. Teacher, Miss Lizzie B. Cate ; wages per month, including board, \$16. Miss Cate by faithful instruction, sustained an interest that afforded an evidence of good advancement in the school. In Book-keeping 1.

Whole number of scholars in the Schools during the year, 104 ; whole number of boys, 62 ; whole number of girls, 42. The amount raised by town tax, for the Schools, \$350.00, from all other sources, \$39.96 Amount appropriated for each scholar \$6.77.

The various kinds of Geographies used in the different schools, have been exchanged during the year, for the Mon-

teith's series. The exchange was almost entire ; which we deem advisable, as a uniformity of text-books is always necessary to success in schools. The Franklin series of Readers, that have been used for several years in our schools have been exchanged for the Appleton's series by part of the schools ; we think it would be a benefit for the exchange to be entire. Allow me to suggest that the presence of parents both at the regular sessions and at the closing exercises of each term would often benefit our children by showing our interest in their school work. By a faithful watch over their progress in our common schools, we may be enabled to create a desire to pursue a course of study in some of our higher institutions of learning. Let us strive to have our children hold as important positions of usefulness in life as their powers, when properly trained qualify them to occupy.
