DALTON TOWN WARRANT

You are hereby notified to meet at the Municipal Building in Dalton, NH on Tuesday, the 12th day of March 2013 to act upon the itemized subjects to follow. The polls will open at 8 a.m. in the forenoon and will close at 7 p.m. The business meeting will be held in the gymnasium and will be opened at 7 o'clock in the evening.

1. To elect all necessary officers for the year
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Seventy Five Thousand Five Hundred Fifty One Dollars (\$775,551.00) for the General Town Operations.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) to be added to the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. Select-Board recommends this article.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to be added to the Fire Department Vehicle Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. Select-Board recommends this article.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) to be added to the Sewer Pump Renovation and Replacement Capital Reserve Fund. Select-Board recommends this article.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund. Three Thousand Dollars to come from the unexpended fund balance. Select-Board recommends this article.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) to be added to the Pay Per Bag Replacement Expendable Trust Fund previously established for their purchase of bags for the "Pay Per Bag" system. The

8. source of these funds will be 25 cents from each bag sold. No taxes will be raised with this appropriation. Select-Board recommends this article.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to be added to the Paving Capital Reserve Fund. Select-Board recommends this article.
9. The Dalton Conservation Commission ask to have that the people vote to transfer the commission's unexpended 2012 budget funds of \$941.05 (nine hundred forty one dollars and five cents) from the town's general fund to the Dalton Conservation Commission money market account. Select-Board recommends this article.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Two Thousand Dollars (\$52,000.00) to pay for Principal Long Term Notes and interest on those notes. Such funds to come from unexpended fund balance. No taxes to be raised by this appropriation. Select-Board recommends this article.
11. Petition Warrant Article. We, the voters of Dalton, put forth this article as a vote of no confidence in all current members of the Select-Board and further call for their resignation. Elected officials are charged with acting in the people's best interest. We believe the current Select-Board are not acting in the best interest of the people but instead with a personal agenda. They are unwisely spending taxpayer money and are ultimately responsible for the loss of many valued employees and elected officials. We recognize this article is non-binding but hope the selectmen will listen to the voice of the voters and step down allowing a new board to be appointed.
12. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the Police Department.
13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

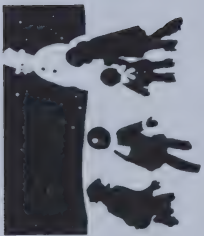

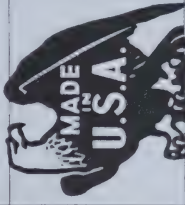

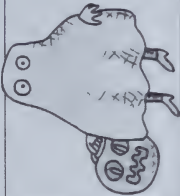

SELECT-BOARD REPORT

The Select-Board worked on completing the policies and suggested programs from the MRI (Municipal Resources Incorporated) report. This is still a work in progress until it is completed and safe guards that were suggested are in place.

The Select-Board worked with and met with State Officials on Land Use Regulations, Timber Tax, and completed the Flood Plain update. Thanks to all involved for their time and hard work.

The Select-Board worked on the heating issues at the Municipal Building. The heat is working better. We removed a cold air duct in the Gym. Erving Fuel addressed other issues also to make the building more energy efficient. The outside of the building received much needed repairs. Thanks to the Road Crew, and a small rented excavator the crew installed drainage around the Municipal Building perimeter. The Municipal Building was painted, and sealed. The bricks were also repointed by Whipple Masonry. The outside of the building should last us several years without anymore deterioration to the foundation.

The Select-Board arranged for fencing and other upgrades to the Transfer Station. Cement pads installed and roofs installed over the containers to help keep things dry and protected from the weather will help reduce tonnage and will help reduce cost.

The Select-Board worked on Clean-up Day. Help Friends of The Old Town Hall with the cook-out.

The Select-Board received an anonymous donation from a family in town, for the purchase of a new EMS First Response Unit. Ron Sheltry was a big help in getting the information for the donated unit, and setting the EMS Unit up to have it supplied and ready for use.

The Select-Board is working with other towns to address the PSNH (Public Service of New Hampshire), current request for tax abatements, and litigation. We hope to move forward on this issue. With the support of other towns in the state, this will help with cost savings to the Town.

Dalton Fire Rescue responded to 130 calls in 2012, an increase over the 2011 call volume of 108. Dalton Fire Rescue made patient contact with 106 patients, 85 percent of the call volume represented EMS calls. Dalton Fire Rescue responding to EMS calls has dramatically reduced response times. Early assessment, stabilization and ALS intervention have been a major benefit to patients. Whitefield Fire Rescue transports Dalton patients, their professionalism and dedication is appreciated. Dalton Fire Rescue and Whitefield Fire Rescue work well together for the benefit of Dalton residents.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the member of the department. Dalton Fire Rescue could not operate without the dedication of members who are trained and prepared to respond to any emergency. I would also like to thank the members families who tolerate the hours spent on fire service. I would like to extend a thank you to the mutual aid systems that provide assistance in large emergencies; we could not survive without their help. Dalton Fire Rescue responded to every emergency last year on the first tone.

The generosity of an anonymous donor made it possible to purchase a First Response Vehicle. A 2012 Ford Expedition was outfitted with cabinets, lights, and equipment. The vehicle has made for quick responses and transports EMS equipment to the scene. The vehicle is capable of transporting a patient from residences that are not assessable by Ambulance to a location that is assessable. The Dalton Select Board and Dalton Fire Rescue would like to thank the family that made this generous donation.

Dalton Fire Rescue had eight members complete an EMT Basic course recently. The course upgraded most members from First Responder to the next level and increased the number of members responding to EMS calls. Dalton Fire Rescue is always striving to offer the highest level of Emergency Medical Care and Fire Service to the Town of Dalton.

Dalton Fire Rescue would like to thank the people of Dalton for their continued support. We would especially like to thank the people who saw the need and supported the First Responder Service. Emergency Medical calls continue to be the highest call volume for the department. Fire Department EMS personnel have made a real difference in the outcome of patients needing this service by providing quick response, scene stabilization, and advanced life support. We would also like to thank the Littleton Regional Hospital Paramedic Program and the Weeks Hospital Paramedic Program. These services offer advanced life support to towns that would otherwise not have this benefit.

I would like to thank the town department heads who help and support Dalton Fire Rescue throughout the year, it is appreciated.

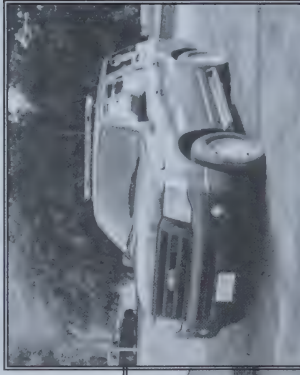

This year the Dalton Public Library signed up for membership in the NH State Library Downloadable Book Service for our patrons. We have public access computers which are used whenever we are open. Shelving has been installed in the library and the work continues with getting the collection in order.

As part of the summer reading program, ICE CREAM FOR READING, the library held weekly story times and events for the children.

I attended the Library Trustees Association, the NH Library Association, the New England Library Association, and the Public Library Association conferences this year. The local library meetings provide guidance and collaboration and continue to provide our patrons materials that are not in our own collection.

Books pulled for the book sale are stored at the Dalton Town Hall. The old library room is set up to house an ongoing book sale to be open whenever there is an event in the building.

CALEB CAREGIVERS

This is to reflect on another solid year of service for the volunteers of Caleb Caregivers serving 160 senior clients from Groveton to Bethlehem and Littleton.

Our mission is to "Increase Seniors' access to healthcare, enhance independent living, and reduce isolation primarily through transportation and visitation" and it is accomplished solely by the Caleb cadre of volunteers.

Caleb's cadre of 60 or so dedicated volunteers contributed close to 2,000 hours this year, made 1,500 transportation trips, about 70% of which were to medical appointments both local and as distant as the VA Hospital in Jamaica Plains, Mass. They travelled nearly 20,000 miles over the year.

One form of valuing those volunteer hours is to calculate the billable hours for the medical appointments that would be lost if Caleb transportation were not provided. Counting long-distance trips for VA supported surgeries and chemotherapy sessions at the Norris Cotton Cancer Center in St. Johnsbury, the Caleb volunteer contribution would tally nearly \$500,000.

Yet another method of calculating the value is to compare premature admission of a senior to a long-term care facility (assisted living or nursing home with minimum annual cost of \$70,000 per resident). Given that the population 65 years of age plus in Coos County is projected to more than double in the next 18 years (by 2030) the need for services that keep seniors living economically and independently in their homes is more important than ever.

Each Caleb volunteer undergoes a State Police background check and training before undertaking service to Caleb clients. Additionally each is covered with liability insurance and supplemental auto insurance for those transporting seniors. Reimbursement for mileage also is available.

These 2 hour sessions are open and frank discussions about the health of all NH citizens. The notification is all by email. 2013-2014 is the year of the 10 year NH Transportation Plan. The Five Member Council will work closely with the local Regional Planning Commissions; hold required hearings on the recommendations for the next ten years for all modes of transportation - highways/s, rail, air and public transportation. We then submit our recommendations to the Governor by December 31, 2013. The Governor reviews and submits her recommendations of the plan to the NH House and Senate by February 15, 2014 which will become a legislative bill concluding with a vote 10-0 by the Department of Transportation on May 1, 2014. I will be working with my office for the NH Dept of Transportation Planning Office at 271-1484 on this. There will be some interesting and in depth discussions and votes.
