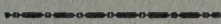

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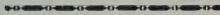

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

The thirty-fifth annual report of the Weeks Public Library follows:

On every Library day during the year the Library has been open and the circulation has been the largest during its existence, 6413 books having been taken out. Of these 2225 were juveniles, a rather smaller proportion than last year, and 502 were non-fiction.

122 volumes were added during the year and 19 were discarded as past their usefulness and several were not returned by borrowers. Our accession number has reached 8537, but the number on the shelves is only 7314, as every year more are retired to the store room in the cellar. 119 volumes of little used fiction were removed this year and the number will be increasingly large in order to make room on the shelves for new ones.

The number of new borrower's cards issued was 31, the larger part of them taken by children.

There are no special features to report this year, as no repairs nor painting have been done and the regular work has gone on as usual.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Greenland, N. H.:

I take pleasure in submitting to you my fourth annual report as Superintendent of the Greenland schools.

There are, following, four tables and the report of the nurse to which I would call your attention. Such statistics in a report of this kind, when compared to those of other years, offer much information about the character, morale and accomplishment of the school. For instance, Table II presents summaries of the usual items in the daily registers during a period of eight years. Three years ago I said in my first report to you, "it is evident that we ought to increase our percent of attendance and decrease the amount of tardiness. I suspect that ill health affects these two items unfavorably. If this is so we ought to make our organization contribute material aid to parents who want to keep their children well."

Thanks to your interest, to the work of the nurse, and to the work of the teachers, parents have been able to send their children to school more regularly and more promptly during the last three years. Table III tells us where absence and tardiness have occurred during the past year. Tardiness to the extent of .045 per pupil per year is not serious, and a ninety five per cent of attendance shows a commendable will to attend school.

It is interesting to see at how many points in the pupil's daily work, matters of hygiene are brought to his attention by his teachers, by his physical surroundings and by his

school nurse and it is gratifying to know that he is a happier and more productive pupil and will be a more useful citizen because we provide this supervision for him.

You will note that for three years the enrollment has been decreasing; the current year shows a still further decrease, there being now an enrollment of only ninety three. We have nearly reached the point where the four schools could be combined into three. Should that be attempted next year, however, we should have an excessive number in one or two rooms.

I am sure that the repairs you made last summer have not only added comfort to the school but they have had a distinct educative value. Pupils respect a tidy building. We have a better school because the building was painted, because the toilet-room floors were painted, and because improvements were made for the classes in cooking and sewing. We ought to go one step further, however, confident of obtaining the same reaction. Since our building is used for public meetings by various organizations it must inevitably show more wear than the usual school house. The use to which the school and the public have put the dining hall and kitchen has resulted in a condition unpleasant alike to school and public. Grease spots, the accumulation of some years, have penetrated the floor; they have accumulated to such an extent that not only their appearance but their odor is offensive. Apparently they cannot be washed out. Now, we require pupils to be orderly with luncheon boxes and "mannerly at table" when the boxes are opened and the luncheon eaten. We ought not to ask them to eat where the surroundings are so unpleasant. The proper treatment of floor and furniture with paint should not be expensive.

We teachers get some evidence that our constant admonition to pupils to be polite, and considerate of each

other and of their elders, to behave properly on the street, to be neat and clean in person and in dress is having some of the desired effect. In our teachers' meetings we have spent much time on matters of this kind. I heartily commend the teachers for being insistent with their pupils on this most important phase of training. We shall go still further in the matter.

The teachers are accomplishing good results in the regular work of the class room. We have studied together some of the defects of the whole school this year and have made deliberate plans to correct them. Good teaching is done in Greenland. Under the direction of Mrs. Corrine Sharp, a teacher of much experience, the pupils are making commendable progress in music. Mrs. Sharp is discovering quality of voice and aptitude in music and is gradually bringing the subject to its deserved place in the minds of the pupils. Her free contribution of an hour per week in the teaching of drawing deserves our thanks.

The system of permanent records is now completely in operation but unless stored in the safe of an outside office it is sure to be destroyed in any considerable fire. It would be wise, I think, to provide a small fire proof safe for them if possible. Such a piece of equipment would, of course, be useful for other purposes.

For the teachers and myself I am glad to make public acknowledgement of our debt of gratitude to you and the many parents of Greenland who have been constantly interested in the schools.
