REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of Greenville:

We herewith submit the following report:

The annual meeting of the School Boards of the Supervisory District was held at the school house on May 23.

Mr. Aldrich of New Ipswich was elected chairman; Mrs. Hatch of Wilton, secretary, and Mr. Eaton of Mason, treasurer. Vernon S. Ames was unanimously re-elected as Superintendent.

On Memorial Day the pupils marched in parade and assisted in the decoration of the Soldiers' graves. A program of songs with a flag drill and recitations was creditably given in the Town Hall under the direction of Mrs. Tolman.

June 19 graduating exercises were held in the Grammar room. A most interesting program was presented, with the school giving able assistance in the music. The class members were Philip Durland, Harriette Frost, Lillian Gedenberg, Barbara Hartshorn, Florence Jean, Paul Tolman and Rose Twiss. Superintendent Ames awarded the diplomas.

The school year 1925-26 opened September 7, although schools were not in session until the following day. All the teachers in the District met at Wilton September 7 with Superintendent Ames to discuss the work of the ensuing year, and all School Boards were invited to be in attendance.

Miss Dorothy Davis of Meredith, N. H., as Principal, took the place of Mrs. Alice Tolman, who had filled that position most efficiently for six years and had been released to go into a larger school. Miss Russell and Miss Brooks returned to the work of the Intermediate and Primary rooms. Manual training under Mr. Robbins required a full session each week as there were fifteen boys old enough for that work. By making two classes all could have necessary instruction. Sewing for the girls was taught by Miss

Davis during that period. Miss Harriet Tebbets of Fitchburg as Music Supervisor, took the place of Miss Southwick, whose services we could not secure this year, and after the change in train schedule we were unable to have a Drawing Supervisor.

The record of the School Census as taken by Wm. H. Doonan will be found in the Superintendent's report.

Furnishing hot cocoa during the winter term to the pupils who stay at noon has been continued in co-operation with the Red Cross.

Legal holidays have been observed except Washington's Birthday was not given as usual. The teachers were asked to make a patriotic observance of that day with program bearing on Washington and Lincoln.

Schools were closed one day on account of severe snow storm.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Greenville:

I submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

SCHOOL ORGANIZATION

There has been but one change in the teaching force since my last report, as Miss Russell and Miss Brooks accepted re-election. We all regretted very much that it became necessary to grant Mrs. Tolman a release last summer, to go to a larger school. We were especially fortunate at that time of year to find a teacher of such experience as Miss Dorothy Davis has had, and she is doing excellent work as principal of the school this year. The music is in charge of Miss Harriet Tibbetts of Fitchburg, who is making regular visits alternate weeks.

The enrollment of the school is somewhat smaller than usual. The per cent. of attendance last year was slightly better than the year before but was still a trifle under the state average. So far the present year it is well above the state average. The amount of tardiness is still considerably above the average, and we would urge upon the parents the importance of getting their children to school on time. Punctuality is an important factor in any occupation the children may take up later and they should learn the value of it now.

SUPERVISION

The statistical report following shows seventy-six supervisory visits during the school year, an increase of twenty-five over the preceding year. I am trying to give an increasing proportion of my time to visiting the teachers at work and less to office work.

Standard tests have been continued and have been used as a basis for suggesting to the teachers ways of improving their teaching along certain lines. The tests are repeated at intervals of eight or ten weeks so that the progress may be noted and further suggestions given.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

The annual medical inspection was made by Dr. Pease in October in both the Public and Parochial Schools. He reports the following defects discovered in the Public School children:

No report was made on the number of treatments since the last examination.

FINANCES

The amount of money appropriated last year for shingling the school building proved to be not nearly enough and in addition the repairs in the basement, including a steel ceiling, very nearly exhausted the budget allowance for minor repairs. In the two items combined the expenditures have exceeded the appropriation by approximately \$150.00. However, with care and economy in other items of the budget, we should be able to make up this over-draft without having a deficiency at the end of the year.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I do not think we shall have any large item of repairs next year. My only recommendation for improvement of the school property is that an electric blower be attached to the furnace for better regulation of the heat. The temperature in the rooms is more variable than is proper for the health of the children, and there is a blower on the

market now that is not only proving to be a help in this respect, but also cuts the fuel bill very materially. I recommend adding \$250.00 to the allowance for new equipment to provide for this.

The usual statistical tables follow this report. Again I wish to express appreciation of the loyalty and support of the teachers, school board, and citizens.
