



# Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on the 13th day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, one Selectman for the term of three years, two or more Road Agents for the year ensuing, two Auditors for the year ensuing, and one Trustee of Trust Funds for the term of three years.
- 2. To bring in your ballot upon the question as to whether the amendment proposed by the Convention to revise the Constitution shall be approved.
- 3. To see what disposition the town will vote to make of the School and Parsonage Fund interest for the year ensuing.
- 4. To see how much money the town will vote to appropriate for Memorial Day expenses for the year ensuing.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of seven hundred and fifty (750) dollars for the maintenance of the District Nurse Association, jointly with the Town of Northfield.

- 6. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for highways and appropriate the amount required by law to secure the same.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to macadamize High Street, from the residence of Frank R. French, to the residence of Joseph I. Twombly, and raise and appropriate the sum of twenty five hundred (2500) dollars for the same.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to employ a day policeman and raise and appropriate money for the purpose.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise two hundred (200) dollars to defray the expenses of a number of band concerts (twelve at least) to be given during the summer months of 1923. (By request of the band).
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, not exceeding \$250.00 to be given to the Laconia Hospital, Laconia, N. H. (By request).
- 11. To see what action the town will take on the question of snow removal, on the Trunk Line Road, between Winnisquam and Franklin, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to re-surface Chestnut Street and raise and appropriate money for the same. (By petition).
- 13. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for all purposes for the year ensuing.
- 14. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents for the past year.

- 15. To choose any other officers and agents for the year ensuing.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Boards and Citizens of Tilton and Northfield:

I herewith submit my eighth annual report as superintendent. It is possible in this report to merely touch upon some of the activities of the schools.

In the statistical tables printed elsewhere may be found interesting matter pertaining to the schools for the year ending last June. I refer you to these tables for information as to teachers salaries, weeks of school, enrollment, and attendance. On another page will be found the roll of honor for the year. The children whose names appear here are deserving of commendation for their fine record in attendance.

The school calendar which has been adopted by the school board of the Tilton Union district needs some explanation. The school year in the past has been nominally thirty-six weeks in length. It was discovered that last year fourteen days of school time were lost because of holidays, institutes, conventions, bad weather, and other causes. This meant a loss of practically three weeks. The school year, then, instead of being thirty-six weeks was actually thirty-three weeks. Any such loss of time cannot fail to have its effect upon the school work for the year. To remedy this condition and to make shorter terms, the vacations or recesses have been arranged so as to fall in the weeks containing the holidays so far as was possible. In addition one extra week was add-

ed making the nominal school year thirty-seven weeks. This calendar has been adopted by the school board of the Tilton Town District except that the extra week has not been added.

The contracts which the several districts have with Tilton Seminary for furnishing secondary school privileges to the pupils of the districts must be renewed this year. Articles will appear in the warrants relative to this matter. Under the law, if no contract is made, the district is liable for only \$55 for the tuition of each pupil and the individual parent is obliged to pay any additional tuition charge. The present contracts call for annual payment of \$75 per pupil. I am certain that this community desires to furnish high school training to the boys and girls and that favorable action will be taken.

The problem of undernourishment of school children due to one cause or another is met everywhere. Through the interest and efforts of Miss Davis, our school nurse, it is now possible for the children at the Union school who are much underweight and any other children who desire it to have a glass of milk at the morning recess. Milk is also provided for the children of the schools of Tilton Town District. The expense of the milk is met in most cases by the individual parents. Where this is impossible interested organizations and individuals have gladly found the means. I cannot speak too highly of the beneficial results coming from this arrangement. The teachers testify that in many cases it means better school work and a better spirit on the part of the children.

### TILTON UNION DISTRICT

In my report last year I recommended the reorganization of the seventh and eighth grades that the work might more nearly correspond to what is considered the best school practice. The appropriation for teachers' salaries at the last school meeting made this possible. There are in grades seven and eight one hundred pupils, fifty-six in grade seven and fortyfour in grade eight. We now have three teachers who give practically full time to these grades. The teaching is arranged on the departmental basis. Mrs. Sheehan teaches the history, English and drawing to both grades. Mrs. Meserve the mathematics, geography, and penmanship, Miss Helen Thompson the science, literature, spelling and sewing. In addition there are the special teachers, Miss Josephine Emery in manual training and Mrs. Worthen in music. One half day of each week Miss Thompson gives to fifth and sixth grade sewing. The assembly hall is used regularly as a recitation room. The advantages of this organization are several. I mention only two. It makes possible better teaching, it gives the children a better preparation for the larger responsibilities which they must assume at the Seminary.

An interesting feature of the work of these grades is the weekly assembly which takes place each Friday afternoon in the school hall. The two grades assemble as one school. The children themselves for the most part make the preparations and have charge of the exercises. In all the work with these grades we are endeavoring to approach the junior high school idea.

Miss Doris Saben, our first grade teacher last year, resigned in the summer. This vacancy was filled by the appointment of Miss Mildred Abbott of Concord. The promotion of Miss Helen Thompson to work with grades seven and eight left a vacancy in the fifth grade. This was filled by the appointment of Miss Rose McCormick of Concord. Both Miss Abbott and Miss McCormick were graduated last June from the Concord Training School. Both teachers are proving most satisfactory. No other changes have taken place in our teaching force. Because of the crowded condition in grades one and three Miss Louise Emery has been secured for the latter half of the year to assist during the forenoons. I should be decidedly remiss if I failed to take this opportunity of testifying to the excellency of our teaching force. Personally, I very much appreciate them.

The enrollment in the schools is slightly less than a year ago. The enrollment at the Seminary is practically what it was last year. There are now seventy-two pupils from this district registered. A good percentage of the class graduating last June from the Union school entered the Seminary. For the most part they have done creditable work. It is probable that nine children from this district will be graduated at the Seminary next June.

The evening school opened this year very propitiously but the work has been interrupted by reason of the illness of the teachers, Miss Josephine Emery and Miss Louise Emery. It is expected that sessions will soon be resumed. Although the attendance has not been large the interest is better than I have ever

before seen it.

The work of repainting and revarnishing the interior of the school building which was begun a year ago last summer was completed this last summer. The walls and ceiling of assembly hall were re-decorated. The walls and floor of the basement were painted. New drinking fountains were installed in the basement and two fountains on the second floor. Wash bowls were also installed in the basement which make it possible for the children to more easily apply some of the laws of hygiene which they learn in the schoolroom. These improvements have cost some over \$900.00. I do not anticipate the need of any extended repairs this next school year.

The financial statement of the school board, covering the period from July 1, 1922 to February 1, 1923, following the arrangement adopted last year, is given in detail. It should be noted that instead of being obliged to report a probable deficit and to ask for a deficiency appropriation we are able to report a probable surplus of over \$600.00.

The proposed budget for next year calls for an appropriation, a little in excess of that made last year. The superintendent and school board feel that we should have a full time teacher throughout the year to work as assistant in the lower grades. Therefore an increase in the appropriation for teachers' salaries is asked for.

## TILTON TOWN DISTRICT

We were truly fortunate in retaining the services for this year of Mrs. Abbott at the Sanborn Road school and Miss Pike at the Lochmere school. Miss Florence Cushing of Belmont succeeded Mrs. Harvey at the No. Four school. Miss Cushing is a graduate of the Seminary, taught two years in Belmont, and has attended for three years the summer sessions at Plymouth Normal. Miss Flora Hodge, a graduate of Plymouth last June,, succeeded Miss Fitts at the Highlands school. I am glad to state that at no previous time since I have been your superintendent have we had so efficient a corps of teacher. A good school is impossible without a good teacher. Our schools as I find them today are a credit to the teachers, to the children, and to the community.

The enrollment from year to year changes little. The Highlands school is now our smallest one. I see little likelihood of any increase in numbers of this school. We are now sending eleven children who would otherwise attend the No. Four school to the Tilton Union school. These are seventh and eighth grade pupils. There is no question but that these children are receiving far better training than we could possibly give them at the No. Four school. This arrangement seems to me the wise one from every standpoint. At Lochmere we have a large school with practically every grade represented. The seventh and eighth grade pupils are not receiving all the attention they should receive, and this condition is due to no fault of the teacher. I know that there are some objections which might reasonably be offered, but I am certain that it would be better for the Lochmere school as a whole and much better for the children concerned, if the seventh and eighth grade pupils were sent to the Union school. The train schedule is such that their transportation would be an easy matter.

We have this year at the Seminary twenty-two pupils, an increase of six over last year. They are classified as follows: 1st year class, 9; 2nd year class, 7; 3rd year class, 3; 4th year class, 3.

A special appropriation for repairs was made at the last school meeting that the Sanborn Road school might be remodeled and made to conform more nearly to the state board recommendations. This work was accomplished during the summer vacation. We now have a school-room well lighted, attractive, and well adapted to the needs of the school. It is evident that the children, themselves, much appreciate the improved conditions. Additional windows were put in and all the windows properly arranged. The condition of the plastering over head made a steel ceiling necessary. The building was painted inside and out. The cost of these alterations and improvements was about \$450.00.

I would call attention to certain needed repairs this next year. The Lochmere building should be reshingled and repainted. If possible this cellar should be enlarged. New fences should be built at No. Four and Sanborn Road. Natural slate boards should be put in both at No. Four and Sanborn Road. The school board recommends an appropriation of \$500 for repairs. No smaller sum would do the work that needs to be done.

The financial report printed is for the fiscal year which ended last June. For this current fiscal year we have resources of about \$7,650.00. We have al-

ready spent \$4,916.11, leaving a balance of \$2,733.89. Our estimated expenditures for the remainder of the year will be \$2,975.00 We ought to have a deficiency appropriation at the school meeting of at least \$250.00. The reason for this deficiency is easily found. The appropriation last March for high school tuition was \$1200; the expenditure will be \$1600 or more. The appropriation for elementary school tuition was \$300; the expenditure will be about \$500.00.
