## WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. s.)

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Webster on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to cooperate with the State in control of White Pine Blister Rust.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum necessary to secure State Highway construction.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary for State Maintenance of Highways.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary for the maintenance of highways and bridges.
7. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for ploughing roads in winter.
8. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for Town Library.
9. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for Old Home Day and 200th Anniversary.
10. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

11. To see if the town will vote to give discount of 2% (per cent) on all 1933 taxes paid on or before August 1st, 1933.

12. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate to pay on town notes.

13. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for interest on town notes.

14. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen the right to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

15. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for Old Age Pensions.

16. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for repairing and painting Town House.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum necessary to buy a snow plow for use with a truck.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The report of the statistics of the district for the year 1931-32 is as follows:

1. No sessions of school were lost this year or last.
2. The average membership and number of pupils has increased slightly.
3. The percent of attendance is excellent,—by far the best in this union. Parents, teachers and pupils should feel proud of this record.
4. The small number of tardinesses at the Corser Hill school is especially to be commended. There are too many at the other school. Parents may aid a great deal in preventing tardiness.
5. Larger number of visits by parents and citizens denotes an increased interest in the work of the schools.

The number of pupils enrolled in the public schools of the district was 55. The number residing in the district and attending high schools in other towns was 5,—distributed as follows: Concord, 3; Hopkinton, 2. Total number of pupils residing in the district and attending public schools, 60; an increase of 3 over last year. The per capita tax, if the rate is not changed by the present legislature, will therefore be \$120 for Dec. 1933.

#### *Health Inspection*

The annual inspection was made by Miss Naomi Austin, school nurse, in December, 1931, and reported as follows:

Pupils underweight 10% or over, 10; defective vision, 11; defective hearing, 1; anaemia, 1; deformity, 1; defective teeth, 27; diseased tonsils, 3; vaccinated, 45; unvaccinated, 9; diphtheria toxin-antitoxin, immunized 31; pediculosis, 8; skin diseases, 6.

Six trips were made to oculists, and six children taken. Glasses were procured for three children. A dental clinic was held, at which many pupils were treated. The pupils

of the schools were weighed and measured twice during the year. Visits were made to each home, more than one when necessary. Several other visits were made to schools for special examinations and inspections.

This is an excellent record. The good results of the work of the school nurse are seen in the high attendance records of the pupils. The district is very fortunate in being able to secure the services of such an experienced and active nurse as Miss Austin.

The work of the eighth grade was completed in June by Hurire Milkonian, Pauline Davis and Alton Kimball. The group graduating in June, 1933 will be much larger.

The project to consolidate the schools of the district in a two-room school at Sweatt's Mills should receive the careful consideration of every citizen in the district. There are three great advantages to be secured by this arrangement: First—the possibility of having a large playground, fully adequate for the needs of all the pupils, with a chance to play baseball and other games, and a large enough number of older pupils to make such a game interesting. There is no room for play except in a very limited way as the schools are now situated. Second: The division of the pupils into two groups of four grades each. This permits the employment of one teacher trained for work with primary pupils, and another for work with the upper grades. Pupils can thus be better fitted for high school. Third: The stimulation gained by having pupils in larger groups in the grades. Only one or two children working in a group does not give the interest and competition of a larger group.

As an offset to these advantages we must consider the period of hard times through which we are passing. The cost of the building as reported by the special committee appointed last March is not very high. If spread over a period of five years by bonding or some similar plan, it would not add very heavily to the tax rate. Another consideration is that the cost of labor and building materials is now very low.

The cost of maintenance of the school and transportation would probably not be lowered below the present cost, but against this must be placed the possibility of securing state aid.

The excellent report of the special committee given at the hearing at Sweatt's Mills, Feb. 6, gives exact details of all these matters. If the project is carried through by the vote of the people at the district meeting in March, it will result in great educational benefit and improvement for the district.

In conclusion we wish to thank the board for its support, and parents for their assistance in making such a good attendance record possible. In spite of the depression this was a good year for the district. With the same interest and cooperation we hope to make as good or better record for 1932-33.
