**To the Inhabitants of Center Harbor  
Qualified to Vote in Town Affairs:**

---

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, March 14, 1905, at ten o'clock a.m., to act upon the following subjects:

- I. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- II. To choose three Selectmen for the ensuing year.
- III. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- IV. To see how much money town will vote to raise for current expenses.
- V. To see how much money town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.
- VI. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate more money than is required by law for schools, and if so, how much. By request.

VII. To see if the town will vote to raise money to defray expenses Memorial Day, and if so, how much. By request.

VIII. To see if the town will vote to adopt the amendments to Chap. 73 of the Public Statutes relating to highways and bridges, whereby the town shall be divided into highway districts. By request.

IX. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expenses of Old Home Week. By request.

X. To see if town will vote to raise money for concreting sidewalks at Center Harbor Village, and if so, how much. By request.

XI. To see if town will vote to change road over Bartlett Hill and raise money for same, if so, how much? By request.

XII. To see if town will vote to raise money to buy lot and build a new town house, and if so, how much. By request.

XIII. To see if town will vote to raise money to repair town house, and if so, how much. By request.

XIV. To choose agents and committees in relation to any article in this warrant and hear reports of any heretofore chosen.

## SCHOOL REPORT.

---

Another year and the report of our schools confronts us. On the whole the year has been very successful. The question of getting good teachers is a lottery, the best of results cannot be expected when a small amount of money is paid. Our one theme is, and has been: More money, better teachers. Pay according to the number of scholars and amount of work required.

Here is an arithmetical problem: Take our school treasurer's report, see how much each of our teachers receives for the school year, remembering \$2 and \$3 must be paid for board. How much can a good, bright and capable teacher save in a year?

That is why we are obliged to change teachers so often. They demand better wages in order to live. Kindly remember this when the question of "school money" is brought up March 14th. A uniformity of books has been made and we think the teachers and children have worked together for good.

The grammar school in the spring was taught by Miss Kate G. Davis. In the fall it was in charge of a fine instructor, Miss Maud F. Weeks, who worked faithfully and well, bringing her school up to a higher standard than it has ever before attained.

Another year the primary school has been under the charge

of Miss Myrtie L. Bickford. Satisfaction was expected and it was given.

The spring term at the Hawkins school was taught by Miss Ethel Lawrence. In the fall we were fortunate in securing the services of Mrs. Fred K. Cloutman, who sees in the children (and makes them see it, too,) something beside the general routine of school duties. This school was badly broken by sickness, making it seem, perhaps, that good results were not attained, yet Mrs. Cloutman is one of our best teachers.

The Town House school in the spring was taught by Miss Claudine Gibson. Miss Gibson left us to attend the Normal school, where she felt she could have better training.
