### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Deerfield in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Deerfield on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid highway maintenance and appropriate money for the same.
4. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for town construction of highway and appropriate money for the same.
5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$100 for Memorial day.
6. To see if the town will vote to build a steel and cement bridge and raise and appropriate money for the same.
7. To see what action the town will take in regard to Sunday gunning.

8. To see what action the town will take in regard to prices paid labor on highways.

9. To see if the town will vote to accept Trust Funds.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the extermination of Pine Blister Rust.

11. To transact any other business that may come before this meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

*To the School Board of Deerfield, N. H.:—*

Your present superintendent of schools assumed his duties the first of last September. Consequently he did not have an opportunity during the summer months to study your school system and get acquainted with its problems. He was faced with a new and difficult situation. He took things as he found them, and has worked ever since devoting his entire time and energy to promote the best interests of Supervisory Union No. 53, of which Deerfield is a part.

The most important phase of any school system is what is actually accomplished in the school room. Recognizing this fact the superintendent has used his influence, skill, and experience in making the school room function in such a way as to impart to the pupils the best training possible under the circumstances. He has given a generous portion of his time to direct the work of your teachers, and has visited every teacher at work often.

Less important school activities have not been allowed to take time which rightly belongs to the thorough teaching of the fundamental subjects. Results have been emphasized more than methods and theories.

Last summer a great deal was done in the way of repairing school chimneys, roofs, and fences. Much new equipment, in the way of new desks was secured and installed both in the Parade and South Road schools. A special appropriation of four hundred fifty dollars made these improvements possible. However, some things remain to be done. Some of the toilets are not what they ought to be. They should at least be provided with fly proof vaults and ventilators.

The Superintendent suggests that an appropriation similar to last year's be made this year in order that next summer the work of school house improvements may be continued.

Punctuality and a sense of responsibility are most valuable characteristics for children to acquire. Are the parents of Deerfield doing their best to see that their children are in school every day, and on time? Do you look after the psysical and moral welfare of your children? Do you take your children out of school just because they are sixteen years old and send them to work to add a few dollars to the family purse? Do you ever visit school to get in sympathetic touch with your children's teachers? Education is the salvation of the world. It demands the active interest of every citizen in order to get our children ready to live in accordance with the noblest traditions, and the highest ideals.

In conclusion the Superintendent wishes to make clear the fact that your schools are doing good work, that a marked improvement is being made, and that the requirements, both by the local board, and the State Department of Education are being met. You are fortunate in having secured the services of good, conscientious, hard working teachers. The Superintendent thanks the community, the teachers, and the school board in particular for the support he has received. If we continue to grow and develop the time will not be long when the boy and the girl who come from small communities like Deerfield will enjoy equal educational advantages with the children who come from larger centers. Let this be our hope!

To the Hon. School Board of the Town of Deerfield:

Gentlemen:

As School Physician of the Town of Deerfield I beg to submit the following report.

The pupils, on the whole are in splendid health. They are also neat and tidy. I believe that the system of school inspection is bearing fruit as to interesting the scholars in their physical condition. I find that our instructions as to deep breathing, care of teeth, etc. are being carried out and the result is shown in the ruddy complexions, bright eyes, full chests and general appearance. Vaccination is the only thing to which I would call your attention, as it is of national importance as well as local.

As to tonsils: Very few have trouble enough to call for interference. A slightly enlarged tonsil almost invariably atrophies and gives no further trouble.

As to teeth: First dentition is always lost and I think we should concern ourselves with the second teeth. The large majority of the pupils of the age of twelve and over have splendid teeth. I have simply called their attention to the condition that calls for early interference.

Of the more important diseases, viz. Malnutrition, Scorfula, Tuberculosis, Nervous diseases, I find none.
