7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

8. To see whether beer or other alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under Act of the Laws of New Hampshire 1933, Chapter 99, Section 22.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

The thirty-sixth annual report of the Weeks Public Library follows:

During the year 121 volumes were added, including two by gift, bringing our accession number to 8,659. One hundred books were removed from the shelves to the store room in the cellar, 24 which had worn out were destroyed and 6 were not returned by patrons. The number of borrowers' cards issued was 39, an increase of 8 over last year.

The Library was closed on July 4 and on one evening this winter when severe weather made it unwise to open. On other days the work has gone on as usual. School children have made greater use of the Library in connection with their work during the last few months.

It was decided to start the year 1934 with a clean slate, as those families who had lost Library privileges because of large unpaid fines or because they had not returned books which they had taken out, were again allowed to become patrons, and this meant an increase of ten or more borrowers.

There have been no repairs during the year.

In November the librarian, substitute librarian, and one of the trustees with librarians and trustees of eleven nearby towns met the secretary of the State Library Commission in an all-day session at Rye, when problems of common interest were talked over and recent books discussed.

Thanks are due Mr. Fisher for the gift of the National Geographic Magazine for the last three years, which High School students particularly have found of use in their school work.

SCHOOL REPORT

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Greenland,
New Hampshire:

It gives me pleasure to submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools in Greenland.

The above table is inserted here to inform all who are interested as to the present numbers in the various grades of the local school and of the Portsmouth High School. These are the pupils for whose schooling taxes are raised in Greenland. At this time last year we had enrolled in the local school fifteen fewer pupils than we have now. The local total enrollment in Greenland is likely to be considerably less in the middle than at the end of the year, because, being a pleasant place in which to live and being near a city, more families belong to the shifting group; they come easily and go easily. If we maintain for the remainder of this school year the same rate of increase as during the last half of last year, the total enrollment for this year will be about one hundred and twenty, and if those now in high school remain till next June, the total number of those to

be provided with schooling will be about one hundred fifty—the largest number for several years. The summaries of the local enrollment by years are contained in Table II, below:

Besides the figures for the total year's enrollment this table shows other figures which need comment; for instance, last year's percentage of attendance was the lowest in nine years. On the face of it this is a very poor showing but taken together with the fact that the record for tardiness was by far the best in nine years, the record does not seem so unworthy, for it can be explained by an unusually large amount of illness. Many more pupils than usual had to remain at home for days at a time; when they could attend, they came on time. January, February and March 1933 brought us unusual epidemics. In those months alone there were 1819 half days of absence.

I should not leave these two tables without pointing out that, during the last two years, you have provided at practically no extra expense a week more of schooling than in any year before.

Illness is again reflected in the unusually short list of those in perfect attendance which follows in Table IV.:

The report of the School Nurse, below, is worthy of examination for it shows careful supervision of the general health of the school. An unusually large number of pupils, between one-fourth and one-third of the whole school, were ten percent underweight, a matter of concern.

Mrs. Sheehy has been very eager this year, in advising with parents and in her examination of the pupils, to present the situation clearly, and to enlist the cooperation of all concerned. I commend her work as being highly satisfactory. Already there is evidence of improvement in several phases of school health and sanitation.

I am pleased to report that the experiment of combining the teaching of music with the duties of one of the regular teachers is showing very good results. Without placing any handicap on the work of her own room, Mrs. Sharp has brought to the whole school a new and better conception of singing and of other vocal expression.

The teachers have made satisfactory weekly plans, have drawn up usable daily time tables and then have taught in accordance with them. We have worked together on several general projects for the betterment of the school, for instance, better use of every day spoken English more clearly enunciated, more careful supervision of pupil response in the class room, more emphasis on pupil conduct when out of school. Whatever good general results we have obtained, and there are some such results, are due to the fine spirit of general cooperation among the teachers.

I have given the usual tests, and have had the usual consultation with individual teachers with a view of providing for the special needs of each individual pupil. Those who have the every day care of the school know that we have constantly occurring problems and are on the watch for the correct solution.

The start made during last summer and continued to some extent since, on needed plans for a sanitary school building, which shall appeal only to the best in pupils, has had good results. There is no concrete floor now which cannot be washed, no room regularly too cold, no school desk unsightly. But further steps can be taken. It is increasingly evident that a considerable part of the wear and tear comes from the use of the building by the public, and that this can be repaired only at unusual expense. Kitchen, dining room, toilets, wardrobes, all demand more attention if we are not to subject the pupils to the occasional and, of

course, unintentional bad example of untidiness or of misuse of furniture. Your present study of this problem will undoubtedly lead to a happy result.

Many people cooperate in the making of a good school, and I take this opportunity to express to them my thanks and those of the teachers for this cooperation.
