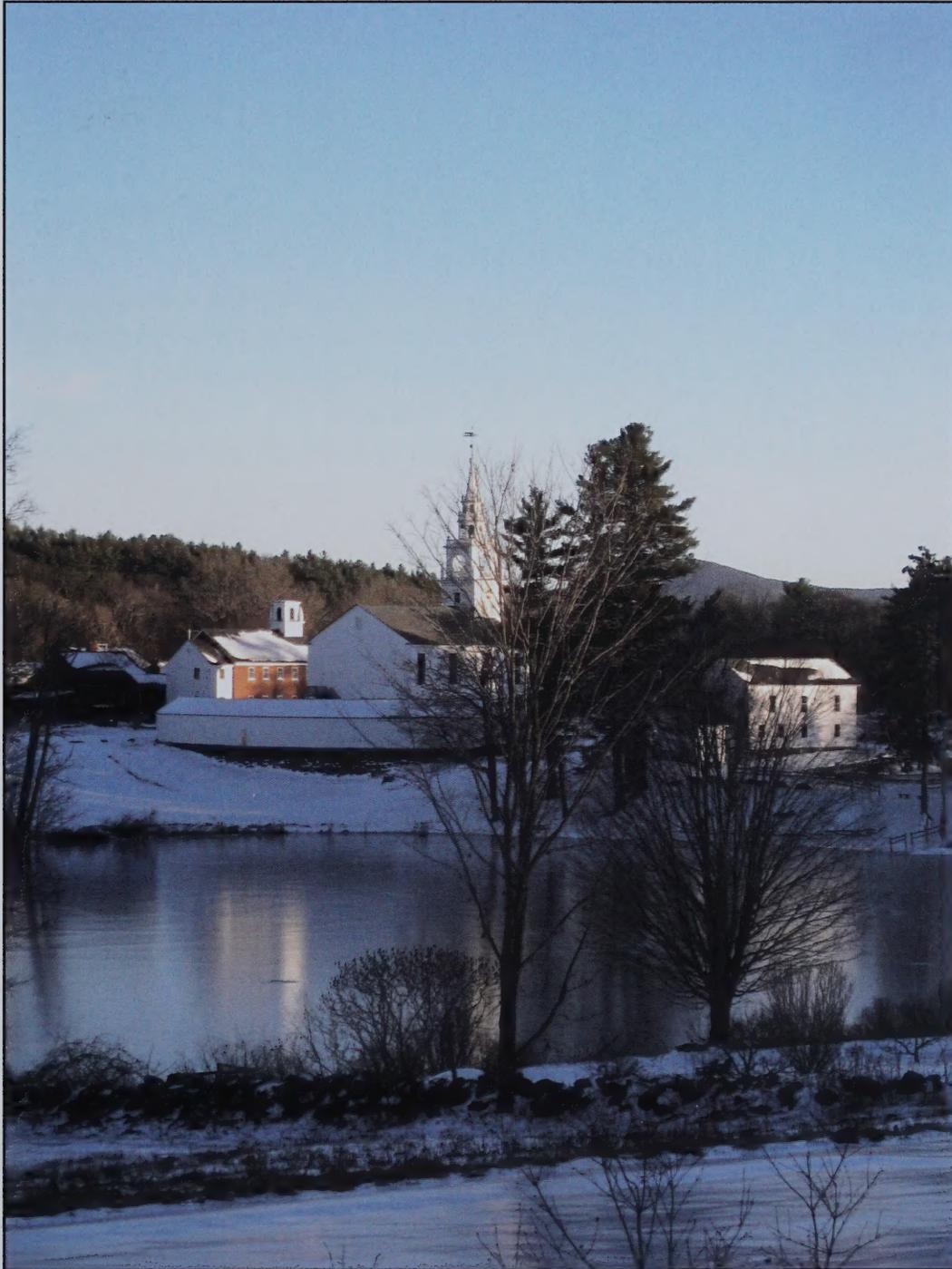

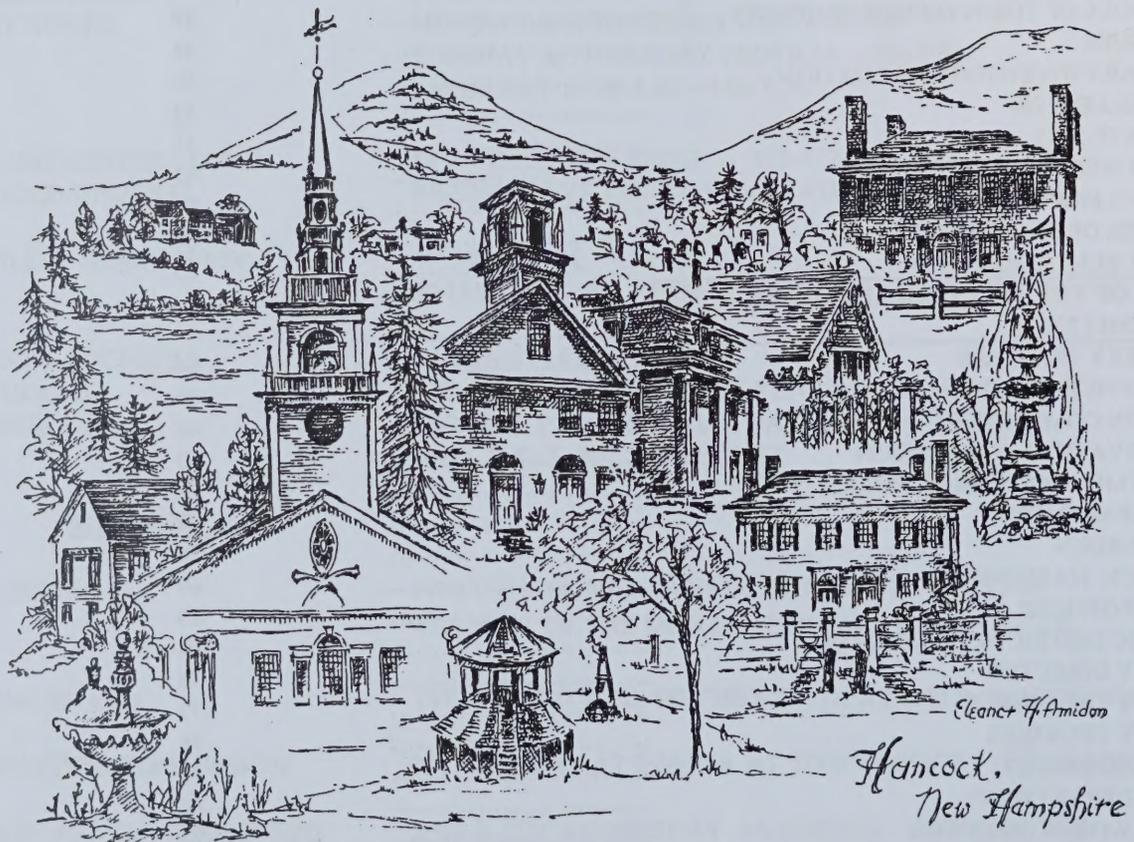

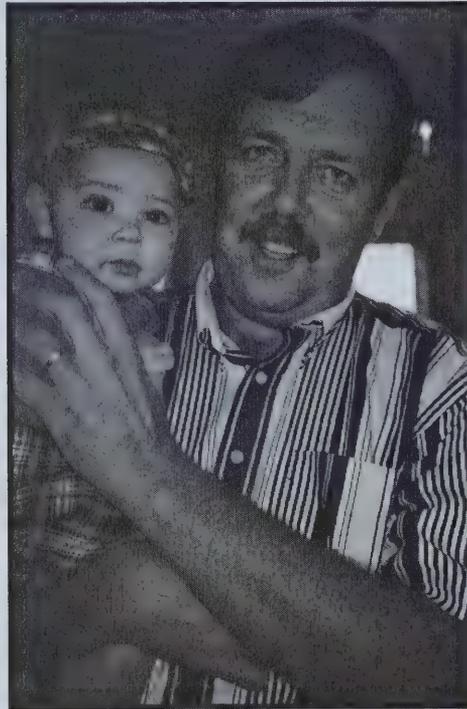

## IN MEMORIAM

Edward J. Coughlan, Jr.  
January 29<sup>th</sup>, 1947 – February 13<sup>th</sup>, 2015



Edward J. Coughlan, Jr. (Ed) passed away at home on February 13<sup>th</sup>, 2015. Ed was a lifelong resident of the area, attending local schools and raising his children in Hancock. He was in the U.S. Army serving in the Viet Nam War and was awarded multiple medals including the National Defense Service Medal. He graduated from the 35<sup>th</sup> class of the NH Police Academy in 1977 then served as Hancock's Police Chief for 22 years. He served on the Select Board for three years and was a Deputy Fire Warden for many years. After his retirement, he worked at the Hancock Market and later at Roy's Market in Peterborough.

Ed was a star basketball and baseball player in high school and carried on his love of sports by coaching and umpiring baseball and basketball, including Little League and All Star teams. He coached and mentored hundreds of Hancock and Peterborough kids over the years.

Ed will always be remembered for always looking out for the welfare of the people in the community, his devotion and integrity to the town as Police Chief and for his kindness, compassion and quirky sense of humor and as a good friend to all who knew him.

## IN MEMORIAM

Richard E .Amidon  
November 16<sup>th</sup>, 1927 – October 30<sup>th</sup>, 2015



Richard E. “Dick” Amidon passed away on October 30<sup>th</sup>, 2015. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II. Richard also served as a Representative to the New Hampshire House, as well as the director of the Office of Legislative Services. He later served as Chief of Staff for the Speaker of the New Hampshire House.

Richard was active in the Hancock community, serving on the Select Board and town moderator for many years. He served on the Hancock Fire Department for 16 years and was also instrumental in preserving Hancock’s historic railroad depot and the adjacent Camp Guild property. He also served on the building committee for Conval High School, was a trustee of the Peterborough Savings Bank, and volunteered for Habitat for Humanity. He is also remembered for being a founding member of Hancock’s Jug Band which entertained the town for many years.

He was always ready to help his family, friends, neighbors and community in any way possible and his contributions to the community will not be forgotten.

## **NOTICE**

If you own real estate lots that were involuntarily merged by municipal action, you may be able to have those lots restored to their pre-merger status.

You may qualify if two or more lots were merged for zoning, assessing, or taxation purposes and the merger occurred:

- During your ownership, without your consent; or
- Prior to your ownership, if no previous owner consented to the merger.

**To restore your property to pre-merger status, you must:**

- Make a request to the local governing body no later than December 31, 2016

**Once restored:**

- Your properties will once again become separate lots; however, they must still conform to applicable land use ordinances. Restoration does not cure non-conformity.

**This notice must be:**

- Posted continuously in a public place from January 1, 2012 until December 31, 2016 and
- Published in the 2011 through 2015 Annual Report

## REPORT OF THE SELECT BOARD

The year 2015 has passed and much has been accomplished in Hancock. Front and center, our Meeting House Restoration project transitioned from a planned implementation stage to a reality. After a 31 year hiatus, it became the venue once again commencing with the 2015 Town Meeting. With pledged donations exceeding \$306,000 through the Hancock Improvement Association (HIA), the tax payer burden has been significantly reduced. Additional Window Preservation efforts totaling \$82,886 took place with the successful award of a Land & Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) grant (\$69,267.00), HIA Capital Campaign Grant (\$16,464) and a grant (\$4,930) from Citizens Bank/Grant Foundation. Other local donations supported improvements ranging from enhanced telecommunication capabilities to the hanging of a historic theater curtain backdrop. Much gratitude and thanks goes out to the team(s) and their diligent work that made this possible.

Hancock became more *Digitally Orientated* with innovations and upgrades to our town website: [www.hancock.org](http://www.hancock.org). Spearheaded by long time webmaster Nahida Sherman, we transitioned from a "home-based" operation to a commercially hosted product that serves as our primary communication platform for public information. Our new Tax Collector, Ann Charbonneau, helped us implement the Tax Kiosk that not only provides on-line tax information, but for the first time allows residents to pay their taxes electronically by ACH or credit card.

Prudent tax supported capital investments in infrastructure projects and equipment purchases continued to keep our town resources and assets at a maintenance level we have come to expect. Warrant Articles supported the replacement of our aging Dump/Plow Truck, replacement of our deteriorated Salt & Sand Pole Barn, and the upgrade of our Firehouse driveway/parking lot. Additionally winter safety drainage issues along Main Street were addressed.

Norway Pond was a focus of our attention for a time with efforts to preserve town based summer recreation activities. Geese mitigation efforts ranging from deploying predator decoys to passing a Town Ordinance on the PROHIBITION OF AQUATIC BIRD FEEDING were enacted. A brief closure of the pond for swimming activities occurred when we experienced a *cyanobacteria* bloom. Future efforts will be explored to ensure that this resource remains a viable asset to our community.

The Nubanusit Boat landing was upgraded to a concrete ramp structure this fall making the town managed public access to this local treasure both safe and functional for residents and visitors alike.

Public safety resources were sublimated with the Selectboard approving the hiring and training of Hancock's newest part-time police officer: Shane (Joey) Sweeney.

VOLUNTEERING continues to be a great way to give back to our community and build social relationships with our fellow residents. Many of our strengths and achievements have come about through volunteering efforts. Our sincere appreciation goes out to the many volunteers who make Hancock the wonderful community it is. ## SUMMARY OF 2015 TOWN MEETING MINUTES

**ARTICLE 1:** Town officers were elected by ballot on March 10th, 2015. Moderator Haskins read the results of the March 10th, 2015 election.

**ARTICLE 2:** Voted by **VOICE** to see if the Town of Hancock would vote to raise and appropriate up to two million seventy six thousand three hundred sixty one dollars (\$2,076,361.00) which represents the operating budget inclusive of the Water Department operations. The Article **PASSED** unanimously.

**ARTICLE 3:** Voted by **VOICE** vote to see if the Town of Hancock would vote to raise and appropriate up to ninety thousand four hundred and seven dollars (\$90,407.00) for the purpose of repair and restoration of the Meetinghouse windows. This amount is to be offset by grants and no amount to be raised by taxation. The Article **PASSED** unanimously.

**ARTICLE 4:** Voted by **VOICE** vote to see if the Town of Hancock would vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a six year lease agreement in the amount of up to one hundred fifty five thousand dollars (\$155,000.00) for the purpose of leasing a 6-wheel dump truck to replace the 2005 International 6-wheel dump truck and to raise and appropriate the sum up to twenty nine thousand dollars (\$29,000.00) for the first year's payment for that purpose. This amount to be offset by unassigned fund balance and no amount to be raised by taxation. The Article **PASSED** unanimously.

**ARTICLE 5:** Voted by **VOICE** vote to see if the Town of Hancock would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty three thousand nine hundred dollars (\$23,900.00) for the purpose of paving and repairing the Hancock Fire Station parking and driveway area. This amount is to be offset by unassigned fund balance and no amount to be raised by taxation. The Article **PASSED** unanimously.

**ARTICLE 6:** Voted by **VOICE** vote to see if the Town of Hancock would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000.00) for the purpose of replacing the pole barn structure for storage of salt and sand. This amount is to be offset by unassigned fund balance and no amount to be raised by taxation. The Article **PASSED** unanimously.

**ARTICLE 7:** Voted by **VOICE** vote to see if the Town of Hancock would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for the purpose of adjustments and repairs to the drainage along the parking areas on Main Street in front of the Hancock Library and the Hancock Inn. This amount to be offset by unassigned fund balance and no amount to be raised by taxation. The Article **PASSED** unanimously.

**ARTICLE 8:** Voted by **VOICE** vote to see if the Town of Hancock would raise and

Appropriate the sum of up to two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) for the purpose of funding a fireworks display on or about July 6<sup>th</sup>, 2015. This amount to be offset by unassigned fund balance and no amount to be raised by taxation. The Article **PASSED** unanimously.

**ARTICLE 9:** Voted by **VOICE** vote to see if the Town of Hancock would raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for the purpose of funding The Grapevine Family & Community Resource Center programs and services for the people of Antrim, Hancock, Bennington, and Frankestown. This amount represents the Town of Hancock's portion of the funds needed to support the Grapevine, a nonprofit service organization. The Article **PASSED** unanimously.

**ARTICLE 10:** Voted by **VOICE** vote to see if the Town of Hancock would raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) to be added to the Meetinghouse Capital Reserve Fund previously established in 2010. The Article **PASSED** by majority vote.

**ARTICLE 11:** Voted by **VOICE** vote to see if the Town of Hancock would raise and appropriate ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the Bridge Capital Reserve Fund previously established in 2007. The Article **PASSED** unanimously.

**ARTICLE 12:** Voted by **VOICE** vote to see if the Town of Hancock would vote to raise and appropriate up to six hundred twenty nine dollars (\$629.00) for the purpose of purchasing baseball equipment and doing maintenance and repairs to the ball fields with said funds to come from the Baseball Special Revenue Fund established in 2007. The Article **PASSED** unanimously.

**ARTICLE 13:** Voted by **VOICE** vote to see if the Town of Hancock would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand eighty-one dollars (\$3,081.00) for the purpose of repairs and replacement of recreational facilities with said funds to come from the Hancock Recreation Special Revenue Fund established in 1993. Shall the town MODIFY the provisions of RSA 72:39-a for elderly exemption from property tax in the Town of Hancock, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$35,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$47,500; for a person 80 years of age or older \$75,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 3 consecutive years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married to each other for at least 5 consecutive years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$22,500 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$31,000; and own net assets not in excess of \$53,000 excluding the value of the person's residence and residential real estate not in excess of 4 acres. (Majority vote required)

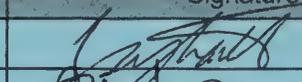
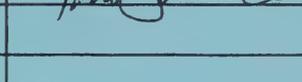

### ***Report on the Financial Statements***

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Hancock as of and for the year ended December 31, 2014, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

### ***Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements***

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### ***Auditor's Responsibility***

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Town's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our adverse and unmodified audit opinions.

### ***Basis for Adverse Opinion on Governmental Activities***

As discussed in Note 20 to the financial statements, management has not recorded the long-term costs of retirement health care costs and obligations for other postemployment benefits in the governmental activities. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that those costs be recorded, which would increase the liabilities, decrease the net position and increase the expenses of the governmental activities. The amount by which this departure would affect the liabilities, net position, and expenses on the governmental activities is not readily determinable.

### ***Adverse Opinion***

In our opinion, because of the significance of the matter described in the "Basis for Adverse Opinion on Governmental Activities" paragraph, the financial statements referred to above do not present fairly the financial position of the government-wide financial statements of the Town of Hancock, as of December 31, 2014, or the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Hancock, as of December 31, 2014, and the respective changes in financial position and the respective budgetary comparisons for the general fund, water fund, and capital project fund, for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

*Other Matters*

**Required Supplementary Information** - Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Management's Discussion and Analysis (pages 3 through 9) be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

**Other Information** - Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Hancock's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund financial schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The combining and individual fund financial schedules are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial schedules are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

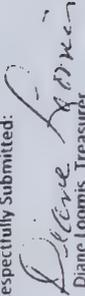

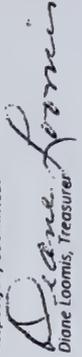

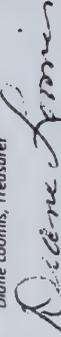

You may also subscribe to e-billing via the website, emailing or calling me.

My office hours are Mondays from 3:30 PM to 6:30 PM, or by appointment. I schedule additional office hours during the two tax billing months, which will be posted on the town website and on the issued bill.

Please free to call or e-mail me at any time with questions or concerns relative to the payment and collection of property, timber yield, current use change, and excavation taxes. General information related to property taxes is posted on the town website for your convenience.

The 2015 property tax rate set by the Department of Revenue was apportioned as follows:

Our town sends out bills semi-annually; the first bill is typically due July 1 and the second bill is due December 1 to cover the tax fiscal year of April 1 – March 31. The first property tax bill is an estimated bill based on the previous year's tax rate. The second bill generated is based on the new tax rate set by the Department of Revenue in the fall. This new rate is applied to the current assessed value of your property as of April 1<sup>st</sup>.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

In 2015 the trust funds for the town maintained their value along with the average stock market trends. For the year, the combined performance for the Common Funds and the Expendable Funds was just under 1% reflecting a difficult year for investments. By statute the Capital Reserve Funds must be invested in short term cash resulting in a minimal return.

The conservative investment asset allocation of approximately 40% equities and 60% bonds and cash should insure that two long standing goals will be met over time; the portfolio value will fluctuate less than the overall stock market and the portfolio will provide stable long-term income for the beneficiaries of the trust funds.

The request for distribution from the funds have been fairly consistent this year as in the past several years. The elementary school, library, cemeteries and fire department are the main beneficiaries of the trust funds each year. The Hancock Elementary School requested funds for the annual New Hampshire Dance Institute program that benefits students in all grades. The school trust funds supported the year end school trip and transportation costs to the Montshire Museum. The Library requested their monthly withdrawal from the trust funds to help offset operating expenses while the cemetery trust funds once again supported the annual maintenance cost of the cemeteries. The Thomas and Eleanor Manning Scholarship granted \$700 to a student pursuing a post-secondary educational career as defined by the bequest.

The Fire Department used money from the Helen Brown Funds to purchase four sets of turnout gear (helmet, coat, pants, boots) as part of the ongoing process to keep the firefighters in safe, updated turnout gear. The largest purchase by the fund in many years was for a new ZOLL 12-lead heart monitor. This unit is the same as those used by the Peterborough Fire Department ambulance and is capable of wireless data transmission directly to the ambulance or the hospital. By using the Helen Brown Funds to purchase replacement safety gear as well as other needed equipment these recurring costs do not affect the town tax rate.

The Fireworks Capital Reserve Fund was used to complement funding of the annual fireworks display at Norway Pond. The Concert Capital Reserve Fund also helped to fund a small portion of the summer bandstand concert series.

Hancock residents have been generous in the past by making bequests to the town for the benefit of the town and its residents. Without the support of the trust funds either taxes would be higher or certain needs would go unanswered.

The trustees would like to thank the Selectboard, the Town Office staff as well as the other boards, commissioners and town departments for the cooperative way that all decisions regarding these funds are reached every year.

## REPORT OF THE HANCOCK CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Town of Hancock's Conservation Commission is a dedicated group of active volunteers whose responsibilities include the managing of the town's Natural Resources Inventory, monitoring conservation easements, and reviewing wetland and timber permits. These and all other additional duties assigned by the board of selectmen or required by RSA 36-A are the work of the commission.

In 2015, the commission continued to monitor the periodic water quality testing of Norway Pond. The Conservation Commission's annual budget includes the fees to cover these important costs, ensuring the health of the pond. The budget also includes an annual contribution to the Nubanusit Lake Host Program. The program inspects each boat before launching into the lake. The lake host personnel have been trained to detect aquatic invasive species. With the new boat launch in place, it's inevitable that we will see increased boat traffic in the future.

Once again, the commission sponsored the annual roadside cleanup coinciding with Earth Day in April. We are always grateful to see young and old alike join us for this event and enthusiastically rummage the roads for the most interesting trash. Fiddleheads donated cakes to the top-prize winners and the Hancock Market supplied ice cream treats.

Looking ahead, the commission will continue its work on updating the Natural Resource Inventory. The commission's greatest interest is to engage townspeople to enjoy and use the large amount of diverse conserved acreage in town.

The Conservation Commission has seen a number of committed volunteers contribute to the ongoing work of the Commission and conservation in Hancock. This year, the commission says goodbye to David Westaway. David has served the commission for two terms and contributed to the ongoing business of the commission and enjoyed trail maintenance. His craftsmanship provided the birdhouses in Kepner Meadow that will be enjoyed by townspeople and birds alike. Thank you, David.

## REPORT OF THE HANCOCK CEMETERY TRUSTEES

This past year will be remembered by the Trustees as the year of the tour.

When we were approached by Bobbie Nylander of the Historical Society to consider conducting a tour of Pine Ridge Cemetery on May 16<sup>th</sup>, we were both excited and nervous. Since this was a first for Hancock, we had no idea where to begin or what to expect. However, with Bobbie's guidance and "The Book of Inscriptions on Gravestones in the Old Cemetery" along with Hayward's "The History of Hancock 1764-1869", we soon had a good handle on how to proceed. We also had plenty of help in getting Pine Ridge ready to be seen. Kurt's crew did an excellent clean-up of the winter debris, and the veterans volunteered to replace all the flags on the graves of the veterans much sooner than usual. A hats off again to all that helped out.

On the day of the tour, we had a gathering of more than 70 people including our former Chairman of the Trustees, Jarvis Coffin, Sr. Although confined to a wheelchair, Jarvis Coffin, Jr. and a host of volunteers made sure that our former Chairman participated fully in the tour. Most inspirational.

We visited 28 graves on this spring day and talked about some tragedies, unique events, and learned about our veterans who fought in the French and Indian Wars, the Revolution, the War of 1812, and the Civil War. We also learned about those that first settled here and those that helped Hancock grow into the wonderful place it is today. A day to remember by all who attended.

One of the off shoots of the tour was a realization that we should take a look at the inscriptions on the gravestones in Norway Plain Cemetery. This plot of land was put to use as a cemetery in 1872 and has a good number of early settlers and soldiers buried there whose gravestones are fading with time. We hope to tackle this project in 2016. If you'd like to help out, please get in touch.

In June, Ken Chester vacated his position as a Cemetery Trustee to move up to Lancaster in the White Mountains along with his wife Heidi to enjoy that part of N.H. Ken will be missed since he had such a vast wealth of knowledge regarding all things historical. Plus he is a really good guy. However, we were very fortunate that another good guy, Dennis Rossiter, volunteered to take Ken's place. Consequently, we have not missed a beat. However, Dennis will also be leaving after the upcoming Town Meeting to deal with a family member who needs his help so we will be looking for an able replacement for Dennis.

Other issues that took place this past year include the continuing battle with the grubs that caused the turkeys to invade Pine Ridge Cemetery in 2014 and to a lesser degree, Norway Plain Cemetery, ripping up the grass and making a mess. We are on a long-term care plan that includes exterminating the grubs and reseeded the patchy areas and so far the results are encouraging.

We received an offer from a Hancock couple that wanted to donate 2 ornamental granite cranes to the cemeteries. After much deliberation and discussion we decided they were just not appropriate for inclusion. Only annual or perennial in ground plantings are acceptable. All objectionable decorations will be removed without notice. The clean, neat, uncluttered look of the cemeteries is paramount.

Due to the grub problem we faced in 2014, we had to put off repairs to the gravestones in Pine Ridge until this year. We are glad to say that John Kaufhold of Peterborough Marble and Granite Works has repaired the majority of the stones and will repair the few remaining stones this year. We were also planning on removing the remaining threatening pine trees along Route 123 in 2015 but have held off until sometime this winter.

During the course of the past summer, you may have noticed some fellows in uniforms working in the cemeteries doing clean up and general maintenance work. Kurt is utilizing the Hillsborough Department of Corrections work crew again and it seems to be going quite well. So much so that they will be back again in 2016 with an expanded schedule.

2015 produced the following: 2 full interments and 14 cremation interments. We sold 11 full interment plots and 0 cremation plots. Also, as it has been for the past 15 years, we have not used any town tax money for the care and maintenance of the cemeteries and we finished the year under budget to boot.

## REPORT OF THE CODE OFFICER

Once again, please number your house, mailbox, or a post at the end of your driveway.

As you can see by the figures below, this year was twice as busy as last year, and projects governed by permits have increased property values by over two and a half million dollars.

Photo voltaic arrays (PVA's), more commonly known as solar power, were a large part of my inspection job this year and quite a learning curve for me. I have attended classes dealing with their installation, which have been helpful, but I find the informal hands-on instruction by installers to be of greater value.

The functioning of PVA's is interesting, but as always, my main concern is the safety of the homeowner and any technical or emergency personnel who may have to come in contact with the array. To that end, I attended a class on January 13th, which was sponsored by the N.H. Building Officials' Association of which I am a member and was presented by a structural engineer who is the owner of Emanuel Engineering Company. It dealt mainly with the structure of the roof on which a PVA is to be erected. Many of the houses or out buildings being suggested for PVA's were built long before there were building codes and are not suitable for use as solar platforms. As it stands now, there is the probability that I will require an inspection by a structural engineer before I issue a permit. This step will protect everyone concerned with the project.

The engineer who presented the class suggested that, since the life of a PVA and an asphalt roof are approximately the same, the homeowner should consider new shingles at the same time the PVA is installed. The cost of removing a PVA in order to replace shingles adds a great deal to the cost, as you might imagine. If the roof and the PVA wear out at the same time, the homeowner could kill two birds with one very large stone.

If you have questions, please do not hesitate to call me. The answer might not be on the tip of my tongue, but I promise I'll get back to you A.S.A.P.

As always, I'd like to thank the tradesmen and women I work with for their cooperation and instruction and the town staff, especially Linda, Diane and Kurt for their help and their collective sense of humor.

It has been a quiet year for the Common Commission. We meet every other month on the third Thursday until further notice.

Our job, for the most part, is to oversee everything growing and green that enhance the beauty of Main Street and the common.

Again this past year we walked Main Street with Jonathan Nute, our Hillsborough County forester, and Dan Tremblay of Broad Oak Tree and Shrub Care. They evaluated each tree for general health, pruning, mulching or removal and made recommendations going forward.

It's been 5 years since many trees were planted as part of the street redevelopment project. Most have done well; Jonathan and Dan made recommendations on pruning of these trees to establish their shape and form into maturity.

We have a good variety of crab apple, hornbeam, zelkova, ginko, linden, red maple, sugar maple, Norway maple, red oak, pin oak, and hawthorn.

We have a fertilizer program for the lawn on the common. Portions of the lawn around the bandstand were doing poorly by fall and will need special attention in spring.

A Rose of Sharon tree donated by Nancy Driscoll in memory of her father has been planted near the millstone on the Dublin Rd. side of Town Hall.

We always welcome donations in memory of or in honor of loved ones.

The Common Commission and Hancock Woman's Club share the cost of flowers for the post office window boxes, raised bed and horse trough in spring...for pumpkins in the fall and winter decorating. Members of Hancock Woman's Club are responsible for all selection and care.

We're grateful to Kurt and his town employees for all they do and to those, as well, who remain anonymous contributing to the beauty of our common and Main Street in all seasons.

## REPORT OF THE PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR

2015 was a year of maintenance for the DPW department. We had a few smaller projects, but overall we spent some time catching up on shoulder work, gravel replacement and brush cutting. Many people have commented on the brutal winter of 2015, we tended to think it was real intense 6-8 week period. We only logged 14 real storms for 2015, but 12 of them came in January and February.

Once we broke out of the winter the spring seemed to drag on, not really getting here until May this year. We began sweeping in mid-April, but we were not able to get into full grading mode until late April, early May. In May the grass started growing again, and we spent about 32 hours a week mowing the lawns and ballfields. We also screened our winter sand and made some repairs to culverts and catch basins that had been damaged over the winter.

In early June we began the replacement of the Fire Station driveway. We excavated the old material, installed some stabilization fabric and new gravel. We also added some drainage to help keep the water and ice away from the front of the building.

We spent time this summer installing more drainage pipe and basins along the side of Evergreen Hill Road. We were able to utilize FEMA funds to complete this project during 2015.

July, August and most of September were spent on summer maintenance projects. We applied over 2500 yards of gravel to some of our gravel roads. We continue to work on our 10 year graveling program each year. We applied chip Seal to portions of Old Dublin Road and Norway Hill Road. We applied asphalt shim to sections of Prospect Hill Road, Norway Hill Road and Jaquith Road. Later in September we applied sand seal on portions of Norway Hill Road and Carriage Hill Road.

In July we made some adjustments to the drainage along Main Street in front of the Inn. We are experimenting with a porous pavement to aid in draining that area during the wet months. Porous pavement is only viable until the pores fill, so we will be watching closely to see what type of longevity we can anticipate. In September we took delivery of our new 6 wheel dump truck; we were able to sell the old truck in late December. In late October we were able to install the much awaited boat ramp at Lake Nubanusit. After all the hoops that NH DES and NH Fish and Game made us jump through (and added a significant cost) not one agency official has stopped or commented. Maybe someday our state agencies will again become helpful instead of creating roadblocks.

October and November were spent getting ready for another New England winter, only to be surprised by an unusually warm December. The warm spell allowed us to get a jump on some ditch work for 2016. We spent a little over a week on Antrim Road, the section from Birch to the Antrim town line. This road gets a tremendous amount of summer traffic and has not been touched in years. We were scheduled for re-graveling in 2016, but we needed to make drainage and safety improvements before we added the gravel. We still have a quaint country road, we just have some improved drainage and a little more width to work with.

During the year we also assisted the water department with hydrant flushing, water breaks and daily operations. We also assisted the Cemetery with 2 full interments and 14 cremation interments.

Our Building and Grounds continue to work gathering data and getting our fixed assets onto maintenance schedules and timelines for capitol repairs. This allows us to manage our buildings with as much preventive maintenance as possible, in the hopes of extending the useful life of the major components.

Funding continues to be an ongoing challenge. State Aid to Highways, through block grants and bridge aid, is still below inflation adjusted historical amounts. Even after increasing the gas tax, the state continues to cut these programs to local municipalities. In 2002, we received \$75,500 in highway Block grant, adjusted for inflation that would have been the equivalent of \$99,500 in 2015. In 2016 we are only slated to receive roughly \$84,250. We have not kept pace with inflation, and we were hit hard during the oil run up of the last several years. As we continue to adjust we know we are not getting the longevity we would like, but we seem to be holding our own for now.

We really don't even want to talk about bridge aid, but we need to. In the 2014 state budget there was 12 million dollars for bridge aid funding, a 100% increase (as promised if the gas tax were to be passed). In the 2015 budget the bridge aid funding was reduced back to 6 million dollars by the Governor and approved by the house and Senate (how short the memories are). How does that affect you? Glad you asked. ☺

The bridge over Moose Brook at Longview Road is our last red listed bridge. We did some preliminary engineering in 2014 to determine the best replacement strategy. The replacement cost (in today's dollars) is around \$500,000. With the lack of increased funding, the earliest we can see the state's 80% share of that cost (\$400,000) is around 2026. That bridge will not last that long! We will be faced with spending around \$40,000 just to perform repairs to get the bridge to last until 2026, or we will need to spend the \$500,000 on our own. When you see your state representatives tell them to quit downshifting costs on the town, we can't afford it any more. OK, Rant over.....

I would like to thank the Town Office staff, the Police, and Fire Department for their help and assistance throughout the year. I would to thank the Selectboard for their guidance and support and especially the townspeople for the continued support throughout the year. I want to personally thank my staff for their professionalism and dedication to the Town of Hancock. I cannot stress enough how dedicated employees are the main reason we can continue to operate efficiently and as productively as we do.

## REPORT OF THE HANCOCK FIRE DEPARTMENT

This past year was a busy one for us – we had over 210 calls, which is a big uptick from our normal call volume. There were at least six First Alarm tones sounded for Hancock in 2015. Thankfully, three of these were relatively minor “smoke in the residence” calls, caused by problems with wood stoves or heaters, and we were able to clear out quickly.

On a very cold night in February (minus 13 degrees) we dealt with a house fire on Knight Farm Road. This was started by a chimney fire that overheated the steel cleanout doors and spread through combustibles to start a basement fire. We were fortunate that a plastic water pipe burst over the fire and acted as a sprinkler until we could get crews downstairs. Despite extensive damage, the house was able to be refurbished.

In April, we dealt with a fire on the roof of a Lake Nubanusit property. We believe that chimney embers landed on piles of pine needles built up in a roof valley and caught the roof and dormer on fire. It can't be fun to own a million dollar house and come home to find a dozen firefighters on your roof, armed with axes, chainsaws and hoses. However, the fire was primarily contained to the exterior, and with some big blue tarps, the house remained habitable.

Later in the summer we had a call that came in as a barn fire on Old Dublin Road. It turned out to be a garage fire, started by a weed-burning torch. By the time we arrived, the building and its contents were mostly on the ground. As I stated in Hancock Happenings, be very careful with any type of torch around combustibles. I won't get into the pros and cons of herbicides for weed control; I got my ass chewed in that issue.

We were happy to have other local fire departments show up on our First Alarm calls to help us out. We paid back to those towns in 2015 by responding to twelve Mutual Aid calls for 1<sup>st</sup> or 2<sup>nd</sup> alarms to Bennington, Dublin, Peterborough, Frankestown and Antrim. Sadly, two of those calls involved a fire fatality. We also had multiple calls for Cover Trucks, to staff a neighboring town's station while they dealt with an incident.

Hancock had its share of odd calls this past year. One guy got his hand stuck in a snow-blower and we had another person blast their car right through the back wall of a garage. Second time in one year..... We had our usual car crashes, thankfully without any serious injuries this year. At least one car went up in flames on Route 202 in March. We bandaged up a young girl from North Carolina with a badly cut foot at the Hancock Inn – I thought we were going to have to bring in a translator to go between our “New Hampsha” and her “Southern” accent. We had our first incident involving the crash of a Jazzy mobility scooter. 2015 was the first time that one of our EMT's has been punched in the face during a call. The police put that inebriated young woman on the ground in a heartbeat.

We had more than our normal amount of “trees and wires down” calls, and quite a few automatic fire alarm calls.

In December, we sent a crew to Keene for their propane emergency that shut down all of the downtown area. Firefighters had to go door-to-door checking gas and carbon monoxide levels

after a failure in the propane pumping station. We put in quite a few hours on that call, but the town will be reimbursed by the propane company.

After the passage of a Town Meeting warrant article in March, the paved aprons on both sides of the fire station were torn up and re-done. Thanks to the DPW for their help with drainage culverts and catch basins, and the new base gravel under the new pavement. In the fall, Glenn Stahl painted new lines on the apron to help back in our big trucks, and would not take any payment.

We took on two new younger members in 2015. Garrett Cassidy and Nicole Whitney joined us in January and rapidly became productive parts of our team. David Small retired this year, as he and Andrea have moved deep into Vermont.

Our three Captains usually run our training sessions. This year, we got to work on cutting up old cars, and had the opportunity to work on drills inside two old houses slated for demolition. There is no better training for members, new and old, then to train inside a building like that.

This winter we put in a state of the art Zoll defibrillator 12 lead heart monitor into service, purchased by the Fire Dept. Association. This is a fantastic diagnostic tool and we have already had occasion to use it.

In closing, I have to extend my thanks to the hard-working and dedicated members of this department. Also Thank You to the Town Office Staff, the Police Department, and the Hancock DPW for their help.

## REPORT OF THE STATE FIRE WARDEN

As you may know, any “outside” fire (not a structure fire or a vehicle fire) is considered the business of the NH Division of Forests and Lands, or the Fire Rangers. Unless there is a significantly large brush fire, they are usually happy to let the local fire departments deal with the situation. Our incident command structure may be a bit different however, as we operate under State Wardens and Deputy Wardens, not Chiefs and Captains. We, and many other towns, have Wardens that are not members of the Fire Department.

We are appreciative of the fact that there have been no man-made brush fires in Hancock for the past several years. However, Mother Nature can stir up trouble – either a wind storm that topples trees onto power lines, or lightning strikes. That was the situation back in August when a lightning storm blew up a dead pine tree on a remote hill and started a good sized fire. We didn’t even know about it for about it for two days, so it had gotten a good start by then. We had to bring our equipment and manpower up to Hayward Road; a class 6 trail that runs between Windy Row and Bonds Corner Road. Then it was a long hike uphill to the fire scene. We got help from multiple other local departments to knock down the worst of the fire, but still had to go back three more times over four days to insure that the fire was totally out. It involved a great deal of hand tool work to get down through the “duff” to find all the last embers. I thank all the members who made the hike and took care of this incident.

Over the year, we also sent crews to brush fires in Stoddard, Antrim and Lyndeborough. We also sent a crew on foot into the woods to deal with the remains of a bonfire on a back road; it turns out we were in Antrim by the time we found it. Antrim owes us one.

If you are planning to burn brush on your property, you need to know the rules. Adequate snow cover on the ground means you do not need a written permit; however we would appreciate a heads-up call. Otherwise, you need to call in for a permit. Sometimes it gets too dry to burn outdoors. This is all regulated by the State; they post the Fire Danger Index every day, Class1 through 5. Burning is only allowed on Class 1 or 2 days. Please don’t ask us to bend these rules. There is more information available on the HFD link on the town website.

Due to a slow housing market and curtailment of building activity, the Planning Board had another very slow year.

During the year, Bobbi Nylander and Mark Stevens resigned. Both had served on the Board for many years and made valuable contributions to its work for which we thank them. Carolyn Boland moved from being an alternate to being a full member and Joe Cummings and Nathaniel Peirce were appointed to the Board as alternates; Joe was later confirmed as a full member.

The Board processed one minor subdivision application and three boundary line adjustments. At the end of the year, a further boundary line adjustment was still pending. It also met with land owners and others to discuss preliminary planning proposals and to advise on questions concerning the application of the zoning ordinance. It also processed one voluntary merger with another pending at year's end.

Throughout the year the Board met on several occasions to deal with administrative matters and to discuss proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

Toward the end of the year, the Board recommended an amendment to the Zoning Ordinance for decision at Town Meeting.

## REPORT OF THE HANCOCK LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Last winter the water line into the library froze solid. We spent a fair amount of time in the library basement trying to figure out how to thaw the pipes. It turned out that nature had the upper hand and the pipes didn't thaw until temperatures moderated. Thanks to Amy's creativity and determination, along with help from the Highway Department, the library continued to operate for about five weeks without any running water. Despite our failure at thawing the pipes, moving through different parts of the basement and following the pipeline was an interesting history lesson in how the library has grown over the years. The original foundation and building built in 1882 – now the upper reading and computer area; the 1925 addition- currently the children's room; the 1988 addition – which houses our adult collections, circulation desk, reading area and Daniels Room. Each of these additions met the needs of a growing and changing community and was made possible largely through donations from individual donors. These donors set a tone of generosity and support for the library that spans 3 centuries. The spirit of generosity embodied in the building has continued as others have included the library in their estate planning and made substantial bequests to the library. The bequests are managed as trust funds and generate about 12% of the operating income for the library.

Some bequests have been made to the town for the benefit of the library and others have been made directly to the library. Bequests to the town for the library's benefit are managed by the town's Trustees of Trust Funds. Funds given directly to the library are overseen by the Library Trustees. For many years the Library Trustees worked with US Trust to manage the funds. This year US Trust informed the trustees that they were no longer managing municipal library accounts and we needed to find a new manager for our account. After interviewing several firms, the trustees selected MillRiver Wealth Advisors from Concord to handle our account. We look forward to working with MillRiver, continuing the responsible investment of our funds in such a manner as to maintain principal and generate income for future projects. We are grateful for those who have made bequests and welcome others to consider continuing this tradition of generous support. It is these investments that will help the library meet the needs of future generations.

Special thanks to Mary Garland who served for ten years as a library trustee. Mary stepped down as trustee this fall and now serves as the library's first Trustee Emeritus. We thank Mary for years of service as trustee and especially appreciated the wisdom and inspiration she brought to many programs, her input on interior design and many hours spent as Treasurer.

This report would not be complete without thanking the staff, volunteers, Friends of the Hancock Town Library, Hancock Women's Club, and individual donors for the many ways they make the library a vibrant and welcoming part of the community. Donations from the Friends provide expanding programming for children and adults, computer software and numerous other services such as museum passes. The Hancock Women's Club provides funding in support of the Summer Reading program. Volunteers help in all ways from maintenance projects to shelving and checking out books. Thanks to you all for helping the Hancock Town Library meet the needs of the community.

## REPORT OF THE HANCOCK LIBRARY DIRECTOR

*"Libraries are the thin red line between civilization and barbarism"*

--Neil Gaiman

2015 has been another busy year for the Hancock Town Library, holding that line between civilization and barbarism for the town of Hancock. But we were up to the task! The Daniels Room was used 134 times by 15 different (non-library) groups serving 1,598 people. The library hosted 41 programs for adults which met 80 times over the course of the year with 1,353 people in attendance. We did even more for the children and teens in town. There were 154 children's programs with 1,593 attending and 7 teen programs with 26 attending. This year 81 children and teens signed up for our Summer Reading Program with great success. Many thanks to the Woman's Club for their generous donation toward a wonderful series of art programs led by Melody Russell during the Summer Reading Program. And in the summer contest between children/teen readers and adult readers, the children and teens eked out a victory reading 1,186 hours to the adult hours of 1,176. The adults want a rematch in 2016.

The library has 1,544 card-carrying members, 80 of which are non-residents who pay a small fee to join our library.

The library owns 19,600 materials with 990 items added to the collection in 2015 and 1,673 weeded.

We circulated 23,457 items in 2015 which includes 1,079 via interlibrary loan (we received 817 from other libraries for Hancock patrons and loaned 262 to other libraries around the state). 575 eBooks, 821 audiobooks, and 52 digital magazines were downloaded by Hancock Town Library patrons through our membership with Overdrive (<http://nh.lib.overdrive.com>). Many thanks to the Friends of the Hancock Town Library for funding this and to the NH State Library for coordinating the consortium for libraries throughout New Hampshire. Hancock Town Library patrons also made use of our online databases; 142 searches were run on Ancestry.com, 9,863 searches on HeritageQuest, and 85 searches on EBSCO.

The continued support of our Friends of the Hancock Town Library made all the difference in what could be offered in 2015. Programming for adults and children, DVDs, audiobooks, technical support, downloadable eBooks and audiobooks, access to databases, the Baby Book Bag service, and the book sale are some of the things the Friends funded this year. Speaking of the book sale, kudos again goes to the spectacular team of Donna Geer and Jane Richards-Jones who lead the army of volunteers who worked on another very successful sale.

A heartfelt thank you to all who volunteer to help the library in so many ways over the course of a year. Whether at the front desk, covering books, serving as a trustee, helping with the book sale, making posters or just doing whatever it is the staff needs done that day, the library couldn't function without you. We are fortunate to have such an active and supportive

community here in Hancock.

Late in 2015 we welcomed Lexy Heatley as a new library trustee. Her experience as an educator and administrator will be put to good use here and we look forward to working with her in the years to come.

Finally, a word about a retiring trustee, Mary Garland served for nine years as library trustee and throughout those nine years has been one of the library's most vocal and enthusiastic supporters. She balanced our books as Treasurer. She attended countless programs, setting up and putting away what must be hundreds of chairs over the years, sometimes hosting the speaker and guests at her lovely home after an event. She spread the word far and wide about our library and the work we do here. In short, she was our ambassador and booster and ball of fire. She is now our Trustee Emeritus and our best patron, in all the meanings of that word. Thank you, Mary for everything.

## REPORT OF THE HANCOCK POLICE DEPARTMENT

It has been a challenging year for the police department. As in other communities throughout New Hampshire, we have seen a significant increase in reported scam calls and attempted fraud. The majority of these scam calls have been targeted toward the older population here in town. Unfortunately, some people have fallen victim to these calls. We have tried to be proactive with these types of reports by putting notices and links on our web page, our Facebook page and in the local newspapers. We encourage people to report these incidents to us as well as take steps in reporting them through the links on our web page.

We continue to partner with Federal, State, County and other local agencies in a united front to fight the criminal activity in our area. Hancock is not immune to these issues. We have investigated significant drug related cases in our community and have made several arrests. During one car stop, the investigation lead to the vehicle being seized, a search warrant was granted for the vehicle and a significant amount of drugs were found in the vehicle. The driver was later arrested and charged with possession with the intent to distribute the drugs. We also assisted in a robbery investigation in Greenfield where a subject entered a house near the town line and held the residents at gunpoint and fled with money. The investigation directed us to a Dublin residence where the suspect lived. The Greenfield and Hancock Police, along with the US Marshalls Fugitive unit raided the residence taking the suspect into custody. It was later determined that the suspect completed a similar crime in Dublin hours before the Greenfield incident. The subject is currently awaiting trial.

We also have worked with our neighboring agencies to assist in solving a multitude of criminal activity. There have been burglary investigations in these towns that have bled over to our community. One such event occurred in April when a fight was reported involving multiple people at a residence on Bennington Road. When our officers arrived, the fight was over. One of the subjects that lived at the residence was wanted in connection to burglaries in Antrim, Bennington and Greenfield. That suspect was taken into custody before being treated at MCH for injuries sustained during the brawl. Three suspects that were involved in the brawl were later arrested in connection to the fight.

In December we received a call from a concerned citizen advising that a brother was suicidal and stuck in the mud at ConVal. The officer notified the Peterborough Police and headed toward the town line. Peterborough Police requested assistance for a subject with a handgun. During the interaction, the suspect fired the weapon. After negotiating with the man, he was separated from the gun at which time he began a physical altercation and wrestled with the Peterborough officers. Our officers were able to assist and Taser the suspect allowing him to be taken into custody and arrested.

We also investigated a significant burglary at a residence in town. Officers processed the scene and interviewed the residence. The extent of the burglary was in excess of \$10,000. The case is still under investigation.

Our efforts to engage the community continue to prove successful. We have had great success with the children and building a bond with them. We have opened the Police Department up on Halloween giving away candy and glow sticks. We visit HES frequently and have had several classes visit us at the police department where we talk about safety. The children seem to enjoy climbing through the police cruisers, working the lights and sirens. It gets a lot of attention on Main Street when the sirens are sounding for a time but the kids love it.

We added Joey Sweeney as a part-time officer in July. Joey grew up in Peterborough. His grandparents live here in Hancock. Joey was a ConVal intern with us a few years ago. He went on to earn an Associate's Degree in Criminal Justice while continuing to run his own landscaping business. Joey has also move into Hancock and is now a resident.

Our staff has attended a multitude of training throughout the year. I have been certified as a National Child Passenger Safety Technician. This will allow me to inspect child safety seat installation and educate parents on the proper use and installation of these seats as well as assist with making the safest choice for seats. Officer Shea attended several instructor programs to include becoming an instructor to train officers on how to deal with an event of an "Active Shooter". These events could take place in a multitude of facilities or camps and we want to be proactive. Ashley, our Administrative Assistant, continues to be very proficient. She has received certification with the State Police as a State Police Online Terminal (SPOTS) operator. She has been tasked with completing press reports, completing pistol permit background checks, making improvements on records management and ordering. She has also been given multiple projects throughout the year.

Our enforcement of traffic laws continues to be a definite influence on the type and amount of criminal activity we see in Hancock. We are very proactive in residential patrols and providing vacant property checks to our residents as well. It is my belief that criminals are less likely to commit criminal activity if there is a strong police presence in the community.

We have been diligent again this year with parking enforcement on Main Street, surrounding areas as well as other areas of town. We have had much success with these efforts and continue to see a significant change in the parking behaviors of drivers.

I would like to thank all of the town employees and department heads for their collegiality that they have shown throughout the entire year. I am very proud of the officers here and thank them for all their hard work. I look forward to the coming year and continued support of the citizens of Hancock.

On March 6, 2015, the new website was officially launched. It was designed and is hosted by Virtual Towns & Schools (VTS) of Boxborough, Massachusetts. It is a professional-looking website which is easy to navigate. User-friendly, it allows Town residents to retrieve any desired information with relative ease. Since its launch, the website has experienced no downtime. When help is needed, the two designated Town representatives receive prompt replies from VTS to any requests they make for modifications, and administrative or operational questions they have, that can only be made by VTS.

VTS's cloud-based solution offers direct access to the website on the Internet by a few Town Officials who are able to continue the timely upload of Town information from any computer. We created web sections for each Town entity, and it is the responsibility of each entity to ensure that its section is up-to-date.

Since the Town switched to the new mail host (GoDaddy.com) at the end of 2012, there have been no disruptions, and no downtime for email service.

In December 2010, based on RSA 91-A (Right-to-Know-Law) authority, the Selectboard approved the Town's Internet website as an official site to post minutes, and meetings and hearing notices in compliance with 91-A Public Meetings and Notices. All minutes, notices, decisions, RFP's, special reports and other documents of the various boards, commissions, committees, trustees and Town of Hancock departments are posted to the website.

In early November 2015, the Webmaster indicated to the Town that she would be relinquishing the webmaster duties at the end of January, 2016. The Webmaster will turn over the reins to the Town Administrator and any personnel designated to handle web section maintenance and uploads.

## REPORT OF THE HANCOCK HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

During the year 2015, the Hancock Historic District Commission deliberated eight applications presented to the Commission for consideration. The Commission's decisions are structured on the basis of current ordinances and stated criteria. The decisions of the Commission are influenced as well by the desire to preserve the overall historic vision of the Historic District while trying to balance what is appropriate and what has the possibility to disrupt that vision. The Commission's deliberations are also guided by best practices as presented in the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the treatment of Historic Properties including preserving, rehabilitation, restoring and reconstruction.

Of the eight applications presented during 2015: five approved projects have been completed; three approved projects have not been completed to date; one application will need to reapply at a later date.

The Hancock Historic District Commission developed, disseminated, and collated a town wide survey. The results will be used to influence projects taken up by the Commission in 2016 in order to increase the knowledge base of residents concerning the work of the Commission. The results will also be used to support decisions made by the Commission as it takes into consideration town residents' overall vision of the town and its Historic District when deliberating applications.

Hancock Historic District Commission survey results showed that 1) the Meetinghouse House, the John Hancock Inn, and the Historical Society rated highest as representing significant elements of the town's cultural, economic, political and architectural history; 2) front doors and surrounding treatments, the fountain, and wooden fences rates highest as examples of unique historic features to be preserved within the village center. A compilation of the survey results is available at the town office.

## REPORT OF THE HANCOCK DUMP COMMITTEE

Our annual trash talk.

2015 saw the slowing of the global economy, and as a result saw the falling prices in our recycling markets. The supplier we have been using for a number of years was not able to sustain the financial pressure and we lost that avenue in 2015. We are continuing to work hard to provide a decent revenue stream for our recyclables and so far we have been successful, but it is a challenging time and it should continue through most of 2016.

In 2015 we collected 345 tons of household trash (compactor) and we processed 232 tons of recyclables. This is a slight drop (48 tons) over the 2014 totals; the entire drop is in the recyclables (50 ton). Overall our recycling rate dropped to 40%. Still a great recycling rate, but down about 3% over last year. We generated about \$24,500 in revenue to offset the cost of operations.

In 2015 we installed a second baler and have that up and running. This has allowed us to process our paper and cardboard faster and more efficiently than we have been able to do in the past. With the loss of Empire recycling we had to re-think how we store our bales and equipment. We repurposed the 2 trailers that were on site and set them on the ground for storage trailers.

We continue to market our recyclables through the Northeast Resource and Recovery Association (NRRRA) but with the changes in the ability to market our items we are also looking to market through Casella Waste. We will continue to strive for the best return for our recyclables as this market goes through another set of changes and fluctuations.

Recycling continues to be our best way to manage out costs at the Transfer Station. For every ton we recycle we are avoiding paying \$95 per ton and we can generate revenue from almost all of our recyclables, which add to the benefits of recycling.

We would like to take this time to thank our employees; they keep this place running smoothly and make the visit to the dump enjoyable. We also need to thank our loyal volunteers at the swap shop; these ladies work hard in the cold of winter and the heat of summer making our swap shop one of the best in the area. The Selectman, Town Office staff and DPW personnel are always ready to support and assist us when needed. And last, but not least, you the customers who continue to support us and our staff throughout the year.

## REPORT OF THE WELFARE OFFICER

In New Hampshire, every town is required to have a welfare officer that is governed by state statute. The basic local welfare duty is described in RSA 165:1. Administering local welfare is a challenging endeavor with applicants seeking financial help with things such as stopping an eviction, keeping the lights and heat on, putting food on the table and many other basic needs. The applicants are required to complete an application form and provide all necessary information needed to make a determination of eligibility that is consistent with the town's welfare guidelines. The application process is very thorough assisted by the applicant's signed release form allowing for verification of the information provided. Any cash, real property and personal property as well as future assets (IRA's, retirement funds etc.) are included in consideration of the application. These assets must be depleted before any assistance is provided. Job searches are also required for those determined able to work. Local guidelines contain a standard of need which is a calculation of what the municipality determines is the actual cost of the basic necessities of life. In this way the needy of the community are assisted according to the law and the welfare budget is prudently managed.

In 2015, a total of \$13,697 was expended for welfare on behalf of qualified applicants. The budgeted figure was \$13,950 so the expenditures were under budget by \$253.00. Continued unemployment and under employment along with increases in fuel and utility costs have contributed to hardships for residents. RSA 165:28 requires that a lien is placed on real estate owned by any applicant covering the amount of any general assistance received when the property is sold. This year, the majority of assistance went towards housing. To apply for help with utility and heating costs, you can call Southern New Hampshire Services at the Peterborough office at 924-2243. For information regarding what other state or local resources are available or to request an application for assistance, you may contact the Town Office.

The Grapevine in Antrim and the River Center in Peterborough offer community members the opportunity of applying for any of the Family Assistance Programs (Food Stamp Benefits, Cash Assistance, Child Care Assistance, and Medical Assistance including Healthy Kids and Medical Coverage for Pregnant Women, Medicare Buy-In) and NH Department of Health and Human Services. NH EASY allows Internet access to trained and certified people at both locations. They will submit completed applications electronically to the Keene District Office along with a faxed or mailed signature page from the applicant. For additional information you can call the Grapevine at 588-2620 or the River Center at 924-6800.

Another initiative led by United Ways of New Hampshire is 2-1-1 NH which is an easy to remember telephone number that connects callers, at no cost, to information about critical health and human services available in their community. Residents in NH can contact 2-1-1 NH toll-free by dialing 2-1-1. This information is also available on our town website by clicking on Emergency Management.

Helping Hands is an important resource for anyone in town who needs assistance, but may not qualify for welfare under the Hancock Welfare Guidelines. The fund expends monies to help Hancock residents with food, rent, fuel oil electricity, repairs, Christmas gifts, medication and other expenses. A special thank you to the Hancock Woman's Guild, the Hancock Woman's Club, and to all of the over very kind donors who have given so generously to the Hancock

Helping Hands Fund during the year. **REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER**

I would like to remind you of the town website under “Emergency Management” for which Jon Grosjean is the Director. Our Webmaster, Nahida has done a wonderful job compiling this website. You will also find many helpful and interesting topics such as “A Citizen’s Guide to Best Practices of the 9-1-1 System”, “Generator Safety”, “211 New Hampshire”, “Lyme Disease”, and information on FEMA relative to preparing for emergencies. The Greater Monadnock Public Health Network (GMPHN) can also be found on the website. GMPHN is now using a free electronic messaging system called Nixle which allows direct communication with people who sign up to receive alerts via text message and/or email. The GMPHN started utilizing Nixle during Hurricane Irene to inform Monadnock residents about flood warnings in the region. They will also send alerts about other conditions in the area such as a tornado warning, public health emergency, shelters open during snow storms, etc.

Water testing kits can be requested at the DES website [www.des.nh.gov](http://www.des.nh.gov). If you have difficulty working the website or don’t have access to a computer, just stop by the office or give me a call and I would be happy to assist you in obtaining a test kit.

Again, I would like to thank the Deputy Health Officer, Charlie Stevenson, for always being cheerfully responsive to any requests that are made of him. We are very fortunate to have his services.
