


William Mudgett Kidder

"MIRROR TO AMERICA"

The title of the second history of New London, "Mirror to America" by Dr. J. Duane Squires, covers the first fifty years of the 20th century in New London. The title is so appropriate, since our town is but a segment of the overall pattern of our nation. Today, fifteen years later, the title is so equally appropriate and descriptive of New London for the year 1964 that we have borrowed "Mirror to America" with Dr. Squires' permission.

1964 brought many "firsts" to our town. It brought new "highs" in home construction; new "lows" in town welfare cases, with necessary aid only slightly over the \$50 salary of the town welfare officer. In our Selectmen's Report this year, we will touch on the highlights of these subjects since you will find detailed information on the various departments elsewhere in this annual report.

Our "firsts" list is headed by a complete re-appraisal of all real estate in New London for tax assessment purposes: followed by our first new church structure to be erected in many years, Saint Andrews, on Gould Road; our first town owned-and-operated bathing beach for the use of all town residents and their guests, Bucklin Beach, on the shore of Little Lake Sunapee. We have our first collective and very worthwhile effort on the part of our high school students to provide a meeting place for young people to gather Friday and Saturday evenings. A group of high school boys and girls formulated their own rules and regulations, their own code of ethics for behavior and discipline and met with the selectmen to request use of the main floor of the town hall. This was readily granted and at no charge for heat, lights or use of the hall. Named "The High Point," the officers of this organization have furnished the hall with tables, sofas,

chairs, some rugs, a ping-pong table, Coke machine, record player and the rest of the things needed by young people to have fun. They do their own janitor work and by mutual arrangement, put the room back to normal when it must be used for town functions. By their own rules, smoking and liquor are barred. Our hats are off to this group for their recognition of the need for just such a meeting place and their judgment in carrying out their plans. 1964 brought our first electrically heated home, our first resident veterinarian, our first contact with the expanded State Highway program with the by-passing of the village of Elkins by Route #11. It brought our first definite knowledge of the proposed location of U. S. Route #89 as it passes through New London. We now own the Town Dump property, rather than lease it as heretofore.

These signs of progress and activity that we read about are happening in our small town just as they are happening all over the country — Mirror to America.

The re-appraisal of all real estate resulted in some surprises, cost us \$10,000 instead of our appropriated \$6,000, and the results have proved the necessity of this move which was voted at the 1963 Town Meeting. We estimated, at that time, 900 parcels to be appraised at an average price of \$6.00 per parcel. The Tax Commission appraisers were unable to do New London until 1964 due to a backlog of towns that had been forced to re-appraise because of their excessive tax rates, and by 1964 the average per parcel cost had risen. Instead of the 900 parcel estimate, we ended up with 1,352 parcels. No land of any appreciable value was discovered that had not been on our tax lists previous to the re-appraisal, which reflects well on the many members of the Board of Selectmen of past years. The increase in the number of parcels resulted from many persons owning more than one piece of property and from the sub-divisions of land that is now assessed as individual lots where such land has been platted. Our total valuations rose from \$4,000,000 to \$22,000,000. This represents the appraisers' opinions of "fair market value" or 100% as contrasted to the so-called "equalized valuation" method under which all town in New Hampshire that are not on the 100% basis must be gauged. There are 222 towns and 13 cities in the State. Numerically, number 1 is the lowest taxing town or city in the state, not in tax rate but in actual tax dollars.

Prior to borrowing to build the new High School, New London was #20 out of the 235 towns and cities. After borrowing, New London rose to #40 . . . still a good position considering our excellent Comprehensive Accredited High School. New London's actual place will not be determined until after the next equalization report by the State Tax Commission. The Commission tells us, however, that our town will definitely be in the lowest fifteen and possibly our number will be below #10 for the entire state.

It should be the aim of the various departments and of the various boards, Library, Cemetery, Sewer, Water, School, and Selectmen to continue to provide the high quality of service that has helped build New London to its present level and still make every effort to avoid waste or extravagance so that our town may continue to enjoy this favorable tax situation. Historically, taxes rise, seldom fall, as services, facilities and populations increase. New London operates under the Municipal Budget Act and the watchful eye of the Town Budget Committee, composed of nine citizen members, one school board member and one selectman member. Our thanks to these civic-minded citizens.

1964 brought a new "high" in construction of private homes. Building permits were issued for 35 residences, compared to 15 the previous year, at an estimated value of \$626,000 exclusive of land. Additions and remodeling of private homes added \$46,000. Three commercial or professional buildings were constructed for an estimated \$41,000, while additions and remodeling of commercial properties amounted to a total of approximately \$105,000. The construction of Saint Andrew's new church with a building estimate

of \$167,000, the addition to the New London Hospital at \$269,000, and Austin dormitory at Colby for \$200,000, all come to the very impressive total of \$1,454,000. This is an increase of over 6% in our total valuations. Of this increase, approximately \$1,000,000 is taxable, with the church and hospital exempt.

Results of the building "boom" are evident as we ride over new streets and see new houses in former hay-fields or wooded areas, new houses on Main Street, Old Main Street, King Hill Road, Elkins Road, Little Lake Sunapee Road, Camp Sunapee Road, in fact all over town. The new roads are constructed according to specifications of the New London Land Sub-division Regulations and water and sewer lines are extended, where necessary, at the expense of the developer, as set forth in these Regulations. We see further evidence in still another addition to Cricenti's Market, the restoration of the exterior of one of the early colonial houses in the center of town and the remodeling of the interior to modern apartments. We see an addition on the F. H. Giddings property, "CrossRoads of Sports" to accommodate unique knitting machines for the production of a particular type sports sweater; we see additions to motels, a new silo, a new swimming pool and cocktail lounge at the Country Club, extensive repair, remodeling and restoration at an old land-mark "Red Gables." the former Frank McCauley property at Pleasant Lake. Groundwork for the continuation of construction in 1965 was laid by the acceptance of plans by Our Lady of Fatima Parish for its new church structure. Property on the west side of Barrett Road was acquired from Miss Mary Barrett and actual construction is anticipated this summer.

Our most obvious addition is to Bucklin Beach. With the gift of 360 feet of shore from Walter S. Bucklin, Esq., and the moving of the state highway by the State, we were able to constructively proceed with our first town bathing beach. Time permitted only the erection of a permanent fence, partial improvement of the beach itself, installation of safety lines and floats bounding the swimming area and

the building of a life-guard stand and other safety factors. With the assistance of the Outing Club, and the Red Cross, we provided lifeguards at all times the gates were open. The Outing Club further provided its excellent series of swimming classes for area children under Red Cross standards, as it has in the past. At the close of the season, work was started on the bath house, dressing room and toilet facilities. This building will be completed before the opening of the 1965 season, a gate attendant will be on duty and windshield stickers will be available at the office of the Town Clerk at Kidder's Garage.

At the suggestion of the Garden Club and with the assistance of Road Agent Henry Stanley and his crew, our town information booth was relocated, and better parking provided for travelers seeking information. The Garden Club then followed through with attractive planting around the building which adds considerably to the center of town. Granite curbing, a new telephone booth, dead tree removal at the "island" in the town parking lot will be followed this year by further planting in which we will have the advice and assistance of the Garden Club. The town acquired the old Scytheville dam in Elkins in 1964 from Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Haves, by gift, and repaired the dam so that once more the mill pond will add to the attractiveness of that area. Our appropriation request this year for care and improvement of such town properties has been raised from \$500 to \$750. With this extra money and with the interest and advice of both the Garden Club and the Men's Division of the Garden Club and the interest and actual work of Henry Stanley and his crew, we hope to continue to beautify our town roadsides.

There will be an article in this year's warrant to see if the town will vote to establish a Town Conservation Commission, as authorized by a 1963 act of the legislature. This commission will consist of not less than three nor more than seven members to be appointed by the selectmen, as provided in the enabling act. The commission may receive gifts of land in the name of the town, or may acquire through purchase, grant, lease or otherwise the fee in such land or water rights, but may not have the power to condemn property for such purposes. The purpose of this act is to permit towns or cities to acquire property to limit the future use or otherwise conserve and properly utilize open spaces and other land and water areas for the general good of the town and the use by the public. We hope that you will consider this article and vote in favor of it. As the town grows, we can foresee a real advantage in having wooded areas for Boy Scout camping and cook-outs, for hunters and nature lovers, old woods roads or open land for trail riding in the hills surrounding us. Perhaps a natural area closer to the expanding center of town could be added. We would lose the taxes on such properties, but carefully administered by a commission of our own citizens, it would seem that the loss of taxes would be a small price to pay for value received. Once land has been developed it it gone forever.

At the 1964 Town Meeting the Selectmen announced two other "firsts," one . . . the necessity of a secretary for the selectmen's office, and another . . . that the 1965 town meeting would not be held in the Town Hall but would be held at night in the school auditorium. Our secretary, Mrs. Maurice Taylor, has proved to be of great value to us and to the state appraisers in compiling the necessary records in connection with the re-appraisal of real estate. She may be reached at the town hall and will be glad to discuss your property records cards with you. The success of the night town meeting will be determined after our meeting on Tuesday, March 9 at 8:00 P.M. Polls will be open, also at the High School auditorium, from 3:00 to 8:00 P.M. Please plan to vote during these hours. It is not practical to permit voting during actual town meeting time, nor practical to permit voting after town meeting, as all of the town officials who must participate in the voting and the counting of the votes will be fully occupied both during and after the meeting. We will all miss the beauty of Whipple Memorial Hall, we will miss the sociability of luncheon provided by the Women's Aid of the Baptist Church, and the memories of the past renewed by the memorial in front of the building, the flags, muskets and tributes to our Servicemen within the hall itself, and the stories of the "old-timers" prompted by their recollection of those bygone days when sawdust covered the floors of the meeting house and when women were not permitted to attend! We will welcome the attendance of many of our citizens whose work prevented them from coming to town meetings during the day. We will probably welcome the extra space, the extra seats and the facilities of the school auditorium that Mr. Livingston and his staff will provide for us. They even hope to provide a loudspeaker for the officials on the platform and one for those of you who wish to speak from the floor.

And so it goes . . . Mirror to America.

REPORT OF THE TRUST FUNDS OF THE TOWN OF NEW LONDON, N. H. ON DECEMBER 31, 1964

There are 248 Cemetery Trust Accounts for the care of individual cemetery lots. Each is invested in a separate Savings Bank Book and earns its own interest. The Principal of these 248 Accounts totals \$22,430.32 and the unspent earnings \$5,601.38, which together make a total of \$28,031.70 in the Cemetery Trust Funds. This makes an average value of \$113.03 for each of the 248 Cemetery Accounts.

The Tracy Memorial Library has the support of four Trust Funds in our care, i.e., The Jane A. Tracy Fund, The Sarah and Elizabeth Brown Trust Fund, The Ann Mary Jelly Trust Fund, and The Kathleen L. Whitcomb Trust Fund, which together contributed a total of \$6,117.88 from their combined principal of \$105,419.26. All Cash Capital Gains from each of these four Trust Funds are deposited in their own Uninvested Savings Account, as received, and the interest earned there is turned over to the Library, as income from that Trust.

The Texas Gulf Sulphur stock, in the Tracy Trust Fund, was sold for a profit during the past year and the proceeds deposited in the Tracy Uninvested Savings Account. During the past year, purchases of new stock and "Rights" were made from Tracy Uninvested Savings, totaling \$677.38.

MUNICIPAL COURT

REPORT FOR 1964

During the twelve months of 1964 the New London Municipal Court heard 226 cases, the second largest number for any one year in its history. The laws governing the operations of Municipal Courts were changed, effective 1 July 1964, and the range of local jurisdiction was much reduced. At the same time the proportion of the distribution of fines as between local and state treasuries was altered, to the advantage of the local treasury.

REPORT OF THE TOWN HEALTH OFFICER

The year 1964 brought an increased number of requests for the services of the Health Officer over those in 1963. The following are examples of the various services performed: Investigation of a highly odoriferous pile of material thought to be illegal septic tank dumpings which turned out to be cow manure; the investigation and destruction of sick raccoons thought possibly to be rabid (the state laboratory report was negative for rabies and the raccoons probably died of a non-human type of hepatitis); investigation of health conditions in homes for state foster children; investigation and consultation on septic system and pollution control problems; collection and testing of water samples from bodies of water in New London as a part of our continuing water pollution control program.

In addition, during the year, regular samples of New London town water have been submitted to the New Hampshire State Department of Public Health Water Testing Laboratory for bacteriological and chemical testing. In one instance the results of these tests necessitated increasing the chlorine content of our water in order to control bacterial contamination. Inspections of food handling establishments have been made with the state inspector. A survey of the Bucklin Beach area was made with the state sanitary engineer and recommendations made as to the most desirable arrangement of facilities (septic tank, drainage field, etc.)

The water testing program for pollution control was hampered somewhat by low water levels in the town brooks this year. However, the testing was continued in Sunapee, Little Sunapee, and Pleasant Lake and with the availability of sufficient funds will be expanded to include all bodies of water in New London. By establishing what the normal levels of pollution are, we shall be in a position to detect and eliminate any future increase in pollution which results from excessive or faulty construction of septic systems as the town continues to expand. For the three years of this program New London's lakes have remained at a relatively high standard of purity for lake waters.

Although there are no State or Town ordinances for minimal standards of septic system size and construction, it is urged that all owners and builders of homes follow the State of New Hampshire recommended standards for such systems. These recommendations include a minimum septic tank size of 900 gallons for a three bedroom house.

We are still hopeful of arranging a clinic for the immunization against rabies of all dogs licensed in New London. The cooperation of all dog owners is urged in order to give our townspeople as much protection as possible should this disease penetrate down to our section of the state.

This is a brief report of some of the activities that your state public health nurse has carried out during the year 1964 within the area in which your town is located.

Home visits were made to all age groups for health supervision, nursing care, referrals, and so forth in each and every town.

Immunization Clinics were held in the towns of Bristol, Franklin, Newbury, Sutton, Salisbury, Wilmot, Grafton, Hill and Northfield. A Chest X-ray Clinic was held in Franklin in February.

A Pre-school Dental Fluoride Clinic was held in Canaan in June. All pre-school children in Grafton were invited to reap the benefits of this clinic.

Your state public health nurse is in her office from 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. Monday through Friday. The telephone number is Franklin 934-2329. Please call or write if any problem arises.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

To the Citizens of New London:

Since the last Town Report, the Planning Board has approved plats outlining the subdivision of land for residential purposes as follows:

Job Seaman's Acres, Audeco Real Estate Co., developer, consisting of 11 lots.

Slope 'n Shore Club, Richard E. Mann, developer, consisting of 21 lots.

In order that our summer residents might participate, two public hearings were held in July on proposed amendments to the Zoning Ordinance. One proposal dealt with a change in the zoning map to rezone the New London shore of Otter Pond and Clark Pond from rural-agricultural to residential in order that they might conform with other lakefront property within the town. The other proposal dealt with giving the Board of Adjustment authority to grant expansion of non-conforming land use when such expansion had been proven to be in keeping with the best interests of the Town. At a subsequent Special Town Meeting in August, both proposals were voted down.

However, the Board is most appreciative of the excellent attendance at the hearings and meeting and of the many ideas derived therefrom.

Much concern has been expressed over the seemingly rapid growth of the town. This concern is partially justified, for the population is increasing at the rate of about 3% per year. Fortunately, due to New London's Zoning Ordinance the growth has proceeded in an orderly manner and should continue to do so. No get-rich-quick developers have invaded our town, nor are they apt to do so as long as we maintain our present restrictions.

Still, New London, like so many towns of similar size and character, is approaching a critical stage. With each increase in population, new problems arise. To name a few: sewage disposal, water supply, building construction or building code with consequent inspection, street maintenance and educational facilities.

With faster and better roads we may or may not have to accelerate our program for solving our future problems. After Route 89 is an established fact we can more accurately forecast our needs. Should those needs be exorbitant we should then recommend the employment of professional planning assistance in revising our zoning map and ordinance. We should also recommend the employment of a Town Manager under supervision of the Selectmen, since the management of town affairs already demands an unreasonable amount of time on the part of our Selectmen.

It was with deep regret that the Board accepted the resignation of James E. Shepard, whose sage counsel and unfailing energy as a planning board member have contributed so much to the well being of the town over so many years.

The chairman also expresses his thanks to members Miss Mary Barrett, Harold Welch, Walton Chadwick and Richard Chatellier for their conscientious and loyal service, together with a special thank you to Irving Dodge, our board secretary, who has done a consistently outstanding job.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

During 1964, the Zoning Board of Adjustment conducted four open hearings on appeals referred to the Board by the Selectmen.

The appeal by Donald Sieburg was heard on May 13, 1964, and concerned his request for a special exception to Art. IX, Sect. C, to enlarge present motel units at the Sun-Dart Motel on Main St., to erect a new sign and to restore full restaurant facilities. The request for additional motel units was returned to the Board of Selectmen as not coming under the authority of the Board of Adjustment, and the request for the erection of a new sign was denied.

A petition was filed for a rehearing by counsel for Austin H. Gibson and Katharine H. Gibson, Susan C. Cleveland and Eva M. Best. The rehearing was held on August 18, 1964. On September 7, 1964, the Board met in executive session and ruled that the permit for dining room facilities be granted as a special exception to the ordinance under Art. VII A instead of a variance.

A request by Benjamin Cushing for a special exception to Art. IX, Sect. H, for the operation of an Antique Shop in their residence on King Hill Rd. was heard on July 8, 1964. The Board approved the request.

On Oct. 20, 1964, a hearing was held to consider the request by Arthur and Ruth Prescott for a special exception and a variance to Art. IX, Sect. C, for the enlargement of restaurant facilities at the Gray House at Crockett's Corner. The request was approved.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2,280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area — 4,350,000 acres is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

- 1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
- 2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
- 3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

INFORMATION BOOTH

REPORT FOR 1964

The Booth was open for the usual nine-week period, a six-day week, from 9 to 5. Business was very slow for the first two weeks, but there was a gradual improvement, and the first ten days of August compared very favorably with the same period in 1963. After that it dropped off sharply, probably due to the weather. For the season as a whole, there was a ten per cent drop in the number of cars over last year's figure. Cars from 30 States and the District of Columbia were listed as 1,473, with passengers listed as 3,997. In addition, there were 12 cars with 35 passengers, listed

from 3 Canadian Provinces. The pedestrians numbered 681, and there were also 6 bicycles, 1 motorcycle, a house trailer and a horse van. We enjoyed chatting with visitors from Sweden, Jamaica, Scotland, England, South America, Australia, and Germany. They all admired the beauty of the area. We received 96 phone calls and made a total of 128 calls, for a variety of needs.

So far as we know, there have been no definite rules laid down as to the management of the booth. We feel that we are there to serve the public, and that seems to cover a wide variety of tasks which we do to the best of our ability. Besides keeping an accurate record of the visitors, our regular duties seem to include keeping the booth and surrounding area free of litter, caring for the window boxes, and keeping the Bulletin board up to date. Extra duties have included finding the parents of lost children, and caring for them while they are there waiting, finding owners of lost dogs, things for people to do or places to go, finding the answers to odd and unusual questions, and even have done traffic duty on occasion. We have also taken care of various things, lost articles, an old lady, laundry, heavy luggage and on one day we stored some musical instruments, including a cello. There have been times when we have been able to render valuable assistance to the telephone operator in locating people who did not have a phone and were needed because of some emergency.

At the end of the summer, the booth was moved to a more desirable location, and attractively landscaped. We have long felt that it was a hazard to traffic coming out of the parking area. Our window boxes were arranged and placed by Mr. Frank Butler as usual, and they were filled with plants through the courtesy of the New London Florists. As usual many people commented on how much they added to the attractive appearance of the building.

TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

ANNUAL REPORT

A summary of the statistics of the Library, though interesting to our staff and patrons, must be brief, and shows an increase over the past year, as follows:

There have been 12,321 visitors.

The new registrations in our borrower's file have shown additions of 106 adult and 46 juvenile names.

The librarians have answered 575 questions, mostly from students, which have covered requests for special books, magazine material and pamphlets. In addition to our own books, we have been able to borrow 613 books from the Extension Division of the State Library and 47 others from the main library for special use. From North Country Film Service we have obtained three films which were shown to 270 children during Book Week. Collections of books for supplementary reading have been loaned to: Wilmot Schools, 593; New London Central School, 1,177; Williams Kindergarten, 22; Sunapee, 22; New London Manor, 16; Colbytown Camp, 10; Fernald Library, 17; and on Inter-library loan, 4.

The library has purchased 216 adult and 112 juvenile books, and 57 more have been received from generous friends. The adult magazines number 56, children's magazines 3, and all of these are available for circulation to everyone. A copy of Webster's third international unabridged dictionary has been bought this past year.

The New London Service Organization has continued its custom of buying military books for their shelves, and this year have added "They Fought Alone" by Keats; "The Death of the Thresher" by Polomar; "The Shaping of a Battle, Gettysburg" by Montgomery; "Airwar Against Hitler's Germany" by Sears.

The second-floor committee room, which is free to all small gatherings, has been in use 38 times this year. The auditorium has been used by the Womans Club, Red Cross, the piano recital of Mrs. Stott's pupils, the Republican Club, the Christmas party for the Confraternity class, the cooperative book-buying group sponsored by the State Library, and for five exhibits.

The Board and Staff have attended the following meetings this year: a book mending class at Contoocook; cooperative book-buying at New London, Andover and East Andover; a Library Development program at Newport; the N. H. Library Association's annual meeting at Concord; and a discussion meeting, "Better Service for Students" at Swanzey.

On each Monday during the school year the librarians, with volunteer helpers from the P.T.A., take book collections to the first six grades at the N. L. Central School. This plan has done much to increase the circulation of children's books and to further the reading program of the children of the town.

Displays and exhibits marked National Library Week in April. A section of the original New London Post Office, a rare lock collection, a post card display of New England libraries, and a flower stamp collection were some of the featured exhibits. Winners of the "Lucky Key" contest were Debra Perkins and Helen Barrett, who were awarded prizes on the last day of the week. About thirty persons attended Open House on Monday and the Bookmobile spent Wednesday afternoon in New London so that children and adults could inspect them and choose a book from their shelves.

A work project was sponsored by the New London Garden Club in observance of Clean-up Week, and the lawns were raked and necessary pruning was done in charge of members of the club. Mrs. Arthur Prescott served refreshments to the workers.

In their glass showcase, mounted in the vestibule of the library, the New London Historical Society has shown pictures of old homes, activities, and scenes of pioneer families, still active in the community, including Todd's, Shepard's, and Messer's. Pictures of the dedication of historical markers and New London scenes of 1880-1890 have attracted much attention from the townspeople.

The Vacation Reading Club opened July 1st, for town and summer children, with 77 participants. The theme for the summer reading program was "Big Game Animals of North America." At the annual party in August, the club was entertained by Mrs. Marlene McCauley, owner of the Popcorn Puppet Theater, Amityville, N. Y., who presented her marionettes in a play entitled "Circus on Strings." First prizes were presented by Mrs. Ray to Marie Manber and Thomas Blaber, and second prizes to Patricia Little and Harry Barrett, Jr. Refreshments were served to the children by their librarians and their helpers in the gardens. In charge of the Vacation Reading Club and assisting at the library during July and August were Miss Kendra Lovell and Miss Dale Thomson.

An extensive beautification project was conducted this past summer by the New London Garden Club. A grant of

\$100.00 from Sears, Roebuck and Company was used to fertilize the lawns and to rebuild and reseed other areas. Four shrubs have been added to the plantings, one of these a gift in the memory of Mrs. Wilbur Breckenridge. A spruce tree, donated by Dwight Braley, was set on the side lawn, and will be used as a lighted Christmas tree in the holiday season. Annuals and tuberous begonias were set out in front of the library and thorough pruning and clearing were completed in the lower gardens.

Two new books, "Garden Book" by Bush-Brown and the revised edition of "Complete Book of Flower Arrangements" by Grayson were presented as gifts to the library by the New London Garden Club this year.

Mrs. Dorothy Dey Howard held an exhibition of her oil paintings from August 24th to September 5 daily except Sundays. This was her eighteenth year of exhibiting at the library, and is always a popular display.

Children's Book Week, November 2-7, was observed with displays of new adult and juvenile books in the auditorium. The Wilmot and Springfield schools, the Kindergarten, and the first six grades of the Central School visited the library during the week to see the exhibits and inspect the new books. The films "Andy and the Lion," "Jenny's Birthday Party" and "The Song of the Prairie" were shown to the children. There were 421 visitors to the display.

Each Saturday afternon during the school year, a Story Hour for pre-school children has been held in the Children's Room. We have entertained and instructed 473 children during these sessions.

Against the new snow, the Christmas lights shine again at the library, with an invitation to all to "come within."

ANNUAL REPORT

September 30, 1964, ended the 46th year of the New London Hospital and the sixth year in its present location.

This year has seen the start of the new additions to the Hospital. The low bidder was the Trahan Construction Company of Littleton, New Hampshire, and this firm was given the contract. Mr. Foot, Chairman of the Building Committee, is pleased with the progress made and all work is proceeding favorably.

An official Seal for the New London Hospital was designed by Vincent S. Wickham and has been accepted by the Hospital's Board of Directors.

The annual "Hospital Day" was quite different this year in that it was held in a new location — the property opposite the Brocklebank, owned by Mr. Keith. This change of location presented many problems, but on the whole it worked out very well. Under the excellent leadership of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Crockford, a net profit of \$12,629.31 was made for the Hospital. One definite advantage of the new location was the ample parking facilities.

Dr. Eric Campbell Moffat joined the Medical Staff this year and is a most welcome member to the Hospital and the community.

Dr. Donald R. Hayes also joined the Medical Staff as a Consulting Surgeon. Dr. Hayes, who practices in Springfield, Massachusetts, has a summer home in Springfield, New Hampshire.

The Board of Directors and the community were saddened by the death of our Treasurer, Mr. James H. Cave.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of New London:

Enrollment

Our student population is now 475 — broken down as follows:

Grades 1-6

— 166 Elementary Students

Grades 7-8 — 91

Grades 9-12 — 218

— 309 Secondary Students

Twelve students from Newbury are enrolled in Grades 7 and 8. It was possible to accommodate this added number in our junior high unit as there are now two sections in both Grades 7 and 8.

Housing

The last two vacant rooms in the original building (the former science lab and commercial room) were renovated and made available for two elementary grades. The rooms

where these grades were previously housed became available for use at the junior-senior high level.

As courses are added to improve the curricula offering and meet the requirements of a "comprehensive high school," the need for more "class stations" increases.

Larger high school enrollments are essential to provide the diversification of courses necessary to handle the varying interests and abilities of our students. If New London is to maintain its high educational standards and remain a high school center, it must continue to improve and expand its program — this will require additional building.

Additional Revenue

Proceeds from the 1964 Sweepstakes amounted to \$7,363.00 and are estimated for 1965 at \$9,200.00. The "improvement of education" was the strong cry from the proponents of this measure. The addition of two staff members and a \$2,500.00 allotment toward a class in special education should result in upgrading our total school offering—the cost of which will be substantially covered by this added revenue from state sources.

Area Study

Several informal meetings have been held during the year with representatives of the surrounding school districts now sending students to New London. These discussions brought out a number of items of mutual interest and concern; such as present and proposed curricula, fair cost to both the "sending" and "receiving" districts, permanency of the present arrangement and future plans — including additional building.

To formalize and thoroughly explore all aspects of the problem, five School Boards have agreed to include an

Article in their respective School Warrants calling for the creation of an AREA School Study Committee. School districts acting favorably upon this Article would select three members each — one of whom must be a member of the School Board — to study and report back their findings and recommendations.

It seems highly desirable that New London take the lead in seeking out a logical solution to long-range school planning where it has become the "educational hub" of the area.

REPORT OF TEACHER CONSULTANT

In reporting some of the shared services and activities with which I have been connected throughout this supervisory union, I wish to express grateful acknowledgement for the assistance of all school personnel and interested citizens in their support, encouragement, and cooperation.

SUMMER SCHOOL — These programs were offered to pupils of all schools in the union on a self-supporting basis, and at a minimum cost to parents whose children participated:

1. Reading and Mathematics: Running for four weeks in July, twelve groups (totaling approximately 60 young-sters) met for 20 daily hour-long lessons taught by three staff members whose objectives were to provide some remedial work on various reading and arithmetic skills.

Summaries and reports were sent to parents at the close of the session and copies were forwarded to each young-ster's teacher in order that some follow-up might be given during the school year. It is expected that similar programs will be offered during the summer of 1965.

2. Typewriting: This self-supporting program was offered to two groups (totaling 30 youngsters from grades 6 through 9 union-wide) and taught by one staff member. These 20 hour-long lessons attempted to provide for two levels — the beginners and those with previous typing experience. It was the objective of this program to help youngsters gain a fair degree of proficiency at the type-writer keyboard, depending upon the amount of practice each student could devote to it. For some students it was an opportunity to acquire a useful skill which might not be possible in the regular scheduling of their high school programs.

CURRICULUM — The up-dating of elementary school offerings has continued for mathematics and reading. It is expected that similar improvements will be made as more emphasis is given to the fields of social studies and science.

ADULT EDUCATION — This program has included a variety of interests, with continuing popularity for oil painting. This year, and for the first time, a course in "Introduction to Modern Mathematics" was offered.

SAFETY EDUCATION — This program of developing a safety-conscious community is made possible by materials from the Child Safety Council. Designed for home use and made available by generous contributions from many local professional and business establishments, the program aims to reduce the toll of accidents to children. It has had the endorsement of our Governor, Safety Commissioner, State Department of Education, and local school boards. The cooperation of local law enforcement officers at school assem-

blies for distributing these materials has been a regular feature of this program.

ADVANCED SCIENCE COURSE — With the help of biology teachers from the three high schools of the union, a special course was arranged for selected juniors and seniors seeking further study in the area of bio-chemistry. Meeting at the New London Science Laboratory for a series of twenty 90-minute Monday evening sessions, twelve area students enrolled in a course entitled, "Chemicals That Live" — a study of the nature and behavior of some of the substances that make up living bodies. It was taught by Mr. Clayton E. Fisher, an outstanding science teacher and former head of the science department of Colby Junior College.

The ultimate value of this course will be measured, not so much by the credits these youngsters may be granted, but rather by each individual's growth in knowledge and understanding of a specialized field of science, pursued by a self-motivating desire to learn.

SPECIAL EDUCATION — Recognizing the need for greater attention to some students with special needs and the fact of some large classes, a "special help" teacher was again provided for the elementary grades. This involved working with a number of students (individually and in small groups) for relatively short periods during the morning session.

In addition to this program, there is some likelihood that New London might operate a special class for intellectually retarded children. The extent of such a program, however, including the location of the class, will be partially determined by pupil needs, degree of interest, and participation of some surrounding school districts.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL TO SUPERINTENDENT GORDON B. FLINT

Dear Mr. Flint:

I submit herewith my annual report as Principal of New London Central School.

The results of the evaluation of the high school continue to be the foremost concern not only for the pupils, the teachers, and the administration, but also for everyone in New London.

The self-evaluation report by the teachers and the evaluation summary by the Visiting Committee were submitted to the Commission on Public Secondary Schools at a meeting held last July. The following letter was received from the commission.

"Mr. Robert J. Livingston, Principal New London High School New London, New Hampshire

Dear Mr. Livingston:

I am happy to inform you that the Commission on Public Secondary schools, at a meeting on July 1, voted to recommend New London High School for continued membership in the New England Association for a period of two years, on the basis of its self-evaluation and the report of the visiting committee. A summary of the report was presented to the members of the Commission. Final action on the recommendation will be taken by the Association at the annual meeting in December. The recommendations of the Commission are usually accepted.

I hope that you found the experience of evaluation an interesting and profitable one and that it will help you to work toward the goal which all of us are seeking, the continual improvement of secondary education in New England. The first step toward that end is a study of the recommendations in the

report of the visiting committee. They may be classified into groups: those that can be carried out immediately, those that can be carried out in the near future, those that require long-range planning, and those that the school finds invalid, impracticable, or unacceptable, with sound reasons given.

Two-year approval was recommended to give the school time to make curriculum adjustments to supplement its excellent college preparatory program with a strong program for terminal students, and to bring its curriculum more into harmony with its excellent statement of philosophy and objectives.

The Commission urges that the recommendations in the report be accomplished as far as possible during the next two years. A report of progress will be asked for at the end of that time.

We congratulate you on a good job well done.

A letter written to me on December 10, 1964, by Dana M. Cotton, Secretary-Treasurer, New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, states, "At the request of the Executive Committee and the officers of the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, Inc., it is my pleasure to inform you that at the Seventy-ninth Annual Meeting of the New England Association, New London High School, New London, New Hampshire, was elected to Continued Membership in the Association."

The Continued Membership, of course, is dependent on the progress the high school has made at the end of two years (June, 1966) in fulfilling the recommendations made by the Visiting Committee. Several of the recommendations have already been carried out, others are in the process of being taken care of, but there are some important ones that are dependent on acquiring more teachers, more equipment, and additional space.

Several of the recommendations will take more than two years to accomplish but it should be remembered that in the Progress Report in June, 1966, it must be shown what steps are being taken to meet these recommendations, and any recommendations deemed invalid, impracticable, or unacceptable have to be reported with sound reasons for not carrying them out.

The next few years will be important ones in the history of New London Central School (the high school and the elementary school).

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
