5. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,800.00 to complete the road to Back Lake Beach and continue said road a distance of approximately six hundred feet to lot 15 owned by George Roberts.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 for cutting out the Town Line.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 for the improvement of Back Lake Beach.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1,000.00 for the Hill Road.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2,500.00 for a road beginning at Camp Otter road and a running a distance of approximately 4500 feet to land owned by C. V. and R. V. Merrill.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1200.00 for a water pump and hose for the fire department.
11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the highway running from the George Hanns place so-called to the George Holmes place so-called.

This is the seventh year that the Pittsburg Nursing Association has been functioning. Many patients have availed themselves of the nursing service.

Much corrective work has been done among the school children and our health records show a decided improvement. Through the aid of the Child Health Recovery Program and the local Red Cross, 14 dental clinics have been conducted. The result being 206 fillings, 55 cleanings and 56 extractions.

Every June, Dr. Kerr of Manchester assisted by Miss Blasland, Infant and Maternity Welfare Nurse, and Mrs. Bigelow, county T. B. Nurse, conducts a free

clinic in the town hall. Mothers and babies receive special consideration, under weight children, school and preschool, as well as adults of doubtful health, are given a thorough examination. This service is entirely financed by the sale of Christmas Seals.

The nurse has assisted with 12 surgical operations, 8 deliveries and administered 18 anesthetics during the year. Many patients have been transported to the County Hospital while others have been taken to doctors for medical help.

Underweight children have been furnished with cod liver oil free of charge and the underweight school children have been given milk during the cold winter months when school is in session.

Expectant mothers may have regular urinalysis and blood pressure service as well as advice and helpful literature as early in pregnancy as they wish. Serious complications have been avoided by the knowledge of trouble gained early.

Experience shows that handicapped children run a very heavy risk at all times, therefore I urge all parents to have defects corrected and eliminate dangerous health hazards.

I extend thanks and appreciation for the loyal cooperation received from the townspeople.

Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Pittsburg:

General

The schools of any community, in the final analysis, are the expression of the wishes of the majority of the people, of that community. The schools cannot advance beyond the support of the tax payers, neither will the people allow the schools to sink below the standards which they believe to be correct. The people want education for occupational efficiency and for citizenship, education for the sphere of life which the individual must occupy, in short, what they would term a practical education.

It is to those who pay the tax bills, and who control the destinies of the nation that the appeal for such an education must be made. The people should understand that the basis of business is education, that the barometer of business is culture, and that the background of business is knowledge.

Buildings and Equipment

The school buildings are for the most part in good condition. A long felt need was met last year, when a domestic Science room was finished off in the high school building. The addition of this room on the third floor made the installation of a fire escape necessary. Some day it may be practical to sound proof the other half of the attic for a Manual Training room, as the present quarters are very inadequate.

The interior of the High School Building is quite badly in need of being redecorated.

The Danforth School has been considerably repaired, and a new heating plant was installed.

Attendance and Enrollment

The attendance records last year were very commendable. Every school in town had better than 97 per cent attendance for the year. Of the 154 pupils enrolled 128 were not tardy and 38 of those were not absent during the entire school year, of 180 days. That in view of the winter is especially commendable. The total enrollment this year is almost exactly the same as that of last year. We have three tuition pupils, two from Clarksville and one from Stewartstown.

Teachers

The following changes occurred in the teaching personnel: W. Warren Salter of the University of Vermont became headmaster, Alma Powers of Northeastern Business College and Plymouth Normal School was elected commercial teacher, Lillian Lowry of Keene Normal became teacher of the intermediate room and Ruth Fitzgerald of Plymouth Normal School filled the vacancy at Indian Stream. All of these have had previous teaching experience.

Notes on the Budget

The total of the School Board's Budget for 1935-1936 is \$18,440.09, as compared with a total appropriation of \$18,358.83 for last year. All of the items remain practically the same as in the 1934-35 budget. It is felt, however, that larger sums should be raised for Janitors' Salaries and Transportation. Opposed to these two increases we find the School Board does not ask for as large an appropriation for either repairs or New Equipment as formerly.

Health

The main emphasis of the nurse, Ethel Sturgis, in the school health program this year, has been focused on the correction of physical defects. Dental clinics have been conducted and all necessary dental work has been done at a flat rate of \$3.00 per hour, making the work much cheaper than by private appointment. The local Red Cross Chapter contributed \$30.00 toward dental work and \$47.35 was available under the Child Health Recovery Program.

The throat work has been harder to get done due to the greater expense for each child. Money for the more expensive clinics is very limited.

During the winter months milk is being supplied by the State for underweight children. This is proving to be very beneficial. A statistical report follows:

The parents in general have cooperated in every way possible in correcting defects, but due to existing economic conditions it is difficult to accomplish all that has been planned.

Conclusion

It is indeed gratifying to note the regard that individual citizens and local organizations have for their schools. This is clearly expressed by their generous support and hearty cooperation in all school activities, and most cheering of all, the widespread interest in the well being of the entire school system.

I wish to thank the School Committee, teachers, parents and friends for the interest they have shown in the schools and for the loyal support and encouragement they have given me in my work.
