SCHOOL REPORT.

Fellow citizens:—

THE close of another year and the commencing of the new, reminds us that to you is due another report of our doings in the past. Realizing that to us has been entrusted much that is of vital importance to you as residents of this town or citizens of the world at large, we greatly regret our lack of ability to discharge the duties incumbent on us to our own satisfaction, and therefore shall not be surprised if YOUR expectations have not been fully realized. Realizing, however, that our schools have been fairly successful, that parents and scholars have generally done well, that the teachers have been well qualified for their positions and labored heartily and honestly, and feeling sure that the best of teachers are always the cheapest, we do claim that the standing of our schools is in advance of the past.

We found it advisable to have five schools in town the past year, but hope that four, and perhaps three, will accommodate all demands for 1887. Through your grant of last year for repairs, the interior of the school-house near J. M. Rice's has been made comfortable, some improvements have been made at South Stoddard, a little mending was done on the house near A. Davis', and a little improvement on the one at the Center. There is still needed repairs at South Stoddard; at the Center general repairs to exterior and interior of house and out-buildings will have to be done before it is fit to use either in cold or warm weather. The house near A. Davis' we think may not be needed this season, and the one at the Mill Village and the one near Lund Barrett's not being used are fast going to decay. The plan adopted three

years since for dividing the school money was followed this past year. Schools have been kept as follows:—

At the Center the first term was taught by Miss Nancy Bragg, 40 scholars, 8 weeks. This school made good progress and Miss Bragg's qualifications were above the average. No text books were used by the teacher at the examination, which was very thorough. The scholars knew what they were talking about. The second term of 12 weeks, 39 scholars, and the 3d term of 8 weeks, 26 scholars, was taught by Miss E. J. Naham who is too well known in this vicinity to need any lengthy comments; suffice it for us to report that she fully sustained her reputation for teaching. No school could be more prompt at an examination, and the progress of the scholars was a surprise to many.

The school near Mr. Jeffs', 1st term, 9 weeks, 19 scholars, and 2nd term, 10 weeks, 16 scholars, were taught by Miss Kate Brown, who is every inch of pure metal. I don't know how this school could have been bettered.

The school near A. Davis', 1st term 8 weeks, 10 scholars, was taught by Miss Mary E. Hilton, who is a veteran in the service and kept a good school, but her register is useless so far as reporting from that is concerned.

The 2nd term, 12 weeks, 11 scholars, was taught by Miss Ellen C. Downing, who succeeded nicely, and the examination showed good progress.

The school at South Stoddard, 1st term, 8 weeks, 20 scholars, was taught by Miss Mabel Estabrooks, whose only failure was in being too lenient so far as the deportment of a few of her scholars was concerned. Second term, 11 weeks, 21 scholars, was in charge of Miss Abbie D. Piper, who kept a good school and maintained good discipline. Under more favorable circumstances more progress in the studies pursued would have been probable.

The school near J. M. Rice's, 1st term, 12 weeks, 10 scholars, 2nd term, 8 weeks, 8 scholars, were both taught by Miss Mabel Estabrooks. Whether it was the improved condition of the school room, the scholars, or the teacher, that made

so marked a change in this school we know not; we think all must have helped; one thing is certain, this school showed a remarkable degree of progress and improvement in every particular at its close.

Of the higher English branches taught in our schools the past year we find Physiology, Natural Philosophy, Rhetoric, History, Algebra, Zoology, Book-keeping, and "Common Things." The total absence of school apparatus is to be regretted, and a supply of charts and maps is a necessity.

Bespeaking liberal appropriations for the schools in the future, and your hearty co-operation with your "School Board," I tender you my sincere thanks for many favors received, and resign my position on "Board of Education" with no abatement of interest in our schools and confident that "Excelsior" will ever be your motto.
