HASSAN AND LEGISLATURE POPULAR HEADING INTO LEGISLATIVE SESSION

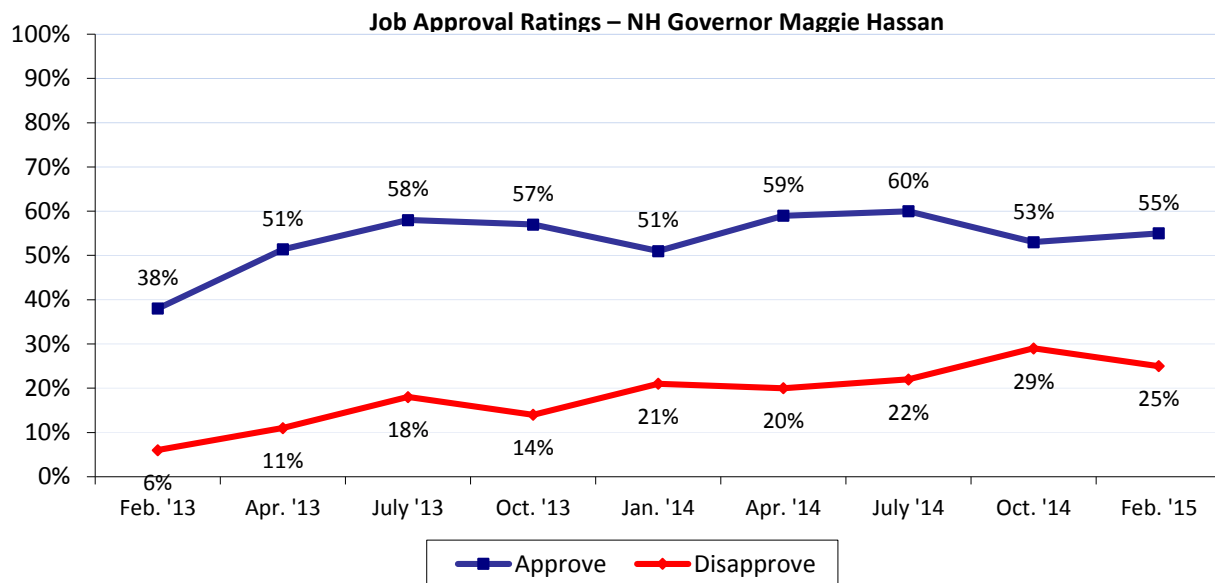
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DURHAM, NH – New Hampshire Governor Maggie Hassan’s job approval continues to be high and a majority of Granite Staters also approve of the performance of the state legislature.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll**,* conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and nine (509) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between February 5 and February 12, 2015. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.3 percent.

Gubernatorial Approval

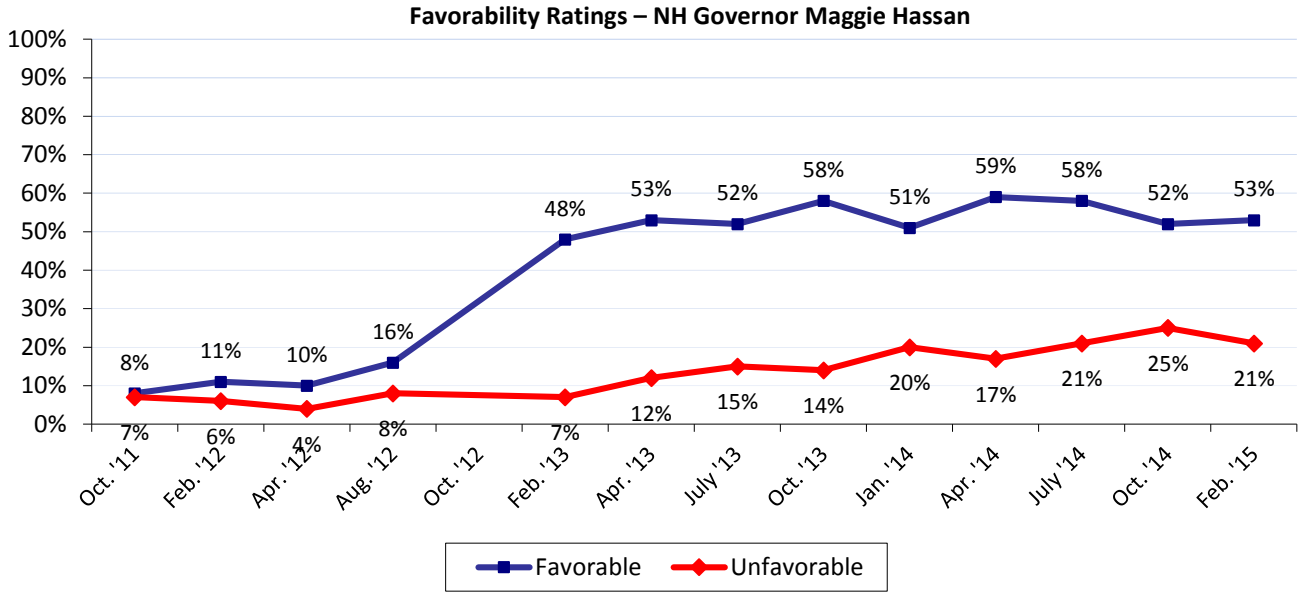
Democratic Governor Maggie Hassan continues to have the approval of a majority of New Hampshire adults. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 55% of Granite Staters say they approve of the job Hassan is doing as governor, 25% disapprove, and 20% are neutral or don’t know enough to say. Hassan’s job approval rating has been over 50% since early in her first term as governor and her disapproval has remained stable as well. Democrats (81% approve, 5% disapprove) and Independents (50% approve, 27% disapprove) approve of Hassan’s job performance, while Republicans (35% approve, 44% disapprove) disapprove somewhat.

Favorability Ratings – Governor Maggie Hassan

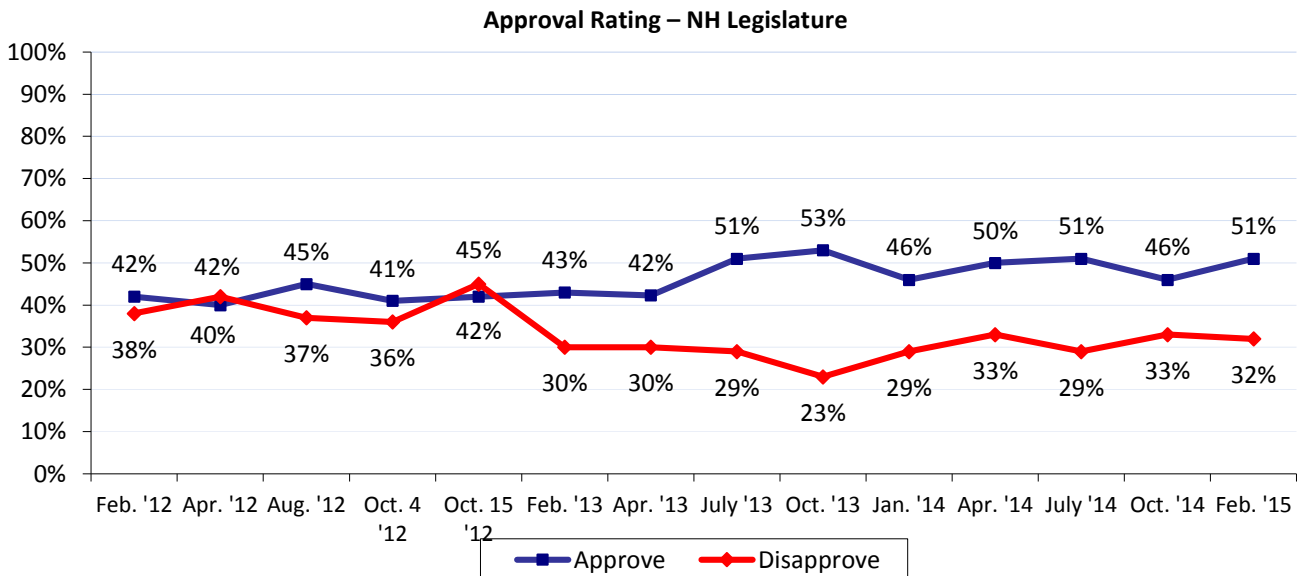
Currently, 53% of New Hampshire adults say they have a favorable opinion of Hassan, 21% have an unfavorable opinion, 15% are neutral, and 11% say they don't know enough about her to say. Hassan's net favorability rating, the percentage having a favorable opinion minus the percentage having an unfavorable opinion, is +32%, which is up from +27% in October. Hassan is very popular among Democrats (+75% net favorable) and popular among Independents (+29%), while Republicans (-3%) are divided on her.



Approval of New Hampshire Legislature

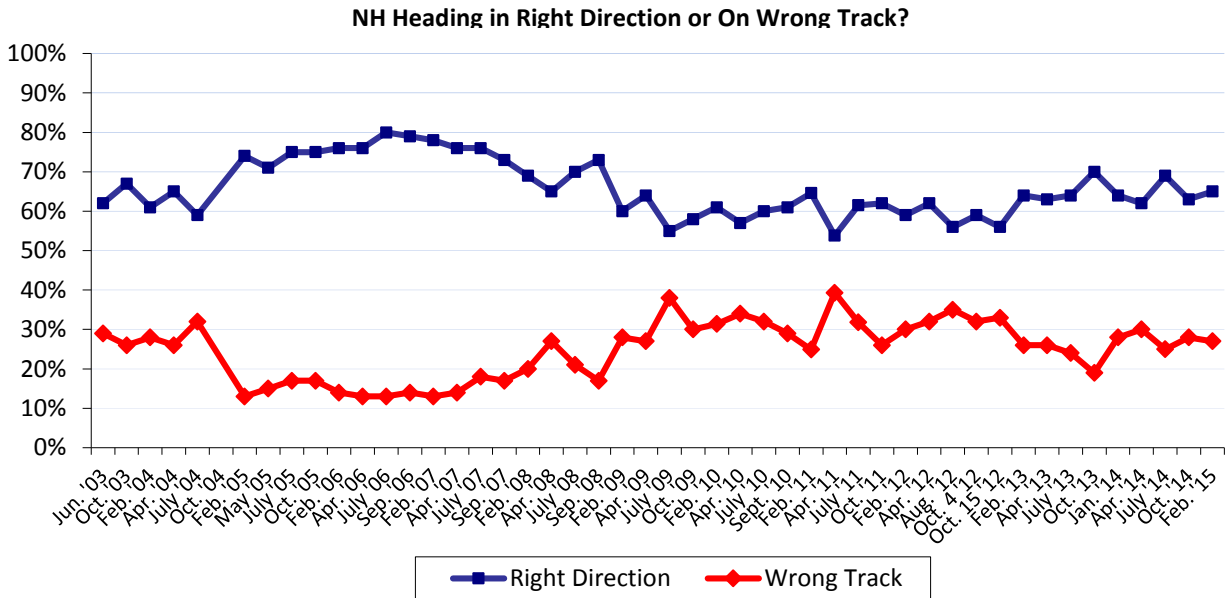
Republicans currently control both houses of the New Hampshire legislature and most state residents approve of the job the new legislature is doing. Currently, 51% of New Hampshire adults approve of how the State Legislature is doing its job, 32% disapprove, and 17% are neutral or don't know enough to say. Approval is bi-partisan as 54% of Independents, 51% of Republicans and 49% of Democrats approve of the job the legislature is doing.

"The biggest issues facing the New Hampshire government are closing the current budget gap and putting together a budget for the next biennium," said Andrew Smith, Director of the Survey Center. "Neither the governor nor the legislature can rely on the unpopularity of the other party as they continue their budget discussions."



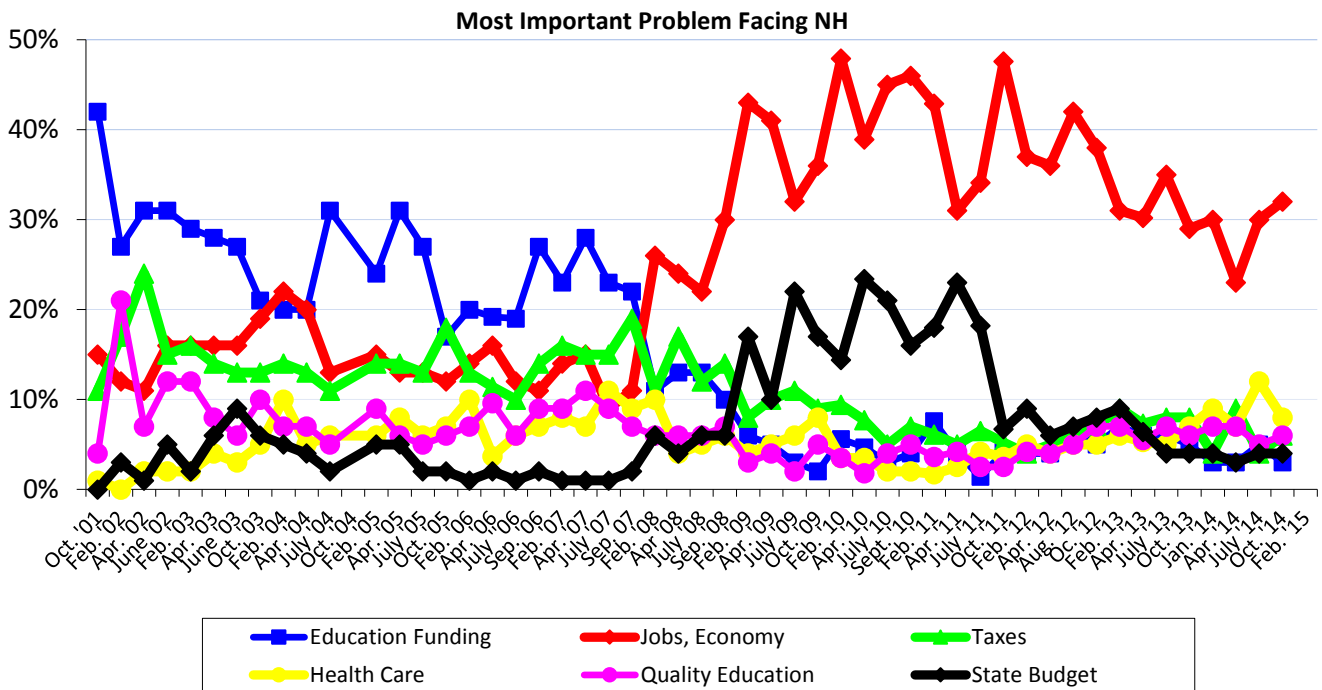
Right Direction or Wrong Track?

New Hampshire residents continue to believe the state as a whole is headed in the right direction. Currently, 65% of New Hampshire adults feel the state is heading in the right direction, 27% think the state is seriously off on the wrong track, and 7% are unsure. Majorities of Democrats (77%), Republicans (59%) and Independents (57%) say the state is headed in the right direction.



Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

Despite improving economic conditions, the state's economy and unemployment continue to be seen as the most important problem facing the state. Currently, 29% of New Hampshire adults say that jobs and the economy is the most important issue facing the state, followed by education (10%), the state budget (9%), health care (8%), and taxes (5%). Granite Staters also appear to be fed up with snowfall as 1% cited the snow as the most important problem.



Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest WMUR Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and nine (509) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between February 5 and February 12, 2015. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.3 percent.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, age, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may sum to just above or below 100%. Respondent numbers in each demographic may not equal the total respondent number due to respondents choosing not to answer some demographic questions.
