WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth, in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March next at Nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Offices for the year ensuing, and a Selectman for three years.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid for highways, and appropriate money for the same.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairing highways and breaking snow for the ensuing year.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairing and building bridges.

6. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid for bridges.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise \$4,000.00 for maintenance of trunk lines.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day observance.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for support of town library.

10. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to purchase fire apparatus.

13. To see if the town will vote to hold an agricultural fair, and elect officers for same.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Tamworth:

I, herewith, submit my second annual report as superintendent of schools.

Our school record for the year ending June 30, 1924 showed an average attendance of 118, an average membership of 131 and a percent of 90. The total enrollment was 152—79 boys and 73 girls.

The work in the schools is constantly being tested, defects remedied, and better methods considered. The superintendent wishes very much that there could be a special teacher of drawing and music.

There are eleven teachers in the employ of the district:

Pearl N. Bacon at Pequaket has six pupils;

Lula M. Ball at Chocorua has eighteen pupils;

Grace E. Shannon at Downs has eleven pupils;

Lillian Davis at Whittier has seventeen pupils;

Hazel M. MacKenzie at South Tamworth has twenty-three pupils;

Ruth M. Currier at Bennett's Corner has twelve pupils;

Edwin A. Blackey at Great Hill has nine pupils;

Winifred Alexander at Wonalancet has one pupil;

Hazel H. Evans at Tamworth Elementary has twenty-six pupils;

Mary C. Fall at Tamworth Grammar has fifteen pupils;

Ruth E. Pingree at the High School has seven pupils.

School Spirit

The schools have continued to show a fine spirit of helpfulness.

South Tamworth has purchased a clock and provided screens for windows and door.

Whittier has provided a chalk tray for the black-

boards, stained the desks, bought new curtains and provided a school sign.

Pequaket has bought dishes for noon lunch, provided a school sign and is hoping to help on inside painting.

Chocorua has provided a school sign and raised about \$40 for inside repairs.

Tamworth Village Schools, through the club organization, have provided playground equipment and otherwise worked for school betterment.

Downs has provided a school sign.

Four schools are now provided with signs. Interest continues in beautifying the grounds by setting out bulbs and shrubs. The District at its last annual meeting very wisely appropriated money to improve lawns, playground at Great Hill and Tamworth Village, and to purchase land for playgrounds at Whittier and Bennett's Corner.

High School

The high school is developing well under the care of Ruth E. Pingree, a graduate of University of New Hampshire. We ought to have a larger attendance, for this is an excellent opportunity for Tamworth pupils. Four of the seven pupils walk from Chocorua. There is one pupil in the second year and there are six in the first year. There should be a class of ten to enter next fall. The school board has shown excellent judgment in allowing this school to run itself while Mrs. Fall takes the grammar school. The trustees of the Public Library have been very helpful in providing reference books for use in the high school.

Medical Inspection

Especially good results followed the medical inspection in June. Dr. L. S. Gilman was secured to do

dental work at the home of Mrs. Mary C. Fall who very kindly opened her house for this service. Mrs. Gilman worked with the doctor and thirty-four children were treated. Dr. Reimck supervised the work.

We owe it to all the children that physical defects should be corrected as far as possible, in order that they may have strong, healthy bodies.

Teachers

The faithful work of the teachers should be appreciated and they should be given all possible help. Too often parents fail to visit the school and voice the kind regard which they really feel for those who teach their children. Five of our teachers are Normal School graduates. One is a college graduate. Two are summer students at Normal School. I wish girls from Tamworth would go to Normal School and train for teachers.

Repairs

Fine work was done by the school board during the past year in improving school property.

At the Village, the lawn was graded and trees set out. A hot air furnace was installed and a fine room finished off for use of the grammar school. This room is equipped with slate blackboards and adjustable seats.

At Chocorua the windows were changed to secure adequate light, a hard wood floor was laid, adjustable seats put in, and the inside painted.

At Whittier the ceiling and walls were sheathed with steel and painted, adding much to the light, and to the attractiveness of the room.

The Great Hill playground was graded.

During the coming year attention should be given to the following: Chemical toilets at the Village; a

ventilating stove at South Tamworth; wood space at Whittier; painting at Pequaket and Bennett's Corner.

The following pupils had perfect attendance for the year ending June 30, 1924: Russell Bennett, High School; Bertha M. Page, Downs School; Benjamin W. Page, Downs School; Lillian F. Walker, Wonalancet School.

In conclusion, I wish to thank all who have cooperated for school betterment.
