WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. s.]

To the inhabitants of the Town of Webster in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Webster on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum necessary to secure State Highway construction.
4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of highways and bridges.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for ploughing roads in winter.
6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for oiling of graveled roads.
7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for relief of the town poor.
8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for old age assistance.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town library.
10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.
11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for new snow fences.
13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to cooperate with the state in the control of white pine blister rust, using town labor.
14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a tract of land and erect a building thereon to house tractor, snow plow and other equipment.
15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for new fire equipment.
16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on town notes.
17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for payments of interest on town notes.
18. To see if the town will vote to give a discount of 2% on all 1935 taxes paid on or before August 1st, 1935.
19. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen the right to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
20. To see if the town will vote to discontinue a certain part of the Cross Road so called, leading from Little Hill to Battle Street, described as follows: beginning at a stone post east of Hirtle's Garage, thence easterly on said road to approximately five rods west of the covered bridge on said road.

21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to buy insurance for town help.

22. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board:

For the past year your schools have been taught by the same efficient teachers. The policy of providing them with as many good tools to work with as possible has been continued. The reading system adopted for the first grade last year seemed to produce good results there, and has been continued in the second grade this year. The new geographies have now been furnished to all the grades. Each school now has eight good maps. A considerable quantity of new supplementary reading material has been furnished. At both schools parts of the toilets had rusted out. These parts have been replaced and they are now in a much more sanitary condition especially at Putney Hill.

At your suggestion, I have selected from the pupils whose attendance was perfect for last year those who are deserving special mention for having attended every day without tardiness for a longer period.

Health Work

The school nurse reported only 6 children underweight during the past school year, as contrasted with 22 in 1932-33, all 6 of these receiving some treatment. A large number, 15, were found with defective vision, 5 cases being corrected. Of the 39 cases of defective teeth, 37 have been corrected. Of 3 with deformity, 2 have received treatment. Other defects found were: Defective hearing, 1; Anaemia, 1; Nervous condition, 1; Diseased tonsils, 6; Defective breathing, 2; Defective speech, 1.

I can give you no better understanding of the value of the work done in this department than to quote Mrs. Fifield's own words: "During the year several visits have been made to each school for examinations and inspections, and talks have been given on the care of the health and dental clean-

liness. Visits have been made to the homes of all pupils and the childrens' health problems discussed. Several trips have been made with the children to clinics. A three day dental clinic was held in November when nearly every child was seen and treated by the dentist. All cavities were filled and necessary extractions done and cleanings. Dr. Eugene Worthen, whom we were fortunate to secure took a great interest in the childrn and gave them instruction in the care of the teeth. We are indebted to the Daniel Webster Grange and the Webster Womens' Union for their financial help and their interest in supporting the clinic, to Miss Little for giving us the use of her rooms and to others who assisted with the clinic or provided transportation. During the summer we hope to be able to correct many defects."

Miss Currier supplemented her regular work in music with an operetta which served to show the development in music possible when teachers and supervisor work together to secure results.

The statistical table shows a slightly smaller membership than the previous year. Tardiness has increased decidedly. At Corser Hill one family is responsible for 48 of the 65

tardy marks, and at Putney Hill two families had all but 9. The reduced number of visits by the Superintendent reflects your change from a Union employing 20 teachers to one employing 46.
