


Carroll SS.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett in the County of Carroll in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at 9 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations for the same.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid Construction.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,498.50 for State Aid Construction.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sums of money called for in the budget, as prepared by the selectmen.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to continue WPA projects.

Article 7. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow necessary sums in anticipation of taxes.

Article 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$98.00, based on one hundredth of one per cent of the assessed valuation, to be paid as its share of the expense of carrying on advertising and other beneficial programs for the section of the State known as the White Mountain Region of which this town is a part, in cooperation with the State of New Hampshire and other towns in said region, to be paid by the selectmen to the treasurer of the White Mountains Region.

Article 9. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to be used for recreational and or business inducements.

Article 10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for Blister Rust control.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for shingling and repairing town buildings.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to establish a Town Planning Board.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, a portion of the town road situated on William Yate's farm starting three rods east of the Yate's barn and continuing easterly to the end of the road.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and Citizens of Bartlett:

Because of resignations at the close of the last school year, it became necessary to engage teachers for the positions held by Mr. Norton, sub-master, Miss McPherson, high school assistant, and by Miss Allgrove, teacher at Intervale. Mr. Ronald Pariseau, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, was engaged as sub-master, Miss Lillian Staples, a graduate of Bates College, as high school assistant, and Effie M. Hunt, an experienced normal school graduate, was engaged for the school at Intervale. Miss Staples, who was doing work of excellent quality, resigned during the fall term on account of ill health. A very capable substitute, Wanda C. Pennett, a former teacher at Kennett high school, has taken her work for the remainder of the school year.

During the summer the small recitation room in the high school was enlarged by addition of the space formerly occupied by the so-called library. A complete inside painting job was done at the high school and a sink added to the laboratory.

The grammar school needs painting and it should be done this summer for economy as well as appearance.

Pupils, both boys and girls, of the high and graded schools play basketball in the school gymnasium five or six days a week for about five months of the school year. There are no facilities for shower baths, and after practice these pupils simply put on their street clothes and expose themselves to the hazards of our climate whatever they may be on any day. This practice is of course unsanitary and unhealthful. Even if a complete battery of showers and lockers cannot be

installed at this time, at least a few showers should be provided before next year.

On September 1, the district voted to accept the offer of a grant from the federal government of forty-five per cent of the cost of a new elementary school building. The maximum cost approved is \$20,400, and if the building costs as much as \$20,400 the government's share will be \$9,180 and the district's share \$11,220. If the building costs less, the government pays forty-five per cent of the actual approved cost.

Because of the increase in the school population in Glen and Lower Bartlett and the imminent necessity of making some radical change in our present arrangements, the voters decided that now is the time, with government assistance, to provide a satisfactory and permanent solution of the elementary school problem in this part of the town. Because of congestion at Glen and Intervale schools as well as in the Bartlett Grammar School to which a number are transported to relieve the situation at Glen, the only other solution was the reopening of the Goodrich Falls school and the continuance of three poorly located, inadequate and unsanitary one-room schools with a single teacher in each trying to teach seven or eight grades.

It is natural that the selection of a site could not be equally pleasing to all. It was evident at once that the available and suitable lots in this part of the town would cost more than the amount the government would approve under the grant. The lot finally chosen has water easily available, about four acres of playground, is free from highway hazards and cost \$1,000 less than was asked for any other lot considered.

Inasmuch as the district was borrowing money for its share of the cost of the school at a low rate, it seemed good business to borrow more money to retire the old outstanding indebtedness of the district on which we were paying five per cent interest, and thus make a substantial saving in interest charges each year. It is planned to pay off the new obligations at the rate of \$2000 a year which is the same amount we have been paying in the past.

The budget has been prepared with care but possibly with less exactness than usual, because we are going into a new situation when we move into the new school and we have no experience to guide us on some of the estimates. It will be necessary to provide in the budget, as we have done, for three teachers in the new school as we anticipate an enrollment of 80 to 90 pupils. If the third teacher is necessary, there is no doubt but that the state will approve the salary and will allow it in next adjustment of state aid. It is planned at present to continue sending the eighth grade to Bartlett but it is very inadvisable to make any definite assurance that this will be a permanent arrangement. There are complications that might arise on account of room or transportation in the future which might make the arrangement impracticable and there is no reason why with a staff of three teachers, the eighth grade could not be satisfactorily taken care of in the new school.

The amount to be raised to balance the budget is \$14,160 which plus the special appropriations if voted as printed in the report, will make the total assessment \$15.985.
