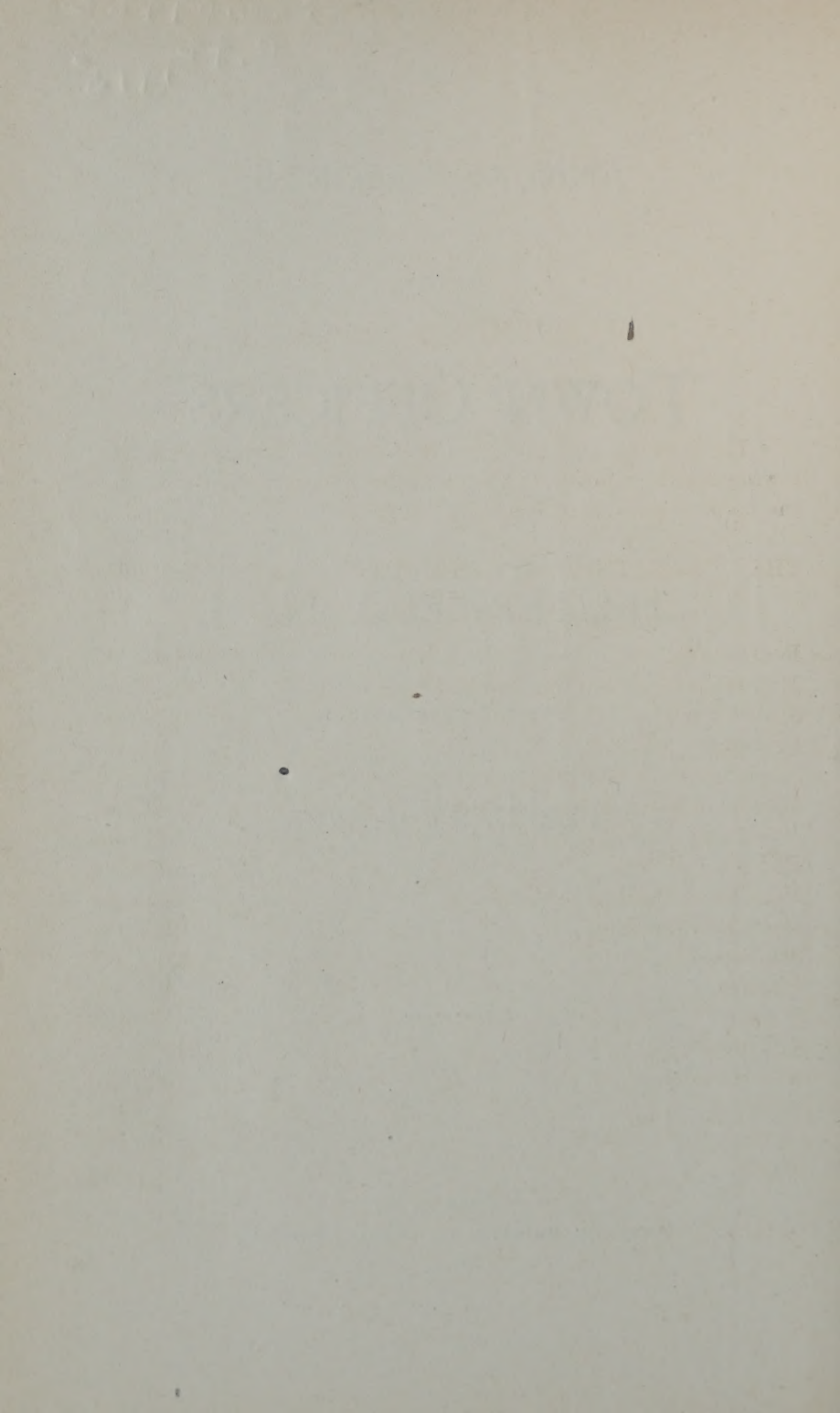

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Chesterfield, in the county of Cheshire, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall, in said town, on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at 9 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the town will raise to defray town charges.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will raise to be worked out on the highways, or act thereon.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the poor, or act thereon.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the town library in addition to what is required by law or act thereon.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will raise for observing Old Home Day, or act thereon.

Art. 8. To determine the method of collecting taxes the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to build the road as laid out by the selectmen, beginning at a point in the highway

at the junction of the old and new roads leading from Chesterfield to Spofford, thence running in a southeasterly direction 349 feet to a point in the highway leading to the John White place, so called, and raise money for the same, or act thereon.

Art. 10. To see what action the town will take in regard to street lighting.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to take from the road agents' districts sections of the Keene and Brattleboro roads, so called, and instruct the selectmen to arrange with the state highway department to maintain said sections of road under the patrol system and appropriate money for the same, or act thereon.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of twenty-five dollars to repair the road leading to the Spofford cemetery, or act thereon.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be expended in the New Boston cemetery, or act thereon.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars or more as a trust fund to be known as the New Boston Cemetery fund, the income to be used toward the repairs of said cemetery, and to guarantee perpetual care of said cemetery, or act thereon.

Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars from Etta Hubbard Hildreth, to be held in trust, the income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association, to be used for the care and improvement of the Amos R. Hubbard burial lot in said cemetery, or act thereon.

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars as a trust fund to be known as the Ira P. Buxton Cemetery Fund, the income to be used for the care and improvement of the Ira P. Buxton burial lot in the Spofford cemetery, or act thereon.

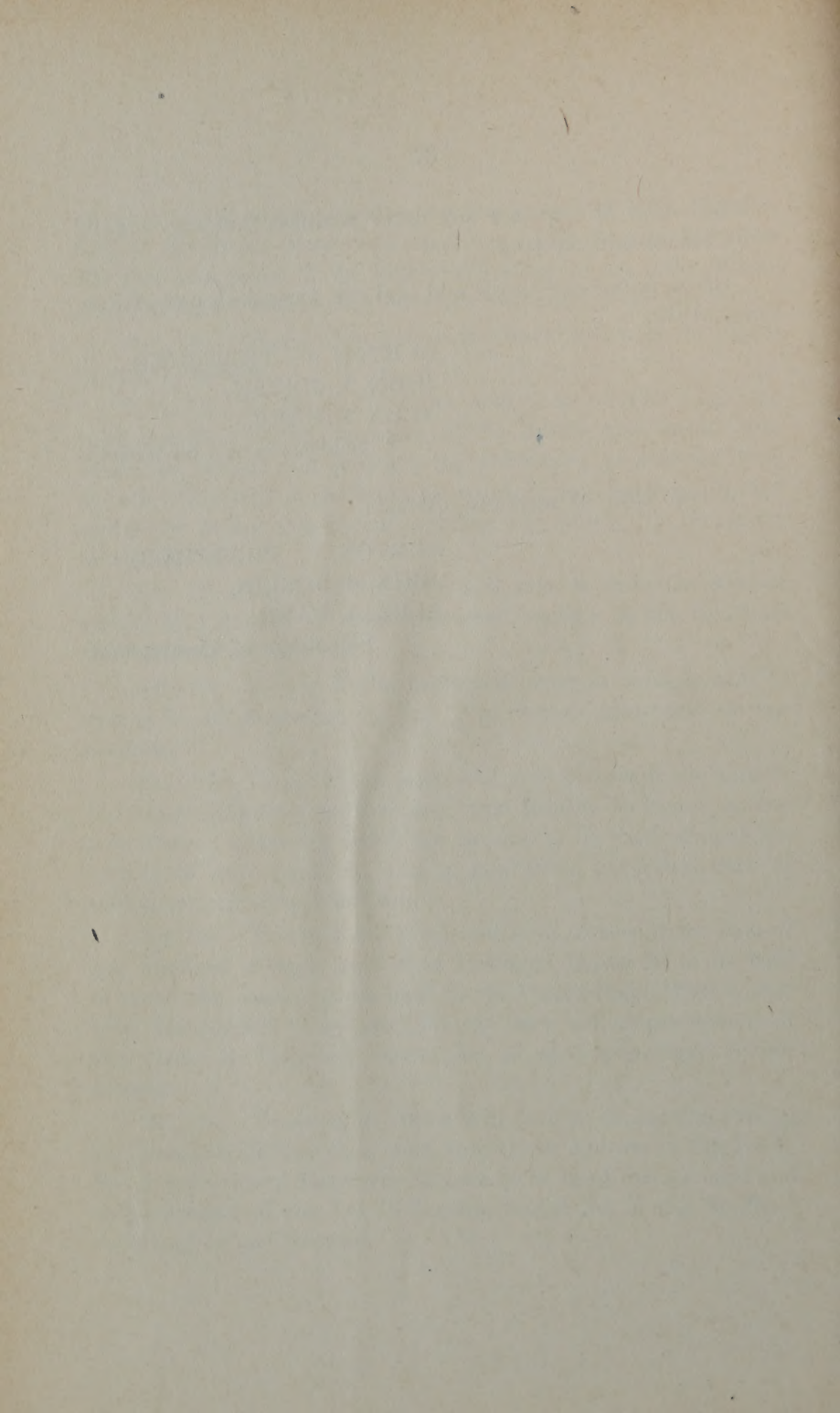
Art. 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
