REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD OF THE TOWN OF DUBLIN

We respectfully submit to the Dublin School District the ninety-fourth annual report of our schools.

Thirty-six weeks of school has been taught in No. 1 and Town Hall schools. Thirty-five weeks in No. 2 and 5 and thirty-five weeks in No. 3. The same teachers taught the spring term. New teachers were secured for the fall and winter terms

at No. 2 and No. 5. All our teachers are doing excellent work. The school houses are all in good condition except the one at the Town Hall which if used another year will have to be changed in a number of ways by order of the State Board of Health. We hope this will not have to be done as every one knows this is no place for a school. We hope the district will vote to build a new school house or remodel the old one.

We submit the following estimate of amount of money that will be required to raise for the payment of statutory obligations of the district.

Amount required by law to raise for schools is \$2,595 00 the same as last year. In addition to this we need to raise \$200 for high school tuition and \$150 for School District Officers.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION, DUBLIN, N. H.

I hereby submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of the schools of Dublin.

TRUE EDUCATION

True education is three fold; physical, mental and moral. In the first we should co-operate with the home by furnishing in schools good ventilation, heat, light, cleanliness, rest and recess periods, and athletic games or sports. The mental development depends on the interest aroused, on the teacher's skill in getting the pupils to increase in power to interpret the thought of others, and to do some independent logical thinking. Moral development is largely attained through the creation of high ideals, in the encouraging of self-control and the desire to do right for right's sake rather than from fear of punishment. True education includes training of hands as well as of brain, and finds at times material for study outside of books. Industrial training is in use in very many places and is now seldom questioned. Pupils' training should point to other activities as well as to professional careers. Is it not well to call attention, by some school work, to the possibilities near at hand?

Manual activities are needful in all grades, simple, of course, for the lower grades and more advanced for the grammar and high schools. Practical nature study, garden and field work, local botany and geography lend themselves to out-of-door observations and out-of-door work after school hours.

TEACHERS

Our schools are in charge of capable, well-trained teachers. The instruction is efficient. The pupils are receiving good training and are interested in their studies, and high ideals are being inculcated. No claim of perfection is made or entertained, but we believe that the work of the schools is progressing in a reasonably satisfactory manner.

In June Miss Laura McPherson and Miss Mertie E. Nolan completed their labors in our schools and the vacancies were filled by the election of Miss Elsie M. Huckins of Ashland and Miss Marjorie Oakman of West Swanzey.

Miss Huckins is a teacher of several years' experience with a diploma from Keene Normal School. Miss Oakman graduated from the Keene Normal in the class of 1915.

SPECIAL FEATURES

In addition to the usual school work the pupils of the village gave a Hallowe'en entertainment to secure funds for the purchase of additional Victrola records. At Thanksgiving they sent bags of good things to the Elliott hospital at Keene for the benefit of the patients. A Christmas box of supplies was forwarded to Miss Jennie Powers for distribution to worthy children of Keene.

The opera "Hansel and Gretel" with Victrola records was publicly presented without charge. Miss Mary Amory Greene presented to the grammar school a year's subscription to "Bird Lore" and gave five dollars towards a fund to be used for the protection of birds.

Through the generosity of John Lewis Childs the children had home flower gardens.

In June, School No. 3 held a public exhibition of manual work. Refreshments were served. A goodly number of parents and friends were present. During the fall term the pupils of grades two, three, four and five, each read twenty-five books. This is quite in contrast with the one book per term reading of a few years ago. In all our schools many books are read per year, but I cannot quote the exact quantity read by the pupils in other schools.

The teacher at No. 2 has introduced some domestic arts work in the way of simple cooking and sewing with warm lunches at the noon hour. The interest manifested by the pupils in this work has carried over into all lines of school endeavor. Mr. Clifton E. Richardson presented a table to the school and the Board provided an oil burner.

While I know of no special work of School No. 5, I wish to speak in commendatory terms of the industry, and interest of the pupils in their regular work.

GRADUATION

On the 18th of June the grammar school graduation exercises were held in the town hall. The following pupils received diplomas: Elliott Allison, Elinor Armstrong, Julia Abbe, Elizabeth Childs, Bernice Clough, Clarence Fiske, Vada Kemp, Ruth Richardson, Lilly Strongren, Christine Walker, Florence Worcester, Alfred Woodward.

Of these graduates two are attending the Agricultural College at Durham, two are in attendance at Keene high and two at Hancock high, one each in pursuing studies at Abbott Academy, Proctor Academy, and Deerfield High, one has returned to pursue further studies in the local school and one is pursuing a course of music at her home.

HOUSING THE PRIMARY SCHOOL

The use of the town hall for housing the pupils of the Primary School is dangerous in many ways. Danger to the life of the children is the most important reason. Situated as the building is near to the street, at a corner, at a point nearly opposite the Post Office, where many automobiles are frequently passing and repassing, especially during the pleasant months of spring and autumn, makes the location dangerous. Furthermore the total lack of a playground, necessitating, as it does, the playing of the children in the street, increases the danger many fold. And although the teacher goes out with the children to their play, this does not afford the amount of protection which is demanded by the situation. Then, too, the sanitary conditions of the building are quite intolerable. Some remedy should be provided. The suggestion has been made that the two schools should be reunited. Such a plan would remedy the present situation it is true, but it would at the same time create a new problem difficult of solution. The total membership of the two schools for the fall has been 44. The combining of the two

schools in one room under the care of one teacher would create a situation which would involve the efficiency of the schools. With so many pupils and so many classes it would be impossible for a teacher to do justice to herself or to the school.

In conclusion I thank the Board for their continued confidence and support and the teachers for their loyalty to the high ideals of service.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC AND DRAWING

SUPT. ANDREW P. AVERILL, DUBLIN, N. H.:

I hereby submit my report in music and drawing for the year ending Feb. 15, 1916.

Each school is visited according to the schedule used in previous years. Owing to the fact that holidays and visiting days have been observed at different times by the different schools and that schools have been closed on account of sickness the schedule has been very much broken. I think each school has received its full number of visits. At least, that has been my intention.

Outlines are provided for each school for each month both in music and drawing. These outlines provide for two lessons in drawing and the work for the week in music. Like every other line of work the results are not satisfactory unless the work planned is carried out. A few lessons can be made up but many lessons can **never** be made up.

Sight reading needs more careful conscientious work in nearly all upper grade work.

Since rote singing is the principal work of the lower grades and since when a child finishes fourth grade work he enters the class made up of all grades from four to eight he gets very little individual reading. He comes to a class where some have acquired more speed in reading than he has and so he loses interest in working for himself and learns his part by rote. A lesson a week on individual sight work would improve the condition immensely but that lesson a week should be rigidly adhered to. The outlines call for two lessons per week in nearly every grade. The principal technical work in the upper grades is the study of key signatures, types of time and chromatic scales. Nos. 3 and 5 are doing this work very well.

Our primary classes present a similar problem as new pupils are coming in at different times. Unfortunately these little people have to get what they can from the others as there is very little time left for individual work or the forming of another class in schools where there are eight grades. The primary class at the village receive more advantages as the school can be graded better. The upper grades in this division, where the tone work warrants their use, work in Modern Music Series First Reader or Modern Music Series Primer; the lower grades work from the board and learn rote songs.

In drawing, the work consists of crayon, pencil, chalk, charcoal and water color, in grades fitted to use these mediums, applied to the drawing of flowers, fruits and vegetables; design in Christmas, Thanksgiving, and other special work, printing, group drawing, mechanical drawing and perspective.

Christmas brought its special work with making of Christmas cards, cornucopias, letter cases, pen trays, etc.

I wish to thank the School Committee for their many kindnesses and for the supplies furnished, and all others who have contributed in any way to the interest of the work.

Fourth. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay interest and part principal of the town debt or pass any vote relating thereto.

Fifth. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to apply for State Aid for highways for the ensuing year, or pass any vote relating thereto.

Sixth. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars for trunk line maintenance, or pass any vote relating thereto.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to paint the outside of the Town House and raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed three hundred dollars to pay for the same, or pass any vote relating thereto.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote to purchase a piece of land for a public dump, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to borrow the sum of fifteen thousand dollars, for the purpose of completing the South Side State Road in Dublin this year. The interest to be paid for by outside parties, or pass any vote relating thereto.
