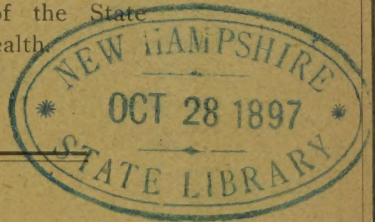

REPORT OF THE

Hampstead Public Library.

The year just past has been one of prosperity to the library, and another strong proof of the benefit such an institution must be to every town.

Two thousand, one hundred and seventy-five books have been taken out during the last year, of 91 library days, and are generally returned in a better condition than in some of the past years.

Some delinquents have been reputed from the non-payment of fines for keeping the books out over time and some cases of very apparent abuse of the books taken out and your trustees have been obliged to deprive such delinquents of the use of the library until proper satisfaction has been given.

But few new books have been placed on the shelves this year.

The trustees and librarian have long felt that the reading public needed and wished for a catalogue to help in the choice of books and have prepared one for publication.

The printing of it has been deferred from time to time, hoping that the books from the fund mentioned in last year's report might be received in season to be catalogued, but as nothing has been heard from them we shall not wait longer, and hope to have the catalogues in time for the usual March meetings.

A small sum will be charged for them, sufficient to cover the cost.

Again we would call your attention to the crowded condition of the books and room and hope for larger quarters soon.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Unfortunate conditions delayed the opening of the schools in the spring, and limited the school money to a much smaller amount than usual so that instead of thirty weeks, we have had but two terms of ten weeks each.

Three of our teachers, who had done good work in the past, and whom we expected to retain, went to more remunerative fields of labor. These vacancies, and one other, were supplied by teachers having had more or less experience in other schools. Three of these remained during the year, and the place of the other, at the end of the first term, was filled by Miss Carrie Randlett who was able to hold the school and accomplished very commendable results.

The plan of work made last year has not been fully carried out in all the schools, and in two, Physiology was wholly neglected, and in some others, very little practice was given the pupils in oral Arithmetic. With a constant change of teachers, it is very difficult to avoid having undue time spent on one study, and another equally important neglected; or to take up the work at the beginning of a year just where it was left at the close of the last.

With competent teachers, without change from year to year, the schools could be so arranged that these evils might be somewhat remedied and the schools become more efficient. There is no doubt, however, that many of the deficiencies of our schools arise from the limitations under which they must necessarily work. Since the one teacher in the country school must do the work

that is usually done by from six to eight teachers in the graded city school, it is easy to see what the result must be.

It is probably impracticable in a somewhat sparsely settled township like ours to establish and maintain a graded system of schools in a large, central school building. Of course, if it were practicable, the Board has no doubt that the town would willingly make such changes as would be necessary to bring about the result. The greatest obstacle to be overcome seems to be one of transportation, both in respect to its inconvenience to the pupils and the expense attending it. If these difficulties could be overcome, nothing would be of greater value to our children, than such a graded school, which all pupils of the town could attend from the primary to the highest grammar grade. A school of say four rooms would then enable the school course to be divided in its execution among four competent teachers each of whom would push along the pupils of her room to the next, until the primary pupils would finally emerge from the school well prepared for the High School, whose course of study should be adapted to take the pupil at graduation from the highest room of the graded school and to pass him along without any break in his intellectual progress. The fact that at present nearly all of the applicants to the High School are obliged to enter the so called preparatory course is not the fault wholly of the teaching done in our schools. Our teachers have far too many daily recitations. The recitations are much too short, necessarily so. In the hurry and rush of swiftly changing classes, and brief recitations almost no time can be found for extended explanation; and hence the pupil must depend too much upon the text book and his own resources. Under these conditions the brightest, naturally, will do much, but the duller ones must suffer. The result of these conditions is their much slower development and progress on the part of pupils than would obtain under the conditions of the graded system. And this progress must also be unequal; that is, some

studies will be pushed more than others. Yet in spite of these facts, the Board has tried faithfully to get the best results from our schools, and we are sure some very good work has been done by teachers and pupils.

We are gratified to report that all our teachers now in town were present at the Institute just holden at Windham, and we feel sure that the suggestions given as to the best methods of teaching and governing will be utilized by them in their future work.

We find from the various registers that the daily attendance has been higher than in some previous years, and fewer cases of tardiness are reported than last year.

In No. 7 a new school house is much needed ; the old one being too small, and having no ventilation without exposing the pupils to direct draughts of air : and but one door of entrance, and one small dressing-room.

Parents and friends have shown continued interest in the schools by frequent visits during the year. We hope these will increase in number each year, as they are an encouragement to the teacher and a stimulus to increased efforts on the part of the pupil.
