REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT.

To the School Board of Jaffrey:

I herewith submit my second annual report—the sixth annual report of the superintendent of schools in Jaffrey.

The membership by schools and by grades on Feb. 2, 1914 is as follows:

Growth.

The above table shows the actual membership in all the schools of the town on February 2. It will be seen that none of the schools are at present overcrowded, except the sub-grammar room with fifty-nine members. At the adjourned school meeting held last spring it was voted to take a part of the annex, fit it up as an extra room, and put the 5th or 6th grade in it. We have run through the year without taking advantage of the vote, but the room has been over-crowded and taxes the strength of the teacher. With 40 to 45 coming in from the 4th grade, 35 remaining and 5 from Jaffrey Centre, about 80 in all, the present room cannot hold them, Therefore, the only course seems to fit

up the extra room as provided, and put either the 5th or the 6th grade there. While this table shows an increase of 29 scholars over last year, I do not anticipate any serious over-crowding except as noted above.

Night School.

Mr. Kelleher, in charge of the night school, reports as follows under date of February 3.

During the fall months of the year, several people of the community suggested that a night school might be established here, for the purpose of affording several in the town the advantages of a schooling which they otherwise would not have.

About Dec. 1, 1913, a night school was opened in the grammar school building with an attendance of thirty-four. Their ages ranged from eighteen to forty-eight. These were divided into two classes: those who had had previous schooling and those who could not read or write.

The objects of the school were to teach the fundamentals; and secondly to show the attendant where he could secure information and how to use it, so as to be self-benefited.

The school has continued to run Tuesday and Thursday nights during the winter term and the progress has been very good considering the short time in school. Already several of the men, who were illiterates, have taken out their first papers for naturalization.

I feel sure that the experiment was entirely justified by its success and I ask that the Night School be continued during the coming winter as long as the attendance and enthusiasm continue.

Spelling Matches.

To encourage children in intertown educational rivalry, two tests have been planned, one held at Marlboro in June, 1913, and one to be held at East Jaffrey, February 7. The local children stood fourth in the written contest and first in the oral test at Marlboro in competition with five other towns. This I consider a good showing.

Loss of Teachers.

During vacation time, Jaffrey suffered the loss of several good teachers, Miss Blanche Browne going to Greenfield, Mass., Miss S. Ellen Brown and Miss Alice Hayes to Somerville, Mass., Miss Mildred Staples to Connecticut, and Miss Martha Sherry to Dover, N. H., (all at increased salaries) also Miss Winifred Coolidge by resignation. While the Normal Schools are turning

out plenty of graduates each year, yet it is unfortunate that we should have to lose our teachers just at a time when experience makes them most valuable. These losses are bound to occur until New Hampshire towns raise their salaries in competition with larger cities, and particularly those of Massachusetts.

Palmer System.

During the year, a new system of penmanship has been introduced into all the schools of the town. In the opinion of your superintendent it is an excellent system, based on the principal of muscular arm movement. It has been in use in Boston schools three or four years and is still retained. During the spring term, I expect to have another Parent's Day at which time I will provide special drills in penmanship in the afternoon for the visiting public.

Gifts for the Schools.

Many times during the year the teachers and superintendent desire money to use for purposes other than those for which regular appropriation has been made. In order that friends of the public schools may give money wisely, I list some of the things that the schools would be glad to receive:—

1. Money to pay for correction of defects in eyesight and hearing of poorer children.
2. A school library, 25 to 50 books. (Supt. will be glad to help in their selection).
3. A well decorated schoolroom interior with suitable pictures.
4. Prizes for intertown and inter-school contests.
5. A victrola.
6. Use of pieces of land for boys' corn and potato clubs.
7. Playground apparatus.

Medical Inspection.

An act approved April 22, 1913, provides for the medical inspection of all school children by a competent physician or physicians. Heretofore, no systematic examination of the children has been held, except tests by the teachers for detecting defective hearing and eyesight. Consequently, children suffering from ill health, sometimes from tuberculosis, find their way into public schools and inoculate other children. A layman cannot detect the incipient stages of a disease where a physician could. I heartily approve of the law and I hope that the voters of Jaffrey will see fit to take advantage of it at the annual school meeting. The adoption of the provisions of this act and the raising of money is left optional with the voters.

Physical Improvements.

I urge that the outside schools should be remodeled, one a year, so as to make them modern. I think this might be undertaken at no very great expense. Some of the modern improvements are:—

- 1st. Outbuildings provided with a cement vault and so situated that the children would not be obliged to go out of doors to reach them.
- 2nd. Slate blackboards.
- 3rd. Adjustable seats—latest type.
- 4th. Jacketed stove for more uniform ventilation and heating.
- 5th. More playground space.
- 6th. Good source of water supply.

School Savings.

On May 12, 1913, acting in co-operation with Mr. Townsend of the Savings Bank, we started a school saving system. Mr. Townsend reports February 2, 1914 as follows:—

Stamps sold in each school as follows, May 12, 1913 to February 2, 1914: Grade 1, \$36.96; Grade 2, \$45.04; Grade 3, \$56.67; Grade 4, \$47.96; Sub-Grammar, \$65.67; Grammar, \$25.14. Beginning Nov. 21: No. 3, \$5.73; No. 4, \$3.56. No. 7, \$8.78. Total, \$295.51.

Amounts transferred to a regular bank book. Grade 1, \$25.94; Grade 2, \$18.44; Grade 3, \$48.36; Grade 4, \$25.62; Sub-Grammar \$56.39; Grammar, \$17.94; No. 3, \$4.84; No. 4, \$1.47; No. 7, \$7.33. Total, \$205.33.

Stamps outstanding in each school: Grade 1, \$11.02; Grade 2, \$26.60; Grade 3, \$8.31; Grade 4, \$22.34; Sub-Grammar, \$9.28; Grammar, \$7.20; No. 3, \$.89; No. 4, \$2.09; No. 7, \$2.45. Total, \$90.18.

The above report speaks for itself. It shows that the children have banked about \$300 in less than a year. I wish to make it plain that the bank is not responsible for the stamp book until it is transferred to a regular bank account. Hence, children should not be careless in handling stamps or stamp books. It is not a paying proposition for the bank, except as it inculcates the habit of saving and makes the children depositors after they grow up.

Permit me to express my appreciation of the co-operation and help of the School Board and teachers, and the kindly attitude of the children and parents.

MR. WM. L. MACDONALD, SUPT. OF SCHOOLS, EAST JAFFREY.

At your request I am sending you a report of the drawing done in the schools of the town.

An outline is prepared for each month which plans for two half hour lessons per week, one to be given by the regular teacher, the other by the Supervisor.

Drawing is one of the subjects that should teach habits of neatness, accuracy, and observation and through these an appreciation of the beautiful. We may have the world's treasures of beauty if we have the power to appreciate them and with our many museums and libraries surely the only thing that can stand between us and these riches is the lack of appreciation. Drawing aims to develop this appreciation.

Our work started in September with the study of fall flowers and sedges and was followed in October by the autumn foliage. Paint, crayons and chalk were the mediums of expression. The abundance of flowers in their season affords material that the city child lacks, and while these are used every year in every grade, they always afford much pleasure. In November, vegetables and fruit with the Thanksgiving holiday furnished material. December brought the Christmas work. Grades I and II made match scratches and Christmas cards and folders; Grade III, stamp or court plaster cases and raffia picture frames; Grade IV, court plaster cases and cardboard toy; Grades V and VI, writing pads with brass corners; Grades VII and VIII, whisk broom holders. The work of grades V, VI, VII and VIII involved the principle of design and that of the lower grades folding and measuring.

The work for the remainder of the year will consist of Still Life, charcoal, mechanical drawing of toys, illustrating stories and Mother Goose rhymes, paper cutting, and painting of Spring flowers.

In January, the first grade enjoyed cutting out freehand and coloring toys and pasting them on a large tree drawn on the board.

The work in the High School has consisted of painting of flowers and vegetables, chalk work of the same, printing, a course in design, pose work and composition. This year the work has been placed on a ranking basis. Outlines have been provided each month for the members of the class, and hectographed copies of subject matter in the design so that work lost can be made up and receive credit.

I wish to thank teachers, committee, and Superintendent for their helpfulness in the work. Respectfully submitted,

TO THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS:

At your request I am sending a report of the work done in music since January, 1913.

Each grade is visited once a week for the music period of thirty minutes. The districts are visited every other week, numbers seven and nine one week, and numbers three and four the next. Besides the Supervisor's period, each room is supposed to give from twenty to thirty minutes daily.

The technical work from January to June was carried out according to the general outline planned for the year. The singing material in the primary grades consisted of rote songs. In the upper grades this material was taken from the New Educational Music Readers." Special Memorial Day music occupied all grades during May, and graduation music kept grades seven and eight busy for some time.

During the summer an outline planning the work from week to week with the exception of assignment of songs and review work was carefully prepared for each grade. Where these outlines have been followed the maximum amount of work will have been accomplished by the end of the winter term, thus leaving the spring term for the enjoyment of songs and some review and drill. In the districts, these outlines have been adapted to the classes found there. The work as planned calls for written work, ear training, individual sight singing, solo work in lower grades, interpretation of terms of tempo and expression and in general, the principles in the following outline.

Grade I. Tune, Major scale staff reading. Time, First time motion.

Grade II. Tune, Pitch names of lines and spaces. Time, Second Time Motion.

Grade III. Tune, Finding "Do" from key signatures. Time, Third Tune motion.

Grade IV. Tune, Names of keys, 1st step in chromatics.

Grade V. Tune, Second step in chromatics. Time, The Arithmetic in music; Theory of Common Time.

Grade VI. Tune, Position of sharps and flats in the signature; Use of all chromatic characters in writing. Time, Fourth time motion; Fifth time motion; Theory of Compound time; Sixth time motion; Seventh time motion.

Grade VII. Time, Syncopation.

Grade VIII. Tune, Bass clef; Review work of other grades. Time, Review of all time motions.

In the High School the music has been from leaflets purchased from time to time. In April, the school gave an Old

Folks' Concert, which netted \$30.96. This was deposited in the bank, and Miss Doris Coolidge was chosen treasurer. From this fund all the music for the High School has been purchased. During the winter and spring, we had an orchestra. So far this year, it has seemed inadvisable to from one. The graduating class took three of our members, another has moved out of the village and our pianist is too far away to get in for evening rehearsals.

During the winter, Miss Edith Baldwin entertained the school with Beethoven's Moonlight Sonata, an account of the composer's life, and a short talk on the sonata form of music.

We wish more of this work might be done for an appreciation of good music. A Victrola, not for the High School alone, but for all grades would fill this need. By its use much could be learned of the opera, orchestra, band and voice. It might be used to advantage on the playground for singing games or for dancing that is being taught so much in the city schools. We hope to have an entertainment soon, the proceeds of which will go toward purchasing such an instrument.

I wish to thank Superintendent, committee and teachers for their help.

Four cases committed to Westmoreland on sentence.

Two cases committed to Keene jail on sentence.

Three cases committed to Keene jail for April term.

Fourteen cases drunkenness; one case tramp; one case larceny; two cases illegally keeping liquor for sale; one case collecting junk without license; one case unnatural act; two cases hunting without license; one case breaking and entering in the day-time; one case attempt to commit rape; one case attempt to commit murder; one case cruelty to a horse; one case felonious assault; one case disturbing the peace; one case bastardy; two cases assault; one runaway boy returned to parents.

Four persons committed to State Hospital for treatment.

I would recommend that town water be installed at the lock-up, electric lights installed at lock-up, and a wood-shed built at the lock-up for storing wood to be worked up by tramps, and a telephone at the house of the chief of police.

- 7th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to apply for state aid for permanent highways for the year 1914 and raise an appropriate sufficient money for the same, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 8th. To see if the town will vote to pay the firemen the same as last year, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 9th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen and Chief of Police to enforce the law relating to the use of explosives on the Fourth of July, or act in any way relating thereto. As petitioned for by George H. Duncan and others.
- 10th. To see if the town will vote to celebrate the Fourth of July, and raise and appropriate money to pay for the celebration, or act in any way relating thereto. As petitioned for for by George H. Duncan and others.
- 11th. To see if the town will vote to pay the East Jaffrey Band for concerts given in the season of 1913, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 12th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be paid the East Jaffrey Band for a series of concerts to be given in East Jaffrey for the season of 1914, or act in any way relating thereto.

13th. To see if the town will vote to make any repairs or additions at the town lock-up, and raise and appropriate money to pay for the same, or act in any way relating thereto.

14th. To see if the town will vote to build a shed at the lock-up, and raise and appropriate money for the same, or act in any way relating thereto.

15th. To see if the town will vote to change its voting place, from Jaffrey to East Jaffrey, or act in any way relating thereto. As petitioned for by Jean W. Towne and others.

16th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a concrete or cement cross-walk on Main street opposite the Catholic church, or act in any way relating thereto. As petitioned for by George H. Duncan and others.

17th. To see if the town will accept a deed of the Warren Ground, so-called, from the East Jaffrey Manufacturing Company, the town paying the cost of transfer, choose Commissioner to manage said Grounds, make any necessary rules for the management of said Grounds, or act in any way relating thereto. As petitioned for by Wilbur E. Webster and others.

18th. To see if the town will vote to acquire any part of the property of the Jaffrey and Troy Electric Light Company in Jaffrey, or any other electric equipment, and provide for the maintenance and operation of the same, under the provisions of Chapter 280 of the Laws of 1911, or Chapter 218 of the Laws of 1913, raise and appropriate or borrow money to pay for the same, or act in any way relating thereto.

19th. To choose three Electric Light Commissioners to have charge of the Electric Lighting system of the town, one to serve until the Annual Town-meeting in March 1915, one until the Annual Town-meeting in March 1916, one until the Annual Town-meeting in March 1917, and until their successors are elected and qualified, or act in any way relating thereto.

20th. To see what action the town will take in regard to collecting outstanding bills due the town, or act in any way relating thereto.

21st. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the purpose of resetting the gravestones in the old cemetery in Jaffrey Centre, and repair the hearse house and gate to said cemetery, or take any action relating thereto. As petitioned by Guy H. Cutter and others.

22nd. To see what action the town will take in regard to repairing and building sidewalks, and raise and appropriate money for the same, or act in any way relating thereto.

23rd. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to have a sanitary drinking fountain installed at the watering tub at the Centre, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$15.00 to pay for same, or to act in any way relating thereto. As petitioned for by C. T. Johnson and others.

24th. To see if the town will vote to improve the "Turnpike Road" in the east part of the town between the residences of A. and C. A. Sawyer and B. G. Wilson, by lowering the grade by taking out the ledge, or act in any way relating thereto. As petitioned for by O. J. Dillon and others.

25th. To see if the town will vote to acquire land and building at Contoocook Lake near the ice-house for a park and public-bathing-place, raise and appropriate or borrow money to pay for the same, or act in any way relating thereto. As petitioned for by J. D. Donahue and others.

OFFICERS ELECTED.

Voted to accept and adopt reports as printed and corrected.

Voted that the pay of the selectmen after this date be 40 cents per hour, for each hour or fraction thereof more than one half hour.

Voted to accept and adopt the Selectmen's Estimate of Appropriations as printed in the town report, with the addition of \$750.00 to the item of town charges.

Voted to pass over Art. 4 (Liquor agent).

Voted to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Voted \$1400.00, to assist the Conant High School.

Voted to apply for State Aid for highways.

Voted to pay the firemen the same as last year.

Voted to instruct the Selectmen and Chief of Police to enforce the laws relating to the use of explosives and firearms on the streets and in public places of this town on July 4th, 1913.

Voted that the Moderator appoint a committee of five to have a July 4th celebration in charge, and that the money remaining from last years celebration, the income from the Emory fund for one year be appropriated for the use of said Committee, that \$100.00 be raised and appropriated for said committee for such celebration.

Voted to pay the East Jaffrey Cornet Band \$66.67 for band concerts given in 1912.

Voted \$150.00 for band concerts in 1913, two to be given at Jaffrey Centre.

Art. 14, motion lost (in reference to new town hall).

Voted to authorize the abutting owners to raise the grade of the sidewalk at the corner of Main and River streets with suitable curbing, Selectmen to resurface same.

Voted that the Moderator appoint a committee of three to investigate electric lighting, under the town's charter, publish report of investigation in next annual town report, and voted \$50.00 for use of said committee.

Voted that the Board of Health be instructed to install a sewer on North street as far as the intersection with Main street provided those benefited pay not less than one third of the cost, and provided private individuals cause a survey of the town to be made at no expense to the town for a complete system of sewers for East Jaffrey Village, said survey to be the property of the town, and said North street sewer to be part of such system, provided the town's share of the cost shall not exceed \$1000.00 and authorize the Selectmen to borrow not exceeding \$1000.00 for same.

Voted to discontinue highway west of watering tub in Jaffrey Centre.

Voted to extend the water main from South Hill Road to Slab City, provided the guaranteed income be not less than 3 per cent on the cost.

Voted to accept \$100.00 from John E. Baldwin in trust for the perpetual care of his cemetery lot, such sum to be carried in a joint Trust Fund to be known as the "Cemetery Fund" the income of which after paying for the care of such lot be carried to the general fund of the town.

Voted \$450.00 to purchase a road roller.

Voted that the Moderator appoint a committee of three to investigate the matter of replacing wooden bridges and report to an adjourned town meeting in Union Hall, East Jaffrey, Monday evening May 19th, 1913. Said committee to receive same compensation as the Selectmen for services rendered. Voted \$300.00 for compensation and expenses of said committee.

Voted \$500.00 for repair of sidewalks.

Voted to adjourn till Monday May 19, 1913 at 8 o'clock in the afternoon at Union Hall, East Jaffrey, N. H.
