STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE,

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pelham in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Pilgrim Hall in said Pelham on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the repair of highways and bridges for the year ensuing and make appropriations for the same. And determine in what manner the same shall be expended.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and set apart the amount of money necessary to secure State aid for permanent improvements of highways, under the law passed at the January Session, 1905.

5. To see what disposition the Town will make of the Dog Fund for the year ensuing.

6. To see what disposition the Town will make of the Literary Fund for the year ensuing.

7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the extermination of the Gipsy and Browntail Moth, and take any action in relation thereto.

8. To choose two persons for Trustees of Cemeteries for three years.

9. To choose one person for Trustee of Public Library for three years.

10. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the Public Library in addition to the amount required by law.

11. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for School purposes for the year ensuing.

12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Cemeteries for the ensuing year.

13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

14. To see if the Town will vote to build a Town Hall building and if voted in the affirmative to see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the same. Also to choose agents or Committees to carry the same into effect or to take any other action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Stone Crusher, Screen, Elevator, Bin and also a suitable engine to oper-

ate the same, and purchase a Horse Roller not less than four tons weight; and if voted in the affirmative to choose a committee to carry the same into effect or to take any other action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to pay more per hour to men and teams for labor on the Highways the ensuing year than has been paid in the past.

17. To see if the Town will vote to select three men for appraisers of real estate for the year ensuing.

18. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two per cent on taxes of 1908 list paid before Sept. 1, 1908.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOLS.

One cannot take an inventory of the returns for the money invested in schools as one can of investments in other kinds of business. The returns are as real but not of a nature for actual stock-taking. The town appropriates annually, a certain amount of money for the use of the children and young people, this money to be transmuted into brain and soul power. Citizens, parents, teachers and pupils help or hinder the results.

During the last year, the schools, taken as a whole, have been much more difficult of management in the line of proper control than for a long time previous. This has come, in part, from a changing population, and, in part, from the fact that a considerable number of our children are at an age where great wisdom is needed for proper guidance and control. It should always be remembered that the teacher has a very complex problem, for she has to deal not only with the individual child, but with the child as associated with the children of twenty or more families. The good of the individual and the good of the whole, must every moment be held in mind. In one school, for on term, a number of children from a lumber camp added much to an already difficult problem. Although it has been harder for the teachers than formerly, yet with this one exception we have had orderly schools and excellent work has been done.

FOUNDATIONS.

"What are you studying John?" "Fundamentals," was the answer. It was a long word but it was the right work.

It covers the whole course of study below the High school. The work of these lower schools is the getting in of foundations, foundations that include habits and tendencies. Foundations that are so broad and thorough and fine that any superstructure may be erected thereon according to individual choice. The looking forward to the privileges of the High school is a stimulus to the pupils of the ungraded rural schools, but too much hurry to enter is becoming a menace to proper foundations. Special preparation for taking an entrance test ought never to be needful. Education is a growth, a process of evolution. One should be able to pass as naturally from one grade of school to a higher as from the First to the Second reader. If one enters the High school without proper foundations, the whole course of the four years is hard, unsatisfactory and to a considerable degree unprofitable.

We have to do our own growing, mental as well as physical; it is one of the things that no person can do for another. The stalwart fellow of six feet four had to do every inch of it for himself. No child can be stretched mentally any more than he can be stretched physically, therefore, the ideal teacher is the teacher who can so rouse, encourage and enthuse the child that it will be ambitious to depend upon itself, and will, under guidance, do patient, persevering, faithful work.

School No. 5—First term, 19 scholars; second, 19; third, 20; for the year, 20, 8 boys and 12 girls. Average attendance, 16. All attended to reading, spelling, penmanship, arithmetic, drawing and vocal music; 12 to geography,

grammar and composition, 6 to history and 3 to physiology.

The amount expended for the five teachers in the town and the miscellaneous expenses for all the schools is \$1,612.94. This does not include the book account, repair bill or tuition for scholars in high school. The book account, is \$118.93. The number of scholars who have attended the schools in the town during the year is 156, $\frac{8}{3}$ boys and 73 girls. Expense per scholar for teaching and miscellaneous expenses is \$10.34. Expense per scholar for book supply is seventy-six cents plus.

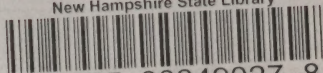
